CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

Fiscal 2008/09 proved to be an extremely challenging year for the Group. Not only were we required to deal with the ongoing effects of the global financial turmoil on our core OEM business, we were also obliged to take a number of difficult decisions relating to our non-core activities.

Our core OEM business remains robust. Whilst demand has been affected by the global downturn, with customers either delaying current purchases or cutting back on production needs, and exports suffered, the Governmental initiatives to stabilize the operating environment in China have helped to alleviate the situation, yet margins remain under pressure. Top Form during this time chose to rationalize capacity in order to preserve margins; we accelerated our strategic moves to downsize the most expensive capacities in our manufacturing structure.

Our results for the year reflect these developments: we held our sales turnover on lower unit output, margin slightly dropped, and pre-tax profit was mopped up by some one-off expenses incurred in our strategic moves. We also prudently increased our tax provisions, relating to prior years, in light of the ongoing Hong Kong Inland Revenue Department (the "IRD") tax audit.

Our decision to exit from the Brand business resulted in impairment losses and other costs impacting the income statement. This decision was made in light of the performance and prospects of the segment, taking into account the need to safeguard resources in the current economic climate. The exit was completed prior to the year end.

In last year's Chairman's Statement I was looking forward with anticipation to the finalization of our acquisition of a number of companies in the ACE Style Intimate Apparel Limited Group. In view of the rapid deterioration in calendar 2008 of the global credit and financial markets, together with the economic outlook, it was mutually decided by all parties to terminate the Share Acquisition Agreement. The Group's income statement bore the professional fees and other expenses relating to the aborted transaction, which would otherwise have been capitalized as a component of the cost of acquisition.

As mentioned earlier, at the time when demand was pent-up, we took the opportunity to accelerate our strategic moves to trim the most expensive capacity in our manufacturing structure. The exercise continues, and has inevitably incurred one-time costs such as severance and asset write-offs. We, however, view it as an investment in improving our long term cost structure and competitiveness. In the meantime, the lost capacity is being replaced by the expansion of existing facilities in the low cost regions of both China and Thailand and we are quite satisfied with the progress.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

Looking ahead, we take the view that the worst time seems to be behind us. However, uncertainties and volatility remain on the way to market recovery. Our current order book suggests a gradual return of business towards the end of the calendar year and probably beyond. We will continue to manage our capacity with a cautious and resilient approach and, taken together with our robust balance sheet, we will continue to be well positioned for the continuing challenging market and resultant opportunities ahead.

Your Board, having taken into account the current business climate, our cash position, and reinvestment needs, has decided to propose a final dividend of HK\$0.025 per share for the fiscal year ended 30 June 2009. No interim dividend was paid during this fiscal year. An interim dividend of HK\$0.015 per share was paid in the last fiscal year.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation to our Board members for their counsel and support, to our shareholders for their understanding and our employees who have contributed so much to the sustainability of our business.

The Group's business activities during 2009 were organized into two operating units, namely Manufacturing and Brand, and a Corporate cost centre. During the year the decision was taken to exit the Brand business and this exit was completed before the year end.

For the year ended 30 June 2009, the Group recorded a profit before taxation of HK\$13.8 million compared with a profit before taxation of HK\$65.4 million in the previous year.

The Group recorded a loss after taxation of HK\$14.0 million compared with a profit after taxation of HK\$53.3 million last year. Loss per share was HK\$0.012 compared to earnings per share of HK\$0.054 last year.

The Group prudently increased the tax provision for certain subsidiaries, relating to prior years, after reassessing the total potential tax exposure of the Group for the relevant period resulting in an additional charge of HK\$14.6 million in the current year's income statement.

Our results were severely impacted by our strategic decision taken during our first half to exit from our Brand business, with resultant costs and provisions, together with the costs incurred in the termination of a Share Acquisition Agreement, also in our first half. As a consequence of the above a Profit Warning was issued by the Company prior to our interim results announcement.

THE RESERVED

MANUFACTURING

During the year our core OEM business achieved global sales of 45.8 million units of brassieres compared to 49.4 million units in 2008.

Our first half accounted for 24.4 million units, compared to 25.1 million units in 2008. In our second half we sold 21.4 million units compared to 24.3 million units in 2008.

Notwithstanding the reduction in unit sales, manufacturing revenues were basically flat compared to last year reflecting a modest increase in average selling prices. This increase was resulted from our changing product and customer mixes, which helped to mitigate the margin erosion brought on by immense market pressure and exacerbated by the rising costs in the operating environment, particularly during the first half of the fiscal year. The gross profit percentage attributable to this segment dropped from 20% to 19%.

There has been some stabilization in the operating environment in the region as a result of governmental initiatives in China aiming to help its industries in the global economic crisis, including a freeze on minimum wage levels and an increase in the tax rebate on imported materials for processing and exports of textile and garment products. The currency appreciation of the PRC Rmb and Thai Baht against the US dollar eased during the year, most notably during our second half.

We continue the repositioning of our production facilities to lower cost areas where people need employment and the operating environment is favourable for future growth.

Our three plants in China accounted for 58% of our global capacity, with Thailand at 35%, up from 31% in the previous year.

Towards the end of the year we made the decision to cease the manufacturing operations of one plant located in the vicinity of Bangkok, with the supporting functions remaining at that location. As at 30 June we had provided some HK\$8.5 million in respect of the impairment losses on property, plant and equipment. Subsequent to the year end approximately HK\$6.2 million was paid for severance and other costs as described in note 34 to the financial statements and will be reflected in the income statement in the first half of fiscal 2010.

The system of joint import surveillance which tracked the issue of export licenses for exports from China to the EU expired at the end of calendar 2008 and has not been extended. The quota agreement with the US expired at the end of calendar 2008. Usage did not reach maximum agreed levels in that year and there are currently no quota arrangements in place.



BRAND

The strategic development of this business segment had been closely monitored by the Board and senior management. In view of the performance and prospects of the segment, taking into account the need to safeguard resources in the current economic climate, the decision was taken to exit the business. Our exit was completed prior to the year end.

Revenues recognized during the year relating to this discontinued business amounted to HK\$17.3 million compared to HK\$20.6 million in the previous year.

Losses recognized in this year's income statement amounted to HK\$25.1 million, which included HK\$16.8 million relating to impairment losses and other costs connected with the closure. The prior year loss was HK\$9.6 million.

CORPORATE

The charges attributable to our corporate cost centre increased from HK\$18.2 million in the previous year to HK\$25 million this year. The current year charges include approximately HK\$9.2 million of professional fees and other expenses relating to our aborted acquisition, details of which are set out in note 7 to the financial statements.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The financial position of the Group remains healthy with shareholders' funds standing at HK\$545.8 million as at 30 June 2009 compared with HK\$558.4 million at the previous year end.

As at 30 June 2009, bank balances and cash stood at HK\$318.3 million. Credit facilities available to the Group amounted to HK\$150 million whilst gearing remained at an insignificant level.

As detailed in note 11 to the financial statements, certain subsidiaries of the Company are currently the subject of a tax audit by the IRD in respect of the years of assessment 2001/02 to 2006/07. Subsequent to the balance sheet date the IRD issued notices of estimated assessment for the years of assessment 2003/04 to 2007/08 amounting to HK\$93,053,000. The amount of tax reserve certificates required to be purchased will be the subject of negotiation with the IRD. Any settlement of the above will impact upon the cash position of the Group.

Capital expenditure during the year amounted to HK\$17.2 million.

OUTLOOK

We do not anticipate any significant growth for the Group in the coming year. Our markets remain challenging and customer demands volatile as consumer confidence in spending is still far from fully recovered.

We will continue to reshuffle the structure of our manufacturing facilities with the objectives of improving the cost efficiency and long term competiveness of the business, including migrating production to our most effective locations and searching out new areas for expansion.

The difficult decisions taken during our first half severely impacted the results of the Group. We remain confident, however, that the actions we have, and are currently taking, will see us emerge stronger at the end of these uncertain times.

Executive Directors

Fung Wai Yiu, aged 62, is the Chairman of the Group. Mr. Fung has 42 years of experience in the apparel industry.

Wong Chung Chong, Eddie, aged 64, is the co-founder of the Group. Mr. Wong is the Group Managing Director and is responsible for the operations of the Group. Mr. Wong has over 43 years of experience in the brassiere trade.

Non-executive Directors

Lucas A.M. Laureys, aged 64, has been a Non-executive Director of the Company since September 2002. He is the President of Van de Velde N.V., the shares of which are listed on the Brussels Stock Exchange. Mr. Laureys has over 37 years of experience in the brassiere trade and specialises in marketing. Mr. Laureys holds a degree in marketing from the University of Ghent-Leuven. Mr. Laureys is a director of Lucas Laureys N.V. and a board member of several European companies, namely Omega Pharma (a company listed on Euronext), Hedgren, Sinelco International N.V. and Delta Lloyd Bank N.V.

Herman Van de Velde, aged 55, has been a Non-executive Director of the Company since September 2002. He is the Managing Director of Van de Velde N.V., the shares of which are listed on the Brussels Stock Exchange. Mr. Van de Velde joined the brassiere industry in 1981 and is well versed in operating the brassiere business in Europe.

Independent Non-executive Directors

Marvin Bienenfeld, aged 77, was appointed as a Non-executive Director of the Company in August 1998 and then re-designated as an Independent Non-executive Director of the Company in September 2004. Mr. Bienenfeld was formerly the Chairman of Bestform Inc. and has over 42 years of experience in the ladies' intimate apparel industry in the United States of America.

Chow Yu Chun, Alexander, aged 62, has been an Independent Non-executive Director of the Company since February 1993. He is a fellow member of The Association of Chartered Certified Accountants ("ACCA") and a Certified Public Accountant ("CPA") of the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("HKICPA"). He has over 32 years of experience in commercial, financial and investment management in Hong Kong and China. Mr. Chow is a director of New World China Land Limited and Playmates Toys Limited. Mr. Chow previously held directorship in New World Mobile Holdings Limited, Playmates Holdings Limited and Yu Ming Investments Limited but had resigned with effect from 1 February 2007, 28 December 2007 and 23 May 2008 respectively. All of the above mentioned companies are listed on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange.

Leung Churk Yin, Jeanny, aged 44, was re-designated as an Independent Non-executive Director of the Company in September 2008. Prior to her re-designation, she had been an Executive Director of the Company since February 1998 and then re-designated as a Non-executive Director in April 1999. Ms. Leung is a seasoned investment banker with over 22 years of corporate finance experience in the Greater China region. She is also the Chief Executive Officer and an executive director of eSun Holdings Limited, and an executive director of Lai Sun Garment International Limited, Lai Sun Development Company Limited and Lai Fung Holdings Limited respectively. All of which are companies listed on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange.

Mr. Leung is currently the Chairman of the Hong Kong Construction Materials Association and the Hong Kong Cement Association.

Lin Sun Mo, Willy, SBS, MBE, JP, age 49, has been an Independent Non-executive Director of the Company since May 2006. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Babson College in the United States of America and is the Managing Director of Milo's Knitwear (International) Limited. Mr. Lin is also the Chairman of Board of Governors of the Prince Philip Dental Hospital, Hong Kong Export Credit Insurance Corporation Advisory Board and the Hong Kong Shippers' Council, Deputy Chairman of Federation of Hong Kong Industries, Vice Chairman of Textile Council of Hong Kong and committee member of Council of the Chinese University of Hong Kong.

Management and Senior Staff

Michael John Austin, aged 61, is the Chief Financial Officer and Company Secretary of the Group. Mr. Austin is a fellow member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales and a CPA of the HKICPA. He has over 28 years of diverse senior financial and general management experience in Hong Kong and internationally.

Chan Man Ying, Vivian, aged 34, is the Group Financial Controller. She is a CPA of the HKICPA and a fellow member of the ACCA. She joined the Group in 2004 and has 12 years of experience in accounting, auditing and financial management areas.

Chen Fu Mei, aged 62, is a Director and the General Manager of Shenzhen Top Form Underwear Co., Limited. Ms. Chen joined the Group in March 1993 and is responsible for the administration of the Group's companies in the People's Republic of China.

Choi Wai Yin, aged 62, is a Director of Top Form Brassiere Mfg. Co., Limited and joined the Group in 1993. Ms. Choi has over 38 years of experience in apparel manufacturing. She oversees all manufacturing operations within the Group.

Wan Ho Yau, David, aged 51, is a Director of Grand Gain Industrial Limited, a subsidiary of the Company, producing foam pads and accessories for brassiere manufacturing. Mr. Wan joined the Group in 1994. He holds degrees in Computer Science and Business Administration from York University, Toronto, Canada.

Wong Chor Wai, aged 41, joined the Group in 1989 and is a Director of Top Form Brassiere Mfg. Co., Limited. Mr. Wong holds a Bachelor degree in Science from The University of Hong Kong.

Wong Hei Yin, Henry, aged 46, is a Director and the General Manager of Charming Elastic Fabric Company Limited, a subsidiary of the Company, producing elastic tapes. Mr. Wong holds a Bachelor degree in Accounting from Lamer University, the United States of America.

Wong Kai Chi, Kenneth, aged 35, is the son of Mr. Wong Chung Chong, Eddie. He joined the Group in 1997 and is a Director of Top Form Brassiere Mfg. Co., Limited. Mr. Wong is responsible for the Group's sales and marketing as well as product development activities. Mr. Wong holds a Bachelor degree in Marketing and Operation Management from Boston University, the United States of America and a Master degree in International Business from Asian Institute of Technology, Thailand.

Wong Kai Chung, Kevin, aged 33, CFA, is the son of Mr. Wong Chung Chong, Eddie. He joined the Group in 2001 and is a Director of Marguerite Lee Limited, Meritlux Garment and Unique Form Manufacturing Company Limited. Mr. Wong is responsible for the Group's Corporate Development. He graduated from Colby College, the United States of America majoring in Economics in 1998.

Tsui Yan Yan, Suzanne, is the Group Human Resources and Administration Manager. Ms. Tsui holds a Bachelor degree majoring in Psychology from Scotland, the United Kingdom and a Master degree from the University of Hong Kong. She obtained her Juris Doctor degree in law from the Chinese University of Hong Kong.

CONNECTED TRANSACTIONS

The Group has been for the past 27 years conducting transactions with Van de Velde N.V. ("VdV") by supplying ladies' intimate apparel to VdV. VdV is a connected person of the Company by virtue of its being a substantial shareholder of the Company and Mr. Lucas A.M. Laureys and Mr. Herman Van de Velde, the President and the Managing Director of VdV respectively, are Non-executive Directors of the Company. All transactions between VdV and the Group would constitute continuing connected transactions ("Continuing Connected Transactions") pursuant to the Listing Rules of the Hong Kong Stock Exchange. Accordingly, a master agreement dated 18 September 2005 (the "Master Agreement") had been entered into between VdV and the Company to govern the Continuing Connected Transactions and to set annual caps for the Continuing Connected Transactions in respect of the three financial years ended 30 June 2008.

On 18 June 2008, the Company had entered into a renewal agreement (the "Renewal Agreement") with VdV to renew the Master Agreement for a further three years up to the financial year ending 30 June 2011 regarding the sale of ladies' intimate apparel to VdV.

An announcement dated 18 June 2008 and a circular dated 4 July 2008 regarding the Continuing Connected Transactions contemplated under the Renewal Agreement and the annual caps for the respective financial years 2009, 2010 and 2011 had been duly published and despatched to shareholders and approval had been obtained from independent shareholders of the Company on 23 July 2008.

1. **GENERAL**

The Company is incorporated in Bermuda as an exempted company with limited liability and its shares are listed on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited ("Hong Kong Stock Exchange"). The addresses of the registered office and principal place of business of the Company are disclosed in the section of corporate information of the annual report.

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars, which is different from the functional currency of the Company, being United States dollars ("USD"). As the Company is a public company with shares listed on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange and most of its investors located in Hong Kong, the directors consider that Hong Kong dollars is preferable in presenting the operating result and financial position of the Group.

The Company is an investment holding company. Its principal subsidiaries are engaged in the design, manufacture, distribution, wholesale and retail of ladies' intimate apparel, principally brassieres.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company (its subsidiaries). Control is achieved where the Company has power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

The results of subsidiaries acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated income statement from the effective date of acquisition or up to the effective date of disposal, as appropriate.

Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies into line with those used by other members of the Group.

All intra-group transactions, balances, income and expenses are eliminated on consolidation.

Minority interests in the net assets of consolidated subsidiaries are presented separately from the Group's equity therein. Minority interests in the net assets consist of the amount of those interests at the date of the original business combination and the minority's share of changes in equity since the date of the combination. Losses applicable to the minority in excess of the minority's interest in the subsidiary's equity are allocated against the interests of the Group except to the extent that the minority has a binding obligation and is able to make an additional investment to cover the losses.

Investments in associates

An associate is an entity over which the investor has significant influence and that is neither a subsidiary nor an interest in a joint venture.

The results and assets and liabilities of associates are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting. Under the equity method, investments in associates are carried in the consolidated balance sheet at cost as adjusted for post-acquisition changes in the Group's share of the net assets of the associates, less any identified impairment loss. When the Group's share of losses of an associate equals or exceeds its interest in that associate (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the associate), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. An additional share of losses is provided for and a liability is recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of that associate.

Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over the cost of acquisition, after reassessment, is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where a group entity transacts with an associate of the Group, profits and losses are eliminated to the extent of the Group's interest in the relevant associate.

Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods sold in the normal course of business, net of discounts and sales related taxes.

Revenue from sales of goods are recognised when goods are delivered and title has been passed.

Interest income from a financial asset is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment including leasehold land and buildings held for use in the production or supply of goods, or for administrative purposes, other than construction in progress, are stated at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment, other than construction in progress, over their estimated useful lives and after taking into account of their estimated residual value, using the straight-line method.

Construction in progress represents property in the course of construction for its own use is stated at cost less any identified impairment loss. Construction in progress is classified to the appropriate category of property, plant and equipment when completed and ready for intended use. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

Assets held under finance leases are depreciated over their expected useful lives on the same basis as owned assets or, where shorter, the term of the relevant lease.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the item) is included in the consolidated income statement in the year in which the item is derecognised.

Prepaid lease payments for leasehold land

Prepaid lease payments represent upfront premium paid for use of land. Prepaid lease payments are released to the consolidated income statement over the lease term on a straight-line basis.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost, which comprises all cost of purchase and cost of conversion, where applicable, other costs that have been incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition, is calculated using the weighted average method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Impairment

At each balance sheet date, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised as an expense immediately.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised as income immediately.

Leasing

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

The Group as lessee

Assets held under finance leases are recognised as assets of the Group at their fair value at the inception of the lease or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the consolidated balance sheet as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are charged directly to profit or loss.

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease. Benefits received and receivable as an incentive to enter into an operating lease are recognised as a reduction of rental expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis.

Leasehold land and building

The land and building elements of a lease of land and building are considered separately for the purpose of lease classification, unless the lease payments cannot be allocated reliably between the land and building elements, in which case, the entire lease is generally treated as a finance lease and accounted for as property, plant and equipment. To the extent the allocation of the lease payments can be made reliably, leasehold interests in land are accounted for as operating leases.

Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recorded in respective functional currency (i.e. the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates) at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each balance sheet date, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the balance sheet date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on the translation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

For the purposes of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. Hong Kong dollars) at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date, and their income and expenses are translated at the average exchange rates for the year, unless exchange rates fluctuate significantly during the period, in which case, the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised as a separate component of equity (the translation reserve). Such exchange differences are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which the foreign operation is disposed of.

Textile quota entitlements

The cost of textile quota entitlements is charged to the consolidated income statement at the time of utilisation or expiration.

Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised as and included in finance costs in the consolidated income statement in the period in which they are incurred.

Retirement benefit costs

Payments to the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme and state-managed retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

For defined benefit retirement benefit plans, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at each balance sheet date. Actuarial gains and losses which exceed 10 per cent of the greater of the present value of the Group's pension obligations and the fair value of plan assets are amortised over the expected average remaining working lives of the participating employees. Past service cost is recognised immediately to the extent that the benefits are already vested, and otherwise is amortised on a straight-line basis over the average period until the amended benefits become vested.

The amount recognised in the consolidated balance sheet represents the present value of the defined benefit obligation as adjusted for unrecognised actuarial gains and losses and unrecognised past service cost, and as reduced by the fair value of plan assets. Any asset resulting from this calculation is limited to unrecognised actuarial losses and past service cost, plus the present value of available refunds and reductions in future contributions to the plan.

Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit as reported in the consolidated income statement because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years, and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax is recognised on differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit, and is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences, and deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from goodwill or from the initial recognition of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries and associates, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Taxation - continued

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each balance sheet date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the liability is settled or the asset is realised. Deferred tax is charged or credited in the consolidated income statement, except when it relates to items charged or credited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is also dealt with in equity.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the consolidated balance sheet when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

Financial assets

The Group's financial assets are classified as loans and receivables.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. At each balance sheet date subsequent to initial recognition, loans and receivables (including debtors, bills receivable, bank balances and cash) are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any identified impairment losses (see accounting policy in respect of impairment loss on loans and receivable below).

Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset, or, where appropriate, a shorter period.

Interest income is recognised on an effective interest basis for debt instrument.

Impairment of loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are assessed for indicators of impairment at each balance sheet date. Loans and receivables are impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the loans and receivables, the estimated future cash flows of the loans and receivables have been impacted.

Objective evidence of impairment could include:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty; or
- default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; or
- it becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial re-organisation.

An impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss when there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired, and is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the original effective interest rate.

The carrying amount of the loans and receivables is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all loans and receivables with the exception of debtors, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognised in profit or loss. When a debtor is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited to profit or loss.

If, in a subsequent period, the amount of impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment losses was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the asset at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

Financial liabilities and equity

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by a group entity are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Group after deducting all of its liabilities.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities (including creditors and bank borrowings and other liabilities) are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the Company are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Repurchase of the Company's own equity instruments is recognised directly in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss on the purchase of the Company's own entity instruments.

These repurchased shares were cancelled upon repurchase and, accordingly, the issued share capital of the Company was reduced by the nominal value of these shares with corresponding increase in capital redemption reserve. The aggregate consideration paid on repurchase was charged to retained profits.

Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments through the expected life of the financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period.

Interest expense is recognised on an effective interest basis.

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the assets expire or the financial assets are transferred and the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial assets. On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised directly in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligation specified in the relevant contract is discharged, cancelled or expires. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

4. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The Group makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future in preparing accounting estimates. The resulting accounting estimates may not equal to the actual results. The key estimates and assumptions that may have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities are discussed below.

Allowance of doubtful debts

The Group recognises an allowance for doubtful debts based on assessment of recoverability of trade debtors. The Group has a concentration of risk with the top five customers comprising HK\$89 million (2008: HK\$123 million) of total trade debtors. The Group has a concentration of risk with the top five customers domiciled in the United States of America (the "USA") and Europe comprising 81% (2008: 75%) of the Group's total revenue. Any adverse changes in the economic environment of the USA and Europe may impact the recoverability of the trade debtors. Any change in circumstances pertaining to one of these customers would have a material effect to the carrying amount of trade debtors. Allowances are applied to trade debtors where events or changes in circumstances provide objective evidence that the balances may not be collectible. The identification of doubtful debts requires the use of judgment and estimates. Where the actual cash flows are less than expectations, such difference will impact the carrying value of trade debtors and doubtful debts expense.

Allowance of inventories

The Group makes allowance for inventories based on an assessment of the net realisable value of inventories. Allowances are applied to inventories where events or changes in circumstances indicate that the net realisable value is lower than the cost of inventories or that the inventories have no further use. The Group has a concentration of risk with the top five customers domiciled in the USA and Europe comprising 81% (2008: 75%) of the Group's total revenue. Any adverse changes in the economic environment of the USA and Europe may impact demand for the Group's products and the net realisable value of the inventory. The allowance also depends on management's assessment of the condition and usefulness of the inventories. Where the expectation of the net realisable value or use of inventories is different from the original estimate, such difference will impact the carrying value of inventories and the allowance of inventories in the consolidated income statement. The Group's carrying amount for inventories as at 30 June 2009 was approximately HK\$162,920,000 (2008: HK\$230,210,000), net of allowance of inventories of HK\$44,102,000 (2008: HK\$34,146,000).

(b) **Defined contribution schemes**

The Group has joined the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme ("MPF Scheme") for all employees in Hong Kong who have registered with the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme Authority under the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Ordinance. The assets of the MPF Scheme are held separately from those of the Group in funds under the control of an independent trustee. Under the rules of the MPF Scheme, the employer and its employees are each required to make contributions to the scheme at rates specified in the rules. The only obligation of the Group with respect of the MPF Scheme is to make the required contributions under the MPF Scheme. No forfeited contributions are available to reduce the contributions payable in the future years.

The eligible employees of the Company's subsidiaries in the PRC are members of pension schemes operated by the Chinese local government. The subsidiaries are required to contribute a certain percentage of the relevant part of the payroll of these employees to the pension schemes to fund the benefits. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the Group in funds under the control of the Chinese local government.

The total cost charged to consolidated income statement of HK\$22,144,000 (2008: HK\$20,439,000) represents contributions payable to these schemes by the Group in respect of the current accounting period.

Defined benefit scheme (c)

Eligible employees of the Company's subsidiaries in the Philippines currently participate in a defined benefit pension scheme operated by the local municipal government. The calculation of contributions to the scheme is based on certain percentages of the employees' salaries. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the Group in funds under the control of the local municipal government.

Under the plan, the employees are entitled to retirement benefits equal to 22.5 day's pay for every year of credited service in accordance with the Retirement Pay Law of The Philippines. No other postretirement benefits are provided.

The most recent actuarial valuation of the present value of the defined benefit obligation was carried out on 30 June 2008 by E.M. Zalamea Acturial Services, Inc., an independent firm of actuaries. The present value of the defined benefit obligation, the related current service cost, past service costs and actuarial losses were measured using the projected unit credit method.

Credit risk

As at 30 June 2009 and 2008, the Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which will cause a financial loss to the Group due to failure to discharge an obligation by the counterparties is arising from the carrying amount of the respective recognised financial assets as stated in the consolidated balance sheet.

In order to minimise the credit risk, the management of the Group has delegated a team responsible for determination of credit limits, credit approvals and other monitoring procedures to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debts. In addition, the Group reviews the recoverable amount of each individual trade debt at each balance sheet date to ensure that adequate impairment losses are made for irrecoverable amounts. In this regard, the directors of the Company consider that the Group's credit risk is significantly reduced.

The bank balances and deposits are concentrated on certain counterparties and the credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high crediting ratings assigned by international credit rating agencies.

In respect of debtors, the Group's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the market demand in intimate apparel industry and economic conditions in the USA, Europe and New Zealand. At the balance sheet date, the Group had a certain concentration risk as approximately 71% (2008: 75%) of trade debtors was due from the top five major customers.

28. SHARE OPTION SCHEME

The Company's share option scheme (the "Scheme") was adopted pursuant to a resolution passed on 22 November 2001 (the "Adoption Date") for the primary purpose of providing incentives or rewards to the Directors, employees or any other persons at the discretion of the Board, and the Scheme will expire on 21 November 2011. Under the Scheme, the Board of Directors of the Company may grant options to any employees, including executives or officers of the Company and its subsidiaries and any other persons at the discretion of the Board to subscribe for shares in the Company.

The total number of shares in respect of which options may be granted under the Scheme is not permitted to exceed 10% of the shares of the Company in issue on the Adoption Date, being 73,560,874 shares (the "Scheme Limit"). With prior approval from the Company's shareholders, the Company may refresh the Scheme Limit by 10% of the shares of the Company in issue as at the date of such shareholders' approval. The number of shares in respect of which options may be granted to any individual in any one year is not permitted to exceed 1% of the shares of the Company in issue at any point in time, without prior approval from the Company's shareholders. Options granted to substantial shareholders or independent non-executive directors in excess of 0.1% of the Company's share capital and with a value in excess of HK\$5 million must be approved in advance by the Company's shareholders.

Options granted must be taken up within 14 days of the date of grant, upon payment of HK\$1 per grant. Options may generally be exercised at any time from the second anniversary of the date of acceptance to the tenth anniversary of the date of grant. In each grant of options, the Board of Directors of the Company may at their discretion determine the specific exercise period. The exercise price is determined by the Directors of the Company, and will not be less than the highest of the closing price of the Company's shares on the date of grant and the average closing price of the shares for the five business days immediately preceding the date of grant and the nominal value of the shares.

As at 30 June 2009 and 2008, no share options of the Company are being held by the Directors or anyone else under the Scheme.

During the years ended 30 June 2009 and 2008, no share options were granted, exercised, cancelled or lapsed.

Shenzhen Top Form Underwear Co., Limited 深圳黛麗斯內衣有限公司 ("SZTF") is a joint venture company established in the PRC and was originally held for a period of twelve years from 28 February 1987. On 18 September 1998, an extension agreement was entered into between the Group and the joint venture partner to extend the joint venture period for a further 10 years to 28 February 2009. On 12 November 2008, the Group entered into a revised joint venture agreement with the joint venture partner to extend the joint venture period for a further 3 years to 28 February 2012. Pursuant to the joint venture agreement and the revised joint venture agreement under which the joint venture was established, the Group has contributed 70% of the registered capital of SZTF. However, under another agreement entered into between the Group and the joint venture partner, the Group is entitled to 100% of this joint venture company's profit after deducting a fixed annual amount attributable to assets contributed by the joint venture partner. The Group is entitled to receive its attributable share of the net assets upon liquidation of the joint venture, and so this joint venture is being accounted for as a subsidiary of the Group.

As at 30 June 2009, all of the deferred shares issued by subsidiaries were held by group companies. The deferred shares carry no right to dividend or to receive notice of or to attend or vote at any general meeting of the respective companies. On winding-up, the holders of the deferred shares are entitled to one half of the remaining assets of the respective companies after the first HK\$100,000,000,000,000 has been distributed equally amongst the holders of the ordinary shares.

None of the subsidiaries had any debt securities subsisting as at 30 June 2009 or at any time during the year.
