CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

Dear Shareholders,

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I am pleased to present to you the annual report of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2016.

ANALYSIS OF THE MACROECONOMIC CONDITION

During the Year, the global economic growth continued to slow down, the potential economic growth rate also decreased. The continuous increase of global debt, which rendered the international financial market more vulnerable, together with the rising trend of trade protectionism, posed more risks and challenges to the world economy. Affected by the general trend of the world economy, the commodity prices experienced sharp fluctuation, and recorded a relatively large increase in the second half of the year. During the same period, the PRC comprehensively implemented the supply side structural reform and registered a GDP growth of 6.7% throughout the year, with economic operation remaining within a reasonable range and economic structure optimizing. However, affected by factors such as the deep-rooted structural problems and the complex and ever-changing global economy, the PRC economic growth was under the pressure of continuous slowdown.

PERFORMANCE OF MAJOR BUSINESS

During the Year, the Group encountered unprecedented and daunting challenges, and was severely and adversely affected by the decrease in demand for coal in South China, profound change in the pattern of coal transportation industry, intensive competition from the ports in Bohai Rim and other unfavourable factors. Affected by the foregoing, the Group recorded substantial decrease in its main cargo, the coal, and the operating results were also significantly affected.

During the Year, the Group has achieved a total throughput for all types of cargoes of 313 million tonnes, representing a decrease of 15.51% as compared with 2015. The throughput of coals, metal ores, oil and liquefied chemicals, containers and the general and other cargoes amounted to 177 million tonnes, 113 million tonnes, 3.31 million tonnes, 13.25 million tonnes and 6.42 million tonnes, respectively. The Group has achieved an operating income of RMB4,911 million, representing a decrease of 28.72% as compared with RMB6,890 million for the corresponding period last year. The net profit attributable to owners of the parent company amounted to RMB365 million, representing a decrease of 72.85% as compared with RMB1,344 million for the corresponding period last year.

BUSINESS REVIEW

As one of the largest public port operator for major dry bulk cargoes in the world and one of the most important ore port operators in the Bohai Rim, the Group provides customers with coal, metal ores, oil/liquefied chemicals, dry bulk cargoes, containers and related logistics services and port value-added and related services.

Facing the new external environment, the Group grasped the new normal, seized new opportunities and faced new challenges. The Group kept centering on economic benefits, deepened the cooperation with major customers and form strategic alliance to control the downward trend in production in full force and actively cultivate new profit growth drivers. The ports in Qinhuangdao, Tangshan and Cangzhou formed healthy interaction and mutual support relationship which further improved the cargoes portfolio and strengthened the ability of sustainable development.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

For coal business, the Company comprehensively implemented marketing initiatives to retain the cargo sources effectively through market segmentation and target marketing. The Company also strengthened the production organization to seize the favourable opportunities from price stabilization in coal market and maximized the throughput capacity of the ports, which significantly enhanced the loading and unloading efficiency at the ports. Based on the customers' need, the Company developed the automatic coal blending system, which significantly increased the coal blending quality. For metal ore business, the Group fully capitalized on the strategic geographical advantages of Huanghua Port and Caofeidian Port to consolidate the existing cargo sources and develop new cargo sources, and recorded increase in metal ore throughput on a year-on-year basis. In respect of oil and liquefied chemicals, the Group made every effort to organize production and sourcing, and commenced the construction of premises under customs supervision to create favourable conditions for the development of cargo sources in the future. In respect of container business, the Group was granted the qualification of a port for imported fruits, opened the direct line for container freight train from Qinhuangdao South to Erenhot (border) and developed several new shipping lines with throughput reaching a new peak.

CAPITAL OPERATION

During the Year, the Group strived to push forward the listing of A Shares. In particular, we seized the favourable opportunity of acceleration in the approving procedures of IPO in the second half of 2016 by strengthening the organization of internal operation and external reporting and communication to expedite and facilitate the progress of A Shares listing. At the next stage, the Group will keep up the good work and endeavor to complete the A Shares listing as soon as possible and establish a capital platform of A Shares plus H Shares, so as to carry out comprehensive transformation and upgrade by fully leveraging on the international and domestic capital markets, thereby providing powerful support to the continuous and healthy development of the Group.

OUTLOOK AND PROSPECTS

In 2017, with the guidance from the national energy policies and the supply side structural reform, the wide adoption of clean energy such as hydroelectric power, nuclear power and wind power will further squeeze the demand for thermal coal, and more efforts will be made in cutting the excessive capacity of steel, coal and cement industries. PRC's economic trend of growing at a slow yet steady pace with favourable momentum will be further strengthened. Facing both challenges and opportunities, the Group will implement various measures to facilitate the reform, development, transition and upgrade, make proactive and important contribution to the national energy transportation sector and facilitate the government to regulate and balance the coal market.

2017 is of critical importance to the Company in maintaining continuous, stable and health development in the new competition among the ports. The Group will continue to focus on economic benefits with the aim of reform, improve the operation management and strive to achieve continuous, stable and health growth of results to create a stable return for the Shareholders. Meanwhile, based on the target of regaining the leading position in coastal ports, we will expedite the strategic transition and upgrade and facilitate the construction of metal ore and oil terminals at Huanghua Port and other major projects to strengthen our competitiveness and lay a solid foundation for the long-term development.

Finally, on behalf of the Board, I would like to express my gratitude to all Shareholders and business partners of the Company for their continuous support and assistance to the Group. Meanwhile, I would also like to express my sincere thanks to all employees of the Group for their hard works.

As at 31 December 2016, the shareholding structure of the Group was as follows:

- Note 1: The Company increased the capital in Cangzhou Bohai, its subsidiary by RMB104,400,000.00 during 2016, which increased the shareholding of the Company therein by 0.15%. The industrial and commercial registration for such change of shareholding was completed in January 2017.
- Note 2: The controlling shareholder of Cangzhou Huanghuagang Steel Logistics Co., Ltd. increased the capital of such company by RMB596,854,300 during 2016, which decreased the shareholding of the Company therein from 12.94% to 3.62%. The industrial and commercial registration for such change of shareholding was completed in January 2017.

(I) INDUSTRY OVERVIEW

(1) Overview of Port Industry in the PRC

In 2016, PRC's port industry generally maintained a stable operation and grew at a steady pace with favourable momentum. The major indexes of port throughput showed a trend of "from low in the first half to high in the second half". According to relevant statistics, in 2016, the throughput of cargoes in PRC's ports above designated size reached 11.8 billion tonnes, representing a year-on-year increase of 3.2% and a rebound of 1.3% in growth rate as compared with last year. The growth rate maintained at 2.3% in the first three quarters, and increased significantly to 5.8% in the fourth quarter. In particular, the throughput of cargoes in coastal ports above designated size reached 8.081 billion tonnes, representing a year-on-year increase of 3% and a rebound of 2% in growth rate as compared with last year.

(2) Overview of Port Coal Industry in the PRC

The PRC issued relevant policies related to capacity cut during 2016. In particular, the implementation of production limitation policies such as "276 working days limitation and production in strict compliance with statutory capacity" had direct impact on the production volume of coal. The total production volume of raw coal by all coal production enterprises in PRC amounted to 3.364 billion tonnes, representing a year-on-year decrease of 9.4%, and the supply of coal continued to decrease. Total throughput of coal in the PRC amounted to 1.9 billion tonnes, representing a year-on-year decrease of 4.7%.

(3) Overview of Port Metal Ore Industry in the PRC

In 2016, with the combined effect of various expectations and policy signals, the PRC steel industry showed improvement, which drove the increase in demand for metal ores and rebound of the unloading amount of imported metal ores at major coastal ports. In 2016, the imported iron ores and concentrates of the PRC amounted to 1.024 billion tonnes, representing a year-on-year increase of 7.5%, and reaching the billion mark for the first time.

(4) Overview of Port Oil Industry in the PRC

In 2016, affected by the decrease in both international oil price and production capacity of domestic oil fields, the crude oil production volume of the PRC amounted to 198 million tonnes, representing a year-on-year decrease of 7.3%, the consumption of refined oil in the PRC amounted to 289 million tonnes, representing a year-on-year increase of 5.0%. The output of local private refineries increased significantly, which boosted the importation of crude oil. Under such circumstances, the imports of crude oil in the PRC hit a new high, and inward volume of imported crude oil at major coastal ports increased significantly, which contributed to the pick-up of port throughput.

(II) RESULTS OF OPERATION AND FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

(1) Revenue

We provide highly integrated port services including stevedoring, stacking, warehousing, transportation and logistics services. We handle various types of cargoes mainly including coal, metal ores, oil and liquefied chemicals, containers and general cargoes. We also provide value-added services including towing, tallying and coal blending.

During the Year, the revenue of the Group amounted to RMB4,911,006 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB1,978,888 thousand or approximately 28.72% as compared with the revenue of RMB6,889,894 thousand in 2015. Such decrease was mainly attributable to the decrease in cargoes of coal business affected by the continuous downturn in the market and the competition from surrounding ports; favourable lump sum rates of coal handling would be provided by the Group to strengthen the advantage in cargoes solicitation.

(2) Operating Costs

Our operating costs primarily includes labour costs, depreciation and amortization, power and fuel costs, repair and maintenance expenses, environmental protection and sewage charges and leasing expenses.

During the Year, the operating costs of the Group amounted to RMB3,573,437 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB505,489 thousand or approximately 12.39% as compared with the operating costs of RMB4,078,926 thousand in 2015. The decrease was mainly attributable to the year-on-year decrease in variable costs affected by the decreased throughput as well as the active implementation of measures of cost reduction and efficiency enhancement by the Group, which significantly decreased the controllable costs.

(3) Gross Profit Margin

During the Year, the gross profit[#] of the Group amounted to RMB1,337,569 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB1,473,399 thousand or approximately 52.42% as compared with the gross profit of RMB2,810,968 thousand in 2015. The gross profit margin of the Group was 27.24% for the Year, representing a year-on-year decrease of approximately 13.56 percentage points as compared with 40.80% in 2015. Such decrease was mainly due to the fact that the Group recorded larger decrease in revenue than the decrease in operating costs as affected by the industry characteristic of large proportion of fixed costs.

(4) Segment Analysis¹ (Business Review)

During the Year, the Group achieved a total cargo throughput of 312.76 million tonnes¹, representing a decrease of 57.4 million tonnes or approximately 15.51%, as compared with the throughput of 370.16 million tonnes¹ in 2015. The throughputs generated from each of the ports which we operate are as follows:

During the Year, the Group achieved a cargo throughput of 179.66 million tonnes⁵ in Qinhuangdao Port, representing a decrease of 66.89 million tonnes or approximately 27.13% from 246.55 million tonnes⁵ for 2015. The decrease was mainly due to the fact that the main cargo handled in Qinhuangdao Port was coal, and the coal throughput recorded year-on-year decrease as affected by the weak demand and supply of coal, the increase in the number of southbound transportation channels for coals from northern region and the intensified competition from surrounding ports,

The Group achieved a cargo throughput of 73.11 million tonnes⁶ in Caofeidian Port, representing a decrease of 7.31 million tonnes or approximately 9.09% from 80.42 million tonnes⁶ for 2015. The main reasons for the decrease are: Caofeidian Shiye was faced with various difficulties in 2016 including the intensifying competition for cargo sources between Jingtang Port and Caofeidian Port. The suspension of vessel berthing at Phase One 2# berth created significant impact on the operation of Caofeidian Shiye. In addition, the operation was also affected by the long downtime of the bucket unloader chain at Phase 2 of the metal ore terminal.

The Group achieved a cargo throughput of 59.99 million tonnes in Huanghua Port, representing an increase of 16.8 million tonnes or approximately 38.90% from 43.19 million tonnes for 2015. The increase was mainly because: (1) the throughput capacity of metal ore was increased due to the commencement of operation of the metal ore terminal at Huanghua Port; (2) we solicited the cargoes extensively and actively develop new cargo sources by communicating with our clients effectively and conducting various research and visits to enterprises in the hinterland; (3) the development of coal business facilitated the "metal ore – coal" pendulum transportation to create linkage between railways and ports, and developed and reinforced the intermodal transportation of ocean and rail; (4) we linked with Hanhuang Railway to launch the business of collecting coal from the train and distributing metal ore at the port, which laid a foundation for the future enhancement of capability of cargo collection and distribution by railway; and (5) we put great effort in developing new shipping lines, which increased the transfer amount of the port.

(i) Dry bulk cargoes handling services

Our dry bulk cargoes handling services mainly include coal and metal ores handling services. During the Year, the Group recorded a total dry bulk throughput of 289.78 million tonnes, representing a decrease of 51.64 million tonnes or approximately 15.13% from 341.42 million tonnes for 2015. The decrease was mainly due to the decrease in coal throughput at Qinhuangdao Port and metal ore throughput at Caofeidian Port.

During the Year, the Group achieved a total coal throughput of 177.04 million tonnes, representing a decrease of 53.37 million tonnes or approximately 23.16% from 230.41 million tonnes for 2015. Such decrease was mainly due to the fact that during the first half of 2016, with the weak demand for thermal coal in the PRC, increase of railway transportation channels, diversion of cargo resources, intensive competition among the coal port operators in Bohai Rim and the implementation of policy of excessive capacity cut in PRC's coal industry, the Group's business operation faced with relatively large difficulties. However, from the second half of 2016, the PRC's macro economy stabilized and started to pick up, the steel and coal industries saw recovery in demand, which led to the continuous increase in the price of thermal coal in Bohai Rim. Meanwhile, the Group seized the favourable opportunities from the improvement of macro environment and market condition by increasing the marketing efforts and actively attracting customers externally and improving the production organization and service quality internally to safeguard the coal transportation in full force, and delivered outstanding performance as the "coal price stabilizer", which reflected the strategic position of Qinhuangdao Port in national energy transportation sector. During the second half of 2016, the coal throughput of the Group increased by 14.2% from the first half of the year, thereby narrowing the decrease in coal throughput for the whole year.

During the Year, the Group achieved a total metal ores throughput of 112.74 million tonnes, representing an increase of 1.73 million tonnes or 1.56% from 111.01 million tonnes for 2015. Such increase was mainly due to the fact that the metal ore throughput of Huanghua Port recorded a significant year-on-year increase, which provided strong supplement to the year-on-year decrease in metal ore throughput of Caofeidian Port, thereby resulting in the year-on-year increase in metal ore throughput of the Group.

(ii) Oil and liquefied chemicals handling services

The Group recorded a total oil and liquefied chemicals throughput of 3.31 million tonnes during the Year, representing a decrease of 3.7 million tonnes or approximately 52.78% from 7.01 million tonnes for 2015. The Daqing crude oil transportation through Tieqin pipeline was stopped at the end of September 2015, which resulted in a relatively large gap in port oil cargo sources. In order to fill the gap in cargo sources, the Group focused on offshore oil and crude oil from asphalt plants, strived to coordinate with the customers to increase the transfer amount, meanwhile actively facilitated the construction of supervisory storage tank.

(iii) Container services

During the Year, the Group achieved better results in respect of the "dry bulk & general cargoes to containers" reform, development of cargo sources in hinterland, expansion of sea-rail intermodal transportation business and stabilization and development of shipping lines. As a result, during the Year, the Group recorded a total container throughput of 1,116,647 TEU, equivalent to a throughput of 13.25 million tonnes, representing increases in the number of containers handled and throughput of 113,971 TEU and 0.72 million tonnes, respectively, (i.e. approximately 11.37% and 5.75%, respectively) as compared with the number of containers handled and throughput of 1,002,676 TEU and 12.53 million tonnes for 2015, respectively.

(iv) General cargoes handling services

During the Year, the Group recorded a total throughput of general and other cargoes of 6.42 million tonnes, representing a decrease of 2.78 million tonnes or approximately 30.22% from 9.20 million tonnes for 2015. The decrease in general cargoes handling throughput was mainly attributable to the decrease in throughput of commodities such as fertilizer and grain affected by decrease in market demand as well as competition and share of cargo sources from surrounding ports.

(v) Ancillary port services and value-added services

We also provide a variety of ancillary port services and value-added services. Our ancillary port services include tugging, tallying, trans-shipping, and shipping agency services during the Year. Our value-added services mainly include towing, tallying, coal blending and tariff-free warehouse and export supervisory warehouse services. During the Year, the revenue of the Group from ancillary port services and value-added services amounted to RMB155,153 thousand, representing a year-on-year decrease of 29.75% as compared to the revenue from ancillary port services and value-added services of RMB220,858 thousand in 2015.

Note:

- 1. Throughput includes that of Caofeidian Shiye. Caofeidian Shiye operates terminals in Caofeidian Port and is a non-consolidated associate company of, and is 35% owned by, the Company. The Company is the largest shareholder of Caofeidian Shiye. During the Year, the throughput of Caofeidian Shiye was 73.11 million tonnes, consisting of 2.78 million tonnes of coal, 70.1 million tonnes of metal ores and 0.23 million tonnes of general cargoes.
- 2. Includes containers throughput. Using TEU as the measuring unit, the Group recorded a containers throughput of 515,482 TEU in Qinhuangdao Port during the Year.
- 3. Representing throughput from Caofeidian Shiye.
- 4. Includes containers throughput. Using TEU as the measuring unit, the Group recorded a containers throughput of 601,165 TEU in Huanghua Port during the Year.

(5) Administrative Expenses and Selling Expenses

During the Year, our total administrative expenses and selling expenses amounted to RMB799,830 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB272,720 thousand or approximately 25.43% from RMB1,072,550 thousand for 2015. The decrease was mainly attributable to the fact that, on one hand, affected by the decrease in throughput, the Group took active measures of cost reduction and efficiency enhancement, which significantly decreased the administrative expense; on the other hand, since May 2016, the property tax, land use tax, vehicle use tax and stamp duty were reclassified to tax and surcharges for accounting purpose; in addition, early retirement benefits were also decreased as compared with 2015.

(6) Financial Costs

During the Year, our financial costs amounted to RMB258,568 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB38,405 thousand or approximately 12.93% from RMB296,973 thousand for 2015. The decrease was mainly attributable to the decrease in interest expense in 2016 due to multiple downward adjustments to the benchmark rate by the People's Bank of China since 2015.

(7) Investment Income

During the Year, our investment income amounted to RMB120,749 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB117,845 thousand or approximately 49.39% from RMB238,594 thousand for 2015. The decrease was mainly attributable to the decrease in profits generated by the enterprises which the Group invested in.

(8) Net Non-operating Revenue and Expenses

During the Year, our net non-operating revenue and expenses amounted to RMB136,636 thousand, representing an increase of RMB83,573 thousand or approximately 157.50% from RMB53,063 thousand for 2015. The increase was mainly attributable to the receipt of subsidy for the number of containers by the Group during the Year.

(9) Income Tax Expense

Income tax expense of the Group decreased by RMB253,340 thousand to RMB113,716 thousand for the Year from RMB367,056 thousand for 2015, which was mainly due to the decrease in total taxable profits. The effective income tax rate of the Group increased to 23.43% for the Year from 21.42% for 2015, which was mainly due to the expiry of the tax preferential policy of "three-year exemption and three-year 50% reduction" enjoyed by Cangzhou Bohai during the Year.

(10) Net Profit

Net profit of the Group for the Year amounted to RMB371,565 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB974,797 thousand or 72.40% from RMB1,346,362 thousand for 2015. Our net profit attributable to owners of the parent for the Year amounted to RMB365,029 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB979,461 thousand or 72.85% from RMB1,344,490 thousand for 2015.

During the Year, net profit margin of the Group was approximately 7.57%, representing a decrease of 11.97 percentage points from approximately 19.54% for 2015.

(11) Earnings Per Share

Earnings per Share are calculated by dividing the net profit attributable to owners of the parent for the Year by the weighted average number of ordinary Shares in issue during the Year. Earnings per Share of the Group for the Year amounted to RMB0.07, representing a decrease of 74.07% from RMB0.27 for 2015. Please refer to Note V-45 to the financial statements in this annual report for the calculation of earnings per Share.

(12) Capital Structure, Cash Flows and Financial Resources

The Group's funds are mainly used for investment, operating costs, construction of berths and repayment of loans. The Group primarily relied on funds generated from operations and bank loans for our working capital requirement.

During the Year, net cash flows generated from operating activities amounted to RMB1,488,869 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB832,369 thousand or 35.86% as compared with the net cash inflows in 2015 (RMB2,321,238 thousand). Such decrease was mainly resulted from the decrease in revenue for the Year.

During the Year, net cash flows generated from investing activities amounted to

RMB-85,788 thousand, representing an increase of RMB1,956,668 thousand or 95.80% as compared with RMB-2,042,456 thousand in 2015. Such increase was mainly resulted from the recovery of bank deposits with maturity of over three months during the Year.

During the Year, net cash flows from financing activities amounted to RMB-1,645,427 thousand, representing an increase of approximately RMB168,280 thousand or 9.28% as compared with RMB-1,813,707 thousand in 2015. Such increase was mainly attributable to the combined effect of decrease in net increase of bank borrowings as compared with last year and decrease in dividends distributed as compared with last year.

Due to the above reasons, as at 31 December 2016, the Group held a balance of cash and cash equivalents of approximately RMB1,149,806 thousand, representing a decrease of RMB226,651 thousand or 16.47% from RMB1,376,457 thousand as at 31 December 2015.

As at 31 December 2016, the gearing ratio (total liabilities divided by total assets) of the Group was 51.82%, decreased by 0.18 percentage point as compared with the gearing ratio of 52.00% as at 31 December 2015.

As such, the Group has not adopted any foreign exchange hedging arrangement.

As at 31 December 2016, the Group's current ratio and quick ratio were 0.56 and 0.47, respectively, representing decreases as compared with the current ratio of 0.74 and quick ratio of 0.65 on 31 December 2015. The turnover days of trade receivables for 2016 was 12.20 days and the turnover days of trade payables was 10.40 days, representing an increase of 1.97 days and 1.20 days, respectively, as compared with 2015, which were still within reasonable levels.

(18) Overview of Major Investments

During the Year, the Group made the following investments in its subsidiaries or associated companies:

- 1. On 19 July 2016, Tangshan Jingtang Railway Co., Ltd. ("Jingtang Railway Co") (a 16.67% owned associated company of the Company) and China Railway Group Limited ("China Railway") entered into the General Contracting Agreement on Investment and Construction of Jishugang Railway Project from Newly Constructed Shuichang Mine Area to Caofeidian Port Area (the "General Contracting Agreement"). Under the General Contracting Agreement, China Railway shall invest in and construct the Shuicao Railway Project undertaken by Jingtang Railway Co and increase the capital of Jingtang Railway Co for no more than RMB2.9 billion to subscribe its equity interests. However, the Company and Beijing Shougang Resource Reuse Technology Co., Ltd., being the existing shareholders of Jingtang Railway Co shall repurchase the equity interests held by China Railway in Jingtang Railway Co within a specified period at the original cost. Accordingly, the Company shall undertake to China Railway to repurchase its equity interests in Jingtang Railway Co.
- 2. On 18 November 2016, Cangzhou Bohai Port Co., Ltd.* (a 96.08% owned subsidiary of the Company) established Cangzhou Bohai Jinji Container Terminal Co., Ltd.* (滄州渤海津冀集装箱碼頭有限公司) with registered capital of RMB100 million, which became a wholly-owned subsidiary of Cangzhou Bohai Port Co., Ltd.

(III) MAJOR RISK FACTORS

The Group's business is subject to certain risks, which is broadly divided into (i) risks relating to the Group's business and our industry, which mainly include the decrease in domestic coal consumption, substitution of domestic coal by imported coal and competition from nearby ports and other port operators; and (ii) risks relating to business operation in the PRC, which mainly include the material and adverse effect on the Group's business from the changes in the economic, political or social conditions in the PRC and policies adopted by the PRC government. In 2016, the Group assessed and controlled the risks within a reasonable range in order to ensure the achievement of the Company's development target.

The Board has been directly responsible for the risk control of the Company and is also responsible for the establishment of an effective risk control environment which is in compliance with the laws and regulations. The Board is responsible for developing the Company's overall risk control objectives, risk control policies and internal control system, improving the Company's governance structure and tiered authority delegation system, and setting objectives for specific risk control activities.

In order to improve the risk management system, the Board has resolved to amend the terms of reference of the audit committee on 23 March 2016, whereby the responsibility for risk management of the Company has been delegated to the audit committee. Since then, the audit committee has been responsible for ensuring an effective risk management and internal control system of the Company is in place, reviewing the sufficiency of the Company's internal resources, employees' qualification, experience and training, and conducting research and study on matters related to risk management and internal control and reporting to the Board in this regard.

(IV) ENVIRONMENTAL POLICIES AND PERFORMANCE

The Company has a relatively comprehensive environmental protection system in place covering various aspects such as environment management, pollutant monitoring and environmental protection assessment, which is an important basis for conducting environmental management.

The Company has a comprehensive pollution prevention and treatment system which includes dust prevention, controlling and removing system for dust from coal, mine and grain; desulfurization and dust removal device for boiler; and various kinds of wastewater treatment facilities. All the operation processes such as belt transmission, dumping, stacking, reclaiming and loading are equipped with a large number of sprinkling devices and dust removing devices as well as mobile sprinklers and dust collecting cars to ensure a clean environment in port areas.

The Company attaches great importance to environmental protection and invest into the construction and upgrade of pollution treatment and environmental protection facilities with an aim to continuously improve and enhance the regional environment quality.

In 2016, the sulphur dioxide emission of the Group decreased by 6.543 tonnes, representing a year-on-year decrease of 29.56% and the nitrogen oxide emission decreased by 1.269 tonnes, representing a year-on-year decrease of 29.56%, which reflected that progress had been achieved in reduction of pollutant emission.

Further details of this section are set out in the environmental, social and governance report for 2016 issued by the Company in accordance with the requirements of Appendix 27 of the Listing Rules.

(V) COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS

The Company recognises the importance of compliance with regulatory requirements and the risk of non-compliance with such requirements could lead to the termination of operating licences. The Company has been allocating system and staff resources to ensure continuing compliance with rules and regulations and to maintain cordial working relationships with regulators through effective communications. During the year ended 31 December 2016, to the best knowledge of the Directors, the Company has complied with the Company Law of the PRC, the Securities Law of the PRC, the Special Provisions of the State Council of the PRC for Share Offerings and Offshore Public Listing of Companies Limited by Share (《中華人民共和國國務院 《關於股份有限公司境外募集股份及上市的特別規定》》), the Port Law of the PRC (《中華人民共和國港口法》), the Securities and Futures Ordinance, the Listing Rules and other relevant rules and regulations.

(VI) RELATIONSHIPS WITH EMPLOYEES, CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

Our results and sustainable development is materially affected by the Group's relationships with its employees, customers and suppliers. As such, the Group commits to maintaining good relationships with its employees, customers and suppliers.

The Group highly values human resources management, offers competitive remuneration package and benefits not less favorable than those in the same territory and same industry and provides various training opportunities which meet the employees' working requirement and needs for long-term development in order to help the employees expand the career path and formulate career plans, thereby continuously optimizing human resources allocation and improving the human resources efficiency.

(VII) PROSPECTS

In 2017, the Company will continue to facilitate the issue and listing of A Shares in a steady pace, strive to achieve the target of listing in both PRC and Hong Kong markets, fully utilize the international and domestic capital markets and promote the integration of industrial business and capital operation in an innovative manner to facilitate the leap-forward development of the Company. With the continuous implementation of structural reform on the supply side of the PRC's coal industry, the Company will continue to give full play to the advantages in efficient collection at the port and stockpiling, further innovate the service supply, maintain strategic cooperation relationship with enterprises in the upstream and downstream and perform the function of China's "stabilizer of coal price" and the "reservoir for coal transportation from north to south". Meanwhile, active seize strategic opportunities in the cooperative development of Beijing, Tianjin and Hebei area, consolidate and improve the major businesses while expanding into other relevant industries, promote the enhancement of efficiency and effectiveness by strengthening basic management.

In February 2017, the Ministry of Environmental Protection issued the Plan for Prevention and Control of Atmospheric Pollution in the Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei Region and the Surrounding Regions in 2017 (Draft for Public Consultation) (《京津冀及周邊地區 2017年大氣污染防治工作方案》), which required that from the second half of 2017, the relevant ports in the Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei Region shall gradually stop the business of coal transfer by truck and adopt railway transportation for collection and distribution of coal at the ports, which will provide effective supplement to the cargo sources of Qinhuangdao Port, the main hub port of Daqin Railway. Meanwhile, the production capacity of Phase Two of coal terminal in Caofeidian of the Company will be further released, and the opening of Mengji Railway will provide stable cargoes supply to the coal terminal. In addition, the Company will fully capitalize on the geographical advantages of Caofeidian Port and Huanghua Port in wide coverage of economic hinterland by improving the functions of the ports and adjusting the cargoes portfolio to achieve synergy in the region. The Company will also leverage on the favourable opportunity of vigorous development in Hebei's container industry to consolidate and continue the expansion of sea-rail intermodal transportation business, proactively explore new shipping lines and further expand the cargoes sources of "dry bulk & general cargoes to containers".

For the next few years, based on the synergetic development strategy in Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei Region, the Company will implement various measures to enhance its profitability and ability in sustainable development with emphasis on the following strategies: adjust the port functions and cargoes portfolio, consolidate the coal business, strengthen the metal ore business and increase the oil business to boost the leap-forward development of general cargoes and containers business; deeply explore the port value-added services, integrate the business in upstream and downstream of the industrial chain and expand the logistics service system; allocate the resources with the link of capital, improve the network distribution of the domestic coastal ports and promote the development of internationalization; strengthen the port's linkage with and increase the port's contribution to urban society development to promote the integrative development of port, industry and city; facilitate the infrastructure construction, continue to enhance the level of technology and equipment and build a green harbour; strengthen the recognition on "talent thriving enterprise" and optimize the human resource structure; accelerate the progress of informatization and integration with application of information technologies such as the Internet of Things and cloud computing to build an intelligent port; and keep centering on economic benefits to create generous return for all Shareholders.

The Board is pleased to present the corporate governance report of the Company during the period from 1 January 2016 to 31 December 2016.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The Group is committed to maintaining high level of corporate governance. The Board is responsible for the implementation of corporate governance, including: (a) formulating, developing and reviewing the corporate governance policies and practices of the Company; (b) reviewing and supervising the training and continuous professional development of the Directors and senior management; (c) reviewing and supervising the policies and practices for the compliance of laws and regulatory requirements by the Company; (d) developing, reviewing and supervising the code of conduct and compliance manual, if any, for employees and the Directors; and (e) reviewing the compliance of the Corporate Governance Code by the Company and the disclosure in the corporate governance report. In the past year, actions and measures were taken by the Board to improve the corporate governance gradually and further strengthen the construction of the Company's corporate governance system. The Board believes that an effective corporate governance system can safeguard the interests of the Shareholders and promote the value and accountability of the Company.

The Company has adopted the code provisions of the Corporate Governance Code which were applicable to the Company during the Year. Save for the deviations disclosed in this report with reasons explained for the deviations, the Company has complied with the code provisions set out in the Corporate Governance Code during the Year.

The Board will continue to review and improve its corporate governance system to ensure the compliance of the Corporate Governance Code.

BOARD

Duties and Division Responsibility

The Board shall act in the interests of all the Shareholders and shall be accountable to the general meeting. The Board shall mainly be responsible for: implementing the resolutions of the general meeting; determining the operation plan and investment program of the Company; formulating the annual financial budget plan and final accounting plan of the Company; formulating the profit distribution plan of the Company; determining the establishment of internal management bodies and formulating the basic management system of the Company. The Company has established four special committees under the Board to oversee specific matters of the Company, namely the Audit Committee, the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee, the Nomination Committee and the Strategy Committee. The Board has delegated relevant duties to the respective committees, which are contained in the terms of reference of the relevant committees. Besides, the management of the Company will provide sufficient consultation to the Board and the Board committees when appropriate to facilitate the Directors in making informed decision.

Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer

The Board is responsible for decision making on important matters of the Company and the management is authorised to manage the daily operation of the Company. The Company does not have the position of chief executive officer, whose duties are performed by the general manager. During the Year, Mr. Cao Ziyu and Mr. Tian Yunshan are the chairman of the Board and the general manager of the Company, respectively. The chairman of the Board and the general manager of the Company have clear division of duties. The chairman of the Board shall oversee the work of the Board and monitor the implementation of the resolutions adopted by the Board and the general manager shall coordinate the operation of the business of the Company under the supervision of the Company due to the change of his work commitment. As it takes time for the appointment, before the Board appoints a new general manager on 15 March 2017, Mr. Cao Ziyu, the chairman of the Company, will temporarily perform the duties as the general manager. The Board and the management of the Company have confirmed that the Company will continue to comply with Code A.2.1 of the Corporate Governance Code.

Save as disclosed in the section "Biographical Details of Directors, Supervisors and Senior Management" in this annual report, there is no financial, business, family or other important relationship between the Directors, the chairman of the Board and the general manager.

COMPOSITION OF THE BOARD

As of 31 December 2016, the Board comprised ten Directors, including four executive Directors, Mr. Cao Ziyu (chairman), Mr. Tian Yunshan (general manager) (resigned on 28 February 2017), Mr. Wang Lubiao and Mr. Ma Xiping, two non-executive Directors, Mr. Li Jianping and Mr. Mi Xianwei, and four independent non-executive Directors, Mr. Li Man Choi, Mr. Zhao Zhen, Ms. Zang Xiuqing, Mr. Hou Shujun. The particulars of the Directors are set out in the section "Biographical Details of Directors, Supervisors and Senior Management" in this report.

During the Year, the Board had complied with the requirement of Rules 3.10(1) and 3.10(2) of the Listing Rules to have not less than three independent non-executive Directors, including at least an independent non-executive Director who has the relevant professional qualification or is an expert in accounting or financial management. Besides, in accordance with Rule 3.10A of the Listing Rules, not less than one third of the Directors shall be independent non-executive Directors. The Company currently have and had four independent non-executive Directors during the Year, representing four-tenth of the total number of Directors and was in compliance with relevant requirement.

In accordance with the Articles of Association, the Directors (including non-executive Directors) shall have a term of office of three years from the date of passing the resolution of the Shareholders' general meeting till the expiration of term of office of the Board. The Directors are eligible for re-election upon the expiration of term of office, provided that no independent non-executive Director shall serve consecutive terms for more than six years.

Positions in Other Companies held by Directors

Save as otherwise disclosed in this annual report, none of the Directors hold any directorship in other listed companies.

Time Commitment of Directors

In addition to attending formal meetings, the Directors shall also review reports of the management and regular reports of the Company, inspect the operation of the Company and understand all matters of the Company through various channels so as to effectively perform their duties. After making particular enquiries, the Board is of the view that the Directors have devoted sufficient time and efforts to perform their duties.

TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OF DIRECTORS

During the Year, all Directors have received trainings in the written form or by participating in seminars. The trainings were mainly about (i) the obligations of compliance with the Listing Rules by the directors, supervisors and senior management of companies listed in Hong Kong; and (ii) the compliance requirement for connected transaction of listed companies under the Listing Rules.

The Directors will be updated with the latest developments in legal and regulatory requirements and the operation of the Company to facilitate the performance of their duties. Training will also be provided for the Directors when necessary to ensure that the Directors understand the business and operation of the Group and their duties and obligations under the Listing Rules and the applicable laws and regulations.

Meetings of the Board

According to the Articles of Association, the Board shall conduct at least four regular meetings per year, i.e. a meeting in each quarter. Written notice of regular Board meetings shall be delivered to all Directors and Supervisors 14 days before the meeting. Written notice of ad hoc Board meetings shall be delivered three days before the meeting. Notice of meeting shall contain the date, venue and duration of the meeting, matters and resolutions to be considered and the date of the notice. Unless otherwise specified by the Articles of Association, more than half of the number of Directors shall form a quorum of a Board meeting. A Director who is unable to attend Board meeting may appoint another Director to attend on his behalf as a proxy by a power of attorney which shall

contain the name and capacity of the proxy and the scope and duration of the appointment. No Director shall vote on any resolution for himself or on behalf of other Directors if he has interest in the parties or matters in relation to the resolution. An ad hoc Board meeting may be conducted by video conferencing, telephone conferencing and by written resolution. Any Director who fails to attend a Board meeting in person or by proxy shall be deemed to have waived his voting rights. The Board shall prepare minutes of Board meetings to record the matters resolved. The minutes shall be initialed by all Directors who have attended the meeting and the person who has prepared the minutes.

All Directors are provided with all relevant information of matters to be discussed in the Board meetings in a timely manner, and they may seek independent professional advice and services from the company secretary and senior management of the Company. Upon reasonable request to the Board, the Directors may seek independent professional advice, as and when necessary, at the Company's expenses.

During the Year, Directors convened six regular meetings on 23 March 2016, 16 June 2016, 30 August 2016, 18 October 2016, 18 November 2016 and 9 December 2016, respectively, at which resolutions regarding the 2015 annual results and the 2016 interim results were considered.

Audit Committee

The major responsibilities of the Audit Committee are (1) to propose the appointment, re-appointment or termination of external auditing firm; (2) to review and supervise the independence and objectiveness of the external auditors and the effectiveness of the audit process in accordance with applicable standards; (3) to review the financial information of the Company and its disclosure; (4) to supervise the financial reporting system, risk management and internal control systems of the Company; and (5) to enhance the communication between the internal and external auditors. The terms of reference of the Audit Committee are posted on the websites of the Company and the Stock Exchange.

As of 31 December 2016, the Audit Committee comprises three Directors, including Ms. Zang Xiuqing, Mr. Li Man Choi and Mr. Mi Xianwei. Ms. Zang Xiuqing, the independent non-executive Director, acts as chairman of the committee. All members of the Audit Committee are non-executive Directors and Ms. Zang Xiuqing and Mr. Li Man Choi are independent non-executive Directors.

During the Year, the Audit Committee convened meetings on 23 March 2016 and 30 August 2016 to review the financial results of the Group for year ended 31 December 2015 and for the six months ended 30 June 2016 before the same were submitted to the Board.

The Audit Committee has reviewed and confirmed the audited consolidated financial statements in this annual report and has discussed with the management on the financial statements and the internal control of the Company. The Audit Committee is of the view that these financial statements are prepared in accordance with the applicable accounting standards and requirements and the disclosure is adequate.

Remuneration and Appraisal Committee

The major responsibilities of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee are (1) to review the remuneration packages and policies of all Directors and senior management and propose a formal and transparent remuneration policy determination procedure for approval by the Board; (2) to review the policy and structure of the remuneration of Directors, Supervisors and senior management (including non-monetary benefits, pension and allowance) and the procedure of the determination of remuneration policy and to make recommendations to the Board on a formal and transparent remuneration policy determination procedure; (3) to propose to the Board on the remuneration of non-executive Directors; (4) to review and approve the compensation for Directors who are dismissed or removed due to misconduct so as to ensure that the compensation is in compliance with the contract terms or reasonable and appropriate if not in compliance with the contract terms; and (5) to monitor the implementation of the remuneration policy for Directors, Supervisors and senior management. The terms of reference of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee are posted on the websites of the Company and the Stock Exchange.

As of 31 December 2016, the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee comprises three Directors. On 28 February 2017, Mr. Tian Yunshan resigned as the executive Director, general manager, member of Remuneration and Appraisal Committee and Strategy Committee of the Company. Prior to the resignation of Mr. Tian Yunshan, the members of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee included independent non-executive Directors Mr. Hou Shujun and Ms. Zang Xiuqing, and executive Director Mr. Tian Yunshan during the Year. Independent non-executive Directors represent a majority in the committee. Mr. Hou Shujun, an independent non-executive Director, acts as chairman of the committee. After the resignation of Mr. Tian Yunshan, the number of members of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee will be reduced from three to two, and is therefore unable to meet the requirements set out in the terms of reference of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee. In order to meet the requirements of the terms of reference of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee, the Company is currently aiming to appoint a new member of the Remuneration and Appraisal Committee as soon as practicable.

The committee shall consider the merits and assessable quality of the candidates and the diversification of the Board on the appointment, re-appointment and succession of Directors and senior management on consideration of the Strategy of the Company and the skill, knowledge, experience and diversification requirements; (4) to review the Diversified Membership Policy of the Board and assess the effectiveness and progress of its implementation and to disclose in the annual corporate governance report; (5) to review the independence of the independent non-executive Directors; and (6) to perform other duties delegated by the Board. The terms of reference of the Nomination Committee are posted on the websites of the Company and the Stock Exchange.

As of 31 December 2016, the Nomination Committee comprises three Directors, including independent non-executive Directors Mr. Zhao Zhen and Ms. Zang Xiuqing, and non-executive Director Mr. Li Jianping during the Year. The independent non executive Directors represent a majority in the committee. Mr. Zhao Zheng, an independent non-executive Director, acts as chairman of the committee.

During the Year, the Nomination Committee has mainly performed the following work: to assess and advise the Board on suitability of the nominees who was nominated as the Directors, Supervisors and senior management of the Company during the Year, and review the composition of the Board in accordance with the requirement of the Diversified Membership Policy of the Board. The Nomination Committee has held one meeting in total and all members attended the meeting.

During the Year, the Nomination Committee held one meeting on 29 August 2016 to finish the work above.

Strategy Committee

The major responsibilities of the Strategy Committee are (1) to research and advise on the long term development strategy of the Company; (2) to review and advise on major investment and financing plans to be approved by the Board as required by the Articles of Association; (3) to review and advise on major capital operation and asset operation to be approved by the Board as required by the Articles of Association; (4) to review and advise on other significant matters affecting the development of the Company; (5) to inspect the implementation of the above matters; and (6) to perform other duties delegated by the Board. The terms of reference of the Strategy Committee are posted on the websites of the Company and the Stock Exchange.

As of 31 December 2016, the Strategy Committee comprises five Directors. On 28 February 2017, Mr. Tian Yunshan resigned as the executive Director, general manager, member of Remuneration and Appraisal Committee and Strategy Committee of the Company. Prior to the resignation of Mr. Tian Yunshan, the members of the Strategy Committee included two executive Directors, one non-executive Director and two independent non-executive Directors during the Year, namely Mr. Cao Ziyu, chairman of the Board, Mr. Tian Yunshan, general manager, Mr. Mi Xianwei, Mr. Zhao Zhen and Mr. Hou Shujun. Mr. Cao Ziyu, chairman of the Board, acts as chairman of the committee.

Diversification of the Board

In accordance with the board member diversification requirement of the Listing Rules, the Board has adopted the Diversified Membership Policy of the Board. DIRECTOR

Appointment and Re-election of Directors

Directors (including non-executive Directors and independent non-executive Directors) shall be elected by general meeting with a term of office of three years from the date of passing the resolution of the general meeting and till the expiration of term of office of the Board. The Directors are eligible for re-election upon the expiration of term of office, provided that no independent non-executive Director shall serve consecutive terms for more than six years.

The chairman and vice chairman of the Board shall be elected and removed by over half of the members of the Board, with a term of office of three years, and may be re-elected upon the expiration of term.

Each of the current Directors has entered into a service contract with the Company to be effective for three years upon approval by Shareholders subject to termination in accordance with the terms of the respective contracts.

None of the Directors has entered or proposed to enter into a service contract with any member of the Group other than those which would be expired within one year or the relevant employer could terminate within one year without the payment of compensation (except statutory compensation).

Nomination of Directors

In accordance with the Articles of Association, the candidates of Directors shall be nominated or recommended by the existing Board or in the form of proposal by the Shareholders separately or jointly holding over 3% of the shares of the Company. The Board shall verify the qualifications and conditions of the candidates of Directors and a written resolution should be proposed at the general meeting for approval after the candidate of Director is determined by proposal.

Independence of Independent Non-executive Directors

The Company currently has four independent non-executive Directors and none of them has served as independent non-executive Director for more than six years. The number and qualification of the independent non-executive Directors are in compliance with the requirements of the Listing Rules and the Articles of Association. Their independence is highly guaranteed as none of the independent non-executive Directors has any business and financial relationship with the Company or its subsidiaries and has no management function in the Company.

Each of our four independent non-executive Directors has given their written confirmation of their independence in accordance with Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. Having confirmed, the Board understands that all current independent non-executive Directors are independent and are in compliance with the requirement of Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules.

Securities Transaction by Directors and Supervisors

The Company has adopted Model Code for Securities Transactions by Directors of Listed Issuers set out in Appendix 10 to the Listing Rules (the "**Model Code**") as its code of conduct for securities transactions by the Directors and Supervisors to regulate the securities transactions of the Directors and Supervisors. After specific enquiries, all Directors and Supervisors have confirmed that they have complied with the provisions of the Model Code during the Year.

Directors' Responsibilities on Financial Statements

The Directors have the responsibility to prepare the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2016 to give a true and fair view of the affairs of the Company and the Group and the results and cash flow of the Group.

According to Code C.1.1 of the Corporate Governance Code, the management shall provide necessary explanation and information to the Board so that the Board can have a preliminary assessment of the financial statements before they are submitted to the Board for approval. The Company will also provide monthly reports on the results, positions and prospects of the Group to all members of the Board.

SHAREHOLDERS AND GENERAL MEETINGS

Particulars of the Controlling Shareholder and the Ultimate Controlling Shareholder

The Controlling Shareholder of the Company is HPG, a state-owned company under the State-owned Assets Supervision & Administration Commission of the People's Government of Hebei Province.

The operation of the Company is independent from the Controlling Shareholder of the Company in terms of personnel, organisation, assets and business. The Controlling Shareholder has not taken any action beyond its authority without approval of the Shareholders at the general meeting and has not directly or indirectly intervened the operation and decision of the Company.

Shareholdings of the substantial shareholders and details of the Non-competition Agreement and Undertaking of the Controlling Shareholder during the Year are set out in the "Report of the Board of Directors" in this report.

General Meetings

The Company is committed to ensure that all Shareholders, in particular the minority Shareholders, are treated equally and are able to exercise all their rights. Shareholders' general meeting is the highest authority of the Company and performs its duties in accordance with all applicable laws.

To safeguard the interests and rights of Shareholders, all major matters shall be proposed as separate resolutions at the general meeting for consideration in accordance with the applicable laws and the Listing Rules. The rights of Shareholders and voting procedures of the general meeting shall be contained in the relevant circular in accordance with the Articles of Association and the Listing Rules, which shall be dispatched to Shareholders within a specified period of time and shall be posted on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company.

During the Reporting Period, the Company convened one annual general meeting and one extraordinary general meeting. For details of proposals and resolutions considered at the meetings, please refer to the relevant announcements posted on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company.

CONTROL SYSTEM

Supervisory Committee

The Supervisory Committee is the supervisory authority of the Company and shall be accountable to the general meeting of the Shareholders. Supervisors shall act independently to protect the legal interests of Shareholders and the Company in accordance with the laws.

The authority and duties of the Supervisory Committee include but not limited to (1) to review the financial statements, business report and profit distribution plan prepared by the Board and may retain certified accountant or certified auditor to review the financial information; (2) to supervise the financial activities of the Company; (3) to demand the rectification of acts of the Directors, general manager and senior management which are against the interests of the Company; and (4) to exercise other power, authority and duties in accordance with the Articles of Association.

The Supervisory Committee currently comprises five members, including three Supervisors elected by the Shareholders (Mr. Nie Yuzhong, Mr. Bo Zhouqing and Mr. Liu Simang) and two Supervisors elected by employees (Mr. Cao Dong and Ms. Chen Linyan). Mr. Nie Yuzhong acts as chairman of the Supervisory Committee. Supervisors who are representatives of the Shareholders shall be elected and removed by Shareholders' general meeting. Supervisors who are representatives of employees shall be elected and removed by employee conference, employee general meeting or other democratic procedures. Each Supervisor shall have a term of three years from the date of approval by Shareholders' general meeting or employee conference subject to termination upon expiry of the session of the Supervisory Committee. Supervisors are eligible for re-election.

Particulars of the Supervisors are set out in the section "Biographical Details of Directors, Supervisors and Senior Management" of this report.

During the Reporting Period, the Supervisory Committee convened regular meetings on 6 April 2016 and 26 August 2016, respectively, at which proposals including the 2015 Work Report of the Supervisory Committee of Qinhuangdao Port Co., Ltd. was reviewed. The work of the Supervisory Committee is set out in the Report of Supervisory Committee in this annual report.

Internal Control and Risk Management

The Board shall have the decision on all operation matters and is committed to establishing and improving the internal control and risk management system. It shall also supervise the implementation of the risk management and internal control system to safeguard the investment of the Shareholders and the assets of the Group.

The Company has adopted a number of internal control and corporate governance measures since July 2010 to strengthen the systematic management of construction projects and other business operations for better internal control. Some major measures are as follows:

- clear division of the authorities of the general meeting of the Shareholders, the Board, the chairman of the Board and the general manager to avoid the centralisation of authority;
- stringent authority delegation, division and supervision system to ensure the security and proper use of funds;
- collective decision is required for major investment and the proposal, evaluation, decision and implementation procedures are under strict control to minimise investment risks;
- invitation of non-state-owned entities to participate in major projects or services of the Group is under strict control and the Directors and senior management are prohibited to have any paid positions outside the Group;
- to promote the transparency of the management and operation through the implementation of "Three Major One Important" policy so as to prevent the Directors and senior management from fraud and bribe;
- the entire procurement procedure from application, approval, contracting, procurement, inspection and delivery and payment is improved through the improvement of purchase procedure and payment monitoring process to eliminate any loophole in procurement;
- the size, structure and sources of funding as well as the use of significant amount of fund are also under strict control to minimise finance costs and ensure the efficient use of funds; and
- there are highly regulated procedures for connected transactions to specify the preliminary appraisal by independent Directors before submitting for approval by the Board.

During the Year, the above procedures were effectively implemented. The internal control system was improved to strengthen the risk prevention and internal control capabilities. The Audit Committee has been reviewing the risk management and internal control system of the Company regularly, whilst such duties were not specified in the written terms of reference of the Audit Committee. To comply with amendments of Listing Rules while considering the schedule of Board meetings, the Company thereby, through the Board meeting held on 23 March 2016, approved the amendment of the terms of reference of the Audit Committee, of which duties of the Audit Committee regarding the risk management are specified. The above did not have a material and significant effect on the Company's corporate governance. In addition, the Audit Committee will continue to review and evaluate the effectiveness of the risk management and internal control system of the Group and to report the findings to the Board. The Board will review and evaluate the risk management and internal control system at least once a year to ensure that no material internal control loophole exists.

A self-evaluation report has been prepared by the Board in respect of the risk management and internal control matters of the Company during the Reporting Period. The Board has reviewed the control system of the Company and is of the view that during the Reporting Period, such system was effective and the management of the Company should further perfect its risk management and internal control system to promote the improvement of its corporate governance

AUDITORS AND THEIR REMUNERATIONS

Ernst & Young Hua Ming LLP was appointed by the Company as the auditors of the Company for 2016. The appointments shall expire upon conclusion of the annual general meeting. The Board is authorized to determine the remuneration of the auditors which is in line with market practice.

For the year ended 31 December 2016, the fees paid to external auditors for interim review and annual audit services (annual audit services for subsidiaries included) were RMB4,198,113.21.

Save as disclosed above, during the Year, the Group did not pay any fee to Ernst & Young Hua Ming LLP for non-audit services. The Audit Committee is satisfied that the independence of the auditors is not affected by the non-audit services provided in 2016.

COMPANY SECRETARY

Ms. Kwong Yin Ping, Yvonne ("Ms. Kwong"), a joint company secretary of the Company, has resigned as a joint company secretary of the Company on 9 December 2016, with effect from 12 December 2016. The Stock Exchange has confirmed that Mr. Zhang Nan ("Mr. Zhang"), the other joint company secretary of the Company, meets certain requirements in relation to the qualification of the company secretary under Rule 3.28 and Rule 8.17 of the Listing Rules and is qualified to act as the sole company secretary. Therefore, Mr. Zhang became the sole company secretary of the Company since 12 December 2016.

Mr. Zhang joined the Company in 2002 and has more than 14 years legal and securities management related experience. He is familiar with the operation of the Board and the Company and is currently the deputy manager of the Board office.

Particulars of Mr. Zhang are set out in the section "Biographical Details of Directors, Supervisors and Senior Management" in this report.

Both of Mr. Zhang and Ms. Kwong have confirmed that they have received not less than 15 hours of relevant professional training as required by Rule 3.29 of the Listing Rules during the Year.

SHAREHOLDERS' RIGHTS AND INVESTOR RELATIONSHIP

Convening of Extraordinary General Meeting

In accordance with the Articles of Association, the Shareholders of the Company may demand, convene, chair, attend or attend by proxy general meetings and exercise voting rights thereat.

Shareholders separately or jointly holding not less than 10% Shares in issue with voting rights may demand the convening of extraordinary general meeting in writing. The Company shall promptly convene such meeting after receipt of the demand. The following procedures shall be followed when Shareholders demand the convening of extraordinary general meeting or class shareholders' meeting:

- (1) Shareholder(s), separately or jointly, holding in aggregate not less than 10% voting Shares of the Company may sign one or more written requests of the same format and content to demand the Board to convene extraordinary general meeting or class shareholders' meeting with explanation of the purpose of the meeting. Upon receipt of the request, the Board shall convene the extraordinary general meeting or class shareholders' meeting as soon as possible. The number of Shares held by the abovementioned Shareholders shall be based on the number of Shares as of the date on which the Shareholders put forward such written request.
- (2) Where the Board fails to issue notice to convening the meeting within 30 days upon receipt of the above written request, Shareholders proposing such request may convene a meeting by their own within four months upon receipt of the request by the Board. The convening procedures shall as much as possible be equivalent to the procedures for meeting convened by the Board.
CORPORATE GOVERNANCE REPORT

If Shareholders call and convene a meeting by themselves since the Board fails to convene the meeting in accordance with the aforesaid requirements, the reasonable expenses incurred shall be borne by the Company and be deducted from the amounts due to the Directors who shall be responsible for such dereliction of duty.

Enquiry to the Board

According to the Articles of Association, Shareholders of the Company shall have access to the Articles of Association, the personal particulars of Directors, Supervisors and senior management, minutes of Shareholders' general meetings, Board meetings, meetings of Supervisory Committee and financial statements.

Request for information, materials or enquiry to the Board shall be forwarded to the Company (contacts to whom are set out in the website of the Company). Shareholder is required to provide written proof of his/her holding of Shares in the Company (including the class and number of Shares) for verification when submitting the enquiry.

Procedures for Proposal at the General Meeting

Shareholders are entitled to make proposal(s) at the general meeting by proposing resolution or speaking at the meeting.

Shareholder(s) holding in aggregate 3% of the Shares in the Company may propose additional resolution in writing to the convener 10 days before the general meeting. Upon receipt of the proposal, the convener shall issue supplemental notice of meeting to contain the additional resolutions in two days.

Shareholders attending the general meeting are entitled to speak. Shareholders who require speaking shall make registration before voting.

Amendment of Constitutional Documents

During the Year, the Company amended the Articles of Association in June and October 2016. For details of the amendments, please refer to the relevant announcements on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company.

Communication with Investors and Investor Relationship

He has served as a director of Hebei Port Group Finance Company Limited (河北港口集團財務有限公司) since July 2014 and the vice chairman of Hebei Port Group Finance Co., Ltd. Since October 2016. Mr. Guo previously served as a supervisor of China Merchants Securities Co., Ltd. (招商證券股份有限公司) (listed on the Shanghai Stock Exchange in November 2009; stock code: 600999) from December 2001 to May 2011.

Mr. YANG Wensheng (楊文勝), aged 48, the general manager of the Company. Mr. Yang graduated from Shanghai Railway Institute (上海鐵道學院) with a bachelor's degree in July 1991 and he is a senior economist. He joined the Qinhuangdao Port Authority in 1991 and has since then been engaged in port operation related work. He had served as the section chief of the production section of the Railway Transport Company of the Qinhuangdao Port Authority (秦皇島港務局鐵運公司), the deputy manager of Rail Transportation Branch of Qinhuangdao Port Group Co., Ltd. (秦皇島港務集團有限公司), the deputy director of the production department of Qinhuangdao Port Group Co., Ltd. (秦皇島港務集團有限公司), the general manager of Qinren Sea Transportation Co., Ltd. (秦仁海運 有限公司) and the manager of the Second Port Branch of the Company. Mr. Yang served as the director of the production department of the Company from September 2012 to January 2015, and was appointed as the deputy general manager of the Company on 22 August 2014. He concurrently served as the chairman of Qinhuangdao Port GangSheng (Hong Kong) Co., Limited (a subsidiary of the Company) since April 2016, and was appointed as the general manager of the Company on 15 March 2017.

COMPANY SECRETARY

Mr. ZHANG Nan (張楠), aged 37, the deputy director of the general office of the Board, the representative for securities affairs and the joint company secretary of the Company. He obtained a bachelor's degree in law majoring in economic law from Heilongjiang University (黑龍江大學) in July 2002. He is a registered corporate lawyer and a registered corporate legal advisor. He is a certified enterprise risk manager and has the qualification certificates of securities practice, secretary to the board of directors, securities affairs representative, independent director as well as financial and tax intermediate professional and technical position. Mr. Zhang has served as the deputy director of the general office of the Board and the representative for securities affairs of the Company since November 2013. He has been the joint company secretary of the Company since August 2013, and has been the sole company secretary of the Company since 12 December 2016 when Ms. Kwong Yin Ping, Yvonne, the other joint company secretary of the Company, resigned from her position.

The Board hereby presented the Report of the Board of Directors and the audited consolidated financial statements of the Group for the Year.

PRINCIPAL BUSINESS

As at the date of this report, the Group provides integrated port services including stevedoring, stacking, warehousing, transportation and logistics services. The various types of cargo we handled mainly include (i) dry bulk cargoes (including coal and metal ores), (ii) oil and liquefied chemicals, (iii) containers and (iv) general cargo and other goods.

There is no material change to the nature of Group's principal business activities during the Year.

FINANCIAL POSITION AND RESULTS

Financial position as at 31 December 2016 and profit of the Year of the Group are set out in pages 65 to 67 of this report.

DIVIDENDS

As the Company is actively pushing ahead the progress of the A Shares IPO and the same has entered the crucial phase. In order to actively facilitate and ensure that the Company will complete the A Shares IPO as scheduled and safeguard the interest of the Company and all Shareholders as a whole, the Board has suggested not to distribute the profits (dividends) for the year ended 31 December 2016 ("2016 Final Dividends") tentatively, which will be accounted for as the accumulated retained profits (dividends) of the Company. Upon the completion of the A Shares IPO of the Company, the retained profits (dividends) will be shared by all Shareholders holding the Shares of the Company after the A Shares IPO in proportion to their respective shareholdings. In the earliest period available for profit distribution after the A Shares IPO of the Company, the Company will propose the distribution of dividends at the general meeting in accordance with the requirements of the Articles of Association of the Company and relevant regulatory requirements. The matters in relation to tentatively not distributing the profits (dividends) for 2016 will be submitted to the Annual General Meeting and class shareholders' meeting proposed to be convened by the Company on 16 June 2017 for approval.

The AGM of the Company will be held on Friday, 16 June 2017. In order to determine the holders of H Shares who will be entitled to attend and vote at the AGM, the register of members of the Company will be closed from Wednesday, 17 May 2017 to Friday, 16 June 2017 (both days inclusive), during which period no transfer of Shares will be registered. In order for the holders of H Shares of the Company to qualify for attending the 2016 AGM, all completed share transfer documents accompanied by the relevant share certificates must be lodged with the Company's H Share registrar in Hong Kong, Computershare Hong Kong Investor Services Limited, at Shops 1712-1716, 17th Floor, Hopewell Centre, 183 Queen's Road East, Hong Kong, and in any case no later than 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday, 16 May 2017.

USE OF PROCEEDS FROM THE GLOBAL OFFERING

The H Shares of the Company has been listed and traded on the Stock Exchange since 12 December 2013. After deducting related expenses, the net proceeds of the Company from the Global Offering amounted to HK\$3,823 million. During the Year, the use of proceeds from the Global Offering was in line with the usage disclosed in the Prospectus.

FIXED ASSETS AND CONSTRUCTION IN PROGRESS

Details of fixed assets and construction in progress of the Group in the Year are set out in Note V-11 and V-12 to the financial statements in this annual report.

UNDISTRIBUTED PROFITS AT THE END OF THE YEAR

Details of the undistributed profits of the Group in the Year are set out in "Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity" in this annual report. As at 31 December 2016, undistributed profits at the end of the Year distributable to Shareholders amounted to approximately RMB832,687 thousand.

MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

During the Year, revenue from the sales to the five largest customers by the Group accounted for approximately 47.07% of the total turnover of the Group, among which, revenue from the sales to the largest customer accounted for approximately 14.79% of the total turnover of the Group.

During the Year, our purchases made from the five largest suppliers of goods or services (i.e. our non-capital goods suppliers) accounted for 12.29% of operating cost of the Group, among which, our purchases made from the largest supplier of non-capital goods accounted for 4.55% of the operating cost of the Group; our purchases made from the five largest equipment and construction service suppliers (i.e. our capital goods suppliers) amounted to RMB486,589 thousand, among which, our purchases made from the largest equipment and construction service supplier amounted to RMB174,758 thousand.

During the Year, none of the Directors, Supervisors or their respective associates or any Shareholders who own more than 5% of equity interests of the Company so far as the Directors are aware, has beneficial interests in the five largest customers and the five largest capital or non-capital goods suppliers.

As HPG Finance is the subsidiary of HPG and 60% of its equity is owned by HPG, HPG Finance is an associate of HPG and also the connected person of the Company.

(A) Lease Agreement

The Company and HPG entered into a lease agreement on 25 December 2008 which was renewed on 28 March 2011 ("**Old Lease Agreement**") in respect of the lease of certain assets which include land, buildings, facilities and equipment from HPG to us. The Old Lease Agreement was valid from 31 March 2008 to 31 December 2013. On 11 July 2013, the Company and HPG entered into a supplemental agreement to the Old Lease Agreement, which extended its term to 31 December 2015, with effect from the execution date of the supplemental agreement. On 23 March 2016, the Company and HPG entered into a new lease agreement, which was valid from 1 January 2016 to 31 December 2018. Pursuant to the new lease agreement, HPG leases to us certain facilities, equipment and properties related to our operations in the western zone of Qinhuangdao Port, which include office buildings, stacking yards, roads, power supply and lighting equipment, office facilities and instruments, and a majority of which are immovable properties. For details of the new lease agreement, please refer to the Company's announcement dated 23 March 2016.

The total rental fee paid to HPG by the Group pursuant to the lease agreement during the Year was RMB97,401 thousand.

(B) General Services Agreement

The Company entered into a general services agreement with HPG on 25 December 2008 which was renewed on 28 March 2011 (the "**Old General Services Agreement**"). On 11 July 2013, the Company entered into a supplemental agreement to the general services agreement with HPG, which extended the term of the Old General Service Agreement to 31 December 2015, with effect from the execution date of the supplemental agreement. On 23 March 2016, the Company and HPG entered into a new general service agreement, which was valid from 1 January 2016 to 31 December 2018. The new general services agreement serves as a framework agreement containing the scope of goods and services, transaction principle, stipulation on the formulation of annual procurement and estimation plan, pricing terms and policies in respect of the goods and services to be provided under the new general services agreement.

Pursuant to the Old General Services Agreement, HPG and/or its subsidiaries shall provide a wide range of services for the Group, which include (i) social services such as employee training, medical services, printing and other relevant or similar services; (ii) office and logistics services such as property services, office leasing, office supplies and other daily supplies leasing, water and heat supply, hygiene, greening and other relevant or similar services; and (iii) production services such as labour services, equipment manufacturing, survey and design, supervisory services, vehicle and other equipment leasing, port construction, property development, entrusted construction, port engineering maintenance and communication services, reclaimed water supply, goods and resource supply and other relevant or similar services, while the Group shall provide HPG and/or its subsidiaries with the following services: general port services, port electricity management services, transportation services, software services, labor services, leasing services, resources supply services and other relevant or similar services. For details of the new general services agreement, please refer to the Company's announcement dated 23 March 2016.

(C) Financial Services Framework Agreement

On 17 November 2014, the Company (on behalf of itself and its subsidiaries) entered into the old financial services framework agreement ("Old Financial Services Framework Agreement") with HPG Finance, pursuant to which HPG Finance agreed to provide the financial services to the Group. Such agreement shall take effect till 31 December 2016. On 23 March 2016, the Company and HPG Finance entered into a new financial services framework agreement, which extended the term of the Old Financial Services Framework Agreement to 31 December 2018, and replaced the Old Financial Services Framework Agreement to 31 December 2018. The new financial services framework agreement as a framework agreement containing the scope of financial services provided by HPG Finance, transaction principle, annual caps and pricing terms and policies.

Pursuant to the new financial services framework agreement, the financial services to be provided by HPG Finance to the Group include: (i) Deposit Taking Services, (ii) Loan Services, and (iii) Other Financial Services. For details of the new financial services framework agreement, please refer to the relevant announcement on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company.

The independent non-executive Directors of the Company had reviewed the above continuing connected transactions and confirmed that the transactions have been entered into:

- (1) in the ordinary and usual course of business of the Company;
- (2) either on normal commercial terms or, if there are no sufficient comparable transactions to judge whether they are on normal commercial terms or not, on terms no less favorable than those available to or from independent third parties; and
- (3) in accordance with the relevant agreements governing the transactions and on terms that are fair and reasonable and in interests of the Company and the Shareholders as a whole.

- (2) have been, in all material respects, entered into on the terms of the respective agreements relating to the transactions; and
- (3) do not exceed the annual caps as disclosed in relevant announcements.

The related party transactions (which also constituted connected transactions/continuing connected transactions under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules) set out in Note X to the financial statements are in compliance with the disclosure requirement under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules.

MATERIAL LITIGATION AND ARBITRATION

Background of the Lawsuit with Shanxi Province

Reference is made to the chapter in relation to the litigation in the Prospectus. On 22 January 1986, the Qinhuangdao Port Management Bureau of Minister of Transportation (the predecessor entity of HPG) and the Planning Committee of Shanxi Province (the "**Parties**") entered into an agreement (the "**Investment Agreement**") pursuant to which Shanxi Province would invest RMB70 million to RMB80 million in the construction of three berths at the Wu Ji (戊己) terminals in Qinhuangdao Port, including any ancillary projects. In return, Shanxi Province would be granted favorable terms in coal or general cargo handling services during the investment period and after the construction of the three berths. In addition, Shanxi Province would have ownership rights in the three berths in proportion to its investments, and the three berths would be jointly operated by the Parties. After the execution of the Investment Agreement, the Planning Committee and Economic Committee of Shanxi Province established the Port Construction Command office of Shanxi Province in Qinhuangdao ("**Shanxi Port Construction Command**"), which was responsible for managing Shanxi Province's investments in the Wu Ji terminals. From 1986 through 1988, Shanxi Province paid an aggregate amount of RMB40 million for construction of the Wu Ji terminals. However, the construction work did not commence on time, and the Parties agreed to utilize the invested RMB40 million for the construction of other terminals of the Qinhuangdao Port.

Due to changes in national policies, the improvement of transportation capabilities was not included in the National Railway and Port Transportation Plan. Meanwhile, the approval for the construction of Wu Ji terminals was not obtained until August 1997. During this period, the national exemption policies on investment in underwater infrastructure changed, which caused a significant increase in the required investment amount by Shanxi Province. This change in policy broke the foundation of the Parties' cooperation, and Shanxi Province ceased to invest in Qinhuangdao Port. The Parties held a number of negotiations to settle the amount of RMB40 million already invested by Shanxi Province, but no agreement has been reached.

In April 2011, Shanxi Port Construction Command initiated a civil lawsuit (the "Lawsuit with Shanxi Province") in the Hebei Province High Court against HPG and the Company, as co-defendants, claiming that the Investment Agreement had terminated and that HPG and the Company should return to them a total loss of approximately RMB144.9 million, which includes the investment principal, accrued interests and management fees.

HPG has committed on 16 April 2012 that they will reimburse to the Group all damages, if and to the extent incurred by the Group, in connection with Lawsuit with Shanxi Province.

On 5 July 2016, Shanxi Port Construction Command, HPG and the Company entered into a settlement agreement (the "Settlement Agreement"), pursuant to which the parties agreed to conditionally terminate the Investment Agreement. The Company does not incur any compensation liability under the Settlement Agreement.

On 21 July 2016, the Hebei Province High Court issued a civil mediation certificate confirming the Settlement Agreement.

On 23 September 2016, State-owned Assets Supervision & Administration Commission of the People's Government of Hebei Province issued the Reply on Matters Related to the Transfer of Certain Shares in Qinhuangdao Port Co., Ltd. by HPG (《關於河北港口集團轉讓所 持部分秦皇島港股份有限公司股份有關問題的批覆》) (Ji Guo Zi Fa Chan Quan Guan Li [2016] No. 96) to approved such equity transfer.

On 16 November 2016, HPG and Qinhuangdao Port Management Office of the People's Government of Shanxi Province ("Shanxi Port Office") (the transferee designated by Shanxi Port Construction Command) entered into the Equity Transfer Agreement, pursuant to which HPG agreed to transfer 30,950,000 Shares of the Company (representing 0.62% of the total share capital of the Company) to Shanxi Port Office.

On 14 December 2016, China Securities Depository & Clearing Corporation Limited ("China Securities Depository") issued the Share Registration and Transfer Confirmation Letter (《過戶登記確認書》) and the Register Management of Holders (《持有人名册 管理》), Shanxi Port Office has registered to the China Securities Depository as a corporate shareholder holding 30,950,000 Shares of the Company.

So far as the Directors are aware and save as disclosed in the Prospectus, the Company was not engaged in any material litigation, arbitration or claim, and no litigation or claim of material importance was pending or threatened against the Company during the Year.

AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Company has established the Audit Committee with written terms of reference in accordance with the provisions of Corporate Governance Code.

Details of the meetings of the Audit Committee are set out in the section headed "Corporate Governance Report" in this report.

AUDITORS

The Company has appointed Ernst & Young Hua Ming LLP as the auditors of the Company to audit the financial statements for the Year.

SUMMARY OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND GOVERNANCE REPORT FOR 2016

The Company will issue a separate environmental, social and governance report for 2016 (the summary of which is set out in this section) in accordance with the requirements of Appendix 27 of the Listing Rules,

The Company regards the environment, society and governance as an indispensable part of its gene, and endeavors to create economic interests as well as environmental and social benefits. The Company values the communication with relevant stakeholders. Through conference, media analysis, peer comparison and other methods, the Company identifies its important stakeholders, which include government and regulatory authorities, shareholders, customers and partners, environment, industry, employees, community and media, and has established various communication channels with the stakeholders to hear their voices, strengthen the strategic cooperation with major customers, respond to the wishes and demands from the stakeholders in a sincere manner and actively assume a variety of social responsibilities.

The Company strives to establish a regional port network with features of reasonable location distribution between ports, comprehensive functions and coordinated development, so as to strengthen the ports' service ability and driving force on regional economy, interaction between ports and cities and industry upgrade.

The Company attaches great importance to environmental protection and implements the strategy of clean production and green growth throughout the corporate development process by establishing comprehensive rules and systems for environmental protection and facilities and systems for pollution prevention and control in order to minimize the adverse impact on the environment during the production and provision of services. Meanwhile, the Company continuously promotes energy saving, emission reduction and development of green transportation, and strives to become a low energy consumption and environment-friendly enterprise. In 2016, the Company was recognized as one of the first "China Green Port (Four Stars)" and "Asia Pacific Green Port", and became one of the first PRC coal terminals admitted in the "Green Port Award System for Asia Pacific Ports" in Asia.

By upholding the philosophy of "people-oriented and caring for employees", the Company practically safeguards the legitimate rights and interests of the employees, provides competitive remuneration and favourable benefits, establishes a comprehensive talent cultivation mechanism, continuously expand the career path of employees, actively organizes corporate culture construction and carries out a variety of leisure activities of employees to enable all employees to share the development results of the Company. The Company proactively integrates the performance of social responsibilities with corporate development by eagerly participating in social welfare activities, actively contributing to poverty alleviation and voluntary services and striving to improve the public's well-being, so as to facilitate the harmonious and mutual development of the Company and the society.

REPORT OF SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE

The Supervisory Committee of the Company (the "Supervisory Committee") has fully discharged its duty of supervision on the Directors and senior management of the Company in a faithful and diligent manner according to the Company Law, the Articles of Association of the Company, the Rules of Procedures of Meetings of the Supervisory Committee of Qinhuangdao Port Co., Ltd. ("Rules of Procedures of the Supervisory Committee") and other applicable laws and regulations, playing a positive role for the regulation and compliance operation of the Company.

EVALUATION ON THE BEHAVIOUR AND PERFORMANCE OF THE BOARD AND SENIOR MANAGEMENT IN 2016

The Supervisory Committee is of the view that the Board and senior management were able to comply with the requirements of the Company Law, Articles of Association of the Company and other applicable laws and regulations and were able to carry out operation in accordance with laws. - 2. On 26 August 2016, the second meeting of the Supervisory Committee was held in which the 2015 Supervision and Inspection Report of the Supervisory Committee of Qinhuangdao Port Co., Ltd. (《秦皇島港股份有限公司監事會2015年度監督檢查報告》) was considered and approved.

The Supervisory Committee also kept track of the business operation, financial position and performance of the Company through a variety of means in a timely manner to conduct effective supervision on the internal control, financial and major decision-making process of the Company and the performance of duties by the Board and senior management of the Company. Different estimates and assumptions applied shall have very significant impact on the recoverable amount of the fixed assets. In 2016, Qinhuangdao Port Co., Ltd. and its subsidiaries (hereinafter referred to as Qinhuangdao Port Group) realized operating income of RMB4,911 million in total, of which income from harbor operations such as loading and unloading of goods and depot accounted for approximately 99% to the revenue of the Group. As to the provision of loading and unloading of goods and depot as harbor operations, Qinhuangdao Port Group applies contracting fee mechanism in collecting revenue from its customers. As disclosed in the accounting policies under note 3.22 to the financial statements, Qinhuangdao Port Group recognizes labour income in accordance to completion percentage method, where the results of labour transactions can be reliability estimated. As to the determination of completion percentage on the year end date, it requires the judgement and estimate of the Management.	Our audit procedures are mainly to inspect whether the disclosures for the policies regarding recognition of revenue are adequate, and to understand whether the estimates and judgement made by the Management on the total costs are reasonable, and re-calculate according the completion percentage method. We have tested the control over the revenue process, and performed substantial testing procedures, including selection of sample customer contracts and review the key terms, so as to assess whether the accounting treatment is appropriate or not. At the same time, we check the disclosures related to note 3.22 and note 5.34 related to revenue.

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I. GENERAL INFORMATION

Qinhuangdao Port Co., Ltd. (the "Company") is a joint stock company with limited liability incorporated in Hebei province, the People's Republic of China on 31 March 2008. The H shares of the Company were listed on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited ("Hong Kong Stock Exchange") on 12 December 2013. The office address and headquarter of the Company is located at 35 Haibin Road, Qinhuangdao, Hebei Province.

The main operating activities of the Company and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as the "Group") are: provision of terminal facilities for vessels and provision of port services such as loading and discharging, stacking, warehousing, transportation, container stacking and less than container load services; other port related services such as tugboat service, lease and repair of harbour facilities, equipment and machinery, cargo weighing, freight forwarding, port tallying and provision of power and electrical engineering services; and import and export services of goods. The Group's port services mainly handle coal and metal ores as well as other types of cargo including oil and liquefied chemicals and general cargo and containers.

The parent and ultimate parent of the Group is Hebei Port Group Co., Ltd. ("HPG"), which was established in the People's Republic of China.

These financial statements have been approved by the board of directors of the Company by resolutions on 15 March 2017. Pursuant to the Articles of Association of the Company, these financial statements will be proposed to the general meeting for consideration and approval.

The consolidation scope of these consolidated financial statements is determined on the basis of control, the changes in which during the year please refer to Note VI. Changes in Consolidation Scope.

II. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting Standards for Business Enterprises-Basic Standard and specific accounting standards, implementation guidance, interpretations and other relevant provisions issued and amended subsequently by the Ministry of Finance (collectively referred to as "Accounting Standards for Business Enterprises").

As of 31 December 2016, the Group's net current liabilities amounted to approximately RMB1.987 billion, of which current assets amounted to approximately RMB2.569 billion and current liabilities amounted approximately RMB4.556 billion. In preparing the financial statements, the management have considered the Group's sources of liquidity, and believe that adequate funding is available to fulfil the Group's debt obligations and capital expenditure requirements. Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared on a basis that the Group will be able to continue as a going concern.

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. If the assets are impaired, corresponding provisions for impairment shall be made according to relevant rules.

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III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

The Group adopts specific accounting policies and accounting estimates according to the actual production and management features, which include provision for bad debt of receivables, accounting method for inventories, provision for fixed assets depreciation and intangible assets amortization.

1. Statement of Compliance with Accounting Standards for Business Enterprises

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Accounting Standards for Business Enterprises and present fairly and fully the financial position of the Company and the Group as at 31 December 2016 and their financial performance and cash flows for 2016.

2. Accounting Period

The accounting year for the Group is from 1 January to 31 December of each calendar year.

3. Functional Currency

The Group's reporting and presentation currency is Renminbi ("RMB"). Unless otherwise stated, the unit of the currency is RMB yuan.

The reporting currencies of the subsidiaries of the Group operating overseas are subject to their respective principal economic environment, and will be denominated in RMB for the preparation of the financial statements.

4. Business Combinations

A business combination is a transaction or event that brings together two or more separate entities into one reporting entity. Business combinations are classified into business combinations under common control and business combinations not under common control.

Business combinations under common control

A business combination under common control is a business combination in which all of the combining entities are ultimately controlled by the same party or parties both before and after the combination, and that control is not transitory. For a business combination under common control, the party that, on the combination date, obtains control of another entity participating in the combination is the merging party, while that other entity participating in the combination date is the date on which the merging party effectively obtains control of the merged party.

Assets and liabilities (including goodwill arising from the acquisition of the merged party by the ultimate controller) that are obtained by the merged party in a business combination under common control shall be accounted for based on their carrying amounts in the financial statements of the ultimate controller at the combination date. The difference between the carrying amount of the net assets obtained and the carrying amount of the consideration paid for the combination (or the aggregate face value of shares issued as consideration) shall be adjusted to share premium under capital reserve. If the capital reserve is not sufficient to absorb the difference, any excess shall be adjusted against retained earnings.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

4. Business Combinations (continued)

Business combinations not under common control

A business combination not under common control is a business combination in which all of the combining entities are not ultimately controlled by the same party or parties both before and after the combination. For a business combination not under common control, the party that, on the acquisition date, obtains control of another entity participating in the combination is the acquirer, while that other entity participating in the combination is the acquiree. Acquisition date is the date on which the acquirer effectively obtains control of the acquiree.

The acquirer shall measure the acquiree's identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities acquired in the business combination at their fair values on the acquisition date.

Where the aggregate of the fair value of the consideration paid (or the fair value of the equity securities issued) and fair value of equity interest in the acquiree held before the acquisition date exceeds the acquirer's interest in the fair value of the acquiree's identifiable net assets, the difference shall be recognised as goodwill. Goodwill is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Where the aggregate of the fair value of the consideration paid (or the fair value of the equity securities issued) and fair value of equity interest in the acquiree held before the acquisition date is less than the acquirer's interest in the fair value of the acquiree's identifiable net assets, reassessment of the measurement of these items is conducted first, if the sum of the fair value of this consideration and other items mentioned above is still lower than the fair value of the net assets acquired, the difference is recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

5. Consolidated Financial Statements

The consolidation scope of consolidated financial statements is determined on the basis of control, including the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2016 of the Company and all of its subsidiaries. A subsidiary is an entity (including an enterprise, a separable part of an investee, a structural body controlled by the Company, etc.) that is controlled by the Company.

In preparation of consolidated financial statements, the subsidiaries use the same accounting year and accounting policies as those of the Company. All assets, liabilities, interests, income, fees and cash flows resulting from intra-group transactions are eliminated on consolidation in full.

Where the amount of losses for the current period attributed to the minority shareholders of a subsidiary exceeds the minority shareholders' portion of the opening balance of shareholders' equity of the subsidiary, the excess amount is allocated against minority interests.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

5. Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

For subsidiaries acquired through a business combination not under common control, the operating results and cash flows of the acquiree are included in the consolidated financial statements from the date on which the Group obtains control and continue to be consolidated until the date that such control ceases. In preparing consolidated financial statements, adjustments shall be made to the subsidiaries' financial statements based on the fair values of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities at the acquisition date.

For subsidiaries acquired through a business combination under common control, the operating results and cash flows of the acquiree are included in the consolidated financial statements from the beginning of the combination year. In preparing consolidated financial statements, adjustments shall be made to related items of prior year's financial statements, as if the reporting entities after the combination had existed from the date when the combining entities first came under control of the ultimate controlling party.

Where change in relevant facts and conditions lead to the change in one or more control elements, the Group will re-evaluate its control over the investee.

Change in non-controlling interests that does not result in the loss of control over the subsidiary is accounted for as an equity transaction.

6. Classifications of Joint Arrangement and Joint Operations

Joint arrangement is classified as joint operations and joint ventures. Joint operation refers the joint arrangement which the joint venture parties entitled to the underlying assets of the relevant arrangement and assumed liabilities of the joint arrangements. Joint venture refers the joint arrangement which the joint venture party only entitled to the right of the net assets of the arrangements.

The joint venture parties recognise in relation to its interest in a joint operation: its assets, including its share of any assets held jointly; its liabilities, including its share of any liabilities incurred jointly; its revenue from the sale of its share of the output arising from the joint operation; its share of the revenue from the sale of the output by the joint operation; its expenses, including its share of any expenses incurred jointly.

7. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash comprises the Group's cash on hand and deposits that can be readily withdrawn on demand for payment purposes. Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments held by the Group, that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

8. Foreign Currency Transactions and Translation of the Financial Statements Prepared in Foreign Currencies

The Group translates the amounts of foreign currency transactions occurred into its functional currency

Foreign currency transactions are recorded on initial recognition, in their functional currencies, by applying to the foreign currency amounts at the spot exchange rates at the transaction dates. At the balance sheet date, foreign currency monetary items are translated using the spot exchange rates at the balance sheet date. All the resulting exchange differences are taken to profit or loss for the current period, except for those relating to foreign currency borrowings specifically for acquisition and construction of qualifying assets, which are capitalised in accordance with the principle of capitalisation of borrowing costs. Non-monetary foreign currency items measured at historical cost shall still be translated at the spot exchange rates prevailing on the transaction dates, while the amounts denominated in the functional currencies do not change. Non-monetary foreign currency items measured at fair value are translated at the spot exchange rates prevailing at the date on which the fair values are determined. The exchange differences thus resulted are recognised in profit or loss or as other comprehensive income for the current period, depending on the nature of the non-monetary item.

For foreign operations, the Group translates all amounts of functional currencies into RMB for the preparation of the financial statements. For assets and liabilities in the balance sheet, spot exchange rates at the balance sheet date are used for translation, while, for shareholder's equity, spot exchange rates prevailing on the transaction dates are adopted for items other than "undistributed profit". For items of income and expenses in the income statement, average exchange rates for the period during which the transactions occur are adopted. Translation differences of functional currencies resulting from the translations mentioned above are recognised as other comprehensive income. For the disposal of foreign operations, other comprehensive incomes relating to foreign operations transfer to profit or loss for the current period for disposal, subject to the ratio of disposal.

Foreign currency cash flows and cash flows of overseas subsidiaries are translated using the average exchange rate for the period during which the cash flows occur. The effect of exchange rate changes on cash is separately presented as an adjustment item in the statement of cash flows.

9. Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Recognition and derecognition of financial instruments

The Group recognises a financial asset or a financial liability when it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of a financial instrument.

The Group derecognises and writes off a financial asset (or part of a financial asset, or part of a group of similar financial assets) from its account and balance sheet when the following conditions are met:

- (1) the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired;
- (2) the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset, or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a "pass-through" arrangement; and either (a) the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Group has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

9. Financial Instruments (continued)

Recognition and derecognition of financial instruments (continued)

If the underlying obligation of a financial liability has been discharged or cancelled or has expired, the financial liability is derecognised. If an existing financial liability is replaced by the same creditor with a new financial liability that has substantially different terms, or if the terms of an existing financial liability are substantially revised, such replacement or revision is accounted for as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability, and the resulting difference is recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on the trade date. Regular way purchases or sales of financial assets mean that the financial assets are received or delivered under the terms of a contract within a period as specified by regulations or conventions in the marketplace. Trade date is the date that the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Classification and measurement of financial assets

Financial assets are, on initial recognition, classified into the following categories: financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, held-to-maturity investments, loans and receivables, available-for-sale financial assets and derivatives designated as effective hedging instruments. A financial asset is recognised initially at fair value. In the case of financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, relevant transaction costs are directly charged to profit or loss for the current period; transaction costs relating to financial assets of other categories are included in the amount initially recognised.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss include financial assets held for trading and those designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit or loss for the current period. A financial asset held for trading is the financial asset that meets one of the following conditions: the financial asset is acquired for the purpose of selling in a short term; the financial asset is a part of a portfolio of identifiable financial instruments that are collectively managed, and there is objective evidence indicating that the enterprise recently manages this portfolio for the purpose of short-term profits; the financial asset is a derivative, except for a derivative that is designated as an effective hedging instrument, or a financial guarantee contract, or a derivative that is linked to and must be settled by delivery of an unquoted equity instrument (without a quoted price from an active market) whose fair value cannot be reliably measured. For such kind of financial assets, fair values are adopted for subsequent measurement. All the realised or unrealised gains or losses on these financial assets are recognised in profit or loss is credited to profit or loss for the current period.

Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity date that an entity has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity. Such kind of financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains or losses arising from amortisation or impairment and derecognition are recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such kind of financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains or losses arising from amortization or impairment are recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are those non-derivative financial assets that are designated as available for sale or are not classified as any of the above categories at initial recognition. After initial recognition, available-for-sale financial assets are measured at fair value. The discount or premium is amortised using the effective interest method and recognised as interest income or expense. A gain or loss arising from a change in the fair value of an available-forsale financial asset is recognised as other comprehensive income, except that impairment losses and foreign exchange gains or losses resulted from monetary financial assets are recognised as profit or loss for the current period, until the financial asset is derecognised or determined to be impaired, at which time the accumulated gain or loss previously recognised is transferred to profit or loss for the current period. Dividends or interest income relating to an availablefor-sale financial asset are recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Investments in equity instruments without a quoted price from an active market and whose fair value cannot be reliably measured, are carried at cost.

Classification and measurement of financial liabilities

The Group's financial liabilities are, on initial recognition, classified into the following categories: financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, other financial liabilities and derivatives designated as effective hedging instruments. For financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, relevant transaction costs are directly recognised in profit or loss for the current period, and transaction costs relating to other financial liabilities are included in the amount initially recognised.

The subsequent measurement of financial liabilities depends on its category as follows:

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading and those designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit or loss. A financial liability held for trading is the financial liability that meets one of the following conditions: the financial liability is assumed for the purpose of repurchasing it in a short term; the financial liability is a part of a portfolio of identifiable financial instruments that are collectively managed, and there is objective evidence indicating that the enterprise recently manages this portfolio for the purpose of short-term profits; the financial liability is a derivative, except for a derivative that is designated as an effective hedging instrument, or a financial guarantee contract, or a derivative that is linked to and must be settled by delivery of an unquoted equity instrument (without a quoted price from an active market) whose fair value cannot be reliably measured. For such kind of financial liabilities, fair values are adopted for subsequent measurement. All realised or unrealised gains or losses on these financial liabilities are recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Other financial liabilities

After initial recognition, such kind of financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost by using the effective interest method.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is presented in the balance sheet when both of the following conditions are satisfied: the Group has a legal right to set off the recognised amounts and the legal right is currently enforceable; the Group intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the financial assets and settle the financial liabilities simultaneously.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group assesses the carrying amount of every financial asset at the balance sheet date. If there is objective evidence indicating a financial asset may be impaired, a provision is provided for the impairment. Objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired is one or more events that occur after the initial recognition of the financial asset and have an impact (which can be reliably estimated) on the expected future cash flows of the financial asset. Objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired includes: significant financial difficulty of the issuer or obligor; a breach of contract by the obligor, such as a default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; a higher probability that the obligor will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; and observable data indicating that there is a measurable decrease in the estimated future cash flows.

Financial assets carried at amortised cost

If impairment on a financial asset has incurred, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced through an allowance amount to the present value of expected future cash flows (excluding future credit losses that have not been incurred). Impairment is recognised in profit or loss for the current period. The present value of expected future cash flows is discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate (i.e., effective interest rate computed on initial recognition) and includes the value of any related collateral. Subsequent to the Group's recognition of impairment loss on a financial asset carried at amortised cost, the interest income is measured by applying the discounting rate in the future cash flows estimation when measuring the impairment loss.

For a financial asset that is individually significant, the asset is individually assessed for impairment, and the amount of impairment is recognised in profit or loss for the current period if there is objective evidence of impairment. For a financial asset that is not individually significant, it is individually assessed for impairment. If no objective evidence of impairment incurs for an individually assessed financial asset (whether the financial asset is individually significant or not individually significant), it is included in a group of financial assets with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assessed for impairment. Assets for which an impairment loss is individually recognised is not included in a group of financial assets with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assessed for impairment.

If, subsequent to the Group's recognition of an impairment loss on a financial asset carried at amortised cost, there is objective evidence of a recovery in value of the financial asset and the recovery can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed and recognised in profit or loss for the current period. However, the reversal shall not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the amortised cost would have been at the date of reversal had the impairment loss not been provided for.

Available-for-sale financial assets

If there is objective evidence that an available-for-sale financial asset is impaired, the accumulated losses arising from decline in fair value previously recognised in other comprehensive income are removed and recognised in profit or loss for the current period. The accumulated losses that removed from other comprehensive income are the difference between the initial acquisition cost (net of any principal repayment and amortisation) and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on the financial asset previously recognised in profit or loss.

If, after an impairment loss has been recognised on an available-for-sale debt instrument, the fair value of the debt instrument increases in a subsequent period and the increase can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised, the impairment loss is reversed with the amount of the reversal recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Financial assets carried at cost

If there is objective evidence that such an asset is impaired, the difference between its carrying amount and the present value of expected future cash flows which are discounted at the current market interest rate is recognised as an impairment loss in profit or loss for the current period. Once an impairment loss is recognised, it is not reversed.

Transfers of financial assets

If the Group transfers substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the Group derecognises the financial asset; if the Group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the Group does not derecognise the financial asset.

If the Group neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, it accounts for the transactions as follows: if the Group has not retained control, it derecognises the financial asset and recognises any resulting assets or liabilities; if the Group has retained control, it continues to recognise the financial asset to the extent of its continuing involvement in the transferred financial asset and recognises an associated liability

When the entity's continuing involvement takes the form of guaranteeing the transferred asset, the extent of the entity's continuing involvement is the lower of the carrying amount of the asset and finance guarantee amount. The finance guarantee amount refers to the maximum amount of the consideration received that the entity could be required to repay

10. Receivables

Receivables that are individually significant and are provided for bad debts on individual basis

As at the balance sheet date, accounts receivable and other receivables greater than RMB10 million are considered as individually significant and are subject to separate impairment assessment. If there is objective evidence that an impairment loss has been incurred, an impairment loss is recognised and a bad debt provision is made based on the shortfall of the present value of estimated future cash flows as compared to the carrying amount of the receivables

Receivables for which provision of bad debts made by portfolio of credit risk characteristics

The Group determines the receivables group based on the aging as the credit risk characteristics. The provisions for bad debts of accounts receivable and other receivables are recorded based on the aging analysis and the accrual percentages are stated as follows:

Receivables that are individually insignificant but are provided for bad debts on individual basis

As at the balance sheet date, accounts receivable and other receivables falling below RMB10 million but with objective evidence that an impairment loss may have been incurred, are individually assessed for impairment loss. The impairment loss is recognised and bad debt provision is made based on the difference between the present value of future cash flows and the carrying amount of the receivables.

11. Inventories

Inventories include raw materials, fuels, spare parts, low-cost consumables, finished goods.

Inventories are initially carried at the actual cost. Cost of inventories comprises all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs. The actual cost of inventories transferred out is determined by using the weighted average method. Low-cost consumables and spare parts are amortised by using one-off amortisation method.

The Group adopts perpetual inventory system.

At the balance sheet date, inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. If the cost of inventories is higher than the net realisable value, a provision for decline in value of inventories is recognised in profit or loss for the current period. If factors that previously resulted in the provision for decline in value of inventories no longer exist and result in the net realisable value higher than their carrying amount, the amount of the write-down is reversed to the extent of the amount of the provision for the inventories and is recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business deducted by the estimated costs to completion, the estimated selling expenses and the related taxes. Provision is considered on a category basis for inventories in large quantity and with relatively low unit prices and on an individual basis for all other inventories.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

12. Long-term Equity Investments

Long-term equity investments include equity investments in subsidiaries, joint ventures and associates.

Long-term equity investments were initially recorded at initial investment cost on acquisition. For long-term equity investments acquired through the business combination of entities under common control, the initial investment cost shall be the share of carrying value of the owners' equity of the merged party at the date of combination as stated in the consolidated financial statements of the ultimate controlling party. Any difference between the initial investment cost and the carrying value of the consideration for the combination shall be dealt with by adjusting the capital reserve (if the capital reserve is insufficient for setting off the difference, such difference shall be further set off against retained profits). Upon disposal of the investment, other comprehensive income prior to the date of combination shall be dealt with on the same basis as if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of directly by the investee. Shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity other than the net profits or losses, other comprehensive income and profit allocation of the investee shall be transferred to current profit and loss upon disposal of the investment. Items which remain long-term equity investments after the disposal shall be accounted for on a pro-rata basis, while items reclassified as financial instruments following the disposal shall be accounted for in full. For long-term equity investments acquired through the business combination of entities not under common control, the initial investment cost shall be the cost of combination (for business combinations of entities not under common control achieved in stages through multiple transactions, the initial investment cost shall be the sum of the carrying value of the equity investment in the acquired party held prior to the date of acquisition and new investment cost incurred as at the date of acquisition). The cost of combination shall be the sum of assets contributed by the acquiring party, liabilities incurred or assumed by the acquiring party and the fair value of equity securities issued. Upon disposal of the investment, other comprehensive income recognised under the equity method held prior to the date of acquisition shall be dealt with on the same basis as if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of directly by the investee. Shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity other than the net profits or losses, other comprehensive income and profit allocation of the investee shall be transferred to current profit and loss upon disposal of the investment. Items which remain long-term equity investments after the disposal shall be accounted for on a pro-rata basis, while items reclassified as financial instruments following the disposal shall be accounted for in full. The accumulated fair value change of equity investments held prior to the date of acquisition and included in the other comprehensive income as financial instruments shall be transferred in full to current profit and loss upon the change to cost accounting. The initial investment cost of long-term equity investments other than those acquired through business combination shall be recognized in accordance with the following: for those acquired by way of cash payments, the initial investment cost shall be the consideration actually paid plus expenses, tax amounts and other necessary outgoings directly related to the acquisition of the long-term equity investments; for those acquired by way of issuance of equity securities, the initial investment cost shall be the fair value of the equity securities issued; for those acquired by the swap of non-monetary assets, initial investment cost is determined based on Accounting Standard for Business Enterprises No. 7 - Swap of Non-monetary Assets.

12. Long-term Equity Investments (continued)

For a long-term equity investment where the Company can exercise control over the investee, the Company uses the cost accounting method in the Company's financial statements. Control refers to having the power over the investee, the entitlement to variable returns through the participation in the relevant activities of the investee, and the ability to affect the amount of returns by using its power over the investee.

Under the cost method, the long-term equity investment is measured at its initial investment cost. For addition or reduction of investments, the cost of long-term equity investments is adjusted. Cash dividends or profits declared to be distributed by the investee should be recognised as investment income in the current period.

The equity method is adopted in accounting for long-term equity investments when the Group holds joint control, or exercises significant influence on the investee. Joint control is the relevant agreed sharing of control over an arrangement, and relevant activities of such arrangement shall be decided upon the unanimous consent of the parties sharing control. Significant influence is the power to participate in decision making in the financial and operating policies of the investee but is not the power to control or joint control with other parties over those policies.

Under the equity method, where the initial investment cost of a long-term equity investment exceeds the investing enterprise's interest in the fair values of the investee's identifiable net assets at the acquisition date, such excess is included in the initial investment cost of the long-term equity investment. Where the initial investment cost is less than the investing enterprise's interest in the fair values of the investee's identifiable net assets at the acquisition date, the difference is charged to profit or loss for the current period, and the cost of the long-term equity investment is adjusted accordingly.

Under the equity method, the Group recognises, upon acquisition of the long-term equity investment, its share of the net profits or losses and other comprehensive income made by the investee as investment income or losses and other comprehensive income, and adjusts the carrying amount of the investment accordingly. The Group recognises its share of the investee's net profits or losses, except that the assets invested or disposed of constitute a business, after making appropriate adjustments to the investee's net profits based on the fair value of the investee's identifiable assets at the acquisition date, using the Group's accounting policies and periods, and eliminating the portion of the profits or losses arising from internal transactions with its associates and joint ventures, attributable to the investor according to its share ratio (but impairment losses for assets arising from internal transactions shall be recognised in full). The carrying amount of the long-term equity investment is reduced based on the Group's share of any profit distributions or cash dividends declared by the investee. The Group shall discontinue recognizing its share of the losses of the investee after the carrying amount of the long-term equity investment together with any long-term interests that in substance forms part of the Group's net investment in the investee are reduced to zero, except to the extent that the Group has incurred obligations to assume additional losses. The Group also adjusts the carrying amount of long-term equity investments for other changes in shareholders' equity of the investees (other than the net profits or losses, other comprehensive income and profit allocation of the investee), and includes the corresponding adjustment in equity.

12. Long-term Equity Investments (continued)

On disposal of the long-term equity investments, the difference between book value and actual proceeds received is recognized in profit or loss for the current period. For long-term equity investments under equity method, when the use of the equity method is discontinued, other comprehensive income previously accounted for under the equity method shall be dealt with on the same basis as if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of directly by the investee. Shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity other than the net profit and loss. If the equity method remains in use, other comprehensive income previously accounted for under the equity method shall be dealt with on the same basis as if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of directly by the investee and transferred to current profit and loss on a pro-rata basis. Shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity accounted for under the equity method shall be dealt with on the same basis as if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of directly by the investee and transferred to current profit and loss on a pro-rata basis. Shareholders' equity recognised as a result of changes in shareholders' equity other than the net profits or losses, other comprehensive income and profit allocation of the investee shall be transferred to current profit and loss on a pro-rata basis.

13. Investment Properties

An investment property is a property held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation or both. Investment properties include land use rights leased out, land use rights held for transfer upon capital appreciation, and buildings leased out.

An investment property is measured initially at its cost. If the economic benefits relating to an investment property will probably flow in and the cost can be reliably measured, subsequent costs incurred for the property is included in the cost of the investment property. Otherwise, subsequent costs are recognised in profit or loss for the period in which they are incurred.

The Group uses the cost model for subsequent measurement of its investment properties. The accounting policy for depreciation or amortisation of investment properties is the same as that for buildings and land use rights.

14. Fixed Assets

A fixed asset is recognised only when the economic benefits associated with the asset will probably flow to the Group and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Subsequent expenditures incurred for a fixed asset that meets the recognition criteria shall be included in its cost, and the carrying amount of the component of the fixed asset that is replaced shall be derecognised. Otherwise, such expenditures shall be recognised in profit or loss for the period during which they are incurred.

Fixed assets are initially measured at cost and the effect of any expected costs of abandoning the assets is considered. The cost of a purchased fixed asset comprises the purchase price, relevant taxes and any other directly attributable expenditure for bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use.

Depreciation of fixed assets is calculated using the straight-line method. The useful lives, estimated net residual value ratio and annual depreciation rate of fixed assets are as follows:

Where individual component parts of an item of fixed assets have different useful lives or provide benefits to the enterprise in different patterns, different depreciation rates are applied.

The Group reviews the useful life and estimated net residual value of a fixed asset and the depreciation method applied at least at each financial year-end, and makes adjustments if necessary.

15. Construction in Progress

Construction in progress is recognised based on the actual construction expenditures incurred. It consists of all types of expenditures necessarily to be incurred, capitalised borrowing costs on related borrowed funds before the asset is ready for its intended use, and other related expenditures during the period of construction.

Construction in progress is transferred to fixed assets or intangible assets when the asset is ready for its intended use.

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III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

16. Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs are interest and other costs incurred by the Group in connection with the borrowings. Borrowing costs include interest, amortisation of discounts or premiums related to borrowings, ancillary costs, and exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings.

The borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of a qualifying asset are capitalised. Other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss for the current period. Assets qualifying for capitalisation refer to fixed assets necessarily taking a substantial period of time for acquisition or construction to get ready for their intended use.

The capitalisation of borrowing costs commences only when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- (1) expenditures for the asset are being incurred;
- (2) borrowing costs are being incurred;
- (3) activities relating to the acquisition or construction of the asset that are necessary to prepare the asset for its intended use have commenced.

Capitalisation of borrowing costs ceases when the qualifying asset being acquired or constructed becomes ready for its intended use. Any borrowing costs subsequently incurred are recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

During the capitalisation period, the amount of interest to be capitalised for each accounting period shall be determined as follows:

- (1) where funds are borrowed for a specific purpose, the amount of interest to be capitalised is the actual interest expense incurred on that borrowing for the period less any temporary interest earned from deposits or investment income.
- (2) where funds are borrowed for a general purpose, the amount of interest to be capitalised is determined by multiplying the weighted average of the excess amounts of accumulated expenditure on asset over the expenditure of specific-purpose borrowings by the weighted average interest rate.

Capitalisation of borrowing costs is suspended when the acquisition or construction of a qualifying asset is interrupted by activities other than those necessary to prepare the asset for its intended use, while the interruption lasts for more than three consecutive months. Borrowing costs incurred during these periods are recognised as expenses in profit or loss for the current period until the acquisition or construction is resumed.

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III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

17. Intangible Assets

An intangible asset shall be recognised only when its related economic benefits will probably flow to the Group and its costs can be measured reliably. Intangible assets are measured initially at cost. However, intangible assets acquired in a business combination not under common control with a fair value that can be measured reliably are recognised separately as intangible assets and measured at fair value.

The useful life of an intangible asset is determined according to the period over which it is estimated to generate economic benefits for the Group. An intangible asset is regarded as having an indefinite useful life when the period over which the asset is estimated to generate economic benefits for the Group is uncertain.

The useful lives of the intangible assets are as follows:

The Group accounts for its land use rights and sea area use rights as intangible assets. For buildings such as plants that are developed and constructed by the Group, the relevant land use rights and buildings are accounted for as intangible assets and fixed assets, respectively. Payments for the land and buildings purchased are allocated between the land use rights and the buildings; if they cannot be reasonably allocated, all of the land use rights and buildings are accounted for as fixed assets.

Intangible assets with finite useful lives are amortised over the useful lives on the straight-line basis. The Group reviews the useful lives and the amortisation method of intangible assets with finite useful lives, and adjusts if appropriate, at least at the end of each year.

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III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

18. Asset Impairment

The impairment of an asset other than inventories, deferred income tax and financial assets is determined as follows:

The Group assesses at the balance sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any indication exists that an asset may be impaired, the Group will estimate the recoverable amount of the asset and perform test for impairment. Goodwill arising from a business combination is tested for impairment at least at the end of each year, irrespective of whether there is any indication that the asset may be impaired. Intangible assets that have not been ready for intended use are tested for impairment each year.

The recoverable amount of an asset is the higher of its fair value less disposal costs and the present value of the future cash flows estimated to be derived from the asset. The Group estimates the recoverable amount on individual basis. If it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the Group determines the recoverable amount of the asset group to which the asset belongs. Identification of an asset group is based on whether major cash inflows generated by the asset group are largely independent from cash inflows of other assets or asset groups.

When the recoverable amount of an asset or an asset group is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to the recoverable amount. The reduction in carrying amount is recognised in profit or loss for the current period and a provision for impairment loss of the asset is recognised accordingly.

For the purpose of impairment testing, the carrying amount of goodwill acquired in a business combination is allocated from the acquisition date on a reasonable basis to each of the related asset groups; if it is impossible to allocate to the related asset groups, it is allocated to each of the related set of asset groups. Each of the related asset groups or set of asset groups is an asset group or a set of asset groups that is able to benefit from the synergies of the business combination and shall not be larger than a reportable segment determined by the Group.

In testing an asset group or a set of asset groups to which goodwill has been allocated for impairment, if there is any indication of impairment, the Group firstly tests the asset group or set of asset groups excluding goodwill for impairment, i.e., it determines the recoverable amount and recognises any impairment loss. After that, the Group tests the asset group or set of asset groups including goodwill for impairment, and the carrying amount of the related asset group or set of asset groups is compared to its recoverable amount. If the recoverable amount of the asset group or set of asset groups is less than its carrying amount, the amount of the impairment loss will be reduced firstly by the carrying amount of the goodwill allocated to the asset group or set of asset groups, and then the carrying amount of other assets (other than the goodwill) within the asset group or set of asset groups, based on the proportion of the carrying amount of each asset.

Once the above asset impairment loss is recognised, it cannot be reversed in the subsequent accounting periods.

19. Long-term Prepaid Expenses

Long-term prepaid expenses are amortised on a straight-line basis over the beneficial period.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

20. Employee Benefits

Employee benefits are all forms of considerations given by the Group in exchange for services rendered by its employees or for the termination of employment. Employee benefits include short-term employee benefits, post-employment benefits, termination benefits and other long-term employee benefits. The benefits provided by the Group to employees' spouse, children, dependents, families of deceased employees and other beneficiaries also belong to employee benefits.

Short-term employee benefits

In the accounting period which services are rendered by the employees, short-term employee benefits are actually recognised as liabilities and charged to profit or loss or related costs of assets for the current period.

Post-employment benefits (defined contribution plans)

Employees of the Group participate in the endowment insurance and unemployment insurance plans managed by local governments as well as enterprise annuity, and the relevant expenditure is recognised, when incurred, in the cost of relevant asset or profit or loss for the current period.

Termination benefits

Where the Group provides termination benefits to its employees, the employee remuneration liabilities arising from termination benefits are recognised in profit or loss for the current period upon the occurrence of the earlier of the following: termination benefits provided as a result of termination of employment plan or downsizing proposal cannot be unilaterally withdrawn by an entity; or reorganisation-related costs or expenses involving payment of termination benefits are recognised by an entity.

Other long-term employee benefits

Other long-term benefits provided to the employees are net debt liabilities or net assets of other long-term employee benefits recognised or measured according to the requirements applicable to post-employment benefits. Changes arising from the measurement will be recognised in profit or loss or cost of relevant assets for the current period.

21. Provisions

Except for contingent consideration and contingent liability assumed in a business combination not under common control, the Group recognises an obligation related to a contingency as a provision when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- (1) the obligation is a present obligation of the Group;
- (2) it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits from the Group will be required to settle the obligation;
- (3) the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

21. Provisions (continued)

A provision is initially measured at the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the related present obligation, with comprehensive consideration of factors such as the risks, uncertainty and time value of money relating to a contingency. The carrying amount of a provision is reviewed at each balance sheet date. If there is clear evidence that the carrying amount does not reflect the current best estimate, the carrying amount is adjusted to the best estimate.

22. Revenues

Revenue shall be recognised only when the associated economic benefits will probably flow to the Group, with its amount being measured reliably, and all of the following conditions are satisfied.

Revenue from the rendering of services

When the outcome of a transaction involving the rendering of services can be estimated reliably at the balance sheet date, revenue associated with the transaction is recognised according to the percentage of completion, or otherwise, the revenue is recognised to the extent of costs incurred that are expected to be recoverable. The outcome of a transaction involving the rendering of services can be estimated reliably when all of the following conditions are satisfied: the amount of revenue can be measured reliably; the associated economic benefits will probably flow to the Group; the stage of completion of the transaction can be measured reliably; and the costs incurred and to be incurred for the transaction can be measured reliably. The stage of completion is determined by the proportion that costs incurred to date bear to the estimated total costs of the transaction. The total service revenue on a transaction involving the rendering of services is determined in accordance with the considerations received or receivable under contract or agreement, except those unfair considerations received or receivable under contract or agreement.

Revenue from the sales of goods

The Group recognises the revenue from the sales of goods when it has transferred the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods to the buyer, and the Group retains neither continuing managerial involvement to the degree usually associated with ownership nor effective control over the goods sold, and the associated costs incurred or to be incurred can be measured reliably. The amount of revenue arising from the sales of goods is determined in accordance with the consideration received or receivable from the buyer under contract or agreement, except those unfair considerations received or receivable under contract or agreement. Where the consideration receivable under contract or agreement is deferred so that the arrangement is in substance of a financing nature, the amount of revenue arising on the sales of goods is measured at the fair value of the consideration receivable.

Lease income

Rental income from operating leases is recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Contingent rental incomes are credited to profit or loss in the current period in which they actually arise.

Interest income

Interest income is determined according to the length of time for which the Group's cash is in use by other parties and the effective interest rate.

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III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

23. Government Grants

Government grants are recognised when all respective conditions will be complied with and the grant will be received. The government grant is measured as the amount received or receivable where it takes the form of a cash asset, or at fair value where it is not a cash asset. Where the fair value cannot be reliably determined, it should be measured at nominal value.

In accordance with the stipulations of the government documents, government grants applied towards acquisition or construction or the formation of long-term assets in other manners are asset-related government grants. Those unspecified in the documents refer to the exercise of judgement based on the basic conditions for receiving the asset-related grant applied towards acquisition or construction or the formation of long-term assets in other manners. All other grants are recognised as income-related government grants.

Government grants, relating to income and applied towards reimbursement of related costs or losses in subsequent periods, are recognised as deferred income and taken to profit or loss for the period in which the related costs are recognised. Government grants, applied towards reimbursement of related costs or losses already incurred, are directly recognised in profit or loss for the current period. Asset-related grant is recognised as a deferred income and credited in profit or loss for the current period and allocated over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal instalment. Where the grant is measured at nominal value, it is directly recognised in profit or loss for the current period.

24. Income Tax

Income tax comprises current and deferred income tax. Income tax is recognised as an expense or income in profit or loss for the current period, or otherwise recognised directly in shareholders' equity if it arises from goodwill on a business combination or relates to a transaction or event which is recognised directly in shareholders' equity.

The Group measures a current tax liability or asset arising from the current and prior periods based on the amount of income tax estimated to be paid or returned and calculated in accordance with the requirements of relevant tax laws.

The Group recognises deferred tax based on temporary differences using balance sheet liability method. Temporary differences are differences between the carrying amount of assets or liabilities in the balance sheet and their tax base on the balance sheet date. Temporary differences also include the differences between the carrying amounts and tax bases of items not recognised as assets or liabilities where the tax base can be calculated according to the relevant tax regulations.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

24. Income Tax (continued)

Deferred income tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except:

- (1) where the taxable temporary differences arise from the initial recognition of goodwill, or the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit or deductible tax loss.
- (2) in respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, joint ventures and associates, where the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not be reversed in the foreseeable future.

A deferred income tax asset is recognised for deductible temporary differences, and unused deductible tax losses and tax credits that can be carried forward, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, deductible tax losses and tax credits can be utilised, except:

- (1) where the deductible temporary difference arises from a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit or deductible tax loss.
- (2) in respect of the deductible temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, joint ventures and associates, a deferred income tax asset is only recognised to the extent that it is probable that the temporary differences will be reversed in the foreseeable future and taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences can be utilised in the future.

At the balance sheet date, deferred income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are estimated to apply to the period when the asset is recovered or the liability is settled, according to the requirements of tax laws. The measurement of deferred income tax assets and deferred income tax liabilities reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the balance sheet date, to recover the assets or settle the liabilities.

The carrying amount of deferred income tax assets is reviewed at the balance sheet date and reduced to the extent that taxable profit is no longer sufficient in future periods to allow the deferred income tax assets to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred income tax assets are reassessed at the balance sheet date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred income tax assets and deferred income tax liabilities are offset and the net amount reported if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred income taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

25. Lease

A finance lease is a lease that transfers in substance all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset. An operating lease is a lease other than a finance lease.

In the case of being the lessee of an operating lease

Rental payments under an operating lease are recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease terms, and either included in the cost of the related asset or charged to profit or loss for the current period. Contingent rental payments are charged to profit or loss in the period in which they actually arise.

In the case of being the lessor of an operating lease

Rent income under an operating lease is recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease terms through profit or loss. Contingent rental incomes are credited to profit or loss in the period in which they actually arise.

26. Profit Distribution

Cash dividend of the Company is recognised as a liability upon being approved in the shareholders' general meeting.

27. Production Safety Expense

Production safety expense appropriated pursuant to the related regulations is recognised in the cost of the relevant products or in profit or loss for the current period, and also in the specialised reserve. The cost shall be handled according to whether a fixed asset is formed. The cost incurred through expenditure will be reduced directly from the specialised reserve. The cost incurred for a fixed asset shall be pooled and recognised as a fixed asset when it reaches the working condition for its intended use; meanwhile an equivalent amount shall be deducted from the specialised reserve and recognised as accumulated depreciation.

28. Significant Accounting Judgments and Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that will affect the reported amounts of revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the balance sheet date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of the assets or liabilities affected in the future.

Uncertainty of estimation

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date, that may cause a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the future accounting periods, are discussed below.

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III. MAJOR ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES (CONTINUED)

28. Significant Accounting Judgments and Estimates (continued)

Uncertainty of estimation (continued)

Useful lives and residual values of fixed assets

The Group's management determines the estimated useful lives and residual values of fixed assets and related depreciation charges. This estimate is based on the historical experience of the actual useful lives and residual values of fixed assets with similar nature and functions. It can change significantly as a result of technical innovations and competitor actions in response to severe industry cycles. Management will increase the depreciation charges where useful lives and residual values are less than previous estimations, or it will write off or write down the fixed assets technically obsolete or abandoned or sold.

Impairment of accounts receivable and other receivables

The impairment of accounts receivable and other receivables is based on the evaluation of the collectability of the outstanding accounts receivable and other receivables. The management's judgment and estimation are required in the recognition of the impairment of accounts receivable and other receivables. Provisions for impairment will be made where there is objective evidence that such receivables are not collectible. If the actual results or future expectation differ from the original estimate, such differences will affect the carrying amount of accounts receivable and other receivables and bad debt provisions/reversal in the period in which the estimate changes.

Allowance for inventories

Allowance for inventories represents the provision for impairment of the slow moving inventories based on their ages. The management's judgments and estimates are required for determining inventory impairment on the basis of clear evidence, purpose of holding the inventories, effect of subsequent events and other factors. The difference between the actual outcome and original estimate will affect the carrying amount of inventories and provision and reversal of decline in value of inventories during the estimated revision period.

Impairment of non-current assets other than financial assets (other than goodwill)

The Group assesses whether there are any indication of impairment for all non-current assets other than financial assets at the balance sheet date. Non-current assets are tested for impairment when there are indicators that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. Impairment exists when the carrying amount of an asset or asset group exceeds its recoverable amount, which is the higher of its fair value less disposal costs and the present value of the future cash flows. The calculation of the fair value less disposal costs is based on available data from binding sales transactions in an arm's length transaction of similar assets or observable market prices less incremental costs for disposing of the asset. When present value of future cash flows calculations are undertaken, the management must estimate the expected future cash flows from the asset or asset group and choose a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows.

Deferred income tax assets

Deferred income tax assets are recognised for all unused tax losses to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses can be utilised. Significant management judgments are required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and level of future taxable profits together with future tax planning strategies.

1. Major Categories of Taxes and Respective Tax Rates

2. Tax Preferences

Enterprise income tax

According to the Implementation Rules of the PRC Enterprise Income Tax Law (Order No.512 of the State Council) and the Circular on the Implementation of the Catalogue of the Key Public Infrastructure Projects Supported by the State and Entitled for Preferential Tax Treatment (《國家稅務總局關於實施國家重點扶持的公共基礎設施項目企業所得 稅優惠問題的通知》) (Guo Shui Fa [2009] No.80), Cangzhou Bohai Port Co., Ltd., Cangzhou Huanghuagang Mineral Port Co., Ltd. and Tangshan Caofeidian Coal Port Co., Ltd. are eligible for tax preferences for public infrastructure projects under key support of the State. Income derived by such companies from the investment in, and the operation of, public infrastructure projects under key support from the State is eligible for a tax exemption for the first year to the third year, and a 50% reduction in enterprise income tax for the fourth year to the sixth year, starting from the year in which the project first generates operating income. Cangzhou Bohai Port Co., Ltd., Cangzhou Huanghuagang Mineral Port Co., Ltd. and Tangshan Caofeidian Coal Port Co., Ltd. first generated their respective operating income in 2010, 2014 and 2015, respectively, and started to be entitled to the tax preferences of enterprise income tax.

Due to implementation of institutional reform, the Group has executed early retirement plan ("Early retirement") since 2015. Eligible employees may retire from their posts on a voluntary basis. The Group has the obligation to pay early retirement pension for those early retired employees in the next 1 year to 10 years until the employees reach their statutory retirement age. The wages for early retirement are determined according to certain proportion of the average monthly wages of the early retired employees in the previous year before their official early retirement. Once confirmed, the wages for early retirement would remain unchanged for the coming years. In the meantime, the Company will make provision and pay for insurance and housing fund for those employees under local requirement for social insurance. In considering the future payment obligations of early retirement pension for employees participating in the early retirement plan, the Group recognized in the administrative expenses on a one-off basis in accordance with discounted China bond and government bond yields. 2. Transfer of Financial Assets

Continuing involvement in transferred financial assets derecognised generally

As at 31 December 2016, the Group has endorsed bank acceptance notes with a carrying amount of RMB59,155,255.64 (31 December 2015: RMB8,250,000.00) to suppliers to settle the amounts payable. As at 31 December 2016, for notes due within 1 to 6 months, if acceptance banks dishonored the notes, endorsees shall have the right to turn to the Group for recourse ("Continuing Involvement") according to the Law of Bill. The Group considered that the acceptance banks of these notes were four major state-owned banks in the PRC, and the potential risk of being subject to recourse due to the banks' inability to pay was low. Therefore, the Group has derecognised carrying amounts of the notes and the related accounts payable that have been settled. The maximum loss and the undiscounted cash flow of Continuing Involvement and repurchase equal to the carrying amounts of the notes. The Group considers that the fair value of Continuing Involvement is insignificant.

In 2016 and 2015, the Group did not recognise any profit or loss at the date of transfer. The Group had no current or accumulated income or expense related to Continuing Involvement of financial assets which had been derecognised. The endorsement happens evenly throughout the year.

3. Risks Arising from Financial Instruments

The Group's principal financial instruments comprise bank borrowings and cash and bank balances etc. The main purpose of these financial instruments is to raise funds for the Group's operations. The Group has various other financial assets and liabilities such as accounts receivable and accounts payable, which arise directly from its operations.

The main risks arising from the Group's financial instruments are credit risk, liquidity risk and market risk. Risk management policies employed by the Group are summarised below.

Credit risk

The Group trades only with recognised and creditworthy third parties. It is the Group's policy that all customers who wish to trade on credit terms are subject to credit verification procedures. In addition, balances of accounts receivable are monitored on an ongoing basis to ensure that the Group's exposure to bad debt is not significant. For transactions that are not settled in the functional currency of the relevant operating unit, the Group does not offer credit terms without the specific approval of the Department of Credit Control in the Group.

The credit risk of the Group's other financial assets, which comprise cash and bank balances, bills receivable, dividends receivable and other receivables, etc., arises from default of the counterparty, with a maximum exposure equal to the carrying amounts of these instruments.

Since the Group trades only with recognised and creditworthy third parties, there is no requirement for collateral. Concentrations of credit risk are managed by customers. As at 31 December 2016, there is a concentration of specific credit risk within the Group as 39% and 67% (31 December 2015: 52% & 73%) of the Group's accounts receivables were due from the largest customer and the five largest customers respectively. The Group did not hold any collateral or other credit enhancements over the balances of accounts receivables.

Further quantitative data in respect of the Group's exposure to credit risk arising from accounts receivables are disclosed in 3. Accounts receivables and 5. Other receivables of Note V.

AS at 31 December 2016 and 31 December 2015, there are no amounts receivable that were neither past due nor impaired, and aging analysis on amounts receivable that were past due but not impaired of the Group.

Liquidity risk

The Group manages its risk of deficiency of funds using a recurring liquidity planning tool. This tool considers both the maturity of its financial instruments and expected cash flows from the Group's operations.

The Group's objective is to maintain a balance between continuity and flexibility of funding through the use of various funding means, such as bank borrowings. As at 31 December 2016, 23% (31 December 2015: 18 %) of the Group's interest-bearing liabilities are due within one year.

4. Capital Management

The primary objective of the Group's capital management is to ensure the Group's ability to operate as a going concern and maintain healthy capital structure so as to support business growth and maximise shareholder value.

The Group manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it in response to changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Group may adjust the distribution of profits to shareholders, return capital to shareholders or issue new shares. The Group is not subject to any externally imposed capital requirements. During 2016 and 2015, there was no change in the Group's capital management objectives, policies or processes.

The Group manages its capital using leverage ratio, which is calculated by dividing net debts by the sum of adjusted capital and net debts. Net debts include accounts payable, other payables, short-term borrowings, non-current liabilities due within one year and long-term borrowings less cash and bank balances. It is the Group's policy to maintain its leverage ratio between 30% and 60%. The Group's net debt to equity ratio as at the balance sheet dates is as follows:

Fair Value Estimation

Management has assessed cash and bank balances, bills receivable, accounts receivable, short-term borrowings, accounts payable and non-current liabilities due within one year etc, and considers that their fair values approximate their carrying amounts due to the short term maturities of these instruments. The fair values of long-term borrowings approximate their carrying amounts due to their floating interest rates.

The Group's finance team is led by the finance manager, and is responsible for formulating policies and procedures for the fair value measurement of financial instruments. The finance team reports directly to the chief financial officer and the audit committee. At each balance sheet date, the finance team analyses movements in the fair value of financial instruments and determines the major inputs applicable to the valuation. The valuation must be reviewed and approved by the finance manager. For the purpose of preparing interim and annual financial statements, the finance team meets the audit committee twice a year to discuss the valuation procedures and results.

The fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities is determined based on the amount for which an asset could be exchanged, or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties in an arm's length transaction, other than in a forced or liquidation sale. The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair values.

The fair values of long-term loans are calculated by discounting the future cash flows using market yields currently available for other financial instruments with similar contractual terms, credit risk and residual term as the discount rate. As at 31 December 2016 and 31 December 2015, the Group's exposure to non-performance risk associated with the long-term borrowings is assessed as insignificant.

Others

In April 2011, the Port Construction Command Office of Shanxi Province in Qinhuangdao ("Shanxi Port Construction Command"), a third party, initiated a civil lawsuit in the Higher People's Court of Hebei Province against the Company and HPG, the parent company, as co-defendants, claiming that the agreement in relation to Qinhuangdao Port investment between Shanxi Provincial Government and HPG had been terminated and the Company and HPG should return, which includes the investment fund, accrued interest and management fees. HPG issued a commitment letter on 16 April 2012 whereby HPG committed to reimburse the Company for all losses in connection with the lawsuit.

Upon mediation from the Higher People's Court of Hebei Province, Shanxi Port Construction Command, HPG and the Group signed the Settlement Agreement on 5 July 2016, which agreed that HPG shall repay the principal and interest in total of RMB76,450,000 in relation to the investment of Shanxi Port Construction Command with the shares in equivalent value held in the issuer. Taking 11 May 2016 as the base date and based on the price determined as the weighted average trading price for 30 trading days prior to the base date, the number of shares for repayment shall be 30,950,000 shares, which accounted for 0.615% of the total share capital of the Company. Such shares will be transferred to Qinhuangdao Port Management Office of the People's Government of Shanxi Province ("Shanxi Port Office"), a public institution under the People's Government of Shanxi Province.

In November 2016, HPG and Shanxi Port Office entered into the Equity Transfer Agreement, pursuant to which HPG agreed to transfer 30,950,000 shares held in the issuer to Shanxi Port Office, and completed the share transfer registration procedures on 14 December 2016. After such share transfer, HPG's shareholding in the Company decreased from 61.723% to 61.108%.
