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### **Chairman's Statement**

Affected by the global economic crisis, the retail market of Taiwan is still weak this year. The Group has taken a series of actions in promoting its sales. The revenue of the Group has increased by 5.4% this year and profit margin has been successfully maintained at 56.7%, almost the same as 2010. Although the loss of the Group has increased from HK\$47.6 million in 2010 to HK\$64.7 million in 2011, the increase is primarily resulted from the full year effect of the share-based compensation expenses of HK\$49.6 million (2010: HK\$34.8 million) in 2011. The share-based compensation expense is a non-cash item and it will not affect the profit and loss of the Group after the end of the vesting period of the share options granted in April 2010 and June 2010, which ends in April 2012 and June 2012 respectively.

The Group has established a joint venture company in 2011 with proposed principal business of design, assembling, processing and sales of premium wedge-shaped synthetic jade stone floor panels and related premium jade decoration products. The machineries are custom-made by and purchased from a manufacturer in Japan. Due to the 2011 Japan earthquake and various modifications of the specification of the machineries, the production plan has been postponed to the second half of 2012. The plant is now under construction and scheduled to be completed in July 2012. Once the machineries are imported from the Japan manufacturer, we will carry out test runs immediately. Assuming no further adjustments are required, the joint venture company will commence normal business operation in late 2012.

The Group will continue to strengthen the business of retailing of garments in Taiwan and accelerate the commencement of business operation of joint venture company. In addition to the premium synthetic jade stone floor panels business, the Group will continue to look for more business and investment opportunities to diversify the business of the Group and achieve substantial and sustainable financial growth for the Group and to maximize shareholder's value.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my deepest gratitude to all the shareholders, my fellow directors, management team and staff of the Group for their support and contributions to the Group throughout the year.

### **Management Discussion and Analysis**

Affected by the global economic crisis, the retail market of Taiwan is still weak this year. The Group has taken a series of actions in promoting its sales. The revenue of the Group has increased by 5.4% this year and profit margin has been successfully maintained at 56.7%, almost the same as 2010. Although the loss of the Group has increased from HK\$47.6 million in 2010 to HK\$64.7 million in 2011, the increase is primarily resulted from the full year effect of the share-based compensation expenses of HK\$49.6 million (2010: HK\$34.8 million) in 2011. The share-based compensation expense is a non-cash item and it will not affect the profit and loss of the Group after the end of the vesting period of the share options granted in April 2010 and June 2010, which ends in April 2012 and June 2012 respectively.

The basic loss per share increased from HK1.31 cents for the year ended 31 December 2010 to HK1.77 cents for the year ended 31 December 2011.

### **Charges on Assets**

As at 31 December 2011, none of the Group's assets was charged or subject to any encumbrance.

### **Contingent Liabilities**

As at 31 December 2011, the Group had no material contingent liabilities.

### **Exposure to Fluctuations in Exchange Rates**

The Group's major monetary assets and liabilities are denominated in the functional currencies of the respective group entities, except for one other payable balance denominated in HK\$ of a group entity with New Taiwan Dollar ("TWD") as its functional currency. The equivalent amount of HK\$ of the other payable is HK\$16,441,000 (2010: HK\$17,113,000). Other than the other payable as stated above, the directors consider that the Group's exposure to foreign currency exchange risk is insignificant.

### **Liquidity and Financial Resources**

As at 31 December 2011, the Group had no bank and other borrowings.

As at 31 December 2011, the current ratio was 1.8. Based on the current cash position and available banking facilities, the Group should have sufficient liquidity to meet its operational needs.

### **Establishment of Joint Venture Company**

The Group has established a joint venture company in 2011 with proposed principal business of design, assembling, processing and sales of premium wedge-shaped synthetic jade stone floor panels and related premium jade decoration products. The plant is now under construction and scheduled to be completed in July 2012. During 2011, the joint venture company had not commenced its business operation.

### **Capital Expenditure**

The total capital expenditure of the Group for 2011 was approximately HK\$23.8 million, of which HK\$3.8 million was for addition of furniture, fixtures and other equipment and HK\$20 million was loan to a jointly controlled entity as a shareholder's loan for setting up the synthetic jade stone floor panels business in the PRC.

As at 31 December 2011, the Group has no material capital expenditure commitments.

### **Human Resources**

As at 31 December 2011, the Group had 13 employees in Hong Kong and 173 employees in Taiwan. Other than the competitive remuneration package offered to the employees, share options may also be granted to the selected employees based on the Group's performance. Details of the share options being granted and outstanding under the share option scheme are set out in the section "Share Option Scheme" on page 59 to 62.

### **Future Prospect**

The Group will continue to strengthen the business of retailing of garments in Taiwan and accelerate the commencement of business operation of the joint venture company. In addition to the premium synthetic jade stone floor panels business, the Group will continue to look for more business and investment opportunities to diversify the business of the Group and achieve substantial and sustainable financial growth for the Group and to maximize shareholder's value.

None of the directors of the Company or any of their associates or any shareholder (which to the knowledge of the directors of the Company own more than 5% of the Company's share capital) had any interests in the Group's five largest suppliers.

During the year, an aggregate amount of HK\$3.8 million has been charged by the Company to a related company, which the ultimate controlling shareholder is also the ultimate controlling shareholder of the company, in relation to sharing of certain administrative services expenses on a cost basis incurred on behalf of the related company. ### **Executive Directors**

**Mr. Wong Lik Ping**, aged 51, was appointed as executive director of the Company in 2009. He is also the Chairman of the Company. Mr. Wong has extensive experience and investments in a wide range of businesses including education, online examination and mine industry in the PRC. Mr. Wong has over 19 years' experience in trading business and financial industry and has held directorship with various private companies. Mr. Wong is currently also vice-chairman of Shougang Fushan Resources Group Limited (Stock Code: 639), a company whose shares are listed on the Main Board of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange"). Mr. Wong also holds directorships in the subsidiaries of the Group in Hong Kong and overseas.

**Mr. Cheung Wing Hong Shannon**, aged 39, has been appointed as executive director and chief executive officer of the Company in 2010. He has over 16 years' experience in corporate finance and banking. Before joining the Company, Mr. Cheung was the Managing Director, China, Global Banking, and Chief Representative Beijing of The Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation Limited. Mr. Cheung holds a bachelor degree in business from University of Calgary and is also a CFA charter holder of the CFA Institute. Mr. Cheung is also (i) a member of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference Shanghai, Committee; (ii) a member of the All-China Youth Federation; (iii) the Standing Committee member of the Central State Owned Enterprise Youth Federation; and (iv) the vice-chairman of China Inner Mongolia Youth League.

**Mr. Ma Chi Shing**, aged 42, was appointed as executive director and chief financial officer of the Company in 2009 and currently as member of the nomination committee of the Company. He has worked as an audit partner in KPMG with over 18 years' experience in auditing, accounting and corporate finance. Mr. Ma obtained a Degree of Master of Business Administration offered by Manchester Business School, The University of Manchester, England. Mr. Ma is a fellow member of Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants (HKICPA) and The Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA) and a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England & Wales (ICAEW). Mr. Ma also holds directorships in the subsidiaries of the Group in Hong Kong and overseas.

#### **Non-executive Director**

**Mr. Huang Bin**, aged 51, has been appointed as executive director and chief investment officer of the Company in 2009 and was redesignated as non-executive director of the Company in 2010. He has almost 21 years experience in financial sector in the PRC. From 1995 to 2000, he served in Salomon Brothers' Beijing Office as vice president and director. From 2000 to 2004, he was managing partner and co-founder of Mandarin Venture Partners. He also served as chief representative of Beijing Office of Lehman Brothers and Beijing Office of Citibank. Mr. Huang holds a bachelor degree from Harvard University, with major in Economics.

He is a Notary Public of Hong Kong, a China Appointed Attesting Offices and holder of Master Degree in Chinese and Comparative Law of City University of Hong Kong and Master Degree in Law of the People's University of the PRC. He also currently serves as (i) an executive director of Goldbond Group Holdings Limited (Stock Code: 172), a company whose shares are listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange and (ii) an independent non-executive director and members of the audit committee, nomination committee and remuneration committee of Shougang Fushan Resources Group Limited (Stock Code: 639), a company whose shares are listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange.

**Mr. Chan Pat Lam**, aged 64, was appointed as independent non-executive director of the Company in 2009 and currently as members of the audit committee, remuneration committee and nomination committee of the Company. He has over 35 years' experience in the field of international banking industry in Hong Kong, Macau and California. Currently, he is the assistant to the managing director of a private company, which is engaged in acting as an international container shipping agency in the Western region of Pearl River Delta. He is also the business advisor of a commercial bank in Macau and a partner of another private company, which is engaged in trading and wholesaling of grocery items. He also currently serves as an independent non-executive director and members of the audit committee, nomination committee and remuneration committee of Shougang Fushan Resources Group Limited (Stock Code: 639), a company whose shares are listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange.

**Mr. To Yan Ming, Edmond**, aged 40, was appointed as independent non-executive director of the Company in 2009 and currently as Chairman of the audit committee, the remuneration committee and nomination committee of the Company. He holds a bachelor degree in Commerce in Accounting from Curtin University of Technology in Western Australia. Mr. To is a practicing accountant and presently the director of Edmond To CPA Limited and Zhonglei (HK) CPA Company Limited. He is a member of both the CPA Australia and Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants. He worked for one of the international accounting firms, Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu and has over 11 years of experience in auditing, accounting, floatation and taxation matters. Mr. To was appointed as an independent non-executive director and chairmen of the audit committee and remuneration committee of China Vanguard Group Limited (Stock Code: 8156), which shares are listed on the GEM Board of the Stock Exchange. Mr. To is also an independent non-executive director, chairman of the audit committee and member of the remuneration committee of BEP International Holdings Limited (Stock Code: 2326) and an independent non-executive director, chairman of the audit committee of Wai Chun Group Holdings Limited (Stock Code: 1013) (both companies listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange).

**Mr. Tu Wen Chen, Arthur**, aged 51, joined the Group in 2000, is the general manager of Taiwan Vision Company Limited. He has extensive experience in corporate management and business operation in Taiwan. Prior to joining the Group, he worked as manager of several multinational companies engaging in wholesale and retail businesses.



### (a) Corporate Governance Practices

The Company is committed to maintain a high standard of corporate governance, holding the beliefs of transparency, independence, honesty and accountability, with a view to enhancing investors' confidence. The Company therefore strives to attain and maintain effective corporate governance practices and procedures. The Company has complied with all the code provisions and to certain extent of the recommended best practices set out in Appendix 14 Code on Corporate Governance Practices (the "CG Code") of the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Listing Rules") throughout the accounting year ended 31 December 2011.

#### (b) Directors' Securities Transactions

The Company has adopted the Model Code for Securities Transactions by Directors of Listed Issuers ("Model Code") set out in Appendix 10 of the Listing Rules as its own code of conduct regarding directors' securities transactions. The Company has made specific enquiries with all directors of the Company and each of them confirmed that they have complied with the Model Code during the year ended 31 December 2011.

#### (c) Board Composition and Board Practices

The composition of the board of directors of the Company (the "Board") is shown on page 8 of this report. As at 31 December 2011, the Board comprised of seven directors, including three executive directors, one non-executive director and three independent non-executive directors. One of the three independent non-executive directors has appropriate professional qualifications, or accounting or related financial management expertise. The primary responsibilities of the Board are to establish long term strategies, administrate and oversee the operations and financial policies and supervising management of the Group. The Board delegates day-to-day operations of the Company to the management of the Group and also instructs the management to implement the Board's decisions and resolutions. In addition, the Board has also delegated various responsibilities to the Audit Committee and the Remuneration Committee. The Company has received, from each of the independent non-executive directors, confirmation of his independence pursuant to Rules 3.13 of the Listing Rules. The Company considers all the independent non-executive directors are independent.

All directors (including non-executive directors) are subject to retirement by rotation once every three years and are subject to re-election in accordance with the Company's Bye-Laws and the CG Code. In accordance with the Company's Bye-Laws, newly appointed director(s) is/are required to retire and can offer themselves for reelection at the first general meeting following their appointment.

Details of backgrounds and qualifications of the directors are set out in the section of "Biographical Details of Directors and Senior Management".

### (c) Board Composition and Board Practices (continued)

In 2011, the Board held 4 meetings to discuss the Group's overall strategy, operation and financial performance. In any event, all directors were available for consultation by management from time to time during the year. The attendance of individual director to the Board meeting is set out below. Review of the Board composition is made regularly to ensure that it has a balance of expertise, skills and experience appropriate for the requirements of the business of the Company. The Company provides at least 14 days' notices of every Board meeting to all directors to give them an opportunity to attend. Board papers are circulated not less than 3 days before the Board meetings to enable the directors to make informed decisions on matters to be raised at the Board meetings.

During the financial year, the Company Secretary attended the regular Board meetings to advise on corporate governance and statutory compliance when necessary. Directors had full access to information on the Group and were able to seek independent professional advice whenever deemed necessary by the directors. The Company Secretary prepared minutes and kept records of matters discussed and decisions resolved at all Board meetings. All directors have access to the advice and services of the Company Secretary with a view to ensuring that Board procedures, and all applicable rules and regulations, are followed.

The Board, Audit Committee and Remuneration Committee had held 4, 2 and 1 meetings respectively in 2011.

### (d) Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

The roles of Chairman and Chief Executive Officer are separate and are not performed by the same individual to reinforce their independence and accountability. During 2011, Mr. Wong Lik Ping served as the Chairman of the Company and Mr. Cheung Wing Hong Shannon served as the Chief Executive Officer of the Company. The Chairman provides leadership for the Board. The Chief Executive Officer has overall chief executive responsibility for the Group's business development and day-to-day management generally. With the support of Executive Directors and the Company Secretary, the Chairman seeks to ensure that all Directors are properly briefed on issues arising at Board meetings and receive adequate and reliable information in a timely manner.

#### (e) Non-executive Director

Under code provision A.4.1 of the CG Code, non-executive director should be appointed for a specific term, subject to re-election. On each of 1 January 2011 and 1 January 2012, the Company has entered into service contracts with non-executive director of the Company for a term of one year. Their directorships of which are all subject to retirement by rotation and re-election at the annual general meeting of the Company in accordance with the Bye-laws of the Company.

#### (f) Remuneration Committee

The Company established a remuneration committee ("Remuneration Committee") in 2005 in accordance with the relevant requirements of the CG Code. The composition of the Remuneration Committee is shown on page 8 of this report. The Remuneration Committee comprises three independent non-executive directors, namely, Mr. To Yan Ming Edmond (Chairman of the Remuneration Committee), Mr. Kee Wah Sze and Mr. Chan Pat Lam. The members' attendance to the Remuneration Committee meeting is listed out on page 17. The role and function of the Remuneration Committee include the determination of the specific remuneration packages of all executive and non-executive directors, including benefits in kind, pension rights and compensation payments (such as compensation payable for loss or termination of their office or appointment), and to make recommendations to the board of the directors. The Remuneration Committee should consider factors such as the salaries index, time commitment and responsibilities of the directors.

Details of the directors' remuneration are set out in note 12 to the consolidated financial statements.

### (g) Nomination of Directors

During the year, the Board adopted the role and function of a nomination committee. Where vacancies exist at the Board or additional directors are considered necessary by the Board, candidates are proposed and put forward to the Board for consideration. In considering the nomination of a new Director, the Board will take into account the qualification, ability, working experience, leadership and professional ethics of the candidates. In determining the independence of directors, the Board follows the requirements set out in the Listing Rules.

The Company established a nomination committee ("Nomination Committee") on 20 March 2012. The Nomination Committee comprises of three independent non-executive directors and one executive director, namely Mr. To Yan Ming Edmond (Chairman of the Nomination Committee), Mr. Kee Wah Sze, Mr. Chan Pat Lam and Mr. Ma Chi Shing. The primary duties of the Nomination Committee are to review the structure, size and composition of the Board, identify individuals suitably qualified to become members of the Board, and assess the independence of independent non-executive directors and make recommendations to the Board on the appointment of directors and succession planning for directors, in particular the chairman and the chief executives.

### (h) Audit Committee

The Company has an Audit Committee which was established in accordance with the requirements of the Code of the Best Practice for the purposes of reviewing and supervising the Group's financial reporting process and internal controls. The written terms of reference which describe the authority and duties of the Audit Committee were prepared and adopted with reference to "A Guide for The Formation of An Audit Committee" published by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The primary roles and functions of the Audit Committee are to review and supervise the financial reporting process and internal controls systems of the Group. The Audit Committee is also responsible for considering the appointment of the external auditor and reviewing any nonaudit functions performed by the external auditor, including whether such non-audit functions would lead to any potential material adverse effect on the Company. The Audit Committee comprises three independent nonexecutive directors, namely Mr. To Yan Ming Edmond (Chairman of the Audit Committee), Mr. Kee Wah Sze and Mr. Chan Pat Lam. The members' attendance to the Audit Committee meeting is listed out on page 17. During the year ended 31 December 2011, the Audit Committee held two meetings to review the annual and interim results, to evaluate the Group's financial reporting process and to make recommendations to improve the Company's internal control system. Draft minutes were circulated to members of the Audit Committee within a reasonable time after each meeting. No member of the Audit Committee is a former partner of the existing auditing firm of the Company during the one year after he ceases to be a partner of the auditing firm.



### (i) Auditors' Remuneration

The Company's external auditor is Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu. For the year ended 31 December 2011, the auditors of the Company and subsidiaries received approximately HK\$890,000 for audit service and HK\$14,000 for non-audit services.

### (j) Internal Control

The Board has overall responsibilities for maintaining sound and effective internal control system of the Group to safeguard shareholders' investments and the Group's assets, as well as for reviewing the system of internal control of the Group. The internal control system is designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss and to manage rather than eliminate risks of failure in operational systems and achievement of the Group's objectives.

### (k) Communication with Shareholders

At 2011 Annual General Meeting ("2011 AGM"), a separate resolution was proposed by the Chairman of that meeting in respect of each separate issue, including the re-election of directors. The Chairman of the Board, and Chairmen of the Audit and Remuneration Committees, or in absence of the chairman of such committees, any member from the respective committees, attended the 2011 AGM to address shareholders' queries. The Company establishes different communication channels with shareholders and investors: (i) shareholders can receive printed copies of corporate information, (ii) the general meeting provides a forum for shareholders to raise comments and exchange views with the Board, (iii) the Company's website offers communication channel between the Company and its shareholders and investors; and (iv) the Company's Sub-Registrar and Transfer Agent in Hong Kong serve the shareholders respecting all share registration matters.

### (I) Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The directors of the Company acknowledge their responsibilities for preparing the financial statements of the Group in accordance with statutory requirements and applicable accounting standards. The directors of the Company also ensure that the financial statements of the Group are published in a timely manner. The reporting responsibilities of our Company's external auditors on the financial statements of the Group are set out in the section headed "Independent Auditor's Report" on pages 21 to 22 of this annual report.

### 1. General

The Company was incorporated in Bermuda as an exempted company and its shares are listed on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange"). Its immediate holding company is Golden Bright Energy Limited, a company incorporated in the British Virgin Islands (the "BVI") with limited liability. The addresses of the registered office and principal place of business of the Company are disclosed in the corporate information to the annual report.

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars ("HK\$"), which is the same as the functional currency of the Company.

The Company acts as an investment holding company. The principal activities of the Company's subsidiaries are retailing of garments. Details of the principal activities of the Company's subsidiaries are set out in note 30. The Company and its subsidiaries are referred to as "the Group".

# New and revised standards on consolidation, joint arrangements, associates and disclosures

HKFRS 10 replaces the parts of HKAS 27 "Consolidated and separate financial statements" that deal with consolidated financial statements and HK (SIC) – INT 12 "Consolidation – Special purpose entities". HKFRS 10 includes a new definition of control that contains three elements: (a) power over an investee, (b) exposure, or rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee, and (c) the ability to use its power over the investee to affect the amount of the investor's returns. Extensive guidance has been added in HKFRS 10 to deal with complex scenarios.

HKFRS 11 replaces HKAS 31 "Interests in joint ventures" and HK (SIC) – INT 13 "Jointly controlled entities – Non-monetary contributions by venturers". HKFRS 11 deals with how a joint arrangement of which two or more parties have joint control should be classified. Under HKFRS 11, joint arrangements are classified as joint operations or joint ventures, depending on the rights and obligations of the parties to the arrangements. In contrast, under HKAS 31, there are three types of joint arrangements: jointly controlled entities, jointly controlled assets and jointly controlled operations.

In addition, joint ventures under HKFRS 11 are required to be accounted for using the equity method of accounting, whereas jointly controlled entities under HKAS 31 can be accounted for using the equity method of accounting or proportionate accounting.

HKFRS 12 is a disclosure standard and is applicable to entities that have interests in subsidiaries, joint arrangements, associates and/or unconsolidated structured entities. In general, the disclosure requirements in HKFRS 12 are more extensive than those in the current standards.

These five standards are effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. Earlier application is permitted provided that all of these five standards are applied early at the same time.

The directors anticipate that these five standards will be adopted in the Group's consolidated financial statements for the annual period beginning 1 January 2013. Other than the application of the disclosure standard of HKFRS12, the application of the other four standards is not expected to have material impact on the amounts reported in the consolidated financial statements.

#### **HKFRS 13 Fair value measurement**

HKFRS 13 establishes a single source of guidance for fair value measurements and disclosures about fair value measurements. The Standard defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and requires disclosures about fair value measurements. The scope of HKFRS 13 is broad; it applies to both financial instrument items and non-financial instrument items for which other HKFRSs require or permit fair value measurements and disclosures about fair value measurements, except in specified circumstances. In general, the disclosure requirements in HKFRS 13 are more extensive than those in the current standards. For example, quantitative and qualitative disclosures based on the three-level fair value hierarchy currently required for financial instruments only under HKFRS 7 "Financial instruments: Disclosures" will be extended by HKFRS 13 to cover all assets and liabilities within its scope.

HKFRS 13 is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013, with earlier application permitted.

The directors anticipate that HKFRS 13 will be adopted in the Group's consolidated financial statements for the annual period beginning 1 January 2013 and that the application of the new standard will have no material impact on the consolidated financial statements.

### Amendments to HKAS 1 Presentation of items of other comprehensive income

The amendments to HKAS 1 retain the option to present profit or loss and other comprehensive income in either a single statement or in two separate but consecutive statements. However, the amendments to HKAS 1 require additional disclosures to be made in the other comprehensive income section such that items of other comprehensive income are grouped into two categories: (a) items that will not be reclassified subsequently to profit or loss; and (b) items that may be reclassified subsequently to profit or loss when specific conditions are met. Income tax on items of other comprehensive income is required to be allocated on the same basis.

The amendments to HKAS 1 are effective for the Group for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The presentation of items of other comprehensive income will be modified accordingly when the amendments are applied in the future accounting periods.

The directors of the Company anticipate that the application of the other new and revised HKFRSs will have no material impact on the consolidated financial statements.

### 3. Significant Accounting Policies

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards issued by the HKICPA. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods.

The principal accounting policies are set out below.

### **Basis of consolidation**

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company (its subsidiaries). Control is achieved where the Company has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

The results of subsidiaries acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income from the effective date of acquisition and up to the effective date of disposal, as appropriate.

Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies in line with those used by other members of the Group.

All intra-group transactions, balances, income and expenses are eliminated on consolidation.

#### Joint ventures

#### Jointly controlled entities

Joint venture arrangements that involve the establishment of a separate entity in which venturers have joint control over the economic activity of the entity are referred to as jointly controlled entities.

The results and assets and liabilities of jointly controlled entities are incorporated in the consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting. Under the equity method, investments in jointly controlled entities are initially recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the jointly controlled entities. When the Group's share of losses of a jointly controlled entity equals or exceeds its interest in that jointly controlled entity (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the jointly controlled entity), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of that jointly controlled entity.

#### **Revenue recognition**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods sold in the normal course of business, net of discounts and sales related taxes.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the goods are delivered and titles have passed, at which time all the following conditions are satisfied:

- the Group has transferred to the buyer the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods;
- the Group retains neither continuing managerial involvement to the degree usually associated with ownership nor effective control over the goods sold;
- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Group; and
- the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably.

Interest income from a financial asset is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

### Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes are stated in the consolidated financial position at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

### Leasing

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

#### The Group as lessee

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term, except where another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed. Contingent rentals arising under operating leases are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are recognised as a liability. The aggregate benefit of incentives is recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straightline basis, except where another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed.

#### **Foreign currencies**

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recorded in the respective functional currency (i.e. the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates) at the rates of exchanges prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on the retranslation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

For the purposes of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. Hong Kong dollars) at the rate of exchange prevailing at the end of the reporting period, and their income and expenses are translated at the average exchange rates for the year, unless exchange rates fluctuate significantly during the period, in which case, the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of translation reserve.

### **Retirement benefit costs**

Payments to the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme and state-managed retirement benefit schemes are recognised as an expenses when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

### Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit as reported in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from goodwill or from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries and interest in joint venture, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of the reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Current and deferred tax is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is calculated using the first-in, first-out method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for inventories less all estimated costs of completion and costs necessary to make the sale.

#### **Financial instruments**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised on the consolidated statement of financial position when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

#### **Financial assets**

The Group's financial assets are classified into loans and receivables. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition. All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the marketplace.

#### Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts (including all fees, points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset, or, where appropriate, a shorter period to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Interest income is recognised on an effective interest basis for debt instruments.

#### Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Subsequent to initial recognition, receivables (including trade receivables, other receivables, loan to a jointly controlled entity, amount due from a related company and bank balances) are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any identified impairment losses.

#### Impairment of financial assets

Financial assets are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of the reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the financial assets have been affected.

For all other financial assets, objective evidence of impairment could include:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty; or
- breach of contract, such as default or delinquency in interest and principal payments; or
- it becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial re-organisation.

For certain categories of financial asset, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed not to be impaired individually are subsequently assessed for impairment on a collective basis. Objective evidence of impairment for a portfolio of receivables could include the Group's past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period and observable changes in national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognised is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset. Such impairment loss will not be reversed in subsequent periods.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables where the carrying amounts are reduced through the use of an allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognised in profit or loss. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited to profit or loss.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment losses was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the asset at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

#### Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by a group entity are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

#### Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the group after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the Company are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

#### Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees, points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Interest expense is recognised on an effective interest basis.

#### Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities including trade payables, other payables and dividend payable are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

#### Derecognition

The Group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. If the Group neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Group continues to recognise the asset to the extent of its continuing involvement and recognises an associated liability. If the Group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Group continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

The Group derecognises financial liability when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Impairment losses on tangible assets

At the end of the reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Where a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash-generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash-generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or a cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised as income immediately.

#### Share-based payment transaction

#### Equity-settled share-based payment transactions

The fair value of services received determined by reference to the fair value of share options granted at the grant date is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, with a corresponding increase in equity (share-based compensation reserve).

At the end of the reporting period, the Group revises its estimates of the number of options that are expected to ultimately vest. The impact of the revision of the original estimates during the vesting period, if any, is recognised in profit or loss such that the cumulative expense reflects the revised estimate, with a corresponding adjustment to share-based compensation reserve.

When share options are exercised, the amount previously recognised in share-based compensation reserve will be transferred to share premium. When the share options are forfeited after the vesting date or are still not exercised at the expiry date, the amount previously recognised in share-based compensation reserve will be transferred to accumulated losses.

### 4. Key Source of Estimation Uncertainty

The following is the key assumption concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period that has a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

#### Allowance for inventories

The management of the Group reviews an aging analysis at the end of the reporting period, and makes allowance for obsolete and slow-moving inventory items identified that are not expected to be sold in the foreseeable future. The management estimates the net realisable value for such stocks based primarily on the current market conditions. However, given the competitiveness of the market, these prices may subsequently be affected. As at 31 December 2011, the carrying amount of inventories is HK\$13,445,000 (2010: HK\$15,791,000). During the year ended 31 December 2011, written back of allowance for obsolete inventories of HK\$97,000 (2010: HK\$2,281,000) was recognised in profit or loss.

#### 5. Capital Risk Management

The Group manages its capital to ensure that entities in the Group will be able to continue as a going concern while maximising the return to shareholders through the optimisation of the debt and equity balance. The Group's overall strategy remains unchanged from prior year.

The capital structure of the Group consists of debts and equity attributable to owners of the Company, comprising issued share capital and reserves.

The directors of the Company review the capital structure on a semi-annual basis. As part of this review, the directors consider the cost of capital and the risks associated with each class of capital. Based on recommendations of the directors, the Group will balance its overall capital structure through the payment of dividends and issue of new shares as well as the issue of new debt or the redemption of existing debt.

#### Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Group's major financial instruments include trade receivables, other receivables, loan to a jointly controlled entity, amount due from a related company, bank balances, trade payables, other payables and dividend payable. Details of these financial instruments are disclosed in respective notes. The risks associated with these financial instruments and the policies on how to mitigate these risks are set out below. The management manages and monitors these exposures to ensure appropriate measures are implemented on a timely and effective manner.

#### Market risk

#### Currency risk

The Group's major monetary assets and liabilities are denominated in the functional currencies of the respective group entities, except for one other payable balance denominated in HK\$ of a group entity with New Taiwan Dollar ("TWD") as its functional currency. The equivalent amount of HK\$ of the other payable is HK\$16,441,000 (2010: HK\$17,113,000). Other than the other payable as stated above, the directors consider that the Group's exposure to foreign currency exchange risk is insignificant.

#### Sensitivity analysis

Sensitivity analysis is prepared to demonstrate the effect of foreign exchange differences by 5% change in exchange rate of TWD against HK\$ of the respective group entity, assuming all other variables were held constant. 5% is the sensitivity rate used which represents management's assessment of the reasonable possible change in foreign exchange rate. An increase in post-tax loss for the year of approximately HK\$822,000 (2010: HK\$856,000) will be resulted where TWD weakens 5% against HK\$. For a 5% strengthening of TWD, there would be an equal and opposite impact on the loss for the year.

#### Interest rate risk

As at 31 December 2011 and 2010, the Group is exposed to cash flow interest rate risk arising from variable interest bearing bank balances. The directors do not expect there will be a significant interest rate adjustment on bank deposits and in view of the short maturities of the bank deposits, no sensitivity analysis is prepared at the end of the reporting period.

As at 31 December 2011 and 2010, the Group did not have any interest bearing borrowings and therefore the Group is not exposed to the relevant cash flow interest rate risk.

#### Credit risk

As at 31 December 2011 and 2010, the Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which causes a financial loss to the Group due to failure to discharge an obligation by the counterparties is arising from the carrying amount of the respective recognised financial assets as stated in the consolidated statement of financial position.

The Group has significant concentration of credit risk in respect of loan to a jointly controlled entity of HK\$19,213,000 (2010: nil) and amount due from a related company of HK\$3,800,000 (2010: nil).

As at 31 December 2011, the loan to a jointly controlled entity of HK\$19,213,000 serves as a shareholder's loan to the jointly controlled entity for financing its future business development. As one of the joint venturers, the Group closely controls and monitors the business development and financial strength of the jointly controlled entity in order to ascertain adequate repayment ability of the jointly controlled entity. In the opinion of the directors, the risk of non-recoverability of the amount due is minimal.

At 31 December 2011, the amount due from a related company amounted to HK\$3,800,000. The Group executes continuous monitoring procedures and ensures that follow-up actions are taken to ensure settlement of the amount due from a related company. In the opinion of the directors, the risk of non-recoverability of the amount due is minimal.

The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit-ratings assigned by international credit-rating agencies.

In order to minimise the credit risk of trade receivables, the management of the Group has delegated a team responsible for determination of credit limits, credit approvals and other monitoring procedures to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debts. In addition, the Group reviews the recoverable amount of each individual debt at the end of the reporting period to ensure that adequate impairment losses are made for irrecoverable amounts. In this regard, the directors of the Company consider that the Group's credit risk is significantly reduced.

#### Liquidity risk

In management of the liquidity risk, the Group monitors and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate by the management to finance the Group's operations and mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

The purpose of the 2009 Scheme is to encourage the eligible participants to perform their best in achieving the goals of the Group and at the same time allow the participants to enjoy the results of the Company attained through their efforts and contributions and to provide the participants with incentives and help the Company in retaining its existing employees and recruiting additional employees. A stronger business relationship will accordingly be established by the Group with the participants. Eligible participants of the 2009 Scheme include any employee, business associate and trustee.

The total number of shares which may be issued upon exercise of all options which may be granted under the 2009 Scheme shall not exceed 10% of the total number of shares in issue at anytime. The maximum number of shares issuable under share options to each eligible participant in the 2009 Scheme within any 12-month period, is limited to 1% of the shares of the Company in issue at any time. Any further grant of share options in excess of this limit is subject to shareholders' approval in a general meeting.

Any grant of option to a director, chief executive or substantial shareholder of the Company or any of their respective associates must be approved by the independent non-executive directors. In addition, any share options granted to a substantial shareholder of the Company or an independent non-executive director or any of their respective associates in excess of 0.1% of the shares of the Company in issue at any time or with an aggregate value (based on the Company's shares at the date of the grant) in excess of HK\$5 million, within any 12-month period, are subject to shareholders' approval in advance in a general meeting.

The offer of a grant of share options may be accepted within 21 days from the date of the offer with no consideration being payable by the grantee. The share option may be exercised at any time during the option period, which is determinable by the Company's board of directors and will not exceed 10 years from the date of grant of the options.

The exercise price of the share options is determinable by the Company's Board of Directors, but may not be less than the highest of (i) the Stock Exchange closing price of the Company's shares on the date of the offer of the share options (ii) the average Stock Exchange closing price of the Company's shares for the five trading days immediately preceding the date of the offer and (iii) the nominal value of the Company's shares.

Share options do not confer rights on the holders to dividends or to vote at shareholders' meetings.
