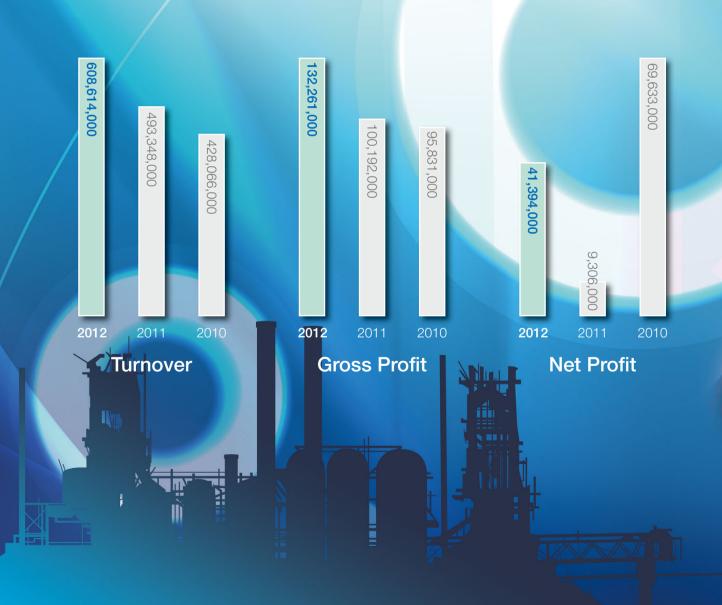

DEAR SHAREHOLDERS,

On behalf of the board of directors (the "Board") of Jutal Offshore Oil Services Limited (the "Company"), I am pleased to present the annual report of the Company and its subsidiaries (the "Group") for the year ended 31 December 2012 to the shareholders.

BUSINESS REVIEW

After years of strategic transformation, the Group has made progress in enhancing core technology, developing general contracting capacity, nurturing new businesses and seeking new customers. Through strategic and cultural integration, we capitalized on the opportunities and made great strides in our business. During the year, our overall operating performance was stable with growth in both income and gross profit; meanwhile breakthroughs are also achieved in our new business.

Completion of the construction of Zhuhai phase II site

The Group has a fabrication site of 400,000 square meters in Equipment Manufacture Area of Zhuhai Gaolan Port Economic Zone. The construction of Zhuhai phase II site was completed in September 2012. At this stage, the construction in respect of approximately half of the size of our fabrication site in Zhuhai has been completed and put into operation. Equipped with a pier and a skidway with a weight capacity of 2,000 tons, Zhuhai phase II site is furnished with 3 production plants and ancillary facilities dedicated for manufacturing subsea oil and gas equipment. With the phase II construction being completed and put into production, the Group is able to undertake the construction of large-scale and high-end oil and gas equipment and facilities. Such initiative has significantly improved our production capacity.





It is believed that the abyssal region will be the next target for developing offshore oil and gas. In response to that trend, the Group endeavors to take advantage of the opportunities and commit its best efforts to establish long-term strategic cooperation with internationally recognized enterprises engaging in offshore engineering and the production of subsea facilities, in order to undertake the fabrication of their subsea oil and gas equipments. Commencing from 2011, the Group has successfully built and delivered relevant products with different models and during the year, it has undertaken a large-scale subsea equipment fabrication project that is in progress as planned. Such project carries with it a great workload and demands a high level of skill, posing considerable challenges to the fabrication process. The successful implementation of such project implies that the Group possesses first-class technology in manufacturing subsea oil and gas equipment and the ability to further undertake subsea oil and gas equipment fabrication projects. All these marked a critical milestone for the fabrication business in which enormous efforts will be devoted by the Group in the future.





Improve competitiveness by focusing on technical enhancement

As an integrated provider of oil and gas equipment and technical services, the Group promotes the development strategy of building its competitiveness through acquiring core technology and professional competence. During the year, the Group has continued to invest in technological R&D and design strength and to exert efforts in improving our engineering capability by recruiting new staff and concentrating on the R&D of novel equipment and technology. Some of the self-developed technologies have already been applied to our projects that we have undertaken and have been proved to be cost-saving and highly efficient. Two patent certificates were obtained and four applications for patent were completed in 2012. The Group is able to provide EPC (Engineering, Procurement and Construction) general contracting services for its oil, gas and water processing skid equipment business and may offer one-stop solutions to customers based on their technical requirements, which include engineering, procurement, manufacturing, on-site installation and commissioning. Through the successful implementation of some complex projects during the year, our project management capability and production assurance have been improved greatly.

The Group continues to advocate the concept of management systems that are comprised of quality control system, occupational health and safety system and environmental protection system throughout the Group. Through training and implementation of such practices, we are able to develop a sense of motivation and create a positive culture. In the meantime, the adoption of 5S management systems has also contributed to the effective management over various elements of production such as staff, equipment, materials and techniques and has fostered all-round quality control by improving the production environment, reducing costs, enhancing efficiency and promoting production safety.

Develop service sector by exploring new businesses and markets

With our dedications to maintaining the relationships with customers, the Group always keeps in touch and communicates with them as well as analyses their needs and conducts tracking on their plans. This enables us to capture business opportunities, strengthen our competitive edges as a market pioneer and avoid low-end competitions. Through implementing certain major projects, we further consolidate our competitive edges in the industry with respects to the technical support services for offshore oil and gas business. In view of the market and business opportunities as a result of the development of new offshore oil and gas fields in China, the Group has actively approached new customers; broadened the content and scope of services and ardently responded to the customers' needs. During the year, we have also set up the subsea technical services department and successfully undertaken several projects, which further extends our offshore oil and gas technical support services to the subsea service sector.

As a result of the global downturn of shipbuilding industry, our shipbuilding service business has further shifted to the offshore engineering sector. Meanwhile, stable business relationships with various shipyards have been established after years of market development. Also, the operations remained stable as a whole.

Foster the offshore engineering business steadily

Penglai Jutal Offshore Engineering Heavy Industries Co., Ltd. ("Penglai Jutal"), an associate of the Group, endeavors to diversify developments and adopts parallel market strategies of developing domestic and international businesses simultaneously. During the year, its scope of business and scale of products continued to expand while the offshore engineering business remains satiated. Other than the successful completion of several domestic and international projects, it also contracted construction of a 30,000-ton platform substructure facilities, enabling the company to accumulate valuable experience in the development of deepwater and heavy-duty machineries. Penglai Jutal has also recorded an admirable growth for its turnover during the year.

PROSPECTS

The development strategies of offshore oil and gas in China will provide us with unprecedented business opportunities with respects to our oil and gas fabrication and service sectors. The improvement of the shipbuilding industry and the great situation of the offshore engineering market will also bring positive impacts to our related businesses.

To fully guarantee the successful implementation of the existing projects, we will further enhance the site facilities, promote the standard of services and capacity in internationalization and strengthen the long-term strategic cooperation with customers. Leveraging on projects implementation to accumulate relevant experience and operating capacity so as to sustain the operations of similar business, expand the existing customer base, and attract new customers and opportunities at the same time. In every link of the project operations, the Group will further upgrade the standards of management and control, enhance the performance of staff and strictly control the costs.

Since the strategic transformation, we understand deeply that the possession of fundamental technologies is the key to realize our strategic goals and enhance our values. The Group will continue to enhance the research and design capacities and recruit more specialists and technicians in the future. Through different measures such as establishing external cooperation, the research on new products and the standard of design could be fostered. Also, the selection of material equipments, detail design and solutions of design processing will be optimized and the accuracy of design will be enhanced so as to uplift the engineering capacity to an international level as soon as possible.

Following the expansion of the Company in terms of scale and business, we will also encounter more challenges on management. However, we will continue to strive for improvement, innovation and excellent service with long-term planning. On behalf of the Board, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to all shareholders of the Company, our enthusiastic and outstanding management and staff, and all parties who offered firm support to the Company.

FINANCIAL AND BUSINESS REVIEW

Turnover

In year 2012, the Group recorded turnover of approximately RMB608,614,000, representing an increase of 23.36% or RMB115,266,000 compared with year 2011. The increase is mainly attributable to the Group's major business of fabrication of oil and gas facilities and oil and gas processing skid equipment business. Revenue from this segment increased by 29.65% or RMB97,971,000 over last year.

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Cost of sales and service

Cost of sales and service of the Group for the year amounted to approximately RMB476,353,000, representing an increase of 21.16% or RMB83,197,000 compared with year 2011.

Gross profit



The total gross profit of the Group amounted to approximately RMB132,261,000 in year 2012, representing an increase of 32.01% or RMB32,069,000 compared with RMB100,192,000 in year 2011. The overall gross profit margin increased from 20.31% in year 2011 to 21.73%. Save for the gross profit margin from the provision of technical supporting and related services for oil and gas industry and sales of equipment and materials business which slightly decreased from 39% last year to 32%, all other businesses recorded growth in their gross profit margins. The gross profit margin from the provision of technical support services for shipbuilding industry business increased from 13% last year to 16% where the fabrication of oil and gas facilities and oil and gas processing skid equipment business increased from 17% last year to 20%.

Other income

Other income of the Group decreased by 56.29% or approximately RMB1,364,000 compared with last year, primarily due to the decrease in net foreign exchange gains.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses increased by 28.91% or RMB24,115,000 compared with year 2011 to approximately RMB107,542,000, which was mainly due to an increase in the salary and welfare of the management staff of approximately RMB12,055,000 and the provision of approximately RMB5,164,000 made correspondingly by the management in respect of recoverability of the trade receivables.

Finance costs

Finance costs reached to approximately RMB9,858,000 in year 2012, which was mainly comprised of bank loans interest of approximately RMB8,655,000 and bank charges and other finance costs of approximately RMB1,203,000.

Share of profits of an associate

The Group held 30% of equity interest in Penglai Jutal. In year 2012, Penglai Jutal recorded net profit of approximately RMB104,156,000. The Group's share of profits from the associate amounted to approximately RMB31,247,000 under the equity method of accounting.

Profit attributable to owners of the Company and earnings per share

In year 2012, profit attributable to owners of the Company amounted to approximately RMB41,394,000, which represent an increase of 344.81% or RMB32,088,000 compared to that of RMB9,306,000 in year 2011. Basic and diluted earnings per share attributable to owners of the Company were RMB0.0663 and RMB0.0661 respectively.

2. LIQUIDITY AND FINANCIAL RESOURCES

As at 31 December 2012, the working funds (cash on hand and bank deposits) of the Group amounted to approximately RMB108,125,000 (2011: RMB70,261,000). During the year, cash inflow from operating activities amounted to approximately RMB81,777,000, cash outflow from investing activities amounted to RMB76,416,000, and cash inflow from financing activities amounted to RMB32,111,000.

As at 31 December 2012, the Group had banking facilities amounted to approximately RMB327,025,000 (2011: RMB257,563,000), of which approximately RMB156,888,000 was utilised and approximately RMB170,137,000 was unutilised. Out of the unutilised banking facilities, approximately RMB66,000,000 was available for raising bank loans. As at 31 December 2012, bank loans of the Group amounted to approximately RMB126,000,000.

3. CAPITAL STRUCTURE

During the year, the Company placed 6,000,000 ordinary shares at the price of HK\$0.6 per share and 34,000,000 warrants at the placing price of HK\$0.01 per warrant. As at 31 December 2012, the share capital of the Company was comprised of 628,799,278 ordinary shares (2011: 622,799,278 ordinary shares).

As at 31 December 2012, the net assets of the Group amounted to approximately RMB874,275,000 (2011: RMB825,062,000), comprising non-current assets of approximately RMB859,800,000 (2011: RMB761,644,000), net current assets of approximately RMB38,586,000 (2011: RMB85,993,000) and non-current liabilities of approximately RMB24,111,000 (2011: RMB22,575,000).

4. SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENT

During the current year, the Group has completed the construction of the second phase of Zhuhai site which mainly included the wharf, the skid way, the workshop and the ancillary facilities and has been put into operation. The total investment was approximately RMB100 million.

For the year ended 31 December 2012, the Group did not have any other significant investment.

5. FOREIGN EXCHANGE RISK

The principal place of production and operation of the Group is in the PRC, and the functional currency of the principal operating subsidiaries of the Group is RMB. The Group also operates its business overseas and possesses assets which are priced in currencies other than RMB. Fluctuation of RMB against other currencies like United States Dollars ("USD") and Hong Kong Dollars ("HK\$") would bring certain foreign exchange risk to the Group. The Group would minimise the amount of assets which are priced in other currencies like USD and HK\$, perform rolling estimates on foreign exchange rates, and would consider potential foreign exchange risk when entering into business contracts. The Group did not enter into any high risk derivatives trading and leveraged foreign exchange contracts for the years ended 31 December 2012 and 2011.

6. ASSETS PLEDGED BY THE GROUP

As at 31 December 2012, approximately RMB6,607,000 of the bank deposits were pledged as security deposits for the issuance of performance bonds, letter of credits and bank acceptance. Bank loans of approximately RMB7,000,000 (2011: Nil) are secured by a charge over the Group's prepaid land lease payments and property, plant and equipment amounted to approximately RMB677,000 and RMB2,190,000 respectively.

7. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

As at 31 December 2012, the Group did not have any significant contingent liabilities.

8. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Group's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Group's ability to continue as a going concern and to maximise the return to the shareholders through the optimisation of the debt and equity balance.

The Group sets the amount of capital in proportion to risk. The Group manages the capital structure and makes adjustment to it in the light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Group may adjust the payment of dividends, issue new shares, buy-back shares, raise new debts, redeem existing debts or sell assets to reduce debts.

The Group monitors capital using a gearing ratio, which is bank borrowings divided by total equity of the Group. The Group's policy is to keep the gearing ratio at a reasonable level.

The increase in bank loans and the gearing ratio compared to the year ended 31 December 2011, was mainly due to capital expenditure for the construction of Zhuhai phase II site in 2012 while a number of engineering projects were underway, resulting in an increase in bank loans.

9. EMPLOYEES AND REMUNERATION POLICY

As at 31 December 2012, the Group had total 2,979 employees (2011: 2,658), of which 567 (2011: 525) were management and technical staff, and 2,412 (2011: 2,133) were technicians.

The Group determines the remuneration and incentives of employees with reference to the prevailing industry practice, and based on their position, duties and performance. The Group contributes to social security funds including pension fund, medical, unemployment and industrial accident insurances for employees in the PRC, and contributes to mandatory provident fund for employees in Hong Kong according to corresponding laws and regulations.

The Group puts emphasis on staff development, encourages employees to pursue continuous education, and formulates training programs for employees every year.

DIRECTORS

Executive Directors

Mr. Wang Lishan (王立山), aged 54, is an executive director and the chairman of the Company, who is responsible for the overall development strategic planning. He was graduated from Dalian Polytechnic University (大連理工大學) in 1982 with a bachelor's degree in offshore oil construction engineering. Mr. Wang has rich experience of management and administration in the oil and gas industries. Prior to joining the Group, he worked in Bohai Petroleum Company Platform Manufacturing Factory (渤海石油公司平臺製 造廠) from 1982 to 1988 and Offshore Oil Company of Bohai Oil Company (渤海石油公司) from 1988 to 1995. Mr. Wang joined the Group in 1995, and was appointed as an executive director in November 2005.

Mr. Cao Yunsheng (曹雲生), aged 50, is an executive director and CEO of the Company, who is responsible for the overall operations of the Group. He was graduated from Tianjin College of Finance and Economics (天津財經學院) in 1988, majoring in accounting, and was graduated with a master degree in business administration from Tianjin University (天津大學) in 2004. Mr. Cao joined the Group in 2001 as the deputy general manager and he is in charge of the finance, administration and the capital operations of the Group and supervision of the Group's cash-flow management. Prior to joining the Group, he was the supervisor of the finance department and chief accountant of Bohai Petroleum Company Platform Manufacturing Factory (渤海石油公司平臺製造廠), the chief accountant of China Offshore Oil Platform Construction Company (中國海洋石油平臺製造公司) and a financial controller of CNOOC Engineering. Mr. Cao was appointed an executive director in November 2005.

Mr. Chen Guocai (陳國才), aged 51, is an executive director and president of the Company, who assist the overall operations of the Group and is responsible for the management of Jutal Offshore Oil Services (Zhuhai) Company Limited ("Zhuhai Jutal") (珠海巨濤海洋 石油服務有限公司). He was graduated with a bachelor degree in petroleum engineering from the Southwest Petroleum Institute (西南 石油學院) in 1982, and obtained a MBA degree from the Maastricht School of Management, the Netherlands. Mr. Chen joined China National Offshore Oil Corp. ("CNOOC") (中國海洋石油總公司) as engineer and operation manager in 1982. He Joined Yacheng 13-1 gas project in joint venture with an American Company Arco as CNOOC Chief Representative of the project, assumed a leadership role in the partnership with ARCO involving in project construction and field operations. He was then promoted to the position of Vice President of CNOOC Shanghai in 2001 and was transferred to CNOOC International as vice president in 2004. Mr. Chen joined the Group in February 2007 and was appointed as an executive director in April 2007. He has rich experiences in the petroleum industry ranging from field operation, engineering and construction, operational and corporate management, merger and acquisition, international and joint venture operation and management.

Mr. Zhao Wuhui (趙武會), aged 39, is an executive director and vice president of the Company, responsible for the finance and accounting and human resource management. Mr. Zhao graduated from Northeast Forestry University (東北林業大學) with a bachelor degree in accounting in 1998, and obtained a MBA degree from the University of Wales in 2009. He joined the Group in March 2002, had served as finance manager of the Group and deputy general manager of Penglai Jutal Offshore Engineering Heavy Industries Co., Ltd. (蓬萊巨濤海洋工程重工有限公司). Prior to joining the Group, he had worked with Kerry Oils & Grains (China) Co., Ltd. (嘉裡糧油 (中國)有限公司) and Everbright Timber Industry (Shenzhen) Co., Ltd. (光大木材工業(深圳)有限公司) as accountant and auditor. Mr. Zhao was appointed an executive director in May 2012.

DIRECTORS AND SENIOR MANAGEMENT

Independent non-executive Director

Mr. Su Yang (蘇洋), aged 45, is an independent non-executive director of the Company. Mr. Su obtained a bachelor degree in statistics from Hunan University (湖南大學) and the Certificate of the Chinese Institute of Certified Public Accountants (中國註冊會計師協會) in 1992 and 1994 respectively. He has a wealth working experience in the field of accounting. Mr. Su had been project manager of Shenzhen Zhongcheng Certified Public Accountants (深圳中誠會計師事務所), department manager of Yuehua Certified Public Accountants Co., Ltd. Shenzhen (深圳岳華會計師事務所有限公司) and the head and principal partner of Shenzhen TaiYang Certified Public Accountants (深圳泰洋會計師事務所). He is currently the managing partner of Wuzhou Songde Certified Public Accountants (五 洲松德聯合會計師事務所). Mr. Su was appointed as an independent non-executive director in August 2006.

Mr. Lan Rong (蘭榮), aged 53, is an independent non-executive director of the Company. He was graduated from Jiangxi University of Finance and Economics (江西財經大學) in 1983 with a bachelor degree in investment finance and obtained a master degree in money and banking from Xiamen University (廈門大學) in 1997. He also obtained his EMBA degree from Cheung Kong Graduate School of Business (長江商學院) in 2007. Mr. Lan has rich experience in finance, banking and investments. He had worked in Fujian Industrial Bank (福建興業銀行) and now is the Chairman of Industrial Securities Co., Ltd. (興業證券股份有限公司). Mr. Lan was appointed as an independent non-executive director in May 2008.

Mr. Xiang Qiang (項強), aged 49, is an independent non-executive director of the Company. Mr. Xiang graduated from Beijing Tsinghua University (清華大學) with a bachelor's degree in architectural structural engineering in 1986, and obtained his MBA degree from Xiamen University (廈門大學) in 2000, studied from 2005 to 2007 and obtained EMBA degree from Cheung Kong Graduate School of Business (長江商學院). Mr. Xiang has extensive senior managerial experience. He has been appointed as the general manager, chairman or president of various entities in China with focus on different areas such as hospitality, securities, real estate project management and development, etc.. Mr. Xiang is currently the executive director and president of PCD Stores (Group) Limited (中國春天百貨集團有限公司). Mr. Xiang was appointed as an independent non-executive director in May 2008.

Mr. Gao Liangyu (高良玉), aged 48, is an independent non-executive director of the Company. He obtained his master degree of economics and his bachelor degree at Graduate Department of People's Bank of China (中國人民銀行研究生部) in 1991 and Nanjing Agriculture University (南京農業大學) in 1986 respectively and is an economist. Mr. Gao started his career in 1986 and the positions held by him include officer of the audits department of Nanjing Agriculture University, section chief of Finance Management Department of the People's Bank of China, the deputy division chief of Public Offering Supervision Department of the Chinese Securities Regulatory Commission (中國證券監督管理委員會). At present he serves as the vice chairman of China Southern fund Management Limited (南方基金管理有限公司). Mr. Gao was appointed as an independent non-executive director in May 2009.

AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE AND COMPANY SECRETARY

Mr. Luk Chi Tong (陸志棠), aged 41, joined the Company in January 2007. Mr. Luk currently acts as the company secretary and the authorised representative of the Company. He has extensive auditing experience. He is a fellow of The Association of Chartered Certified Accountants and is an associate member of the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

Mr. He Rugang (賀汝剛), aged 50, is the vice president of the Company, who is responsible for the Group's major commercial business and offshore engineering market development. Mr. He Joined the Group in 1997 as a deputy general manager, and has been in the SBM Beijing Representative office, Dalian Shipbuilding Heavy Industry Group Offshore Engineering Co., Ltd. (大連船舶重工集團海洋工程有限公司), and CNOOC North Pars project as sales manager, deputy general manager and commercial manager respectively from year 2005 to year 2010. He was appointed the current position in January 2011. Prior to joining the Group, Mr. He had worked in CNOOC platform Fabrication Co. (中海油平臺製造公司) and Shenzhen Chiwan Offshore Engineering Co., Ltd. (深圳赤灣海洋工程有限公司).

Mr. Li Jing (李靖), aged 45, is the vice president of the Company, who is responsible for the overall management of the subsea business division and quality & safety management. He was graduated from Sun Yat-Sen University (中山大學) with a bachelor's degree in enterprise management. Mr. Li joined the Group in 1999, and had served as operation manager and the manager of New Star System Formwork Co., Limited (鑫星系統模板有限公司). Mr. Li also served as the deputy manager of Penglai Jutal Offshore Engineering Heavy Industry Co., Ltd. (蓬萊巨濤海洋工程重工有限公司) from the year 2004 to 2009. Prior to joining the Group, Mr. Li had worked in CNOOC platform Fabrication Co. (中海油平臺製造公司), Shenzhen Chiwan Offshore Engineering Co., Ltd. (深圳赤灣海洋工程有限公司) and Shenzhen Chiwan Sambawang Engineering Co. Ltd. (深圳赤灣勝寶旺工程有限公司).

Mr. Guo Yong (郭勇), aged 51⁺ is the vice president of the Company, who is responsible for the Group's R & D and the oil and gas processing equipment market development. Mr. Guo graduated from the Nanjing Institute of Chemical Technology (南京化工學院) with a bachelor degree in Chemical Machinery in 1983, and obtained his master's degree in engineering from Huazhong University of Science and Technology (華中工學院) in 1985. Mr. Guo had served as senior engineer and manager in Beijing Petrochemical Engineering Company (北京石化工程公司) and Technip Engineering Consulting (Shanghai) Co., Ltd. (德希尼布工程咨詢(上海)有限公司). Mr. Guo joined the Group in 2007.

Mr. Li Chunyi (李純毅), aged 61, is the assistant president of the Company and in charge of the commercial and marketing of the Bohai region. He joined the Group in 1999 and had served as the administration manager of Shenzhen Jutal and the deputy manager of Tianjin Jutal. Prior to joining the Group, Mr. Li was a government official.

Mr. Jin Yan (金焱), aged 47, is the assistant president of the Company, who is responsible for the investor relations and the construction of Zhuhai site. He was graduated from the Mechanic Engineering Faculty of Nautical College (上海海運學院) (now the Engineering Mechanic Faculty of the Logistics Engineering College of Shanghai Maritime University (上海海本學)) in 1988. Mr. Jin joined the Group in March 2000. Prior to joining the Group, Mr. Jin was the manager and deputy general manager of the property department of Shenzhen Gold Industries Co., Ltd. (深圳黃金實業有限公司) and the technical supervisor and deputy manager of the technical department of Shekou China Merchants Port Service (招商港蛇口港務有限公司).

Mr. Yang Bo (楊波), aged 41, is the assistant president of the Company and the manager of Jutal Marine Shipbuilding Engineering Services (Dalian) Co., Ltd. ("Dalian Jutal")(巨濤海洋船舶工程服務(大連)有限公司), a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company, and is in charge of its overall operation. He was graduated from East China Shipbuilding Institute (華東船舶工業學院) with bachelor's degree in marine engineering in 1994. Mr. Yang joined the Group in May 2002 and had served as deputy manager and general manager of Dalian subsidiary. Prior to joining the Group, he was the head of research office of Dalian Shippard (大連造船廠).

Mr. Xu Zhe (徐喆), aged 37, is the assistant president of the Company, who is responsible for the Group's commercial and marketing. He was graduated from Wuhan University of Water Resources and Hydroelectric Engineering (武漢水利水電大學) with bachelor's degree in electro technology in 1996 and obtained a degree of executive master of business administration from the University of Texas at Arlington in 2011. Mr. Xu joined the Group in April 1998 and had served a number of positions in the Group including the project manager, procurement manager and commercial manager.

The directors of the Company (the "Directors") present the annual report and the audited accounts of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2012.

PRINCIPLE ACTIVITIES

The principle activity of the Company is investment holding.

The Group is mainly engaged in providing integrated services, including fabrication and technical support services in offshore oil and gas and shipbuilding industry.

The activities of the principal subsidiaries are set out in note 19 to the consolidated financial statements.

DISTRIBUTABLE RESERVES

As at 31 December 2012, the Company's share premium reserve was approximately RMB648,627,000 (subject to section 34 of the Cayman Companies Law and the Article of Association of the Company), and the retained earnings approximately RMB37,228,000 were available for distribution to the shareholders of the Company (the "Shareholders").

Under the Companies Law (Revised) of the Cayman Islands, the funds in the share premium account and the special reserve account of the Company are distributable to the Shareholders provided that immediately following the date on which the dividend is proposed to be distributed, the Company will be in a position to pay off its debts as they fall due in the ordinary course of business.

RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS

Details of the Group's result for the year ended 31 December 2012 are set out in the consolidated income statement on page 38.

The directors recommend the payment of final dividend of HK\$0.02 per each ordinary share of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2012.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Details of the movement during the year in the property, plant and equipment of the Group are set out in note 15 to the consolidated financial statements.

SHARE CAPITAL AND TRANSACTIONS INVOLVING SHARES OF THE COMPANY

On 25 September 2012, the Company issued 6,000,000 ordinary shares on placement at a price of HK\$0.6 per share. The Company also issued 34,000,000 warrants on placement at a price of HK\$0.01 per warrant.

As at 31 December 2012, the share capital of the Company comprised of 628,799,278 ordinary shares (2011: 622,799,278 ordinary shares).

Details of the movements during the year in share capital of the Company are set out in note 34 to the consolidated financial statements.

PRE-EMPTIVE RIGHTS

There are no provisions for pre-emptive rights under the Company's articles of association or the laws of the Cayman Islands, being the jurisdiction in which the Company was incorporated, which would oblige the Company to offer new Shares on a pro rata basis to existing Shareholders.

PURCHASE, SALE OR REDEMPTION OF THE COMPANY'S LISTED SECURITIES

During the year ended 31 December 2012 neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries purchased, sold or redeemed any of the Company's listed securities.

SHARE OPTION

The Company's share option scheme ("Share Option Scheme") was adopted on 28 August 2006 by the way of passing resolutions by all of the then Shareholders with a valid period of 10 years commencing on the date on which the shares of the Company commenced trading on the main board of the Stock Exchange. The Share Option Scheme enables the Company to grant options to eligible participants as incentives and rewards for their contribution to the Group. Eligible participants include all full time employee, Directors (including independent non-executive Directors) and part-time employees with weekly working hours of 10 hours and above, of the Group, substantial Shareholders of each member of the Group, associates of the Directors and substantial shareholders of any member of the Group, trustee of any trust pre-approved by the board of Directors (the "Board"); and any advisor (professional or otherwise), consultant, distributor, supplier, agent, customer, joint venture partner, service provider to the Group whom the Board considers, in its sole discretion, has contributed or contributes to the Group.

The General Scheme Limit of the Share Option Scheme has been refreshed and approved by Shareholder's resolution at the Company's Annual General Meeting held on 27 May 2009. The total number of Shares which may be issued upon exercise of all options to be granted under the Share Option Scheme must not, in aggregate, exceed 49,800,000 Shares, representing 10% of the shares in issue on the date of the said Annual General Meeting (498,000,000 Shares). The total number of Shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of the options granted to each participant (including both exercised and outstanding options) in any 12-month period must not exceed 1% of the relevant class of the shares in issue from time to time.

The General Scheme Limit of the Share Option Scheme has been further refreshed and approved by Shareholder's resolution at the Company's Annual General Meeting held on 25 May 2012. The total number of Shares which may be issued upon exercise of all options to be granted under the Share Option Scheme must not, in aggregate, exceed 62,279,927 Shares, representing 10% of the shares in issue on the date of the said Annual General Meeting (622,799,278 Shares). The total number of Shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of the options granted to each participant (including both exercised and outstanding options) in any 12-month period must not exceed 1% of the relevant class of the shares in issue from time to time.

According to the terms of the Share Option Scheme, the consideration for the grant of the options should be HK\$1.00. The options may be exercised in accordance with the terms of the Share Option Scheme at any time during the exercise period as determined by the Board which shall in any event not be more than ten years from the date of grant.

The Board approved to grant and the Company has granted options to Directors and other eligible participants under the Share Option Scheme from 1 January 2007 to 31 December 2011. As at 31 December 2012, details of the options granted under the Share Option Scheme are as follows:

MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

During the year, the aggregate sales attributable to the Group's five largest customers accounted for approximately 44.15% of the Group's total sales and the sales attributable to the Group's largest customer were approximately 11.69% of the Group's total sales. The aggregate purchases during the year attributable to the Group's five largest suppliers accounted for approximately 14.62% of the Group's total purchases and the purchases attributable to the Group's largest supplier were approximately 4.13% of the Group's total purchases.

Except Dalian Shipbuilding Industry Offshore Company Limited ("Dalian Shipbuilding Offshore"), which is an associate (as defined under the Listing Rules) of Prospering Investments Limited, a company beneficially wholly-owned by Mr. Wang Lishan, who is the chairman, an executive director and a controlling shareholder of the Company (as defined under the Listing Rules), none of the directors, their associates or any shareholders of the Company which, to the knowledge of the directors, owned more than 5% of the Company's issued share capital, had any interest in any of the five largest customers or suppliers of the Group.

CONNECTED TRANSACTIONS

On 10 April 2012, the Company entered into the Master Service Agreement with the Dalian Shipbuilding Offshore, pursuant to which Dalian Shipbuilding Offshore agrees to engage the Group to provide construction support services including construction and other agreed services for a term of 31 months commencing from 1 June 2012 to 31 December 2014.

Dalian Shipbuilding Offshore is an associate (as defined under the Listing Rules) of Prospering Investments, a company beneficially wholly-owned by Mr. Wang Lishan, who is the chairman of the Company, an executive Director and a controlling Shareholder (as defined under the Listing Rules). Dalian Shipbuilding Offshore is therefore a connected person of the Company under the Listing Rules. As the relevant percentage ratios on an annual basis exceeds 5% and the transactions amount under the Master Service Agreement exceeds HK\$10,000,000, the continuing connected transactions constitute non-exempt continuing connected transactions ("CCT") for the Company and are subject to the reporting and announcement requirements and requires the approval of the Independent Shareholders.

The Independent Shareholders approved the proposals regarding the CCT at the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 25 May 2012.

According to the rules 14A.37 of the Listing Rules, the independent non-executive directors had reviewed the CCT and confirmed that the CCT have been entered into:

- (1) in the ordinary and usual course of business of the Group;
- (2) on normal commercial terms; and
- (3) in accordance with the relevant agreement governing them on terms that are fair and reasonable, and in the interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole.

Further, in accordance with Rule 14A.38 of the Listing Rules, the Company's external auditor was engaged to report on the Group's continuing connected transactions in accordance with Hong Kong Standard on Assurance Engagements 3000 "Assurance Engagements Other Than Audits or Reviews of Historical Financial Information' and with reference to Practice Note 740 "Auditor's Letter on Continuing Connected Transactions under the Hong Kong Listing Rules" issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

The external auditor has confirmed in writing to the Board that nothing has come to its attention that causes it to believe that the CCT:

- (1) have not been approved by the Board;
- (2) were not, in all material respects, entered into in accordance with the pricing policies of the Group;
- (3) were not, in all material respects, entered into in accordance with the relevant agreement governing the transactions; and
- (4) have exceeded the maximum aggregate annual value disclosed in the previous announcement dated 10 April 2012.

A copy of the auditor's letter has been provided by the Company to the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited.

SUFFICIENCY OF PUBLIC FLOAT

Based on information that is publicly available to the Company and within the knowledge of the Directors, the Company has maintained a sufficient public float since the listing of the shares on the Stock Exchange and as at the date of this report.

AUDITOR

A resolution will be submitted to the forthcoming annual general meeting to re-appoint RSM Nelson Wheeler as external auditor of the Company. The Board confirms that there has been no change in auditor of the Company since 24 November 2005, date of incorporation.

The Company has adopted the Code on Corporate Governance Practices (from 1 January 2012 to 31 March 2012) and the Corporate Governance Code (from 1 April 2012 to 31 December 2012) (the "Code Provisions") respectively as set out in Appendix 14 of the Listing Rules to maintain a high standards of corporate governance so as to improve the corporate transparency and protect the interests of the Shareholders.

In the opinion of the Board, the Company has complied with the Code Provisions for the year ended 31 December 2012. There are four independent non-executive Directors in the Board, all of them possess adequate independence and therefore the Board considers the Company has achieved balance of and provided sufficient protection to its interests.

DIRECTORS' SECURITIES TRANSACTIONS

The Company has adopted the Model Code for Securities Transactions by Directors of Listed Issuers ("Model Code") set out in Appendix 10 of the Listing Rules as its own code of conduct regarding Directors' securities transactions.

Having made specific enquiry of all Directors, the Directors of the Company have complied with the required standard set out in the Model Code regarding Directors' securities transactions.

BOARD

The Board currently comprises four executive Directors and four independent non-executive Directors.

Executive Directors Mr. Wang Lishan (Chairman), Mr. Cao Yunsheng (CEO), Mr. Chen Guocai, Mr. Zhao Wuhui

Independent Non-executive Directors Mr. Su Yang, Mr. Xiang Qiang, Mr. Lan Rong, Mr. Gao Liangyu

Mr. Wang Lishan and Mr. Cao Yunsheng are the chairman and the CEO of the Company respectively and the roles of chairman and the CEO are segregated and not exercised by the same individual. The biographical details of the Directors are set out in the section headed "Directors and Senior Management" of this annual report.

To the best acknowledgment of the Company, among the members of the Board, none of them has any financial, business and relative relationship with the other members in the Board, including the chairman and the general manager. All of them are free to make independent judgments.

By the terms of the service contracts of the executive Directors and the appointment letters of the independent non-executive Directors, the term for each Director is three years.

The responsibility of the Board is to lead and supervise the development direction and operation strategy of the Group, and to decide on material affairs of the Company such as the resolution of budget, resolution of profits allocation, significant investments and acquisitions, issue of new shares, amendments to the articles of association and appointments to senior management of the Company. While the management of the Company was given sufficiently autonomy by the Board to handle the daily ordinary course of administration and management, when the Board delegates aspects of its management and administration functions to management, it has given clear directions as to the powers of management, in particular, with respect to the circumstances where management shall report back and obtain prior approval from the Board before making decisions or entering into any commitments on behalf of the Company.

The Board confirmed that the Company has received, from each of the independent non-executive Directors, an annual confirmation of this independence pursuant to Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. The Company considers that they are independent under Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules.

In respect of the corporate governance functions, during the year 2012, the Board formulated the terms of reference on the corporate governance duties in accordance with the terms of reference. To be specific, the Board mainly performed the following corporate governance duties during the year 2012:

- To develop and review the Company's policies and practices on corporate governance;
- To review and monitor the training and continuous professional development of directors and senior management;
- To review and monitor the Company's policies and practices on compliance with legal and regulatory requirements;
- To develop, review and monitor the code of conduct applicable to directors and employees;
- To review the Company's compliance with the Code Provisions and disclosure in the Corporate Governance Report.

INDUCTION AND CONTINUING DEVELOPMENT OF DIRECTORS

The Directors participated in continuous professional development to develop and refresh their knowledge to ensure their contribution to the board remains informed and relevant. In the year, the Company provided reading materials relating to the corporate governance and the amendments of the Listing Rules to all the directors. Besides, Mr. Wang Lishan, Mr. Cao Yunsheng, Mr. Chen Guocai and Mr. Zhao Wuhui participated in the courses of cross-sectoral collaboration and management provided by professional institution, Mr. Lan Rong, Mr. Gao Liangyu, Mr. Su Yang and Mr. Xiang Qiang participated in the courses of company innovative business, training for senior management of listed companies, acquisition and merger of listed companies and securities market insider trading regulations etc. respectively.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT

The Directors acknowledge their responsibility for prepare the consolidated financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2012 in accordance with Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The statement of the external auditor of the company on their reporting responsibilities on the financial statements of the Group is set out in the independent auditor's report on page 37.

The Group has certain functions to be responsible for the internal control and risk management of the Company. The duties of the departments are to audit and review regularly the financial management, production and service procedures and documentation management system of the Company, and to report on the findings of the auditing. The executive Directors and senior management of the Group will be given a monthly financial report and management report so as to supervise the operation development of each business department and make reasonable planning.

The Board has conducted its annual review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control of the Group and agrees to the measures taken by the management for monitoring and risk controlling. The Board considered that the management should continue to maintain the company's system construction, conduct regular internal audits and strengthen the risk prediction capacity, as well as reporting on emergencies.

Furthermore, pursuant to the Code Provisions, the Board also reviewed the resources, qualifications and experience of staff of the Company's accounting and financial reporting function. The board considered it is adequate of resources, qualifications and experience of staff of the Company's accounting and financial reporting function, and their training programmers and budget.

AUDIT COMMITTEE AND AUDIT COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The Company has established an audit committee with specific written terms of reference which deal clearly with its duties. The audit committee of the Company has four members, including the four independent non-executive Directors of the Company, which are Mr. Su Yang, Mr. Lan Rong, Mr. Gao Liangyu and Mr. Xiang Qiang. Mr. Su Yang is the chairman of the audit committee. The primary duties of the audit committee (inter alia) are to review the financial reporting process and internal control system of the Group, and to make proposals to the Board as to appointment, renewal and resignation of the Company's external auditor and the related remuneration and appointment terms.

During the year, two audit committee meetings were held to discuss and approve the financial statements and the dividend payment, renew the external auditor. The audit committee adopted the auditor's suggestion and comments that need to improve and made the management to implement. All members attended the meetings. The audit committee also discussed with the management of the internal control system, reviewed the Company's financial controls, internal control and risk management regulations.

The audit committee oversees the financial reporting process. In this process, the management of the Company is responsible for the preparation of Group's consolidated financial statements including the selection of suitable accounting policies. Independent external auditors are responsible for auditing the Group's consolidated financial statements and evaluating the Group's system of internal controls. The audit committee oversees the respective works of the management and the external auditors to monitor the processes and safeguards employed by them. The audit committee reports to the Board on its findings after each of its meeting.

The audit committee reviewed and discussed with management and external independent auditors the Group's consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2012. The audit committee also received reports and met with the independent auditors to discuss the general scope of their audit work and their assessment of Group internal controls.

Based on these reviews and discussions and the report of the independent auditors, the audit committee recommended for the Board's approval of the consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2012.

The audit committee also reviewed and recommended to the Board approval of the unaudited financial statements for the first six months of 2012, prior to public announcement and filing.

The audit committee recommended to the Board that the Shareholders be asked to re-appoint RSM Nelson Wheeler as the Group's external independent auditor for year 2013.

REMUNERATION COMMITTEE

The Company has established a remuneration committee with specific written terms of reference which deal clearly with its duties. The remuneration committee comprises of four independent non-executive Directors, which are Mr. Lan Rong, Mr. Su Yang, Mr. Gao Liangyu and Mr. Xiang Qiang. Mr. Xiang Qiang is the chairman of the remuneration committee. The primary duties of the remuneration committee are to review and determine the remuneration package, bonus and other allowance terms payable to Directors and senior management, and to make proposals to the Board in respect of the remuneration policy and structure of all the Directors and senior management of the Group.

During the year, one remuneration committee meeting was held in the year to discuss and suggest:

- (1) annual salary review for 2012 for the Directors and the senior management; and
- (2) the remuneration policy.

All members attended the meeting.

NOMINATION COMMITTEE

The Company has established a nomination committee with specific written terms of reference which deal clearly with its duties. The nomination committee comprises of four independent non-executive directors, namely, Mr. Gao Liangyu, Mr. Su Yang, Mr. Lan Rong and Mr. Xiang Qiang. Mr. Gao Liangyu is the chairman of the nomination committee. The nomination committee is responsible to make proposals to the Board in respect of the appointment of Directors and the renewal plans of Directors. Basically the nomination procedure follows the articles of association of the Company. In considering the candidates, the nomination committee will take into account his past performance and experience, academic and working qualifications, general market conditions in accordance with the requirements set out in the Listing Rules and the articles of association of the Company so as to make the composition of the board of directors filled with a variety and a balance of skills and experience.

During the year, one nomination committee meetings were held in the year to:

- (1) decide the names of the directors who should retired and be elected or re-elected at the annual general meeting; and
- (2) reviewing regularly the roles of directors by considering the issues of conflict of interest, their performance and conduct.

All members attended the meeting.

For the year ended 31 December 2012

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Company was incorporated in the Cayman Islands with limited liability. The address of its registered office is Cricket Square, Hutchins Drive, P.O. Box 2681, Grand Cayman KY1-1111, Cayman Islands. The address of its principal place of business is 10th Floor, Chiwan Petroleum Building, Shekou, Nanshan District, Shenzhen, the People's Republic of China (the "PRC"). The Company's shares are listed on the Main Board of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange").

The Company is an investment holding company. The principal activities of its subsidiaries are set out in note 19 to the financial statements.

In the opinion of the directors of the Company, as at 31 December 2012, Cheung Hing Investments Limited, a company incorporated in the Samoa, is the immediate and ultimate parent; and Mr. Wang Lishan is the ultimate controlling party of the Company.

2. ADOPTION OF NEW AND REVISED HONG KONG FINANCIAL REPORTING STANDARDS

In the current year, the Group has adopted all the new and revised Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("HKFRSs") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants (the "HKICPA") that are relevant to its operations and effective for its accounting year beginning on 1 January 2012. HKFRSs comprise Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("HKFRS"); Hong Kong Accounting Standards; and Interpretations. The adoption of these new and revised HKFRSs did not result in significant changes to the Group's accounting policies and amounts reported for the current year and prior years.

The Group has not applied the new HKFRSs that have been issued but not yet effective. The Group has already commenced an assessment of the impact of these new HKFRSs but is not yet in a position to state whether these new HKFRSs would have a material impact on its results of operations and financial position.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs, accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong and the applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the Stock Exchange and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with HKFRSs requires the use of certain key assumptions and estimates. It also requires the directors to exercise its judgements in the process of applying the accounting policies. The areas involving critical judgements and areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to these financial statements, are disclosed in note 4 to the financial statements.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(a) Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiaries made up to 31 December. Subsidiaries are entities over which the Group has control. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. The existence and effect of potential voting rights that are currently exercisable or convertible are considered when assessing whether the Group has control.

Subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. They are de-consolidated from the date the control ceases.

The gain or loss on the disposal of a subsidiary that results in a loss of control represents the difference between (i) the fair value of the consideration of the sale plus the fair value of any investment retained in that subsidiary and (ii) the Company's share of the net assets of that subsidiary plus any remaining goodwill relating to that subsidiary and any related accumulated foreign currency translation reserve.

Intragroup transactions, balances and unrealised profits are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

Non-controlling interests represent the equity in subsidiaries not attributable, directly or indirectly, to the Company. Non-controlling interests are presented in the consolidated statement of financial position and consolidated statement of changes in equity within equity. Non-controlling interests are presented in the consolidated income statement and consolidated statement of comprehensive income as an allocation of profit or loss and total comprehensive income for the year between the non-controlling shareholders and owners of the Company.

Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling shareholders even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

Changes in the Company's ownership interest in a subsidiary that do not result in a loss of control are accounted for as equity transactions (i.e. transactions with owners in their capacity as owners). The carrying amounts of the controlling and non-controlling interests are adjusted to reflect the changes in their relative interests in the subsidiary. Any difference between the amount by which the non-controlling interests are adjusted and the fair value of the consideration paid or received is recognised directly in equity and attributed to the owners of the Company.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(b) Business combination and goodwill

The acquisition method is used to account for the acquisition of a subsidiary in a business combination. The cost of acquisition is measured at the acquisition-date fair value of the assets given, equity instruments issued, liabilities incurred and contingent consideration. Acquisition-related costs are recognised as expenses in the periods in which the costs are incurred and the services are received. Identifiable assets and liabilities of the subsidiary in the acquisition are measured at their acquisition-date fair values.

The excess of the cost of acquisition over the Company's share of the net fair value of the subsidiary's identifiable assets and liabilities is recorded as goodwill. Any excess of the Company's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of acquisition is recognised in consolidated profit or loss as a gain on bargain purchase which is attributed to the Company.

In a business combination achieved in stages, the previously held equity interest in the subsidiary is remeasured at its acquisition-date fair value and the resulting gain or loss is recognised in consolidated profit or loss. The fair value is added to the cost of acquisition to calculate the goodwill.

If the changes in the value of the previously held equity interest in the subsidiary were recognised in other comprehensive income (for example, available-for-sale investment), the amount that was recognised in other comprehensive income is recognised on the same basis as would be required if the previously held equity interest were disposed of.

Goodwill is tested annually for impairment or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired. Goodwill is measured at cost less accumulated impairment losses. The method of measuring impairment losses of goodwill is the same as that of other assets as stated in the accounting policy (x) below. Impairment losses of goodwill are recognised in consolidated profit or loss and are not subsequently reversed. Goodwill is allocated to cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the acquisition for the purpose of impairment testing.

The non-controlling interests in the subsidiary are initially measured at the non-controlling shareholders' proportionate share of the net fair value of the subsidiary's identifiable assets and liabilities at the acquisition date.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(c) Associates

Associates are entities over which the Group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policies of an entity but is not control or joint control over those policies. The existence and effect of potential voting rights that are currently exercisable or convertible are considered when assessing whether the Group has significant influence.

Investment in an associate is accounted for in the consolidated financial statements by the equity method and is initially recognised at cost. Identifiable assets and liabilities of the associate in an acquisition are measured at their fair values at the acquisition date. The excess of the cost of acquisition over the Group's share of the net fair value of the associate's identifiable assets and liabilities is recorded as goodwill. The goodwill is included in the carrying amount of the investment and is tested for impairment together with the investment at the end of each reporting period when there is objective evidence that the investment is impaired. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of acquisition is recognised in consolidated profit or loss.

The Group's share of an associate's post-acquisition profits or losses is recognised in consolidated profit or loss, and its share of the post-acquisition movements in reserves is recognised in the consolidated reserves. The cumulative post-acquisition movements are adjusted against the carrying amount of the investment. When the Group's share of losses in an associate equals or exceeds its interest in the associate, including any other unsecured receivables, the Group does not recognise further losses, unless it has incurred obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate. If the associate subsequently reports profits, the Group resumes recognising its share of those profits only after its share of the profits equals the share of losses not recognised.

The gain or loss on the disposal of an associate that results in a loss of significant influence represents the difference between (i) the fair value of the consideration of the sale plus the fair value of any investment retained in that associate and (ii) the Group's share of the net assets of that associate plus any remaining goodwill relating to that associate and any related accumulated foreign currency translation reserve.

Unrealised profits on transactions between the Group and its associates are eliminated to the extent of the Group's interests in the associates. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of associates have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

- (d) Foreign currency translation
 - (i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of each of the Group's entities are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates (the "functional currency"). The consolidated financial statements are presented in Renminbi ("RMB"), which is the Company's presentation currency and the functional currency of the principal operating subsidiaries of the Group.

(ii) Transactions and balances in each entity's financial statements

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency on initial recognition using the exchange rates prevailing on the transaction dates. Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rates at the end of each reporting period. Gains and losses resulting from this translation policy are recognised in profit or loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured at fair values in foreign currencies are translated using the exchange rates at the dates when the fair values are determined.

When a gain or loss on a non-monetary item is recognised in other comprehensive income, any exchange component of that gain or loss is recognised in other comprehensive income. When a gain or loss on a non-monetary item is recognised in profit or loss, any exchange component of that gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss.

(iii) Translation on consolidation

The results and financial position of all the Group entities that have a functional currency different from the Company's presentation currency are translated into the Company's presentation currency as follows:

- Assets and liabilities for each statement of financial position presented are translated at the closing rate at the date of that statement of financial position;
- Income and expenses are translated at average exchange rates (unless this average is not a reasonable approximation of the cumulative effect of the rates prevailing on the transaction dates, in which case income and expenses are translated at the exchange rates on the transaction dates); and
- All resulting exchange differences are recognised in the foreign currency translation reserve.

On consolidation, exchange differences arising from the translation of the net investment in foreign entities and of borrowings are recognised in the foreign currency translation reserve. When a foreign operation is sold, such exchange differences are recognised in consolidated profit or loss as part of the gain or loss on disposal.

Goodwill and fair value adjustments arising on the acquisition of a foreign entity are treated as assets and liabilities of the foreign entity and translated at the closing rate.

For the year ended 31 December 2012

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(e) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised in profit or loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation of property, plant and equipment is calculated at rates sufficient to write off their cost less their residual values over the estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis. The principal useful lives are as follows:

Buildings	20 – 44 years
Plant and machinery	5 – 10 years
Furniture, fixtures and equipment	5 years
Motor vehicles	5 years
Leasehold land	Over the lease period

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation method are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Construction in progress represents property, plant and machinery under construction or pending installation, and is stated at cost less impairment losses. Depreciation begins when the relevant assets are available for use.

The gain or loss on disposal of property, plant and equipment is the difference between the net sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the relevant asset, and is recognised in profit or loss.

(f) Patents and the computer software

Patents and computer software are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Amortisation is calculated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives of 5 years.

(g) Leases

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

The Group as lessee

(i) Operating leases

Leases that do not substantially transfer to the Group all the risks and rewards of ownership of assets are accounted for as operating leases. Lease payments (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

 - The Group as lessee (cont'd)
 - (ii) Finance leases

Leases that substantially transfer to the Group all the risks and rewards of ownership of assets are accounted for as finance leases. At the commencement of the lease term, a finance lease is capitalised at the lower of the fair value of the leased asset and the present value of the minimum lease payments, each determined at the inception of the lease.

The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the statement of financial position as finance lease payable. Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charge and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance charge is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Assets under finance leases are depreciated the same as owned assets.

The Group as lessor

(i) Operating leases

Leases that do not substantially transfer to the lessees all the risks and rewards of ownership of assets are accounted for as operating leases. Rental income from operating leases is recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

(ii) Finance leases

Leases that substantially transfer to the lessees all the risks and rewards of ownership of assets are accounted for as finance leases. Amounts due from lessees under finance leases are recognised as receivables at the amount of the Group's net investment in the leases. Finance lease income is allocated to accounting periods so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the Group's net investment outstanding in respect of the leases.

(h) Inventories

Inventories for trading, representing raw materials, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined using the weighted average basis. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Inventories for construction contracts, representing raw materials and consumables, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined using the weighted average basis. Net realisable value is determined by reference to the underlying specific contracts in progress in which the inventories will ultimately be used.

For the year ended 31 December 2012

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(i) Construction contracts

When the outcome of a construction contract can be estimated reliably, contract costs are recognised as an expense by reference to the stage of completion of the contract at the end of the reporting period. When it is probable that total contract costs will exceed total contract revenue, the expected loss is recognised as an expense immediately. When the outcome of a construction contract cannot be estimated reliably, contract costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

Construction contracts in progress at the end of the reporting period are recorded in the statement of financial position at the amount of costs incurred plus recognised profits less recognised losses and progress billings, and are presented in the statement of financial position as "Gross amount due from customers for contract work". When progress billings exceed costs incurred plus recognised profits less recognised losses, the surplus is recorded in the statement of financial position as "Gross amount due to customers for contract work". Progress billings not yet paid by the customer are included in the statement of financial position under "Trade and bills receivables". Amounts received before the related work is performed are included in the statement of financial position under "Accruals and other payables".

(j) Recognition and derecognition of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to receive cash flows from the assets expire; the Group transfers substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the assets; or the Group neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the assets but has not retained control on the assets. On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligation specified in the relevant contract is discharged, cancelled or expires. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

(k) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less allowance for impairment. An allowance for impairment of trade and other receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the Group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of receivables. The amount of the allowance is the difference between the receivables' carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the effective interest rate computed at initial recognition. The amount of the allowance is recognised in profit or loss.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(k) Trade and other receivables (cont'd)

Impairment losses are reversed in subsequent periods and recognised in profit or loss when an increase in the receivables' recoverable amount can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, subject to the restriction that the carrying amount of the receivables at the date the impairment is reversed shall not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

(I) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents represent cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other financial institutions, and short-term highly liquid investments which are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Group's cash management are also included as a component of cash and cash equivalents.

(m) Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument under HKFRSs. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Group after deducting all of its liabilities. The accounting policies adopted for specific financial liabilities and equity instruments are set out below.

(n) Borrowings

Borrowings are recognised initially at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred, and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Group has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period.

(o) Convertible loans

Convertible loans which entitle the holder to convert the loans into a fixed number of equity instruments at a fixed conversion price are regarded as compound instruments consist of a liability and an equity component. At the date of issue, the fair value of the liability component is estimated using the prevailing market interest rate for similar non-convertible debt. The difference between the proceeds of issue of the convertible loans and the fair value assigned to the liability component, representing the embedded option for the holder to convert the loans into equity of the Group, is included in equity as convertible loan notes equity reserve. The liability component is carried as a liability at amortised cost using the effective interest method until extinguished on conversion or redemption.

Transaction costs are apportioned between the liability and equity components of the convertible loans based on their relative carrying amounts at the date of issue. The portion relating to the equity component is charged directly to equity.

(p) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are stated initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

(q) Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the Company are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

(r) Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably.

Interest income is recognised on a time-proportion basis using the effective interest method.

Rental income is recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Finance lease income is allocated to accounting periods so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the Group's net investment outstanding in respect of the lease.

Revenues from the sales of equipments and trading of raw materials are recognised on the transfer of significant risks and rewards of ownership, which generally coincides with the time when the goods are delivered and the title has passed to the customers.

Subcontracting fee income is recognised when the subcontracting services are rendered.

Revenues from the rendering of technical consultancy services are recognised when the services are rendered. Revenues from the rendering of services other than technical consultancy services are recognised by reference to stage of completion using percentage of completion method as mentioned below.

Contract revenue

When the outcome of a construction contract can be estimated reliably, revenue from a fixed price contract is recognised using the percentage of completion method, measured by reference to the percentage of contract costs incurred to date to the estimated total contract costs for the contract; and revenue from a cost plus contract is recognised by reference to the recoverable costs incurred during the period plus an appropriate proportion of the total fee, measured by reference to the proportion that costs incurred to date bear to the estimated total costs of the contract.

When the outcome of a construction contract cannot be estimated reliably, revenue is recognised only to the extent of contract costs incurred that is probable to be recoverable.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

- (s) Employee benefits
 - (i) Employee leave entitlements

Employee entitlements to annual leave and long service leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave and long service leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the end of the reporting period.

Employee entitlements to sick leave and maternity leave are not recognised until the time of leave.

(ii) Pension obligations

The Group contributes to defined contribution retirement schemes which are available to all employees. Contributions to the schemes by the Group and employees are calculated as a percentage of employees' basic salaries. The retirement benefit scheme cost charged to profit or loss represents contributions payable by the Group to the funds.

(iii) Termination benefits

Termination benefits are recognised when, and only when, the Group demonstrably commits itself to terminate employment or to provide benefits as a result of voluntary redundancy by having a detailed formal plan which is without realistic possibility of withdrawal.

(t) Share-based payments

The Group issues equity-settled share-based payments to certain directors and employees. Equity-settled sharebased payments are measured at fair value (excluding the effect of non market-based vesting conditions) of the equity instruments at the date of grant. The fair value determined at the grant date of the equity-settled share-based payments is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, based on the Group's estimate of shares that will eventually vest and adjusted for the effect of non market-based vesting conditions.

(u) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are capitalised as part of the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

To the extent that funds are borrowed generally and used for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset, the amount of borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation is determined by applying a capitalisation rate to the expenditures on that asset. The capitalisation rate is the weighted average of the borrowing costs applicable to the borrowings of the Group that are outstanding during the period, other than borrowings made specifically for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(v) Taxation

Income tax represents the sum of the current tax and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit recognised in profit or loss because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses or unused tax credits can be utilised. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from goodwill or from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries and associates, and interests in joint ventures, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. Deferred tax is recognised in profit or loss, except when it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case the deferred tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the Group intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis.

(w) Related parties

A related party is a person or entity that is related to the Group.

- (A) A person or a close member of that person's family is related to the Group if that person:
 - (i) has control or joint control over the Group;
 - (ii) has significant influence over the Group; or
 - (iii) is a member of the key management personnel of the Company or of a parent of the Company.
- (B) An entity is related to the Group (reporting entity) if any of the following conditions applies:
 - (i) The entity and the Company are members of the same group (which means that each parent, subsidiary and fellow subsidiary is related to the others).
 - (ii) One entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or an associate or joint venture of a member of a group of which the other entity is a member).
 - (iii) Both entities are joint ventures of the same third party.
 - (iv) One entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity.
 - (v) The entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the Group or an entity related to the Group. If the Group is itself such a plan, the sponsoring employers are also related to the Group.
 - (vi) The entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (A).
 - (vii) A person identified in (A)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity).

(x) Impairment of assets

At the end of each period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets except goodwill, deferred tax assets, inventories, gross amount due from customers for contract work and receivables to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of any impairment loss. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

(x) Impairment of assets (cont'd)

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset.

If the recoverable amount of an asset or cash-generating unit is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset or cash-generating unit is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset or cash-generating unit is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of amortisation or depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset or cash-generating unit in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

(y) Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised for liabilities of uncertain timing or amount when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation arising as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made. Where the time value of money is material, provisions are stated at the present value of the expenditures expected to settle the obligation.

Where it is not probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required, or the amount cannot be estimated reliably, the obligation is disclosed as a contingent liability, unless the probability of outflow is remote. Possible obligations, whose existence will only be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more future events are also disclosed as contingent liabilities unless the probability of outflow is remote.

(z) Events after the reporting period

Events after the reporting period that provide additional information about the Group's position at the reporting period or those that indicate the going concern assumption is not appropriate are adjusting events and are reflected in the financial statements. Events after the reporting period that are not adjusting events are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements when material.

4. CRITICAL JUDGEMENTS AND KEY ESTIMATES

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are discussed below.

(a) Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

The Group determines the estimated useful lives, residual values and related depreciation charges for the Group's property, plant and equipment. This estimate is based on the historical experience of the actual useful lives and residual values of property, plant and equipment of similar nature and functions. The Group will revise the depreciation charge where useful lives and residual values are different to those previously estimated, or it will write-off or write-down technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold.

(b) Revenue and profit recognition

The Group estimated the percentage of completion of the construction contracts by reference to the proportion that contract costs incurred for work performed to date to the estimated total costs for the contracts. When the final cost incurred by the Group is different from the amounts that were initially budgeted, such differences will impact the revenue and the profit or loss recognised in the period in which such determination is made. Budget cost of each project will be reviewed periodically and revised accordingly where significant variances are noted during the revision.

(c) Income taxes

The Group is subject to income taxes in several jurisdictions. Significant estimates are required in determining the provision for income taxes. There are many transactions and calculations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recorded, such differences will impact the income tax and deferred tax provisions in the period in which such determination is made.

(d) Impairment of goodwill

Determining whether goodwill is impaired requires an estimation of the value in use of the cash-generating unit to which goodwill has been allocated. The value in use calculation requires the Group to estimate the future cash flows expected to arise from the cash-generating unit and a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value.

(e) Allowance for trade and other receivables

The Group's management determines the allowance for receivables based on assessments of the recoverability of the trade and other receivables, including the creditworthiness, the past collection history of each debtor and the current market condition. Management will reassess the allowance made at the end of each reporting period.

(f) Allowance for slow-moving inventories

Allowance for slow-moving inventories is made based on the ageing and estimated net realisable value of inventories. The assessment of the allowance amount involves judgement and estimates. Where the actual outcome in future is different from the original estimate, such difference will impact the carrying value of inventories and allowance charge/ write-back in the period in which such estimate has been changed.

4. CRITICAL JUDGEMENTS AND KEY ESTIMATES (CONT'D)

Key sources of estimation uncertainty (cont'd)

- (g) Accounting for variation orders of construction contracts
 - The Group makes claims for additional work performed, which may arise either under specific circumstances provided for under the contracts or due to variation made to the contract specifications by customers. Where the amounts of such claims have not been formally agreed at the end of reporting period, the amount recoverable as estimated by management is included in the contract value in determining the estimated profit or foreseeable loss on the contract.

5. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: foreign currency risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The Group's overall risk management programme focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the Group's financial performance.

(a) Foreign currency risk

Most of the Group's business transactions, assets and liabilities are principally denominated in RMB, Hong Kong dollars ("HK\$") and United States dollars ("US\$"). The Group currently does not have a foreign currency hedging policy in respect of foreign currency transactions, assets and liabilities. The Group will monitor its foreign currency exposure closely and will consider hedging significant foreign currency exposure should the need arise.

At 31 December 2012, if the US\$ had weakened 5 per cent against RMB with all other variables held constant, consolidated profits after tax for the year would have been approximately RMB1,691,000 (2011: RMB276,000) lower, arising mainly as a result of the foreign exchange loss on bank deposits and net position of trade and bills receivables and other receivables and trade and bills payables denominated in US\$. If the US\$ had strengthened 5 per cent against RMB with all other variables held constant, consolidated profits after tax for the year would have been approximately RMB1,691,000 (2011: RMB276,000) higher, arising mainly as a result of the foreign exchange gain on bank deposits and net position of trade and bills receivables and other receivables and trade and bills payables denominated in US\$.

(b) Credit risk

The carrying amount of the cash and bank balances, trade and other receivables included in the statement of financial position represents the Group's maximum exposure to credit risk in relation to the Group's financial assets.

The Group has no significant concentrations of credit risk.

It has policies in place to ensure that sales are made to customers with an appropriate credit history.

The credit risk on cash and bank balances is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit-ratings assigned by international credit-rating agencies.

For the year ended 31 December 2012

5. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT (CONT'D)

(c) Liquidity risk

The Group's policy is to regularly monitor current and expected liquidity requirements to ensure that it maintains sufficient reserves of cash to meet its liquidity requirements in the short and longer term.

All the Group's financial liabilities mature within one year.

(d) Interest rate risk

The Group's exposure to interest rate risk arises from its bank deposits and bank loans. Part of the bank deposits and bank loans bear interests at variable rates varied with the then prevailing market condition and expose the Group to cash flow interest rate risk.

At 31 December 2012, if interest rates at that date had been 100 basis points lower with all other variables held constant, consolidated profit after tax for the year would have been approximately RMB697,000 lower (2011: RMB245,000 lower), arising mainly as a result of lower interest income from bank deposits. If interest rates had been 100 basis points higher, with all other variables held constant, consolidated profit after tax for the year would have been approximately RMB697,000 lower (2011: RMB245,000 lower), arising mainly as a result of lower interest income from bank deposits. If interest rates had been approximately RMB697,000 higher (2011: RMB245,000 higher), arising mainly as a result of higher interest income from bank deposits.

The Group's other fixed-rate bank loans and bank deposits, bear fixed interest rates and therefore are subject to fair value interest rate risks.

During the year ended 31 December 2011, the Group entered into an acquisition agreement with Firstachieve Group Limited ("Firstachieve") (a company incorporated in the British Virgin Islands with limited liability and wholly-owned by Ms. Wang Wei, spouse of Mr. Wang Lishan, who is the chairman of the Company, an executive director and is the ultimate controlling party of the Company), of which the Group acquired the entire equity interests in Zhuhai Prospering Offshore Oil Engineering Limited ("Zhuhai Prospering"). The acquisition was completed on 26 July 2011 (the "completion date").

Zhuhai Prospering is a company established in the PRC with limited liability. Its sole business was holding a piece of industrial land in Zhuhai City, the PRC with an area of approximately 400,000 square meters (the "Leasehold land") and had not carried any other significant business transactions since its incorporation and until the completion date.

In the opinion of the directors, the acquisition is in substance acquisition of the Leasehold land, instead of an acquisition of business and therefore is excluded from the scope of HKFRS 3 "Business Combinations". Therefore, the acquisition was not disclosed as a business combination in accordance with the requirements of HKFRS 3.

The Group's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Group's ability to continue as a going concern and to maximise the return to the shareholders through the optimisation of the debt and equity balance.

The Group sets the amount of capital in proportion to risk. The Group manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Group may adjust the payment of dividends, issue new shares, buy-back shares, raise new debts, redeem existing debts or sell assets to reduce debts.

The Group monitors capital using a gearing ratio, which is bank loans divided by total equity of the Group. The Group's policy is to keep the gearing ratio at a reasonable level.

The increase in bank loans and the gearing ratio from year ended 31 December 2011, mainly due to the Group raised additional bank loans to finance the construction of the port and skid way in the fabrication site located in Zhuhai and to use as working capital of the Group.

The only externally imposed capital requirement is that for the Group to maintain its listing on the Stock Exchange it has to have a public float of at least 25% of the shares. The Group receives a report from the share registrars monthly on substantial share interests showing the non-public float and it demonstrates continuing compliance with the 25% limit throughout the year. As at 31 December 2012, 33.38% (2011: 32.73%) of the shares were in public hands.

Any further grant of shares options in excess of this limit is subject to shareholders' approval in a general meeting.

Share options granted to a director, chief executive or Substantial Shareholder of the Company, or to any of their associates, are subject to approval in advance by the independent non-executive Directors (excluding an independent non-executive Director who is the Grantee of the Options). In addition, any share options granted to a Substantial Shareholder or an independent non-executive Director of the Company, or to any of their associates, in excess of 0.1% of the shares of the Company in issue at any time or with an aggregate value (based on the price of the Company's shares at the date of the grant) in excess of HK\$5 million, within any 12-month period, are subject to Shareholders' approval taken on a poll and a circular must be sent to the Shareholders.

The offer of a grant of share options may be accepted within 28 days from the date of the offer, upon payment of a nominal consideration of HK\$1 in total by the grantee. The exercise period of the share options granted is determinable by the directors, and commences after a certain vesting period and ends on a date which is not later than ten years from the date of the offer of the share options or the expiry date of the Scheme, if earlier.

Share options do not confer rights on the holder to dividends or to vote at shareholders' meetings.

(vi) Convertible loan notes equity reserve

The convertible loan notes equity reserve represents the value of the unexercised equity component of convertible notes issued by the Company recognised in accordance with the accounting policy adopted for convertible loans in note 3(o) to the financial statements.

(v) Warrants reserve

Warrants reserve represents fair value of consideration received from the subscription of warrants as detailed in note 34(d) to the financial statements. It is transferred to share premium account when the warrant is exercised or released directly to retained profits when the warrant is expired.
