

**CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT**

Our strategy revolves around prudent cost management, operational efficiency improvements, and targeted investments in innovation with the suitable technology. By closely monitoring client needs and preferences, we aim to deliver value-added solutions that address their evolving demands while optimizing our resource allocation. Additionally, we are actively exploring new market segments, partnerships, and business models that can help diversify our revenue streams and mitigate the effects of the stagnant economy. Furthermore, we remain committed to fostering a resilient corporate culture that encourages agility, adaptability, and continuous improvement, ensuring our ability to weather economic headwinds and emerge stronger. Despite the economic challenges, we are confident in our ability to navigate the current environment and position ourselves for long-term success.

In addition to economic conditions, geopolitical risks play a crucial role in shaping the business environment. Such events may lead to changes in government policies, regulations, or business environments, necessitating adaptability and careful navigation. Geopolitical conflicts, along with the imposition of sanctions, can disrupt business operations, impact market access, and introduce compliance risks for businesses operating in affected regions.

To effectively navigate these economic conditions and geopolitical risks, we will closely monitor and assess their potential impacts. As we move into 2024, we will continue to consolidate our acquisitions and expansion, I look forward to all we will accomplish together in the year ahead. We will continue to work closely with our subsidiaries and associates in an effort to produce stronger level of synergy and growth. We believe collaboration will produce higher returns by growing and strengthening existing business, diversifying our products and services, and operating more efficiently.

# **CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT**

Throughout 2023, we strengthened our client portfolio by bringing in major clients from their respective industries. The current retention rate for our clients is above 74% which makes our group a major leader in the industry. With solid recognition from existing clients, our Group will continue to transform and combine its core business from integrated print solution services to other related services for corporate clients in Hong Kong financial and capital markets. During the year, our turnover was approximately HK\$178.6 million, a decrease of approximately 6.1% from the previous year. This decrease can be attributed to the reduction of jobs by 5.5% to 8,822 in the current year from 9,334 in the previous year.

In line with our business strategy, our Group was not only tasked with delivering high-quality services to meet the demands of our clients but also to take into serious consideration of diversifying our products and services. The technology-centric organizational changes we put into action more than three years ago and the flexibility we built into the business enabled us to not only mitigate the risks in order to operate more effectively but to also create new services for our clients by offering various digital solutions during 2023. Our Group will continue to look out for opportunities and collaborations with local business partners, especially in the technology segment to strengthen our existing business by offering additional services. Once again, I would like to thank the team for their commitment and effort throughout these years.

Now, COVID-19 is now behind us but there will be different challenges to come as mentioned in the previous paragraph. In 2024, our Group is expected to ensure that business activity will return to pre-pandemic level as quickly as possible. However, we have actively assessed and managed these potential business risks after the pandemic and taken all necessary measures to overcome these challenges in the "new normal" business environment. To cope with growth, our Group will remain committed to strategies that allow the adoption of the proper technology, and we will continue to focus diligently on technological development as well as suitable solutions to run our operations more effectively and at potential cost savings. With our well-connected network in the region, we can offer highly customised solutions to our clients regionally. With these partnerships, we will continue to position our Group as an innovative solution provider for our clients and maintain our strong presence where our strengths can be combined to achieve an optimal mix between both traditional print business with digital solutions to stay ahead in our industry in the coming years.

Our financial results for 2023 made clear just how differentiated our people are. We undoubtedly have an abundance of talent, but beyond that, we also have a unique corporate culture, which we have worked hard to preserve over the course of the pandemic. Our employees' health and safety are always our top priority, and while we are adapting the hybrid-work model for each office location, we continue to make progress in bringing our employees back together as much as we possibly can. We will always offer our people the flexibility they need to manage their work-life style, but throughout 2023 our experience showed that we are stronger when we come together. Nonetheless, protecting and enhancing our culture will remain a primary focus for our group as we enter 2024.

#### **BUSINESS REVIEW**

During the Reporting Period, we continued to offer a wide range of services, including financial printing services for corporations listed on the Stock Exchange and potential listing applicants to marketing collateral printing services for fund houses and insurance companies. During the Reporting Period, the Group's revenue was approximately HK\$178.6 million, down approximately 6.1% from the previous year. In 2023 and 2022, 8,822 and 9,334 jobs were completed, respectively, contributing to our revenue. Compared to the year ended 31 December 2022, this represented a 5.5% decrease in jobs.

A 51% equity share in into23 Limited was acquired in May 2023. The company has developed a business model combining AI-enabled technology, a large network of in-country translation partners, and a dedicated team of project managers. Approximately 22.85% of the issued shares of Wordbee S.à r.l., an associate of our company, were sold in October 2023. We are consolidating our internal resources after several acquisitions and disposals to ensure our long-term success. These entities can be brought together to create greater opportunities and sustainability by combining their strengths, expertise, and market presence. The consolidation aims to maximize efficiency, capitalize on synergies, and improve our market competitiveness.

# FUTURE PROSPECTS

Going forward, the economic environment remains uncertain and difficult. Through the strengthening of our existing business strategies, we are consolidating our resources to be flexible and are prepared for future uncertainties. We are committed to strengthening our core competencies in order to stay abreast of the latest trends, analyse the situation, and explore other business opportunities related to the latest trends.

# FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Revenue

The Group's revenue for the Reporting Period was approximately HK\$178.6 million compared to approximately HK\$190.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, representing a decrease of approximately 6.1%. The decrease primarily stemmed from the decrease in revenue from (i) financial printing projects, which decreased by approximately HK\$10.6 million, or 7.4%, from approximately HK\$143.3 million for 2022, to approximately HK\$132.8 million for 2023; (ii) the marketing collateral printing projects, which decrease by approximately HK\$1.7 million, or 6.0% from approximately HK\$28.8 million for 2022 to approximately HK\$27.0 million for 2023; and (iii) other projects increased by approximately HK\$0.6 million, or 3.3% from approximately HK\$18.2 million for 2022 to approximately HK\$18.8 million for 2023.

#### Gross Profit and Gross Profit Margin

The Group's gross profit decreased by approximately HK\$5.8 million, or 8.4%, from approximately HK\$68.5 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$62.8 million for the Reporting Period. It was mainly due to the decrease in revenue. The Group's gross profit margin for the Reporting Period and the year ended 31 December 2022 were approximately 35.1% and 36.0% respectively.

#### Other Income, Gains and Losses

The Group's other income, gains and losses increased by approximately HK\$3.2 million from approximately HK\$1.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$4.6 million for the Reporting Period. Such increase was mainly attributable to the gain on disposal of an associate, partially offset by the impairment losses on goodwill recoginsed during the Reporting Period.

#### **Selling Expenses**

The Group's selling expenses decreased by approximately HK\$2.4 million, or 16.8%, from approximately HK\$14.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$12.0 million for the Reporting Period. The decrease was mainly attributable to the decrease in employee benefits expense which is directly related to the revenue.

#### Administrative Expenses

The Group's administrative expenses increased by approximately HK\$0.6 million, or 1.3%, from approximately HK\$47.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$48.4 million for the Reporting Period.

#### **Finance Costs**

Finance costs decreased by approximately HK\$1,000 from approximately HK\$696,000 for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$695,000 for the Reporting Period. Such decrease was mainly due to the decrease in interest on lease liabilities.

#### Taxation

The Group's income tax expense decreased by approximately HK\$169,000 from approximately HK\$230,000 for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$61,000 for the Reporting Period.

#### Profit for the year and Net Profit Margin

Profit after tax of the Group decreased by approximately HK\$0.6 million, from approximately HK\$7.1 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 to approximately HK\$6.5 million for the Reporting Period. Such decrease was mainly due to the decrease in Group's revenue as compared to the year ended 31 December 2022. The net profit margins for the Reporting Period and the year ended 31 December 2022 were approximately 3.6% and 3.8% respectively.

# FINANCIAL RESOURCES, LIQUIDITY AND GEARING RATIO

As at 31 December 2023,

- (a) the Group's total assets increased to approximately HK\$141.1 million (2022: approximately HK\$133.2 million) while the total equity increased to approximately HK\$89.8 million (2022: approximately HK\$89.2 million);
- (b) the Group's current assets increased to approximately HK\$129.6 million (2022: approximately HK\$100.8 million) while the current liabilities increased to approximately HK\$50.6 million (2022: approximately HK\$37.8 million);
- (c) the Group had approximately HK\$90.6 million in cash and bank balances (2022: approximately HK\$58.6 million), which included cash and bank balances in Renminbi ("RMB") of approximately RMB7.2 million, in US dollars ("USD") of approximately USD0.5 million, in Taiwan dollars ("TWD") of approximately TWD0.7 million, in Singapore dollars ("SGD") of approximately SGD0.2 million, in Euro dollars ("EUR") of approximately EUR1.8 million, and approximately HK\$61.5 million, and the current ratio of the Group was approximately 2.6 times (2022: approximately 2.7 times);
- (d) the Group had total leases liabilities of approximately HK\$6.5 million (2022: approximately HK\$15.8 million); and
- (e) the gearing ratio (calculated based on debts including payables incurred not in the ordinary course of business divided by total equity as at the respective period end and multiplied by 100%) of the Group was 8.4% (2022: 18.3%).

#### FUTURE PROSPECTS

We remain reasonably optimistic about sustaining our core business throughout the rest of the year, despite the uncertainties created by the COVID-19 pandemic. Given the Hong Kong Government has lifted most of the COVID-19 containment measures by early March 2023, it is expected that the economy is going to revive and is likely to boost the Group's business performance in the coming year.

We will also continue to explore potential opportunities to develop our core and related businesses, and, if appropriate, explore selective acquisition and partnership in order to strengthen our revenue base and maximise both returns to shareholders and the value of the Group.

#### CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

As at 31 December 2023, the Group had approximately HK\$2.0 million of capital expenditure (2022: approximately HK\$1.6 million).

#### SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENTS

As at 31 December 2023, the Group did not hold any significant investments (2022: nil).

# CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

As at 31 December 2023, the Group did not have any significant contingent liabilities (2022: nil).

# EMPLOYEES AND REMUNERATION POLICIES

As at 31 December 2023, the Group had 130 employees (2022: 142) in Hong Kong, 9 employees (2022: 8) in PRC, 18 employees (2022: 10) in Taiwan, and 13 employees (2022: 13) in Singapore. We believe that hiring, motivating and retaining qualified employees are crucial to our success as a reliable financial printer. Total staff costs (including Directors' emoluments) were approximately HK\$71.1 million for the Reporting Period (2022: approximately HK\$69.8 million). The remuneration packages of the Group's employees include fees, salaries, retirement benefit scheme contributions and other benefits. The remuneration policies of the Group, including promotion, bonus, salary increment and other benefits, are formulated based on the Group's operating results, employees' individual performance, working experience, respective responsibilities, merit, qualifications and competence, as well as comparable to the prevailing market practice, standards and statistics. The remuneration policies of the Group regularly. The dedication and hard work of the Group's staff during the Reporting Period are generally appreciated and recognised.

In addition, the Group adopted a share option scheme (the "**Scheme**") on 15 December 2016 to provide incentives to the Directors and eligible employees. No options were exercised during the Reporting Period (2022: nil).

The Group also adopted a share award scheme on 4 July 2022 with the purposes and objectives to (i) recognise and reward the contributions of eligible participants to the growth and development of the Group and give incentives to them in order to retain them for the continual operation and development of the Group; and (ii) to attract suitable personnel for further development of the Group. During the Reporting Period, 21,415,000 Shares were awarded to 15 awardees under the share award scheme by way of issuing and allotting 21,415,000 new Shares to the trustee to be held on trust for the awardees pursuant to the general mandate granted by the shareholders of the Company at the annual general meeting of the Company held on 10 May 2022.

# INDEBTEDNESS AND CHARGES ON GROUP'S ASSETS

As at 31 December 2023, the Group did not pledge its assets to secure general banking facilities (2022: HK\$1.5 million).

# DISCLOSEABLE TRANSACTION DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD

On 20 April 2023, a sale and purchase agreement (the "**Sale and Purchase Agreement**") was entered into between HM Investment Limited (an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company) as purchaser (the "**Purchaser**"), and Richard Liam Paul DELANTY as vendor (the "**Vendor**"). The Vendor was an individual residing in Hong Kong and independent of and not connected with the Company and its subsidiaries and its connected person(s) and its ultimate beneficial owner(s) or their respective associate(s). Pursuant to the Sale and Purchase Agreement, the Vendor has agreed to sell and the Purchaser has agreed to purchase 10,200 shares (the "**Sale Shares**") in into23 Limited (the "**Target Company**"), representing 51% of the issued share capital of the Target Company, at the consideration of HK\$6,375,000 (the "**Consideration**").

Upon completion of the sale and purchase of the Sale Shares in accordance with the terms of the Sale and Purchase Agreement, the Company has been indirectly holding 51% of the issued share capital of the Target Company and the Target Company has become an indirect non-wholly owned subsidiary of the Company, and the financial position and operating results of the Target Company shall be consolidated into the financial statements of the Group.

The Target Company is a company incorporated in Hong Kong with limited liability on 18 May 2017 and is engaged in the provision of translation services globally.

The Board considered that the terms and conditions of the Sale and Purchase Agreement were fair and reasonable and were on normal commercial terms and were in the interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole.

As one or more of the applicable percentage ratios (as calculated in accordance with Rule 19.07 of the GEM Listing Rules) was more than 5% but less than 25%, the entering into of the Sale and Purchase Agreement constituted a discloseable transaction of the Company under the GEM Listing Rules and therefore subject to the reporting and announcement requirements but exempt from the circular and shareholders' approval requirements under Chapter 19 of the GEM Listing Rules.

For details of the above-mentioned discloseable transaction during the Reporting Period, please refer to the announcements of the Company dated 20 April 2023 and 2 May 2023, respectively.

# MAJOR TRANSACTION DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD

On 31 July 2023, a sale and purchase agreement (the "Sale and Purchase Agreement") was entered into between Mr. José Vega, Dr. Dädalus Böhmig, HM Investment Limited (an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company), Activos Linguisticos SL (a company incorporated in Spain with limited liability), Mr. Daniel Johnson, Mr. Maxime Appolonia and Ms. Anita Sempels (collectively, the "Wordbee Vendors", and each a "Wordbee Vendor") and Mr. Andre Hemker (the "Wordcraft Vendor", together with the Wordbee Vendors, the "Vendors") as vendors and Transperfect Luxembourg S.à r.l., (a company incorporated in Luxumbourg with limited liability) (the "Wordbee Purchaser") and Transperfect Translations Gmbh (a company incorporated in Germany with limited liability) (the "Wordcraft Purchaser", together with the Wordbee Purchaser, the "Purchasers") as purchasers.

Pursuant to the Sale and Purchase Agreement, (i) the Wordbee Vendors had conditionally agreed to sell and the Wordbee Purchaser had conditionally agreed to acquire the entire issued share capital of Wordbee S.à r.l., (a company incorporated in Luxembourg with limited liability) (the "**Disposal Company**"); and (ii) the Wordcraft Vendor had conditionally agreed to sell and the Wordcraft Purchaser had conditionally agreed to acquire the entire issued share capital of Wordcraft GmbH (a company incorporated in Germany with limited liability) ("**Wordcraft**").

The Disposal Company was an associate of the Company. 8,156 shares in the Disposal Company (the "**Sale Shares**"), representing approximately 22.85% of the entire issued share capital of the Disposal Company, were to be disposed of by HM Investment Limited. The Company has not hold any interests in Wordcraft.

The Board considered that the Disposal was carried out on normal commercial terms, fair and reasonable and the Disposal was in the interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole.

As one or more of the applicable percentage ratios (as calculated in accordance with Rule 19.07 of GEM Listing Rules) are more than 25% but less than 75%, the Disposal constitutes a major transaction of the Company under the GEM Listing Rules and is therefore subject to the reporting, announcement and shareholders' approval requirements under Chapter 19 of the GEM Listing Rules.

For details of the above-mentioned major transaction during the Reporting Period, please refer to the announcements of the Company dated 1, 22, 25 August 2023 and 4 September 2023, respectively, the circular of the Company dated 15 September 2023 and the announcement of the Company in relation to the completion of the Disposal dated 5 October 2023.

# FOREIGN CURRENCY EXPOSURE

The Group's businesses are mainly operated in Hong Kong. The sales and purchases are mainly denominated in HK\$ and customers rarely request to settle our billing by other foreign currencies such as USD and RMB.

The Group's assets, liabilities and transactions are mainly denominated in HK\$. Only a little portion of the Group's deposits with bank are denominated in USD, SGD and TWD (which are freely convertible into HK\$), and RMB (which is not freely convertible currency in the international market). The Directors are of the view that the Group's operating cash flow and liquidity are not subject to significant foreign exchange rate risks and, therefore, no hedging arrangements were made during the Reporting Period. However, the Group will review and monitor the relevant foreign exchange risk from time to time based on its business development requirements and may enter into foreign exchange hedging arrangements when applicable.

He is mainly responsible for formulating the overall financial and strategic planning of our Group. Mr. Yu has more than 30 years of experience in the printing industry. Mr. Yu obtained a Diploma in Management for Executive Development from The Chinese University of Hong Kong in September 1991. From April 1982 to February 1992, he was the production supervisor at Speedflex Asia Limited, a financial pre-press services provider, and was subsequently
	promoted to the position of general manager of production, mainly responsible for managing its printing factory. In January 1992, Mr. Yu was appointed as a director of Sunland Printing Limited ("Sunland") and he resigned from the role in September 2014. Since March 2000, Mr. Yu has been the chairman of HeterMedia Services Limited ("HM Services"). Mr. Yu is currently a director of each of HM Immediate Holdings Limited ("HM Immediate"), HM Services, HM Too Limited ("HM Too"), HM Too (Asia) Limited ("HM Asia"), HM Language Services Limited ("HM Language"), Talesis Limited, i.Link Group Limited ("i. Link") and WordFlow Limited, all of which are subsidiaries of the Company. Mr. Yu is also a director of HM Ultimate Holdings Limited, the controlling shareholder of the Company.

Chief Executive Officer, Executive Director & Compliance Officer Mr. Chan Wai Lin ("Mr. Chan"), aged 51, is an executive Director, the Chief Executive Officer of our Group, the Compliance Officer and a member of the Nomination Committee of the Company. He is mainly responsible for overall business management and making overall operational decisions of our Group. He joined our Group in November 2012 as a director of HM Too. Mr. Chan has over 15 years of experience in the financial printing industry. In December 1998, Mr. Chan obtained a degree of Bachelor of Arts in Economics from the University of Missouri, USA. In December 2000, he obtained a degree of Master of Arts in Finance from Webster University, USA. Mr. Chan also obtained a degree of Master of Business Administration from Webster University, USA, in August 2001.

Mr. Chan worked at State Street - Kansas City (formerly known as IFTC (Investors Fiduciary Trust Company)) as fund accountant/portfolio administrator in March 1999 and as financial analyst from May 2000 to March 2001. He was mainly responsible for preparing financial reports and conducting ad hoc analysis on profitability of new fund accounts. Mr. Chan was employed by RR Donnelley Roman Financial Limited, a financial printer, from March 2002 to March 2008 and his last position was head of office in the business process outsourcing department. He was mainly responsible for developing production strategies, planning projects and developing and implementing procedures and systems. # PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Company is an investment holding company. Its subsidiaries are principally engaged in provision of integrated printing services, concept creation and artwork design, IT and languages services. The principal activities of the Company's subsidiaries are set forth in Note 36 to the Consolidated Financial Statements.

# **BUSINESS REVIEW**

A review of the business of the Group for the Reporting Period and a discussion on the Group's future business development are provided in the Chairman's Statement and Management Discussion and Analysis on pages 4 to 13 of this report. In addition, various financial risks have been disclosed in Note 32 to the consolidated financial statements.

# PRINCIPAL RISK AND UNCERTAINTIES

Our Group's financial position, results of operations and business prospects may be affected by a number of risks and uncertainties directly and indirectly pertaining to our Group's business. The following are the key risks and uncertainties identified by our Group.

We generally do not enter into any long-term contracts with our clients. We may not be successful in maintaining our relationship with existing clients or attracting new clients, which may expose us to potential volatility with respect to our business performance.

We provide integrated printing services for corporate clients mainly in the financial and capital markets in Hong Kong. We, in general, do not enter into any long-term contracts with our clients, and we are engaged by our clients on a project-by-project basis. Most of our projects are non-recurring in nature, such as financial printing projects related to fund investment content outputs, and the availability of these projects are subject to the financial market condition.

We engage subcontractors to conduct part of the works in our productions and the performance of these subcontractors may affect the quality of our overall services to our clients.

We outsource part of our productions, in particular the printing and binding/packaging works, to our subcontractors. As we do not operate any printing factory, all of our printing and binding/packaging works are outsourced to third party printing houses. Generally, our final content outputs are delivered to our clients' designated locations directly by our subcontracted printing houses or through third party logistic service providers.

# ENVIRONMENTAL POLICIES AND PERFORMANCE

The Group has actively participated in sustainability and social responsibility and recognises the responsibility to protect the environment from its business activities. Details for the environmental policies and performance of the Group for the Reporting Period are set out in the Environmental, Social and Governance Report.

# COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS

To the best of the Directors' knowledge, information and belief, having made all reasonable enquiries, our Group has complied in material respects with the relevant laws and regulations that have a significant impact on the business and operation of our Group during the Reporting Period.

# RESULTS AND APPROPRIATIONS

The results of the Group for the Reporting Period are set out in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income on page 60.

The Board has recommend the payment of a final dividend of HK\$2.0 cents per share for the Reporting Period (2022: final dividend of HK\$1.5 cents per share). The proposed final dividend is subject to approval by shareholders in the forthcoming annual general meeting to be held on 9 May 2024.

# PURCHASE, SALE OR REDEMPTION OF LISTED SECURITIES OF THE COMPANY

During the Reporting Period, neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries had purchased, sold or redeemed any of the Company's listed shares.

#### SHARE OPTION SCHEME

The Company conditionally adopted the Scheme on 15 December 2016 which became unconditional upon the listing of the Company on 11 January 2017. Under the terms of the Scheme, the eligible participants (the "**Scheme Eligible Participant**") of the Scheme include employee, adviser, consultant, service provider, agent, client, partner or joint venture partner of the Company or any subsidiary (including any Director of the Company or any subsidiary) who is in full-time or part-time employment with or otherwise engaged by the Company or any subsidiary at the time when an option is granted to such person. The Board may at its discretion grant options to the Scheme Eligible Participants who have contributed or may contribute to the Group as incentive or reward for their contribution to the Group.

The maximum number of Shares in respect of the options to be granted at any time under the Scheme together with options which may be granted under any other share option schemes must not exceed 10% of all the Shares in issue as at the listing date of the Company (the "Scheme Mandate Limit"). The Company may seek approval by the Shareholders in general meeting to refresh the 10% limit provided that the total number of Shares available for issue under options which may be granted under the Scheme and any other schemes of the Group in these circumstances must not exceed 10% of the issued share capital of the Company at the date of approval of refreshing of the limit. No options may be granted under the Scheme or any other share option schemes of the Group if this will result in the Scheme Mandate Limit being exceeded.

The total number of Shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of the options granted to each participant (including both exercised and outstanding options) in any 12-month period must not exceed 1% of the Shares in issue. Where any further grant of options to an Eligible Participant would result in the Shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of all options granted and to be granted to such person (including exercised, cancelled and outstanding options) in the 12-month period up to and including the date of such further grant representing in aggregate over 1% of the Shares in issue, such further grant must be separately approved by the Shareholders in general meeting with such Eligible Participant and his/her close associates abstaining from voting.

An option under the Scheme may be exercised at any time during the period to be determined and identified by the Board to each Scheme Eligible Participants at the time of making an offer for the grant of option, but in any event no later 10 years from the date of grant.

The subscription price under the Scheme shall be determined at the discretion of the Directors but in any event will not be less than the highest of (a) the closing price of the Shares on the Stock Exchange as shown in the daily quotations sheet of the Stock Exchange on the offer date of the particular option, which must be a business day; (b) the average of the closing prices of the Shares as shown in the daily quotations sheets of the Stock Exchange for the five business days immediately preceding the offer date of that particular option; and (c) the nominal value of a Share on the offer date of the particular option.

The Scheme shall be valid and effective commencing from the adoption date of the Scheme (i.e. 15 December 2016) until the termination date as provided therein (which being the close of business of the Company on the date which falls 10 years from the date of the adoption of the Scheme), after which period no further options will be granted but the provisions of the Scheme shall remain in force to the extent necessary to give effect to the exercise of any options granted or exercised prior thereto or otherwise as may be required in accordance with the provisions of the Scheme.

On 16 March 2018 (the "**Date of Grant**"), share options were granted to employees of the Group (excluding any Directors, chief executive or substantial shareholders of the Company) under the Scheme, entitling them to subscribe for up to a total of 1,560,000 Shares from 16 March 2019 to 15 March 2022 (Group A) or 16 March 2020 to 15 March 2023 (Group B) at an exercise price of HK\$0.70 per Share, being the average closing price of the Shares for the five trading days immediately before the Date of Grant. The closing price of the Shares immediately before the Date of Grant is HK\$0.69. The grant for Groups A and B under the Scheme was expired on 15 March 2023. # SHARE AWARD SCHEME

On 4 July 2022, the Board has resolved to adopt the share award scheme ("**Share Award Scheme**") with the purposes and objectives to (i) recognise and reward the contributions of certain eligible participants (the "**Eligible Participants**") to the growth and development of the Group and to give incentives to them in order to retain them for the continual operation and development of the Group; and (ii) to attract suitable personnel for the further development of the Group. The Eligible Participants cover any employee (full time and part time staff, including any executive Director but excluding any non-executive Director) of the Group or any invested entity held by the Group. Unless terminated earlier, the Share Award Scheme shall remain valid and effective for a period of 10 years commencing from 4 July 2022 (the "**Adoption Date**"). The Share Award Scheme is subject to the administration of the Board or a subcommittee of the Board (the "**Trust Deed**") in accordance with the rules relating to the Share Award Scheme and the terms of the Trust Deed.

The Board or the Committee may, from time to time and at its absolute discretion, select any Eligible Participant for participation in the Share Award Scheme. The remuneration committee of the Company shall have powers on recommending and/or deciding the selection of the selected participants (the "**Selected Participants**") and the number of the awarded shares (the "**Awarded Shares**") to be awarded to the respective Selected Participants. The aggregate number of shares awarded under the Share Award Scheme by the Board shall not exceed 10% of the total number of issued shares of the Company as at the Adoption Date and the maximum number of shares which may be awarded to a Selected Participant under the Share Award Scheme shall not exceed 1% of the issued share capital of the Company as at the Adoption Date. The total issued share capital of the Company as at the Adoption Date.

On the extraordinary general meeting ("**2023 EGM**") of the Company held on 9 May 2023, the ordinary resolution relating to the award to the Connected Awardee was duly passed by the independent Shareholders.

With the approval of the GEM Listing Committee of the Stock Exchange, a total of 21,415,000 Awarded Shares were issued and allotted on 18 May 2023 pursuant to the Share Award Scheme to the Trustee of the Connected Awardee and other non-connected Awardees under the 2022 General Mandate. The remuneration policies of the Group, including promotion, bonus, salary increment and other benefits, are formulated based on the Group's operating results, employees' individual performance, working experience, respective responsibilities, merit, qualifications and competence, as well as comparable to the prevailing market practice, standards and statistics. The remuneration policies of the Group are reviewed by the management of the Group regularly. The dedication and hard work of the Group's staff during the Reporting Period are generally appreciated and recognised.

On 4 March 2024, a lease dated 29 February 2024 (the "Lease") was entered into between HeterMedia Services Limited ("HSL") (a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company) as lessee, and Jetwise Investment Limited ("Jetwise") (an Independent Third Party) as lessor, in relation to the lease of the office premises located at the whole of 35th Floor of Dah Sing Financial Centre, No. 248 Queens Road East, Wan Chai, Hong Kong (the "Premises") for a term of five (5) years from 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2029 (both days inclusive).

The Group's current headquarters and principal place of business in Hong Kong is located at the whole of 9th Floor of the Commercial Development of Infinitus Plaza, No. 199 Des Voeux Road Central, Hong Kong, and the lease of which is expiring on 31 July 2024. The Board is of the view that entering into the Lease provides the Group with an opportunity to relocate its headquarters in Hong Kong, while benefiting from a lower rental rate. The Company will publish an announcement in relation to the change of principal place of business in Hong Kong in due course.

The Board considered that the Lease was entered into on normal commercial terms after arm's length negotiations between the parties with reference to the prevailing market rent for comparable premises in the vicinity of the Premises, and the terms of the Lease were fair and reasonable and in the interests of the Company and the Shareholders as a whole.

The unaudited value of the right-of-use asset recognised by the Company under the Lease amounted to approximately HK\$16,954,000 which was calculated with reference to the aggregate lease payment and discounted by a discounted rate.

Pursuant to HKFRS 16 *Leases*, the Company if entering into lease transaction as lessee will recognise a rightof-use asset in its consolidated financial statements. Such transaction will be regarded as an acquisition of capital asset for the purpose of the GEM Listing Rules.

As one or more of the applicable percentage ratios (as defined in the GEM Listing Rules) in respect of the acquisition of right-of-use assets of the Premises recognised by the Group pursuant to HKFRS 16 *Leases* under the Lease is 25% or more but is less than 100%, the entering into of the Lease constitutes a major transaction for the Company and is subject to the reporting, announcement, circular and Shareholders' approval requirements under Chapter 19 of the GEM Listing Rules.

The Company has in place a corporate governance framework and has established a set of policies and procedures based on the Corporate Governance Code (the "CG Code") contained in Appendix C1 of the GEM Listing Rules. Such policies and procedures provide the infrastructure for enhancing the Board's ability to implement governance and exercise proper oversight on business conduct and affairs of the Company.

The Board is of the view that throughout the Reporting Period, the Company has complied with all the code provisions set out in the CG Code. Key corporate governance principles and practices of the Company are summarised below.

#### A. The Board

#### A1. Responsibilities and Delegation

The Company is headed by an effective Board which is responsible for the leadership, control and management of the Company and oversees the Group's business, strategic decision and performances in the attainment of the objective of ensuring effective functioning and growth of the Group and enhancing value to investors. All the Directors carry out their duties in good faith, take decisions objectively and act in the interests of the Company and the Shareholders at all times.

All Directors have full and timely access to all relevant information of the Group as well as the advice and services of the company secretary and senior management, with a view to ensuring compliance with Board procedures and all applicable laws and regulations. Any Director may request for independent professional advice in appropriate circumstances at the Company's expenses for discharging his/her duties, upon reasonable request made to the Board.

The Board reserves for its decision on all major matters of the Company, including the approval and monitoring of all policy matters, overall strategies and budgets, internal control and risk management systems, material transactions (in particular those that may involve conflict of interests), financial information, appointment of Directors and other significant financial and operational matters.

The Chief Executive Officer and senior management of the Company are delegated the authority and responsibilities by the Board for the day-to-day management and operation of the Group. The delegated functions and work tasks are periodically reviewed. Approval has to be obtained from the Board prior to any significant transactions entered into by the above-mentioned officers. The Board has the full support of the senior management to discharge its responsibilities.

The Company has arranged appropriate insurance coverage on Directors' and officers' liabilities in respect of any legal actions taken against Directors and senior management arising out of corporate activities. The insurance coverage would be reviewed on an annual basis.

#### A2. Board Composition

None of the members of the Board is related to one another.

As a female director was appointed in 2021, the Company is currently in compliance with GEM Listing Rule 17.104 that came into effect on 1 January 2022 on promoting board gender diversity. The Company is committed to promote gender diversity for its board composition. As at the date of this annual report, the Company has maintained a board gender diversity comprising a mix of 5 males (83%) and 1 female (17%). The Board is of the view that the existing gender diversity in respect of the Board is sufficient, and that the nomination policy of the Company can ensure that there will be a pipeline of potential successors to the Board which continues the existing gender diversity in the Board. The Board is mindful of the objectives for the factors for assessing the candidacy of the Board members, and will ensure that any successors to the Board shall follow the gender diversity policy. Similar considerations shall also be in place to assess the candidacy of the senior management team from time to time. The Group is determined to maintain gender diversity and equality in terms of the whole workforce, and to procure the senior management team to achieve gender equality in terms of the gender ratio within a medium-term time frame. The Company expects the above is achievable with suitable effort in promoting the gender diversity culture, which the Group has been advocating for so.

#### A3. Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

The positions of Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of the Company are held by Mr. Yu Chi Ming and Mr. Chan Wai Lin respectively. The Chairman provides leadership and is responsible for formulating the overall financial and strategic planning of the Group. The Chief Executive Officer focuses on the Company's overall business management and making overall operational decisions. During the Reporting Period, the Chairman had a meeting with the independent non-executive directors, without the presence of the other directors.

#### A4. Independent Non-executive Directors

Throughout the Reporting Period, the Board has met the requirements of the GEM Listing Rules of having a minimum of three independent non-executive directors (representing at least one-third of the Board) with at least one of them possessing appropriate professional qualifications or accounting or related financial management expertise.

The members of the Board have skills and experience appropriate for the business requirements and objectives of the Group. Each executive Director is responsible for different business and functional division of the Group in accordance with his expertise. The independent non-executive Directors bring different business and financial expertise, experiences and independent judgment to the Board and they are invited to serve on the Board committees. Through participation in Board meetings, taking the lead in managing issues involving potential conflicts of interests, the independent non-executive Directors have made contributions to the effective direction of the Company and provided adequate checks and balances to safeguard the interests of both the Group and the Shareholders. The Group has established mechanism to ensure independent views and input are available to the Board.

The Company has received written annual confirmation from each independent non-executive Director of his independence pursuant to the requirements of the GEM Listing Rules. The Company considers all independent non-executive Directors to be independent in light of the independence guidelines set out in the GEM Listing Rules.

#### A5. Appointment and Re-election of Directors

All Directors are appointed for a specific term. Each executive Director is engaged on a service contract for an initial term of 3 years, which is renewable thereafter and is subject to termination by either party by giving to the other not less than 3 months' notice in writing. Each of the independent non-executive Directors is appointed for an initial term of 3 years, which is renewable thereafter and is subject to termination by either party by giving to the other not less than 3 months' notice in writing.



According to clause 108 of the articles of association of the Company (the "Articles"), one-third of the Directors for the time being (if their number is not a multiple of three, the number nearest to but not less than one-third) shall retire from office by rotation at each annual general meeting (the "AGM") provided that every Director shall be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years and that any Directors so to retire shall be those who have been longest in office since their last re-election or appointment. The retiring Directors should be eligible for re-election at the relevant AGM. In addition, pursuant to clause 112 of the Articles, any new Director appointed by the Board to fill a casual vacancy shall hold office until the first general meeting of Shareholders after his/her appointment, whereas any Director appointed by the Board as an addition to the existing Board shall hold office only until the next following AGM. The Director appointed by the Board as aforesaid shall be eligible for re-election at the relevant general meeting.

At the forthcoming annual general meeting to be held on 9 May 2024 (the "2024 AGM"), Ms. Chan Wai Chung Caroline and Mr. Ng Jack Ho Wan shall retire by rotation pursuant to Article 108 as stated in the foregoing paragraph. Both of the retiring Directors, being eligible, will offer themselves for re-election at the 2024 AGM. The Board and the Nomination Committee recommended their re-appointment. The circular of the Company, sent together with this annual report, contains detailed information of these two Directors as required by the GEM Listing Rules.

#### A6. Continuous Professional Development of Directors

Directors shall keep abreast of regulatory developments and changes in order to effectively perform their responsibilities and to ensure that their contribution to the Board remains informed and relevant.

Each newly appointed Director shall receive a formal induction on the first occasion of his/her appointment to ensure that he/she has appropriate understanding of the business and operations of the Group and that he/she is fully aware of his/her responsibilities and obligations under the GEM Listing Rules and relevant regulatory requirements.

The existing Directors are continually updated with legal and regulatory developments, and the business and market changes to facilitate the discharge of their responsibilities. Trainings and professional development for Directors are arranged whenever necessary. In addition, relevant reading materials on new or changes to salient laws and regulations applicable to the Group are provided to Directors from time to time for their reference and studying.

The Directors are required to submit to the Company details of the training they received in each financial year for the Company's maintenance of proper training records of the Directors. According to the training records currently maintained by the Company, during the Reporting Period, the Directors have complied with the code provisions of the CG Code on participation in continuous professional training as follows:

#### A8. Directors' and Employees' Securities Transactions

The Company has adopted the required standard of dealings set out in Rules 5.48 to 5.67 of the GEM Listing Rules (the "Required Standard of Dealings") as its own code of conduct regarding Directors' dealings in the securities of the Company.

Specific enquiry has been made of all the Directors and the Directors have confirmed that they have complied with the Required Standard of Dealings throughout the Reporting Period.

The Company has also established written guidelines (the "Employees Written Guidelines") on terms no less exacting than the Required Standard of Dealings for securities transactions by employees who are likely to possess inside information of the Company and/or its securities. Throughout the Reporting Period, no incident of non-compliance of the Employees Written Guidelines by the employees was noted by the Company.

In case when the Company is aware of any restricted period for dealings in the Company's securities, the Company will notify its Directors and relevant employees in advance.

#### A9. Corporate Governance Functions

The Board is responsible for performing the functions set out in the code provisions of the CG Code.

During the Reporting Period, the Board has reviewed and monitored the Company's corporate governance policies and practices, training and continuous professional development of Directors and senior management, the Company's policies and practices on compliance with legal and regulatory requirements, the compliance of the Required Standard of Dealings and Employees Written Guidelines, and the Company's compliance with the CG Code and disclosure in this corporate governance report.

#### B. BOARD COMMITTEES

The Board has established three committees, namely, the Audit Committee, the Remuneration Committee and the Nomination Committee, for overseeing particular aspects of the Company's affairs. All Board committees of the Company are established with specific written terms of reference which deal clearly with their authority and duties. The terms of reference of the Board committees are posted on the Company's website and the website of the Stock Exchange and are available to Shareholders upon request. All the Board committees should report to the Board on their decisions or recommendations made.

All Board committees are provided with sufficient resources to discharge their duties and, upon reasonable request, are able to seek independent professional advice in appropriate circumstances, at the Company's expenses.

#### B1. Audit Committee

The Company has met the GEM Listing Rules requirements regarding the composition of the Audit Committee throughout the Reporting Period. The Audit Committee consists of three members, being all the three independent non-executive Directors, namely Mr. Ng Jack Ho Wan (chairman of the Committee), Mr. Choi Hon Ting Derek and Mr. Wan Chi Wai Anthony, with Mr. Ng Jack Ho Wan and Mr. Wan Chi Wai Anthony possessing appropriate professional qualifications or accounting or related financial management expertise. None of the Audit Committee members is a former partner of the Company's existing external auditors.

The terms of reference of the Audit Committee are of no less exacting terms than those set out in the CG Code. The main duties of the Audit Committee are to assist the Board in reviewing the financial information and reporting process, risk management and internal control systems, effectiveness of the internal audit function, scope of audit and relationship with external auditors, and arrangements to enable employees of the Company to raise concerns, in confidence, about possible improprieties in financial reporting, internal control or other matters of the Company.

The Audit Committee has reviewed the Consolidated Financial Statements.

During the Reporting Period, the Audit Committee held 4 regular meetings to review and discuss the Group's consolidated financial statements, results announcements and reports for the year ended 31 December 2022, for the three months ended 31 March 2023, for the six months ended 30 June 2023 and for the nine months ended 30 September 2023; the significant issues on the financial reporting, operational and compliance controls, the effectiveness of the risk management and internal control systems and internal audit function; re-appointment of external auditors and relevant scope of works; and arrangements for employees to raise concerns, in confidence, about possible improprieties.

The attendance records of each Audit Committee member are set out in the above section A7 headed "Directors' Attendance Records at Meetings".

The Audit Committee also met the external auditors once without the presence of the executive Directors.

#### *B2. Remuneration Committee*

The Remuneration Committee consists of three members, being two independent non-executive Directors, Mr. Choi Hon Ting Derek (chairman of the Committee) and Mr. Wan Chi Wai Anthony, and one executive Director, Mr. Yu Chi Ming. Throughout the Reporting Period, the Company has met the GEM Listing Rules requirements of having the majority of the Remuneration Committee members being independent non-executive Directors as well as having the Committee chaired by an independent non-executive Director.

The terms of reference of the Remuneration Committee are of no less exacting terms than those set out in the CG Code. The primary functions of the Remuneration Committee include reviewing and making recommendations to the Board on the remuneration packages of individual executive Directors and senior management, the remuneration policy and structure for all Directors and senior management; and establishing formal and transparent procedures for developing such remuneration policy and structure to ensure that no Director or any of his associates will participate in deciding his own remuneration.

During the Reporting Period, the Remuneration Committee held one meeting to review and make recommendations to the Board on the remuneration policy and structure of the Company and the remuneration packages of the Directors and other related matters.

#### B3. Nomination Committee

The Nomination Committee comprises three members, being two independent non-executive Directors, Mr. Wan Chi Wai Anthony (chairman of the Committee) and Mr. Ng Jack Ho Wan, and one executive Director, Mr. Chan Wai Lin. Throughout the Reporting Period, the Company has met the GEM Listing Rules requirements of having a majority of the Nomination Committee members being independent non-executive Directors and having the Nomination Committee chaired by an independent non-executive Director.

The terms of reference of the Nomination Committee are of no less exacting terms than those set out in the CG Code. The principal responsibilities of the Nomination Committee are to review the structure, size and composition (including the skills, knowledge, experience and diversity perspectives) of the Board at least annually and make recommendations on any proposed changes to the Board to complement the Company's corporate strategy; identify qualified and suitable individuals to become Board members and select or make recommendations to the Board on the selection of individuals nominated for directorships; assess the independence of independent non-executive Directors; and make recommendations to the Board on relevant matters relating to the appointment or re-appointment of Directors and succession planning for Directors, in particular the Chairman and the Chief Executive of the Company.

The Company also recognises and embraces the benefit of having a diverse Board to enhance the quality of its performance. To comply with the GEM Listing Rules, a Board diversity policy was adopted by the Company, pursuant to which the Nomination Committee is responsible for monitoring the implementation of the Board diversity policy and assessing the Board composition under diversified perspectives (including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, or professional experience). The Nomination Committee shall report its findings and make recommendation to the Board, if any. Such policy and objectives will be reviewed from time to time to ensure their appropriateness in determining the optimum composition of the Board.

In selecting candidates for directorship of the Company, the Nomination Committee would make reference to certain criteria such as the Company's needs, the diversity on the Board, the gender, integrity, experience, skills and professional knowledge of the candidate and the amount of time and effort that the candidate will devote to discharge his/her duties and responsibilities. External recruitment professionals might be engaged to carry out selection process when necessary.

The Company has also adopted the director nomination policy. Such policy, devising the criteria and process of selection and performance evaluation, provides guidance to the Board on nomination and appointment of directors of the Company. The Board believes that the defined selection process is good for corporate governance in ensuring the Board continuity and appropriate leadership at Board level, and enhancing better Board effectiveness and diversity as well as in compliance with the applicable rules and regulations.

During the Reporting Period, the Nomination Committee has held one meeting in which the Committee members had reviewed the structure, size and composition of the Board to ensure that it has a balance of gender, expertise, skills and experience appropriate to the requirements for the business of the Group; recommended the reappointment of the retiring Directors standing for re-election at the Company's annual general meeting held on 9 May 2023; and assessed the independence of the existing independent non-executive Directors.

The Board will take opportunities to increase the proportion of female members over time when selecting and making recommendation on suitable candidates for Board appointments. The Board would ensure that appropriate balance of gender diversity is achieved with reference to stakeholders' expectation and international and local recommended best practices, with the ultimate goal of bringing the Board to gender parity. The Board also aspires to having an appropriate proportion of directors who have direct experience in the Group's core markets, with different ethnic backgrounds, and reflecting the Group's strategy.

The attendance records of each Nomination Committee member are set out in the above section A7 headed "Directors' Attendance Records at Meetings".

#### C. RISK MANAGEMENT AND INTERNAL CONTROLS

The Board acknowledges its responsibility for the risk management and internal control systems and reviewing their effectiveness to safeguard the interests of the Shareholders and the assets of the Group. The Audit Committee assists the Board in leading the management and overseeing their design, implementation and monitoring of the risk management and internal control systems on an ongoing basis. At the same time, the Group endeavours to identify risks, control impact of the identified risks and facilitate implementation of coordinated mitigating measures. The risk management and internal control systems are compatible with the Committee of Sponsoring Organisations of the Treadway Commission (COSO) – Integrated Framework 2013 principles. They are designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failures in order to achieve business objectives, and can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Group has established a risk management policy which sets out the process of identification, evaluation and management of the principal risks affecting the business.

- 1. Each division is responsible for identifying and assessing principal risks within the division on a quarterly basis establishing mitigation plans to manage the risks identified;
- 2. The management is responsible for overseeing the Group's risk management and internal control activities, attending quarterly meetings with each division to ensure principal risks are properly managed, and new or changing risks are identified and documented;
- 3. The Board is responsible for reviewing and approving the effectiveness and adequacy of the Group's risk management and internal controls systems.

The risk management framework, coupled with our internal controls, ensures that the risks associated with our different business units are effectively controlled in line with the Group's risk appetite.

Our independent internal control consultant has performed an assessment on our internal control systems including reviewing guidelines and policies which are implemented through our operational process. An internal audit function is set up to examine key issues in relation to the financial and operational matters/ practices and to provide its findings and any recommendations for improvement to the Audit Committee.

The Board has the responsibility to maintain the adequacies of resources, and to enhance qualifications and experiences of staff by providing training programs. The Board concluded that the Group's risk management and internal control systems were in place and effective.

With respect to the monitoring and disclosure of inside information, the Group has adopted a disclosure policy which provides a general guide to the Company's Directors, senior management and relevant employees in handling confidential information, monitoring information disclosure and responding to enquiries. Control procedures have been implemented to ensure that unauthorised access and use of inside information are strictly prohibited.

#### D. DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITY IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Directors have acknowledged their responsibility for preparing the Consolidated Financial Statements.

The Board is responsible for presenting a balanced, clear and understandable assessment of annual and interim reports, inside information announcements and other disclosures required under the GEM Listing Rules and other regulatory requirements. The management has provided such explanation and information to the Board as necessary to enable the Board to make an informed assessment of the financial information and position of the Group put forward to the Board for approval.

The Directors are not aware of any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The statement of the external auditors of the Company about their reporting responsibilities on the Consolidated Financial Statements is set out in the section headed "Independent Auditors' Report" in this annual report.

There is no disagreement between the Board and the Audit Committee on the selection, appointment, resignation or dismissal of external auditors.

#### E. DIVERSITY AT WORKFORCE

The Company believes creating a culture of diversity and inclusion helps the employees to unleash their potentials. The Company values staff diversity in the workplace, and therefore provide equal opportunities for all applicants and employees regardless of race, colour, national origin, religion, gender, marital status, age, sexual orientation, and disability. The Company is committed to treating all employees with fairness and respect. Employees are hired based on their abilities and merits. The Company treats everyone the same regardless of their background, religions, races and gender etc. The promotion within the Company is completely based on the performance of the individual but nothing else.

As at 31 December 2023, the gender ratio of the Company's and its controlling subsidiaries' workforce (including directors, senior management and other staff) was 98% male to 100% female (31 December 2022: 90% to 100%). Therefore, there were less male workforce than female workforce but the gap difference was reduced. To cope with the female-tilted workforce, the Company will provide more training to attract male employees to work in the service industry. The Group will strive to maintain a balance between the number of male and female employees to narrow the gap between the workforce of the two genders, taking into account our overall development plan and strategy and needs of our clients.

Board members and senior staff will be available to answer questions raised by the Shareholders at general meetings of the Company, where the Board and the Company can solicit and understand the views of the Shareholders and stakeholders. The Company will also invite representatives of the auditors to attend its AGM to answer Shareholders' questions about the conduct of the audit, the preparation and content of the auditors' report, the accounting policies and auditors' independence, if any.

The Board has reviewed the implementation and effectiveness of the Shareholders' communication policy, and having considered the multiple channels of communication and engagement in place, it is satisfied that the shareholders' communication policy has been implemented during the Reporting Period and is effective.

In addition, the Company maintains a website at www.hetermedia.com as a communication platform with its Shareholders and investors, where information and updates on the Company's business developments and operations and other information are available for public access.

#### I. SHAREHOLDERS' RIGHTS

To safeguard Shareholders' interests and rights, separate resolution is proposed for each substantially separate issue at general meetings, including the election of individual Director. All resolutions put forward at general meetings will be voted on by poll pursuant to the GEM Listing Rules and poll results will be posted on the website of the Stock Exchange as well as the Company's website after each general meeting.

Shareholders may put forward proposals at general meetings by requesting an extraordinary general meeting ("EGM").

Pursuant to the Articles, an EGM can be convened on the requisition of one or more Shareholders holding, at the date of deposit of the requisition, not less than one tenth of the paid up capital of the Company having the right of voting at general meetings. Such requisition shall be made in writing to the Board or the secretary of the Company at the Company's principal place of business in Hong Kong (currently 9/F, Infinitus Plaza, 199 Des Voeux Road Central, Hong Kong) for the purpose of requiring an EGM to be called by the Board for the transaction of any business specified in such requisition. Such meeting shall be held within two months after the deposit of such requisition. If within 21 days of such deposit, the Board fails to proceed to convene such meeting, the requisitionist(s) himself/herself (themselves) may do so in the same manner, and all reasonable expenses incurred by the Company.

With respect to the Shareholders' right in proposing persons for election as Directors, please refer to the procedures available on the website of the Company.

#### J. CONSTITUTIONAL DOCUMENTS

With effect from 1 January 2022, the Stock Exchange has amended Appendix 3 of the GEM Listing Rules to adopt a uniform set of 14 Core Standards (the "Core Standards") for shareholder protection for issuers. The Board thus has proposed to amend the memorandum and articles of association of the Company to adopt the second amended and restated memorandum and articles of association of the Company (the "New M&A") in order to (i) conform to the Core Standards set out in Appendix 3 of the GEM Listing Rules which took effect from 1 January 2022; (ii) allow the Company to hold hybrid and electronic meetings; and (iii) reflect certain updates in relation to the applicable laws of the Cayman Islands and the GEM Listing Rules and make other housekeeping amendments (collectively, the "Proposed Amendments"). The proposed adoption of the New M&A was subject to the approval of the Shareholders by way of a special resolution at the annual general meeting of the Company held on 9 May 2023 ("2023 AGM"). The special resolution relating to the Proposed Amendments was duly passed at the 2023 AGM and the New M&A came into effect on the conclusion of the 2023 AGM. For details of the New M&A, please refer to the announcement of the Company dated 17 March 2023, the circular of the Company dated 29 March 2023 and the poll results announcement of the 2023 AGM of the Company dated 9 May 2023. An up-to-date version of such Memorandum and Articles of Association is available on the website of the Stock Exchange and the Company's website. Shareholders may refer to the Articles for further details of the rights of Shareholders.

#### K. POLICIES RELATING TO SHAREHOLDERS

The Company has in place a Shareholders' communication policy to ensure that Shareholders' views and concerns are appropriately addressed. Such Policy is regularly reviewed to ensure its effectiveness.

The Company has adopted a dividend policy on payment of dividends. The Company does not have any predetermined dividend payout ratio. Depending on the financial conditions of the Company and the Group and the conditions and factors as set out in the dividend policy, dividends may be proposed and/ or declared by the Board for a financial year or period and any final dividend for a financial year will be subject to the Shareholders' approval.

#### L. ANTI-CORRUPTION AND WHISTLEBLOWING POLICIES

The Group has established the Anti-Bribery and Corruption Policy and Whistleblowing System for the Board members, management, employees and third parties who represent the Group, such as suppliers, contractors and business partners, to ensure the Group and the relevant stakeholders will uphold the highest standards of professional integrity. The Whistleblowing System not only can further strengthen the internal control environment of the Group, it also acts as a channel for the staff of the Group to report any illegal behaviours, and is dedicated to external stakeholders to report any suspected misconduct, malpractice or illegal acts.

The Group recognised revenue of approximately HK\$178,624,000 from provision of integrated printing services for the year ended 31 December 2023.

Revenue from provision of integrated printing services is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation using input method as the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date. Management used significant judgements and estimations to determine the progress towards complete satisfaction of the performance obligation at the reporting date. Our procedures in relation to revenue recognition mainly included but not limited to:

- Inspecting quotations and agreements with customers to understand the terms of the provision of integrated printing services to assess the Group's revenue recognition criteria with reference to the requirements of the prevailing accounting standards;
- Assessing the Group's revenue recognition is based on a reasonable measurement of the value of performance completed to date of the individual contract as a percentage of total transaction price; and
- Checking the accuracy of the incurred costs to date and assessing judgements and estimates about budgeted costs to complete and expected gross profits.

Based on the procedures performed, we consider the revenue recognition to be supported by the available evidence.

#### 1. GENERAL

The Company was incorporated in the Cayman Islands on 13 January 2016 as an exempted company with limited liability. Its parent and ultimate holding company is HM Ultimate Holdings Limited, a company incorporated in the British Virgin Islands ("BVI") and owned by Mr. Yu Chi Ming ("Mr. Yu") and Mr. Chan Wai Lin ("Mr. Chan"). The Company has been registered as a non-Hong Kong company under Part 16 of the Companies Ordinance (Cap. 622). Its shares were initially listed on GEM of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange").

The address of the registered office of the Company is Windward 3, Regatta Office Park, PO Box 1350, Grand Cayman KY1-1108, Cayman Islands and the principal place of business is 9/F, Infinitus Plaza, 199 Des Voeux Road Central, Hong Kong. The Company is an investment holding company. The Group is principally engaged in the provision of integrated printing services (including provision of financial printing services, marketing collateral printing services and other services).

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Hong Kong Dollars ("HK\$"), which is also the functional currency of the Company and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand ("HK\$'000") unless otherwise stated.

In accordance with the transition provision:

- (i) the Group has applied the new accounting policy retrospectively to leasing transactions that occurred on or after 1 January 2022;
- (ii) the Group also, as at 1 January 2022, recognised a deferred tax asset (to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilised) and a deferred tax liability for all deductible and taxable temporary difference associated with right-of-use-assets and lease liabilities.

The application of the amendments has had no material impact on the Group's financial position and performance, except that the Group discloses the related deferred tax assets of approximately HK\$1,172,000 and deferred tax liabilities of approximately HK\$1,172,000 on a gross basis but it has no impact on the retained earnings at the earliest period presented.

Change in accounting policy as a result of application of the HKICPA guidance on the accounting implications of the abolition of the Mandatory Provident Fund ("MPF") – Long Service Payment ("LSP") offsetting mechanism in Hong Kong

The Group has several subsidiaries operating in Hong Kong which are obliged to pay LSP to employees under certain circumstances. Meanwhile, the Group makes mandatory MPF contributions to the trustee who administers the assets held in a trust solely for the retirement benefits of each individual employee. Offsetting of LSP against an employee's accrued retirement benefits derived from employers' MPF contributions was allowed under the Employment Ordinance (Cap.57). In June 2022, the Government of the HKSAR gazetted the Employment and Retirement Schemes Legislation (Offsetting Arrangement) (Amendment) Ordinance 2022 (the "Amendment Ordinance") which abolishes the use of the accrued benefits derived from employers' mandatory MPF contributions to offset severance payment and LSP (the "Abolition"). The Abolition will officially take effect on 1 May 2025 (the "Transition Date"). In addition, under the Amendment Ordinance, the last month's salary immediately preceding the Transition Date (instead of the date of termination of employment) is used to calculate the portion of LSP in respect of the employment period before the Transition Date.

In July 2023, the HKICPA published "Accounting implications of the abolition of the MPF-LSP offsetting mechanism in Hong Kong" which provides guidance for the accounting for the offsetting mechanism and the impact arising from abolition of the MPF-LSP offsetting mechanism in Hong Kong. In light of this, the Group has implemented the guidance published by the HKICPA in connection with the LSP obligation retrospectively so as to provide more reliable and more relevant information about the effects of the offsetting mechanism and the Abolition.

By following the Guidance, the Group has therefore changed its accounting policy and ceased to apply the practical expedient and reattribute the deemed employee contributions on a straight-line basis from the date when services by employee first lead to their benefits in terms of the LSP legislation in accordance with HKAS 19 paragraph 93(a). The cumulative effect of recognised these adjustments as of 31 December 2022 and for the year ended 31 December 2023 was not material and hence no material impact has had on the retained earnings, or another component of equity for the prior periods and current year.

#### 3.1 Basis of preparation of consolidated financial statements

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA. For the purpose of preparation to the consolidated financial statements, information is considered material if such information is reasonably expected to influence decisions made by primary users. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on GEM of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited ("Listing Rules") and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The directors of the Company have, at the time of approving the consolidated financial statements, a reasonable expectation that the Group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the consolidated financial statements.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these consolidated financial statements is determined on such a basis, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of HKFRS 2 *Share-based Payment*, leasing transactions that are accounted for in accordance with HKFRS 16 *Leases*, and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in HKAS 2 *Inventories* or value in use in HKAS 36 *Impairment of Assets*.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs are inputs, other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

#### 3.2 Material accounting policy information

#### Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Company:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

When the Group has less than a majority of the voting rights of an investee, it has power over the investee when the voting rights are sufficient to give it the practical ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee unilaterally. The Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether or not the Group's voting rights in an investee are sufficient to give it power, including:

- the size of the Group's holding of voting rights relative to the size and dispersion of holdings of the other vote holders;
- potential voting rights held by the Group, other vote holders or other parties;
- rights arising from other contractual arrangements; and
- any additional facts and circumstances that indicate that the Group has, or does not have, the current ability to direct the relevant activities at the time that decisions need to be made, including voting patterns at previous shareholders' meetings.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date when the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Profit or loss and each item of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests. Total comprehensive income of subsidiaries is attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

When necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies into line with the Group's accounting policies.

All intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

Non-controlling interest in subsidiaries are presented separately from the Group's equity therein, which represent present ownership interests entitling their holders to a proportionate share of net assets of the relevant subsidiaries upon liquidation.

## 3.2 Material accounting policy information (continued)

## Business combinations

Acquisitions of businesses are accounted for using the acquisition method. The consideration transferred in a business combination is measured at fair value, which is calculated as the sum of the acquisition-date fair values of the assets transferred by the Group, liabilities incurred by the Group to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the Group in exchange for control of the acquiree. Acquisition-related costs are generally recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Except for certain recognition exemptions, the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed must meet the definitions of an asset and a liability in the *Framework for the Preparation and Presentation of Financial Statements* (replaced by the *Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting* issued in October 2010).

At the acquisition date, the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed are recognised at their fair value, except that:

- deferred tax assets or liabilities, and assets or liabilities related to employee benefit arrangements are recognised and measured in accordance with HKAS 12 *Income Taxes* and HKAS 19 *Employee Benefits* respectively;
- liabilities or equity instruments related to share-based payment arrangements of the acquiree or share-based payment arrangements of the Group entered into to replace share-based payment arrangements of the acquiree are measured in accordance with HKFRS 2 *Share-based Payment* at the acquisition date (see the accounting policy below);
- assets (or disposal groups) that are classified as held for sale in accordance with HKFRS 5 Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations are measured in accordance with that standard; and
- lease liabilities are recognised and measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments (as defined in HKFRS 16) as if the acquired leases were new leases at the acquisition date. Right-of-use assets are recognised and measured at the same amount as the relevant lease liabilities, adjusted to reflect favourable or unfavourable terms of the lease when compared with market terms.

Goodwill is measured as the excess of the sum of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree, and the fair value of the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquiree (if any) over the net amount of the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed as at acquisition date. If, after re-assessment, the net amount of the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed exceeds the sum of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree and the fair value of the acquirer's previously held interest in the acquiree (if any), the excess is recognised immediately in profit or loss as a bargain purchase gain.

Non-controlling interests that are present ownership interests and entitle their holders to a proportionate share of the relevant subsidiary's net assets in the event of liquidation are initially measured at the non-controlling interests' proportionate share of the recognised amounts of the acquiree's identifiable net assets or at fair value.

When the consideration transferred by the Group in a business combination includes a contingent consideration arrangement, the contingent consideration is measured at its acquisition-date fair value and included as part of the consideration transferred in a business combination. Changes in the fair value of the contingent consideration that qualify as measurement period adjustments are adjusted retrospectively. Measurement period adjustments are adjustments that arise from additional information obtained during the "measurement period" (which cannot exceed one year from the acquisition date) about facts and circumstances that existed at the acquisition date.

The subsequent accounting for the contingent consideration that do not qualify as measurement period adjustments depends on how the contingent consideration is classified. Contingent consideration that is classified as equity is not remeasured at subsequent reporting dates and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity. Contingent consideration that is classified as an asset or a liability is remeasured to fair value at subsequent reporting dates, with the corresponding gain or loss being recognised in profit or loss.

When a business combination is achieved in stages, the Group's previously held equity interest in the acquiree is remeasured to fair value at the acquisition date (i.e. the date when the Group obtains control), and the resulting gain or loss, if any, is recognised in profit or loss or other comprehensive income, as appropriate. Amounts arising from interests in the acquiree prior to the acquisition date that have previously been recognised in other comprehensive income and measured under HKFRS 9 would be accounted for on the same basis as would be required if the Group had disposed directly of the previously held equity interest.

## 3.2 Material accounting policy information (continued)

## Business combinations (continued)

If the initial accounting for a business combination is incomplete by the end of the reporting period in which the combination occurs, the Group reports provisional amounts for the items for which the accounting is incomplete. Those provisional amounts are adjusted retrospectively during the measurement period (see above), and additional assets or liabilities are recognised, to reflect new information obtained about facts and circumstances that existed at the acquisition date that, if known, would have affected the amounts recognised at that date.

### Goodwill

Goodwill arising on an acquisition of a business is carried at cost as established at the date of acquisition of the business (see the accounting policy above) less accumulated impairment losses, if any.

For the purposes of impairment testing, goodwill is allocated to each of the Group's cashgenerating units (or group of cash-generating units) that is expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, which represent the lowest level at which the goodwill is monitored for internal management purposes and not larger than an operating segment.

A cash-generating unit (or group of cash-generating units) to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment annually or more frequently when there is indication that the unit may be impaired. For goodwill arising on an acquisition in a reporting period, the cash-generating unit (or group of cash-generating units) to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment before the end of that reporting period. If the recoverable amount is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit (or group of cash-generating units).

On disposal of the relevant cash-generating unit or any of the cash-generating unit within the group of cash-generating units, the attributable amount of goodwill is included in the determination of the amount of profit or loss on disposal. When the Group disposes of an operation within the cash-generating unit (or a cash-generating unit within a group of cash-generating units), the amount of goodwill disposed of is measured on the basis of the relative values of the operation (or the cash-generating unit) disposed of and the portion of the cash-generating unit (or the group of cash-generating units) retained.

The Group's policy for goodwill arising on the acquisition of an associate and a joint venture is described below.

#### Investment in an associate and a joint venture

An associate is an entity over which the Group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint arrangement. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The results and assets and liabilities of associate and joint venture are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting. The financial statements of an associate and joint venture used for equity accounting purposes are prepared using uniform accounting policies as those of the Group for like transactions and events in similar circumstances. Under the equity method, an investment in an associate or a joint venture is initially recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the associate or joint venture. Changes in net assets of the associate/joint venture other than profit or loss and other comprehensive income are not accounted for unless such changes resulted in changes in ownership interest held by the Group. When the Group's share of losses of an associate or joint venture exceeds the Group's interest in that associate or joint venture (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the associate or joint venture), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate or joint venture.

An investment in an associate or a joint venture is accounted for using the equity method from the date on which the investee becomes an associate or a joint venture. On acquisition of the investment in an associate or a joint venture, any excess of the cost of the investment over the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities of the investee is recognised as goodwill, which is included within the carrying amount of the investment. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of the investment, after reassessment, is recognised immediately in profit or loss in the period in which the investment is acquired.

## 3.2 Material accounting policy information (continued)

### Investment in an associate and a joint venture (continued)

The Group assesses whether there is an objective evidence that the interest in an associate or a joint venture may be impaired. When any objective evidence exists, the entire carrying amount of the investment (including goodwill) is tested for impairment in accordance with HKAS 36 as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs of disposal) with its carrying amount. Any impairment loss recognised is not allocated to any asset, including goodwill, that forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with HKAS 36 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

When the Group ceases to have significant influence over an associate or joint control over a joint venture, it is accounted for as a disposal of the entire interest in the investee with a resulting gain or loss being recognised in profit or loss. When the Group retains an interest in the former associate or joint venture and the retained interest is a financial asset within the scope of HKFRS 9, the Group measures the retained interest at fair value at that date and the fair value is regarded as its fair value on initial recognition. The difference between the carrying amount of the associate or joint venture and the fair value of any retained interest and any proceeds from disposing the relevant interest in the associate or joint venture is included in the determination of the gain or loss on disposal of the associate or joint venture. In addition, the Group accounts for all amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in relation to that associate or joint venture on the same basis as would be required if that associate or joint venture had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities. Therefore, if a gain or loss previously recognised in other comprehensive income by that associate or joint venture would be reclassified to profit or loss on the disposal of the related assets or liabilities, the Group reclassifies the gain or loss from equity to profit or loss (as a reclassification adjustment) upon disposal/partial disposal of the relevant associate or joint venture.

The Group continues to use the equity method when an investment in an associate becomes an investment in a joint venture or an investment in a joint venture becomes an investment in an associate. There is no remeasurement to fair value upon such changes in ownership interests.

When the Group reduces its ownership interest in an associate or a joint venture but the Group continues to use the equity method, the Group reclassifies to profit or loss the proportion of the gain or loss that had previously been recognised in other comprehensive income relating to that reduction in ownership interest if that gain or loss would be reclassified to profit or loss on the disposal of the related assets or liabilities.

When a group entity transacts with an associate or a joint venture of the Group, profits and losses resulting from the transactions with the associate or joint venture are recognised in the Group's consolidated financial statements only to the extent of interests in the associate or joint venture that are not related to the Group.

#### Revenue from contracts with customers

The Group recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, i.e. when "control" of the goods or services underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to the customer.

A performance obligation represents a good and service (or a bundle of goods or services) that is distinct or a series of distinct goods or services that are substantially the same.

Control is transferred over time and revenue is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation if one of the following criteria is met:

- the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the Group's performance as the Group performs;
- the Group's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the Group performs; or
- the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

Otherwise, revenue is recognised at a point in time when the customer obtains control of the distinct good or service.

Contract assets arise when the Group has right to consideration in exchange for goods or services that the Group has transferred to a customer that is not yet unconditional. It is assessed for impairment in accordance with HKFRS 9. In contrast, a receivable represents the Group's unconditional right to consideration. i.e. only the passage of time is required before payment of that consideration is due.

Contract liabilities arise when the Group has obligation to transfer goods and services to a customer for which the Group has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer.

A contract asset and a contract liability relating to the same contract are accounted for and presented on a net basis.

Revenue is measured based on the consideration specified in a contract with customer. The Group recognises revenue when it transfers control of service to a customer.

## 3.2 Material accounting policy information (continued)

### Revenue from contracts with customers (continued)

The Group recognises revenue from provision of integrated printing services (including provision of financial printing services, marketing collateral printing services and other services) which arise from contracts with customers.

## *Provision of integrated printing services (including financial printing services, marketing collateral printing services and other services)*

The Group provides integrated printing services (including provision of financial printing services, marketing collateral printing services and other services) under contracts with customers. Such contracts are entered into before the services begin. Revenue from provision of financial printing services, marketing collateral printing services and other services is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation using input method as the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

#### Leases

#### Definition of a lease

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

For contracts entered into or modified on or after the date of initial application or arising from business combinations, the Group assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease based on the definition under HKFRS 16 at inception, modification date or acquisition date, as appropriate. Such contract will not be reassessed unless the terms and conditions of the contract are subsequently changed.

#### The Group as lessee

#### Allocation of consideration to components of a contract

For a contract that contains a lease component and one or more additional lease or non-lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components.

The Group also applies practical expedient not to separate non-lease components from lease component, and instead account for the lease component and any associated non-lease components as a single lease component.

### Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to leases of properties and equipment that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option. It also applies the recognition exemption for lease of low-value assets. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis or another systematic basis over the lease term.

### Right-of-use assets

The cost of right-of-use asset includes:

- the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability;
- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received;
- any initial direct costs incurred by the Group; and
- an estimate of costs to be incurred by the Group in dismantling and removing the underlying assets, restoring the site on which it is located or restoring the underlying asset to the condition required by the terms and conditions of the lease.

Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

Right-of-use assets in which the Group is reasonably certain to obtain ownership of the underlying leased assets at the end of the lease term are depreciated from commencement date to the end of the useful life. Otherwise, right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of its estimated useful life and the lease term.

The Group presents right-of-use assets as a separate line item on the consolidated statements of financial position.

#### Refundable rental deposits

Refundable rental deposits paid are accounted under HKFRS 9 *Financial Instruments* ("HKFRS 9") and initially measured at fair value. Adjustments to fair value at initial recognition are considered as additional lease payments and included in the cost of right-of-use assets.

## Leases (continued)

The Group as lessee (continued) Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of a lease, the Group recognises and measures the lease liability at the present value of lease payments that are unpaid at that date. In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses the incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date if the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable.

The lease payments include:

- fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable;
- variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date;
- amounts expected to be payable by the Group under residual value guarantees;
- the exercise price of a purchase option if the Group is reasonably certain to exercise the option; and
- payments of penalties for terminating a lease, if the lease term reflects the Group exercising an option to terminate the lease.

After the commencement date, lease liabilities are adjusted by interest accretion and lease payments.

The Group remeasures lease liabilities (and makes a corresponding adjustment to the related rightof-use assets) whenever:

- the lease term has changed or there is a change in the assessment of exercise of a purchase option, in which case the related lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate at the date of reassessment.
- the lease payments change due to changes in expected payment under a guaranteed residual value, in which cases the related lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised lease payments using the initial discount rate.

The Group presents lease liabilities as a separate line item on the consolidated statements of financial position.

- the modification increases the scope of the lease by adding the right to use one or more underlying assets; and
- the consideration for the leases increases by an amount commensurate with the stand-alone price for the increase in scope and any appropriate adjustments to that stand-alone price to reflect the circumstances of the particular contract.

For a lease modification that is not accounted for as a separate lease, the Group remeasures the lease liability based on the lease term of the modified lease by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate at the effective date of the modification.

The Group accounts for the remeasurement of lease liabilities by making corresponding adjustments to the relevant right-of-use asset. When the modified contract contains a lease component and one or more additional lease or non-lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the modified contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components.

#### Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rates of exchange prevailing at the dates of the transactions. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items and on the retranslation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise, except for exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation), which are recognised initially in other comprehensive income and reclassified from equity to profit or loss on disposal or partial disposal of the Group's interest in an associate.

### Foreign currencies (continued)

For the purpose of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. HK\$) using exchange rates prevailing at the end of each reporting period. Income and expense items are translated at the average exchange rates for the period, unless exchange rates fluctuate significantly during that period, in which case the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of translation reserve (attributed to non-controlling interests as appropriate).

Goodwill and fair value adjustments on identifiable assets acquired arising on an acquisition of a foreign operation are treated as assets and liabilities of that foreign operation and translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the end of each reporting period. Exchange differences arising are recognised in other comprehensive income.

#### Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

Any specific borrowing that remain outstanding after the related asset is ready for its intended use or sale is included in the general borrowing pool for calculation of capitalisation rate on general borrowings. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

#### Government grants

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Group recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate. Specifically, government grants whose primary condition is that the Group should purchase, construct or otherwise acquire non-current assets are recognised as a deduction from the carrying amount of the relevant asset in the consolidated statement of financial position and transferred to profit or loss on a systematic and rational basis over the useful lives of the related assets.

Government grants related to income that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable. Such grants are presented under "other income".

#### Employee benefits

#### Retirement benefit costs

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are recognised as an expense when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

For defined benefit retirement benefit plans including the LSP under the Hong Kong Employment Ordinance, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each annual reporting period. In determining the present value of the Group's defined benefit obligations and the related current service cost and, where applicable, past service cost, the Group attributes benefit to periods of service under the plan's benefit formula. However, if an employee's service in later years will lead to a materially higher level of benefit than earlier years, the Group attributes the benefit on a straight-line basis from:

- (a) the date when service by the employee first leads to benefits under the plan (whether or not the benefits are conditional on further service) until
- (b) the date when further service by the employee will lead to no material amount of further benefits under the plan, other than from further salary increases.

Remeasurement, comprising actuarial gains and losses, the effect of the changes to the asset ceiling (if applicable) and the return on plan assets (excluding interest), is reflected immediately in the consolidated statement of financial position with a charge or credit recognised in other comprehensive income in the period in which they occur. Remeasurement recognised in other comprehensive income is reflected immediately in retained earnings and will not be reclassified to profit or loss.

Past service cost is recognised in profit or loss in the period of a plan amendment or curtailment and a gain or loss on settlement is recognised when settlement occurs. When determining past service cost, or a gain or loss on settlement, an entity shall remeasure the net defined benefit liability or asset using the current fair value of plan assets and current actuarial assumptions, reflecting the benefits offered under the plan and the plan assets before and after the plan amendment, curtailment or settlement, without considering the effect of asset ceiling (i.e. the present value of any economic benefits available in the form of refunds from the plan or reductions in future contributions to the plan).

Net interest is calculated by applying the discount rate at the beginning of the period to the net defined benefit liability or asset. However, if the Group remeasures the net defined benefit liability or asset before plan amendment, curtailment or settlement, the Group determines net interest for the remainder of the annual reporting period after the plan amendment, curtailment or settlement using the benefits offered under the plan and the plan assets after the plan amendment, curtailment or settlement and the discount rate used to remeasure such net defined benefit liability or asset, taking into account any changes in the net defined benefit liability or asset during the period resulting from contributions or benefit payments.

Defined benefit costs are categorised as follows:

- service cost (including current service cost, past service cost, as well as gains and losses on curtailments and settlements);
- net interest expense or income; and
- remeasurement.

The retirement benefit obligation recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position represents the actual deficit or surplus in the Group's defined benefit plans. Any surplus resulting from this calculation is limited to the present value of any economic benefits available in the form of refunds from the plans or reductions in future contributions to the plans.

Discretionary contributions made by employees or third parties reduce service cost upon payment of these contributions to the plan.

When the formal terms of the plans specify that there will be contributions from employees or third parties, the accounting depends on whether the contributions are linked to service, as follows:

- If the contributions are not linked to services (for example contributions are required to reduce a deficit arising from losses on plan assets or from actuarial losses), they are reflected in the remeasurement of the net defined benefit liability or asset.
- If contributions are linked to services, they reduce service costs. For the amount of contribution that is dependent on the number of years of service, the Group reduces service cost by attributing the contributions to periods of service using the attribution method required by HKAS 19 paragraph 70 for the gross benefits.

For LSP obligation, the Group accounts for the employer MPF contributions expected to be offset as a deemed employee contribution towards the LSP obligation in terms of HKAS 19.93(a) and it is measure on a net basis. The estimated amount of future benefit is determined after deducting the negative service cost arising from the accrued benefits derived from the Group's MPF contributions that have been vested with employees, which are deemed to be contributions from the relevant employees.

#### Share options granted to employees

Equity-settled share-based payments to employees and others providing similar services are measured at the fair value of the equity instruments at the grant date.

The fair value of the equity-settled share-based payments determined at the grant date without taking into consideration all non-market vesting conditions is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, based on the Group's estimate of equity instruments that will eventually vest, with a corresponding increase in equity (share option reserve). At the end of each reporting period, the Group revises its estimate of the number of equity instruments expected to vest based on assessment of all relevant non-market vesting conditions. The impact of the revision of the original estimates, if any, is recognised in profit or loss such that the cumulative expense reflects the revised estimate, with a corresponding adjustment to the share option reserve.

When share options are exercised, the amount previously recognised in share options reserve will be transferred to share premium. When the share options are forfeited after the vesting date or are still not exercised at the expiry date, the amount previously recognised in share-based payment reserve will be transferred to retained earnings.

Equity-settled share-based payment transactions (continued) Share award granted to employees

When the trustee of the share award scheme purchases the Company's shares from the open market, the consideration paid, including any directly attributable incremental costs, is presented as shares held under the share award scheme and deducted from total equity.

When the Company issue and allotment of new ordinary shares to the trustee of the share award scheme to be held on trust for the awardees, the fair value at the issue and allotment date, including any directly attributable incremental costs, is presented as shares held under the share award scheme and deducted from total equity.

The fair value of services received determined by reference to the fair value of shares awarded at the grant date is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, with a corresponding increase in equity (share award reserve). At the end of each reporting period, service and nonmarket performance vesting conditions are included in the estimation about the number of share awards that are expected to vest, the Group revises its estimate of the number of share awards that are expected to ultimately vest. The impact of the revision of the original estimates, if any, is recognised in profit or loss such that the cumulative expense reflects the revised estimate, with a corresponding adjustment to share award reserve.

When the trustee transfers the Company's shares to grantees upon vesting, the related costs of the granted shares vested are reversed from shares held for share award scheme. Accordingly, the related expense of the granted shares is reversed from the share award reserve. The difference arising from such transfer is debited/credited to retained profits.

When the share award scheme is cancelled during the vesting period, the Group accounts for the cancellation as an acceleration of vesting, and recognises immediately the amount that otherwise would have been recognised for services received over the remainder of the vesting period. The amount previously recognised in share award reserve will also be transferred to retained profits.

#### Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of current and deferred income tax expense.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from "profit before tax" because of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit and at the time of the transaction does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences. In addition, deferred tax liabilities are not recognised if the temporary differences in a difference arises from the initial recognised to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences. In addition, deferred tax liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of goodwill.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries and associates and interest in a joint venture, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the assets to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for leasing transactions in which the Group recognises the right-of-use assets and the related lease liabilities, the Group first determines whether the tax deductions are attributable to the right-of-use assets or the lease liabilities.

For leasing transactions in which the tax deductions are attributable to the lease liabilities, the Group applies HKAS 12 requirements to the lease liabilities, and the related assets separately. The Group recognises a deferred tax asset related to lease liabilities to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilised and a deferred tax liability for all taxable temporary differences.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied to the same taxable entity by the same taxation authority.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively. Where current tax or deferred tax arises from the initial accounting for a business combination, the tax effect is included in the accounting for the business combination.

#### Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment, including buildings held for use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes, are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of assets less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Intangible assets

#### Intangible assets acquired separately

Intangible assets with finite useful lives that are acquired separately are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses. Amortisation for intangible assets with finite useful lives is recognised on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful life and amortisation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate being accounted for on a prospective basis. Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives that are acquired separately are carried at cost less any subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

## Impairment on property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets and intangible assets other than goodwill

At the end of the reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets, intangible assets with finite useful lives to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the relevant asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets and intangible assets are estimated individually. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount individually, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. When a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash-generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash-generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, corporate assets are allocated to the relevant cash-generating unit when a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be established, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be established. The recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units to which the corporate asset belongs, and is compared with the carrying amount of the relevant cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. In assessing value- in-use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pretax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset (or a cash-generating unit) for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or a cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. For corporate assets or portion of corporate assets which cannot be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis to a cash-generating unit, the Group compares the carrying amount of a group of cash-generating units, including the carrying amounts of the corporate assets or portion of corporate assets allocated to that group of cash-generating units, with the recoverable amount of the group of cash-generating units. In allocating the impairment loss, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill (if applicable) and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit or the group of cash-generating units. The carrying amount of an asset is not reduced below the highest of its fair value less costs of disposal (if measurable), its value-in- use (if determinable) and zero. The amount of the impairment loss that would otherwise have been allocated to the asset is allocated pro rata to the other assets of the unit or the group of cash-generating units. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cashgenerating unit or a group of cash-generating units) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle that obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (where the effect of the time value of money is material).

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

#### Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value except for trade receivables arising from contracts with customers which are initially measured in accordance with HKFRS 15. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL")) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset or financial liability and of allocating interest income and interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts and payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset or financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition. Interest expense is recognised on an effective interest basis.

Interest income which are derived from the Group's ordinary course of business are presented as revenue.

#### Financial assets

All financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis where the purchase or sale of a financial asset is under a contract whose terms require delivery of financial asset within the time frame established by the market concerned.

All recognised financial assets are required to be subsequently measured at amortised cost or fair value on the basis of the Group's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

#### Classification of financial assets

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

#### Amortised cost and effective interest rate

The amortised cost of a financial asset is the amount at which the financial asset is measured at initial recognition minus the principal repayments, plus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount, adjusted for any loss allowance. On the other hand, the gross carrying amount of a financial asset is the amortised cost of a financial asset before adjusting for any loss allowance.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and of allocating interest income over the relevant period.

The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts and payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) excluding expected credit loss ("ECL"), through the expected life of the financial assets, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the gross carrying amount of the financial assets on initial recognition.

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for debt instruments measured subsequently at amortised cost. For financial instruments, other than purchased or originated credit-impaired financial assets, interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired. For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset from the next reporting period. If, in subsequent reporting periods, the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset.

#### Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises a loss allowance for ECL on financial assets and other assets which are subject to impairment assessment under HKFRS 9 (including contract assets, trade and other receivables, amount due from a joint venture, pledged bank deposits and bank balances). The amount of ECL is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL represents the ECL that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the relevant instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date. Assessment are done based on the Group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current conditions at the reporting date as well as the forecast of future conditions.

The Group always recognises lifetime ECL for trade receivables and contract assets and assesses the lifetime ECL for trade receivables and contract assets on a collective basis for portfolio that shares similar economic risk characteristics.

For all other financial instruments, the Group measures the loss allowance equal to 12-month ECL, unless when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, in which case the Group recognises lifetime ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition.

Significant increase in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the Group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly:

- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the financial instrument's external (if available) or internal credit rating;
- significant deterioration in external market indicators of credit risk, e.g. a significant increase in the credit spread, the credit default swap prices for the debtor;
- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor; and
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the Group presumes that the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

Despite the aforegoing, the Group assumes that the credit risk on a debt instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition if the financial asset is determined to have low credit risk at the reporting date. A financial asset is determined to have low credit risk if (i) it has a low risk of default; (ii) the borrower has a strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term; and (iii) adverse changes in economic and business conditions in the longer term may, but will not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations. The Group considers a debt instrument to have low credit risk when it has an internal or external credit rating of "investment grade" as per globally understood definitions.

The Group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify where there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in the credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

## Definition of default

The Group considers the following as constituting an event of default for internal credit risk management purposes as historical experience indicates that receivables that meet either of the following criteria are generally not recoverable:

- when there is a breach of financial covenants by the counterparty; or
- information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the debtor is unlikely to pay its creditors, including the Group, in full (without taking into account any collaterals held by the Group).

Irrespective of the above, the Group considers that default has occurred when a financial asset is more than 90 days past due unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

- the disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.

#### Write-off policy

The Group writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the counterparty is no realistic prospect of recovery, e.g. when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings, or in the case of trade receivables, when the amounts are over two years past due, whichever occurs sooner. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Group's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. A write-off constitutes a derecognition event. Any subsequent recoveries are recognised in profit or loss.

#### Measurement and recognition of ECL

The measurement of ECL is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based on historical data and forward-looking information.

Generally, the ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at the effective interest rate determined at initial recognition.

The Group recognises an impairment gain or loss in profit or loss for all financial instruments by adjusting their carrying amount, with the exceptions of trade receivables and contract assets where the correspondence adjustment is recognised through a loss allowance account.

Where ECL is measured on a collective basis to cater for cases where evidence at the individual instrument level may not yet be available, the financial instruments are grouped on the following basis:

The grouping is regularly reviewed by management to ensure the constituents of each group continue to share similar credit risk characteristics.

If the Group has measured the loss allowance for a financial instrument at an amount equal to lifetime ECL in the previous reporting period, but determines at the current reporting date that the conditions for lifetime ECL are no longer met, the Group measures the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month ECL at the current reporting date.

## Foreign exchange gains and losses

For financial liabilities that are denominated in a foreign currency and are measured at amortised cost at the end of each reporting period, the foreign exchange gains and losses are determined based on the amortised cost of the instruments. These foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in the 'Other income and gains/(losses)' line item in profit or loss (note 6) as part of net foreign exchange gains/(losses) for financial liabilities that are not part of a designated hedging relationship. For those which are designated as a hedging instrument for a hedge of foreign currency risk, foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in a separate component of equity.

The fair value of financial liabilities denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate at the end of the reporting period. For financial liabilities that are measured as at FVTPL, the foreign exchange component forms part of the fair value gains or losses and is recognised in profit or loss for financial liabilities that are not part of a designated hedging relationship.

On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

The Group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

## 4. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Group's accounting policies, which are described in Note 3.2, the directors of the Company are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised if the revisions affect only that period, or in the period of the revisions and future periods if the revisions affect both current and future periods.

The following are the key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period that may have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

### **Revenue recognition**

The Group recognises contract revenue of a service contract is dependent on management's estimation of the progress of satisfaction of performance obligations of a service contract over time, measured by the value of performance completed to date of the individual contract as a percentage of total transaction price. Because of the nature of the activity undertaken by the Group, the Group reviews and revises the estimates of contract revenue and contract costs, prepared for each service contract as the contract progresses. Budgeted contracts costs are prepared by management on the basis of quotations provided by the vendors involved and the experience of management. In order to keep the budget accurate and up to-date, management conducts periodic reviews of the budgeted contract costs and revises the budgeted contract costs as appropriate.

Significant judgement is required in estimating the value of performance completed, contract revenue and contract costs which may have an impact on percentage of completion of the service contract and the corresponding contract revenue and profit to be recognised in an accounting period. In addition, the actual outcome in terms of total revenue or costs may be higher or lower than estimation at the end of the reporting period, which would affect the revenue and profit recognised in future years as an adjustment to the amounts recorded to date.

## 4. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY (CONTINUED)

## Impairment of trade and other receivables and contract assets

The Group estimates the amount of loss allowance for ECL on trade receivables and contract assets based on the credit risk and past due status of trade receivables. The loss allowance amount is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows with the consideration of expected future credit loss. The assessment of the credit risk involves high degree of estimation and uncertainty. When the actual future cash flows are less than expected or more than expected, a material impairment loss or a material reversal of impairment loss may arise accordingly.

### Impairment assessment for goodwill

The Group tests whether goodwill have suffered any impairment in accordance with the accounting policy stated in Note 3.2. Determining whether goodwill are impaired requires an estimate of the valuein-use of the asset. Estimating the value-in-use requires the Group to make an estimate of the expected future cash flows from the assets and also choose a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows. Where the actual future cash flows are less than expected, a material impairment loss may arise.

Such services are recognised as a performance obligation satisfied over time as the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date. Revenue is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation using input method.

# Transaction price allocated to the remaining performance obligations for contracts with customers

Provision of financial printing services, marketing collateral printing services and other services are typically provided for a period of one year. As permitted under HKFRS 15, the transaction price allocated to these unsatisfied contracts is not disclosed.

HKFRS 8 *Operating Segments*, requires identification and disclosure of operating segment information based on internal financial reports that are regularly reviewed by the executive directors of the Company, being the chief operating decision maker, for the purpose of resources allocation and performance assessment. On this basis, the Group has determined that it only has one operating segment which is the provision of integrated printing services.

## Geographical information

In addition, the Group's revenue is substantially generated in Hong Kong and the Group's assets and liabilities are also substantially located in Hong Kong. Accordingly, the Group does not present separately segment information.

On 21 March 2018, the Hong Kong Legislative Council passed The Inland Revenue (Amendment) (No. 7) Bill 2017 (the "Bill") which introduces the two-tiered profits tax rates regime. The Bill was signed into law on 28 March 2018 and was gazetted on the following day. Under the two-tiered profits tax rates regime, the first HK\$2 million of profits of the qualifying group entity will be taxed at 8.25%, and profits above HK\$2 million will be taxed at 16.5%. The profits of group entities not qualifying for the two-tiered profits tax rates regime will continue to be taxed at a flat rate of 16.5%.

Accordingly, one of the subsidiaries of the Company subjected to the Hong Kong Profits Tax is calculated at 8.25% on the first HK\$2 million of the estimated assessable profits above HK\$2 million. Other subsidiaries of the Company are subjected to Hong Kong Profit Tax at the rate of 16.5% for the years ended 31 December 2023 and 2022.

For the years ended 31 December 2023 and 2022, pursuant to relevant PRC tax laws and regulations, the annual taxable income of a small low-profit enterprises that is not more than RMB1 million shall be included in its taxable income at the reduced rate of 12.5%, with the applicable enterprise income tax rate of 20%; and the annual taxable income that is not less than RMB1 million nor more than RMB3 million shall be included in its taxable income at the reduced rate of 25%, with the applicable enterprise income tax rate of 20% for the years ended 31 December 2023 and 2022.

Taxation arising in other jurisdiction is calculated at the rates prevailing in the relevant jurisdiction.

In August 2019, HM Investment Limited ("HM Investment"), an indirectly wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company, entered into the shareholders agreement with Wordbee, pursuant to which HM Investment has agreed to subscribe for, and Wordbee has agreed to allot and issue, an aggregate of 8,156 new ordinary shares, representing approximately 22.85% of the total issued shares of Wordbee after the issue of the subscription shares. The consideration of the acquisition is EUR1,000,000 (equivalent to approximately HK\$8,726,000), which is satisfied by (i) 4,078 ordinary shares at consideration of EUR500,000 on or before September 2019 and (ii) 4,078 ordinary shares at consideration of EUR500,000 on or before May 2020. In September 2019, HM Investment paid the first instalment of EUR500,000 (equivalent to approximately HK\$4,355,000) and subscribed 4,078 ordinary shares. During the financial year ended 31 December 2023, the Group entered into a loan agreement with a local bank wherein the latter will provide the Group with a credit facility with aggregate principal amount of HK\$1,200,000. The loan shall be for a term of 5 years from the date of initial borrowing, with interest of 1.75% per annum over Prime Rate quoted by the bank. Payment shall be in 60 monthly instalments on each principal repayment date commencing at the end of the first month from the date of initial borrowing. The Group's bank loans are guaranteed by the Hong Kong Mortgage Corporation Insurance Limited amounting to HK\$1,080,000 and personal guarantee by the director of the subsidiary, with unlimited amount.

### 23. BANK BORROWINGS (CONTINUED)

During the financial year ended 31 December 2022, the Group has entered into certain supplier finance arrangements with banks. Under these arrangements, the banks pay suppliers the amounts owed by the Group in advance of the original due dates offered by the suppliers. The Group's obligations to suppliers are legally extinguished on settlement by the relevant banks. The Group then settles with the banks between 60 days after settlement by the banks with interest ranges from 7.07%-8.78%, which may be extended beyond the original due dates of respective invoices. Taking into consideration of the nature and substance of the above arrangements, the Group presents payables to the banks under these arrangements as "Bank Borrowings" in the consolidated statement of financial position. The shares to be awarded under the Share Award Scheme (the "Awarded Shares") will either be acquired by the trustee of the Share Award Scheme (the "Trustee") from the open market or be new shares allotted and issued to the Trustee under general mandates granted by shareholders of the Company to the directors at general meetings of the Company from time to time. The Trustee will hold the Awarded Shares in trust for the awardees until such shares are vested with the awardees in accordance with the provisions of the Share Award Scheme. The Trustee shall not exercise the voting rights in respect of any shares held under the trust.

On 18 May 2023, the Group issued and allotted 21,415,000 new ordinary shares for Share Award Scheme to the Trustee. The total amount of the new issued and allotted shares was approximately HK\$2,034,000 and has been deducted from equity and such shares were classified as shares held for share award scheme. #### Defined contribution plans

The Group operates a Mandatory Provident Fund ("MPF") Scheme under rules and regulations of MPF Schemes Ordinance for all its employees in Hong Kong. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the Group, in funds under the control of trustees.

The employees of the Group's subsidiary in the PRC are members of a state-managed retirement benefit scheme operated by the government of the PRC. The subsidiary is required to contribute a specified percentage of payroll costs to the retirement benefit scheme to fund the benefits. The only obligation of the Group with respect to the retirement benefit scheme is to make the specified contributions.

### Defined contribution plans (continued)

As at 31 December 2023 and 2022, there were no forfeited contributions available to offset future employers' contributions to the schemes.

The total expense recognised in consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income amounted to approximately of HK\$3,791,000 (2022: approximately of HK\$3,336,000) represents contributions paid to these plans by the Group at rates specified in the rules of the plans. ### Obligation to pay LSP under Hong Kong Employment Ordinance (Chapter 57)

For the Group's subsidiaries operating in Hong Kong, pursuant to the Employment Ordinance, Chapter 57, the Group has the obligation to pay LSP to qualifying employees in Hong Kong under certain circumstances (e.g. dismissal by employers or upon retirement), subject to a minimum of 5 years employment period, based on the following formula:

Last monthly wages (before termination of employment)  $\times$  2/3  $\times$  Years of service

Last monthly wages are capped at HK\$22,500 while the amount of long service payment shall not exceed HK\$390,000. This obligation is accounted for as a post-employment defined benefit plan.

Furthermore, the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Ordinance passed in 1995 permits the Group to utilise the Group's mandatory MPF contributions, plus/minus any positive/negative returns thereof, for the purpose of offsetting LSP payable to an employee (the "Offsetting Arrangement').

The Amendment Ordinance was gazetted on 17 June 2022, which abolishes the use of the accrued benefits derived from employers' mandatory MPF contributions to offset the LSP. The Abolition will officially take effect on the Transition Date (i.e., 1 May 2025). Separately, the Government of the HKSAR is also expected to introduce a subsidy scheme to assist employers for a period of 25 years after the Transition Date on the LSP payable by employers up to a certain amount per employee per year.

Under the Amendment Ordinance, the Group's mandatory MPF contributions, plus/minus any positive/ negative returns, after the Transition Date can continue to be applied to offset the pre-Transition Date LSP obligation but are not eligible to offset the post-Transition Date LSP obligation. Furthermore, the LSP obligation before the Transition Date will be grandfathered and calculated based on the Last monthly wages immediately preceding the Transition Date and the years of service up to that date. The Amendment Ordinance does not have material impact for the Group for the prior periods and current year.

#### (b) Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Group's major financial instruments include trade and other receivables, pledged bank deposits, cash and bank balances, trade and other payables, amount due to a joint venture, bank borrowings and lease liabilities. Details of these financial instruments are disclosed in respective notes. The risks associated with these financial instruments and the policies on how to mitigate these risks are set out below. The management manages and monitors these exposures to ensure appropriate measures are implemented in a timely and effective manner.

The Group's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including foreign currency risk, interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk. The management has been monitoring these risk exposures to ensure appropriate measures are implemented in a timely and effective manner so as to mitigate or reduce such risks.

There has been no change to the types of the Group's exposure in respect of financial instruments or the manner in which it manages and measures the risks during both years.

#### Foreign currency risk management

As the assets and liabilities of the Group are mainly denominated in HK\$ as at 31 December 2023 and 2022, the management does not expect significant foreign currency exposure in relation to the exchange rate fluctuation between HK\$ and other currencies and the Group's income and operating cash flows are substantially independent of changes in foreign currency exchange.

The Group currently does not have a foreign exchange hedging policy. However, the management of the Group monitors foreign exposure and will consider hedging significant foreign exchange exposure should the need arises.



### (b) Financial risk management objectives and policies (continued)

#### Interest rate risk management

The Group is exposed to fair value interest rate risk in relation to bank borrowings and fixed-rate lease liabilities. The Group is not exposed to significant cash flow interest rate risk. The Group currently does not have interest rate hedging policy. However, the management monitors interest rate exposure and will consider hedging significant interest rate exposure should the need arise.

The Group's exposures to interest rates risk on financial liabilities are detailed in the liquidity risk management section of this note.

#### Credit risk management

The Group's credit risk is primarily attributable to trade and other receivables, contract assets, pledged bank deposits and bank balances. The Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which will cause a financial loss to the Group due to failure to discharge an obligation by the counterparties provided by the Group is arising from the carrying amount of the respective recognised financial assets as stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at the end of each of the reporting period.

In order to minimise the credit risk on trade receivables and contract assets, the management of the Group has delegated a team responsible for determination of credit limits, credit approvals and other monitoring procedures to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debts. The credit quality of the debtors is assessed based on their financial position, past experiences and other factors. The Group has policies in place to ensure credit terms are granted to reliable debtors. In addition, the Group reviews the recoverable amount of each individual trade debt by weekly basis and debt instrument at the end of each of the reporting period to ensure that adequate impairment losses are made for irrecoverable amounts. In this regard, the management of the Group considers that the credit risk is significantly reduced.

For other receivables, management of the Group makes periodic collective as well as individual assessment on the recoverability of other receivables based on historical settlement records and past experience. The management of the Group believes that there is no material credit risk inherent in the Group's outstanding balances of other receivables.

The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit ratings assigned by international credit-rating agencies or with good reputation.

The Group is also subject to concentration of credit risk arising from its trade receivables as 22% (2022: 41%) of these receivables are due from the Group's largest five customers as at 31 December 2023.

#### Credit risk management (continued)

The Group considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of asset and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk on an ongoing basis throughout each reporting period. To assess whether there is a significant increase in credit risk, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the asset as at the reporting date with the risk of default as at the date of initial recognition. It considers available reasonable and supportive forwarding-looking information.

#### Impairment of financial assets

The Group's trade receivables are subject to the expected credit loss model.

#### Trade receivables

The Group applies the HKFRS 9 simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance for all trade receivables.

To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on shared credit risk characteristics and the days past due.

The expected loss rates are based on the payment profiles of trade receivables over a period of 24 months before 31 December 2023 or 31 December 2022 respectively and the corresponding historical credit losses experienced within this period. The historical loss rates are adjusted to reflect current and forward-looking information on macroeconomic factors affecting the ability of the customers to settle the receivables. The Group has identified payment pattern, creditworthiness, the past collection history of each customer, the probability of insolvency or significant financial difficulties of the counterparty and default or significant delay in payments to be most relevant factors, and accordingly adjusts the historical loss rates based on expected changes in these factors.

## 37. LITIGATION

### Case 1

In July 2017, a writ of summons was issued against HM Services as a defendant by a customer (the "Plaintiff") for the claims of loss and damage by the allegation that HM Services had issued certain notices since 6 June 2016 without authority from the Plaintiff which contained untrue information, of which HM Services emphatically denied. The directors are in the view that there was a Court order dated 14 June 2016, which showed that the change of the Plaintiff's board of directors had not effectively taken place until and after 16 June 2016. Accordingly, HM Services had authority from the Plaintiff (controlled by the previous board of directors) to issue the alleged notices until 16 June 2016. HM Services has ceased to render further services to the Plaintiff after the change of her board of directors on and/or after 16 June 2016.

The Plaintiff is claiming loss and damage in an unknown amount caused by the above. It is estimated that if the claim was successful, the amount of loss/damage would be about HK\$200,000 to HK\$300,000. In the same action, HM Services was counter-claiming a sum of approximately HK\$163,000 plus interest amounted to approximately HK\$33,000 thereon, being fees for services already rendered to the Plaintiff. Up to the date of approval of these consolidated financial statements, the litigation is still ongoing. After consideration for the views of the Group's legal advisor, the directors are of the view that the above would have no material adverse effect. Accordingly, no provision has been made in these consolidated financial statements.



## 37. LITIGATION (CONTINUED)

### Case 2

In January 2024, a writ of summons was issued against i.Link as a defendant by a staff (the "Plaintiff") for the claims of loss and damage by the allegation that i.Link terminated the employment contract 1) without sufficient notice or payment in lieu of notice; 2) without any valid reason and in contravention of the Employment Ordinance; and 3) underpayment of the final payment of wages, which i.Link emphatically denied. The directors are in the view that there was a Labour Tribunal order dated 25 January 2024, which showed that the claims will be heard at Labour Tribunal on 17 June 2024.

It is estimated that if the claim was successful, the amount of loss/damage would be about HK\$140,000. After obtaining advises from legal advisor, i.Link only agreed a sum of approximately HK\$13,000, being underpayment of the severance pay or the long service pay for services already rendered by the Plaintiff. Up to the date of approval of these consolidated financial statements, the litigation is still ongoing and is too remote to assess the amount of loss/damage above. After consideration for the views of the Group's legal advisor, the directors are of the view that the above would have no material adverse effect. Accordingly, no provision has been made in these consolidated financial statements.
