CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

Dear Shareholders

On behalf of Jiashili Group Limited ("Jiashili" or the "Company", together with its subsidiaries collectively, the "Group", "we", "our", "us"), I am pleased to present the annual results of Jiashili for the year of 2020.

Our Business



The global pandemic has been with us for more than a year now and has presented immense challenges not only for our Company, but for society as a whole. To limit the spread of COVID-19, governments took various actions to slow and otherwise control the spread of COVID-19, including the issuance of stay-at-home orders and social distancing guidelines. Jiashili has been strongly affected by the restrictions and regulations introduced to contain COVID-19. Our focus has been to implement comprehensive measures in all areas of our business to protect our employees, consumers, business partners, and suppliers, as well as to preserve business

continuity. The Company has taken numerous measures during the pandemic to fulfill our key objectives: 1) ensuring the health and safety of our employees, 2) safely producing and delivering our foods to distributors and consumers, 3) supporting the communities in which we operate, and 4) maintaining financial flexibility. We have experienced some challenges in connection with the COVID-19 pandemic, including temporary closings of production facilities and reduced demand for certain of

our products. Despite these challenges, there has been minimal disruption to our supply chain network to date, including the supply of our raw materials, packaging, or other sourced materials. However, we are continuing to closely monitor the potential impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, as we cannot predict its ultimate impact on our suppliers, distributors, and manufacturers.



Despite the challenging trading environment in 2020, Jiashili once again continued its solid growth path and further extended its leading position in the local biscuit market. Although the market environment continues to be very challenging, we still managed to achieve an above-average performance in 2020. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic the Group's revenue decreased 4.7% to approximately RMB1,518 million in 2020 compared with 2019. However, we are able to increase our market share in the segment of breakfast biscuits and wafer biscuits amid sales declined in our three segments, namely crisp biscuits; sandwich biscuits and coarse grains biscuits. Overall we can maintain our market share despite these difficulties. Sandwich biscuit segment although recorded a decline in 2020 compared with 2019 but is still our most important line of product for our Group, contributing 27.0% of the Group revenue. On product mix, breakfast biscuits, crisp biscuits and sandwich biscuits are being the dominant range represent about 67.7% (2019: 68.5%) of the total revenue. Group operating profit (earnings before interest and tax, EBIT) rose by 14.3% to approximately RMB191.4 million (2019: approximately RMB167.4 million). This represents an EBIT margin of 12.6% (previous year: 10.5%).



Net profit for the year amounted to approximately RMB145.3 million (increased 33.8% compared to previous year), providing a return on revenue of 9.6% (previous year: 6.8%). Operating cash flow reached approximately RMB279.8 million (previous year: approximately RMB120.9 million). In terms of liquidity and capital resources, we assess our liquidity in terms of our ability to generate cash from our operating, investing and financing activities as a whole. Significant factors affecting liquidity include cash flows generated from operating activities, capital expenditures, acquisitions, dividends, and the adequacy of available bank lines of credit. We generate substantial amounts of cash from operations and remain in a strong financial position, with sufficient

liquidity available for capital reinvestment, strategic acquisitions and the payment of dividends.



Chairman's Statement

Impact of IFRS 16 'Leases'

In January 2019 the Group adopted the new accounting standard (IFRS 16 'Leases'), which had the impact of increasing depreciation expenses of right-of-use assets by approximately RMB7.1 million in 2020 (2019: approximately RMB6.1 million), and the effect of increasing finance cost by approximately RMB0.4 million (2019: approximately RMB0.4 million).

Our new business acquisitions

During the second quarter of 2020, we completed the acquisition of LOHAS (綠葉居), a well-known bakery and bread making company in Guangzhou for more than 20 years, this is the first time our Group entered the short shelf-life bread business, rising consumer incomes and an increasingly Western lifestyle in Chinese cities, combined with growing variety and expanding presence in retail outlets such as supermarkets and hypermarkets, have supported the retail performance of baked products across the country. Moreover, Western-style pastries are competing with traditional Chinese varieties and are becoming a daily food item for many middle-class urban consumers. Bread has become a popular breakfast or snack item for young urban consumers. We believed that increased fresh milk intake goes hand in hand with higher bread consumption, as more Chinese domestic consumers think that bread is a better complement to milk than traditional breakfast items such as rice porridge and meat buns. Unlike traditional breakfast, milk and bread require minimal preparation, thereby making them attractive to a large class of office workers who seek convenience due to the fast pace of daily life.

Another investment in the second quarter of 2020 was the establishment of a joint venture, Guangdong Fengjia Food Company Limited (the "Fengjia"), with Beidahuang Fengyuan Group Co., Ltd, a state-owned enterprise in the PRC, engaged in manufacturing and selling of wheat flour. Wheat flour, one of our major raw materials, accounted for approximate 16% of our costs of production. On January 17, 2021, the Group had entered an agreement to provide financial assistance to Fengjia to ensure the bidding of the 100% equity interest of Kailan, a local PRC company manufacturing and selling of wheat flour in the PRC. For more details on this transaction, please refer to the announcement on January 17, 2021 and circular to shareholders on March 25, 2021. An important element of our strategy is a commitment to maintaining the highest quality in all areas of activity and to ensuring the business is managed according to sustainable principles. Our core raw materials (sugar, flour and palm oil) purchases reaches approximately RMB518 million in 2020, a good and reliable suppliers base will enable us to create a sustainable supply chain that not only minimise the cost structure, provide quality materials and adopt sustainable best practices in their decision-making process. We will strengthen our existing sourcing and supply chain strategy to meet our goal of achieving a fully traceable and verifiable supply chain for our raw materials in the future.



Chairman's Statement

Cost of production and gross profit margin

Prices of our raw materials including palm oil and sugar have risen drastically in 2020, whereas our cost of packaging materials and wheat flour had remained steady. The combined effects of COVID-19 pandemic and mixed prices of raw materials had led to Group's gross profit margin contraction in 2020. Our gross profit margin for the year 2020 decreased by 0.2 percentage point to 33.6% (2019: 33.8%).

Corporate responsibility

Our purpose to provide safe, nutritious, affordable biscuit and snack food that is great value for money has never been more relevant. We are committed to being a good neighbour and supporting the communities in which we operate. Our core value of "Jiashili benefit the Nation and benefit to all People" "嘉士利、利國家、利大家" have proved to be critical in determining our responses to the challenges posed by COVID-19. The strong culture of the Group, which has been established and then embedded in each of our businesses over many years, provided the firm foundation for the ways in which decisions were implemented. We have always aimed to make a lasting positive contribution to society, and we continue to take to invest in our people, support society, strengthen supply chains and respect our environment.

Dividends

The Board (the "Board") of directors (the "Directors") is acutely aware of the importance of dividends to shareholders. Following the decision not to declare an interim dividend in the interim results of 2020, and in the light of our subsequent profitable trading and the group's net cash balance at the end of the year, the Board has given much consideration to the payment of a dividend for this financial year. On balance, we have elected to propose a final dividend of HK\$5 cents for this year (2019: interim and final in aggregate HK\$10 cents).

Outlook

In this very difficult year, our special thanks go to our employees, who have consistently shown enormous flexibility and commitment in responding to unforeseen challenges. We have been able to maintain daily operations at Jiashili due to stricter and extensive safety precautions in our offices and production facilities. Through their determination and continuous efforts, our employees have made a huge contribution to combating the virus. Many thanks for the great and tireless commitment!

Dear shareholders, we are confident that we will master the current economic downturn and emerge stronger from this global crisis. Thanks to our solid foundation — built on a strong business model, stable finances and high liquidity, improved efficiency in many areas, and great employee commitment — Jiashili is in an excellent position for the future. By continuing to invest heavily in advertising and promotion and product innovation, and consistently focusing on our consumers, we have laid the basis for expanding market shares further.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

BUSINESS REVIEW

COVID-19

2020 has been an extraordinary year would be something of an understatement. The rapid spread of the global novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic was totally unexpected and has to a great extent caused destructive power to the global environment causing severe impacts to businesses, families, communities and society as a whole in ways which we could not have imagined a year ago. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic and related mitigation measures, we created an internal COVID-19 crisis management team led by Board of Directors in order to review and assess the evolving COVID-19 pandemic and began implementing changes in our business in February 2020 to protect our employees and customers, and to support appropriate health and safety protocols. For example, we installed physical barriers between employees in production facilities, implemented extensive cleaning and sanitation processes for both production and office spaces. Throughout the year our focus has been on our people, our customers, our communities and our investors, in particular:

- ensuring the health and safety of our staffs and customers;
- continuing to serve the needs of our customers and communities, including supporting government and private sector responses to the pandemic; and
- taking steps to optimise cash flow, reduce operating costs and strengthen further our liquidity position during a period of suppressed activity.

Our strong business model and stable finances, combined with a solid cash flow — and above all our highly committed workforce — provide a solid basis for us collectively to overcome this pandemic and emerge from it stronger.

In our operating environment, China saw a rapid recovery starting from the third-quarter of 2020 after economic slump in the first half year due to the success of Chinese Government's measures in combating virus lead to gradual relaxation of restriction orders and valiant recovery by private consumption. The 2020 gross domestic product (GDP) according to the data released by the National Bureau of Statistics of China exceeded RMB101 trillion, grew by 2.3% year-on-year suggesting that China is the only market that experienced a positive economic growth across the world amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. The pace of recovery of China market looks promising and will depend on the delivery of the vaccine and on continued policy support. The Group is full of confidence in the future and will stay vigilant and cautious and will continue to maintain and improve product quality, innovating products portfolio, reducing costs and broadening the distributor network to safeguard revenue and addressing the needs of consumers.

Performance Review

Although COVID-19 has influenced the Group's short-term planning and actions, our strategy remains unchanged with long-term growth being driven by organic investment and supplemented by acquisitions. Our financial performance this year more than ever demonstrates the resilience of the group. This comes from the strength of our brands, the diversity of our products and markets, our geographic spread, conservative financing and an organisation design that permits fast and flexible decision-taking. The Group's revenue has marginally decreased by approximately RMB75 million or 4.7% to approximately RMB1,518 million in 2020. On product mix, breakfast biscuits, crisp biscuits and sandwich biscuits are being the dominant range represent about 67.7% (2019: 68.5%) of the total revenue, while coarse grain biscuits, wafer and other biscuits products make up the balance. Gross profit decreased by approximately RMB28 million to approximately RMB511 million from approximately RMB539 million in the same period of 2019, representing a year-on-year decline of 5.2%, the reduction was mainly due to the increase in our cost of raw materials (particularly the palm oil). Then, gross profit margin decreased by approximately 0.2 percentage point to 33.6% as compared with that of 2019.

Despite the difficult market environment created by repeated local lockdowns and temporary closure on shopping malls and shops; restrictions orders in use of roads and highways and persistent social distancing, the Group continued to make progress on certain segments including breakfast biscuits and our new product of short shelf-life bread. Profit for the year increased by 33.8% or approximately RMB36.8 million in 2020 to approximately RMB145.3 million from approximately RMB108.5 million of 2019. The increased in COVID-19-related administrative and selling and distribution costs and incremental increase in research expenses on expanding product excellency and portfolio were completely offset by reduction on impairment loss on prepayments no longer provided in 2020.

The Group's objectives are to produce quality, popular and preferred biscuits and leisure snack products where you can share anytime, anywhere. Through our Company's effective sale strategy and our slogan "Quality and Customers first 質量第一、顧客至上" and our business philosophy of "Jiashili benefit the Nation and benefit to all People" "嘉士利、利國家、利大家" the Group strive to provide delicious and premium biscuits and other series products to the customers in the PRC.

New Business Ventures

In the second quarter of 2020, Guangzhou Jialixuan Food Company Ltd, an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company has acquired the bakery and bread making business from LOHAS (綠葉居), a well-known bread making company in Guangzhou for more than 20 years in the PRC. The short shelf-life bread market in the PRC has huge growth potential, with its market size potentially reaching tens of billions of RMB, the market landscape is hardly concentrated, comprising mainly regional and local factories as industry players. The Group captured this new business opportunity and fully entered the short shelf-life bread business through leveraging the Group's brand advantages. The Group had made substantial progress in the first year of operation gaining consumers over with products of high quality, rich nutrition and diverse tastes. During the year, revenue generated from Guangzhou Jialixuan reached to approximately RMB14.0 million. The Group adopted business strategy of diversified product category aiming at providing different food and snack categories with different flavors to customers in the PRC market. Dare to accept innovative idea and product development are the driving force for the Group's continuous development.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

In May of 2020, the Group had established a joint venture, Guangdong Fengjia Food Company Limited engaged in manufacture and sale of flour, together with Beidahuang Fengyuan Group Co., Ltd. The Group believed that investment in business of flour will provide a stable supply and discount on prices of our major materials to our business. Our cost of flour purchase has reduced around 2% in 2020 from 2019.

Enhancement of product quality and raw material supplies are our Group strives for best quality with competitive prices, and zero customers complaints. This could be achieved by improved quality and supplies management and production and packaging processes. Through straight and stringent control on product safety, quality check and review will be implemented on each stages of production leads to costs reduction and enhancement of production efficiency.

Marketing and promotion

Innovation has always been a strong tradition at Jiashili. Today, our pace of innovation is faster than ever, and every year we bring new creations on to the market. To cater for constantly changing consumer demands, our product specialists work day after day to ensure that every new product has the potential to become a classic one day. In 2020, research expenses amounted to approximately RMB59.9 million increased by 14.3% year-on-year. Research expenses accounted for approximately 3.9% of total revenue in 2020 (2019: 3.2%)

In 2020, our Group has more than 2,000 distributors in the PRC, Jiashili is a consumer-led organisation. Our business model, structures and strategies continue to evolve, centred around a deep understanding of diverse local consumer preference. Jiashili continues to meet a wide range of rapidly evolving consumer preferences. Across different consumer landscape, today's most pronounced preferences include clean and cleaner label, convenience, nutrition & wellness, authenticity and premiumisation. These distinct preferences can mean different things to consumers in different parts of the world. Central to Jiashili's approach is the fundamental understanding of how to address these needs and support customers as they seek to innovate to win in today's marketplace. These ever-evolving consumer preferences are redefining consumption occasions right across end use markets and channels. Our customers is at the centre everything we do, we aims to adding value by offering so much more to distributors and our end consumers. Our Group is undergoing consolidation in different distributor channels, aligning with different distributors through various channels such as supermarkets, shops, convenience stores and key accounts (KA) to fulfil our customers' needs. Some differentiated products are sold exclusive through specific channel to avoid possible conflicts among channels. We also strived for product differentiation in packaging and specifications among different channels and regions.

To promote our products our Group has various policies and controls on promoting our products and brand names through discounts, tasting events, on-site advertisement and promotion. Owing to recent government restriction orders and social distancing guidelines, we are unable to conduct those face-to-face promotion events. We switch to using on-line promotion media via Tik Tok (抖音) and Kuaishou (快手) was used in 2020. In December of 2020, we have signed a contract with Tian Leng ("Mr. Tian"), as the spokesperson of our brand names of Jiashili and Silang for two years till November of 2022. We believed that the healthy, sportive, full of energetic images of Mr. Tin would be a perfect match to our brand images. Selling, advertising and promotion expenses accounted for 9.4% of revenue of 2020. (2019: 8.3%).

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Despite the challenging conditions, created by the Covid-19 pandemic, Jiashili was able to achieve a solid result and maintained its market share in all of its key markets in 2020. Group's revenue had been hurt by repeated lockdowns and closed of shopping malls and shops and persistent social distancing. Sales level was dropped even after reopening of mall and shops and relaxation of social restrictions compared to pre-pandemic level reflects consumer demand.

During the year ended December 31, 2020 Group's revenue recorded a slight decline by 4.7% year-on-year to approximately RMB1,518.5 million while the aggregate sales volume reached 105,639 tonnes, a 4.3% decreased of the same period last year. Breakfast biscuits series

Under COVID-19 pandemic level, breakfast biscuits series delivered a mild increase in reported sales, driven mainly by our Group strong brand names and Chinese people traditionally like to eat biscuit during breakfast time. In 2020 the revenue generated from breakfast biscuits increased by approximately RMB4.5 million, or 1.3% to approximately RMB363.9 million and sales volume increased by 1.7% to 32,412 tonnes over the same period last year.

Crisp biscuits series

In 2020, the revenue generated from crisp biscuits series decreased by approximately RMB39.4 million to approximately RMB253.4 million and sales volume decreased by 10.1% to 19,619 tonnes over the same period last year. The market landscape for crisp biscuits continued to be challenged in the period.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Sandwich biscuits series

Turning to sandwich biscuits, mainly fruit jam sandwiches biscuits (果樂果香), in 2020, the business performed well in the first half of the year, but it drops in the fourth quarter of the year, the revenue generated from sandwich biscuits series was mildly declined by 6.4%, or approximately 28.1 million year-on-year to approximately RMB410.0 million. Sales volume decreased by 4.1% to 24,741 tonnes over the same period last year. This is the first time that sandwich biscuits series registered a drop in revenue after enjoying astronomical double-digit growth annually since its first launch in 2014. The reason for the decline was mainly attributable as follows: (i) In view of COVID-19 pandemic situation, a lot of factories and production were lockdown in February and March, in addition, logistic and delivery time was further prolonged due to transportation restrictions, thus impacting delivery of products and (ii) Our target consumers are mostly university students; youngsters and teenagers, the prolonged suspension of school since this year causing unexpected loss of these groups of consumers and (iii) consumers are straightly follow the social distancing rules and guidelines.

Wafer series

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic challenges, the strict lockdowns mostly affected the mall and shops. Wafer biscuits achieved positive sales growth and increased its market shares, mainly thanks to the success of the Group's marketing and pricing strategy and wide market acceptance. Wafer biscuits series delivered a strong improvement in revenue with a 14.7% ahead of 2019 to approximately RMB162.3 million, from approximately 141.5 million of 2019. Growth in sales volume rose by 15.1% to 9,757 tonnes.

Coarse grain biscuits series

The revenue of coarse grain biscuits amounted to approximately RMB111.4 million, representing a decline of 32.8% or approximately RMB54.3 million as compared with the same period last year. Sales volume reached 7,239 tonnes representing a decrease of 25.4% from the same period last year. The reason for the decline was mainly attributable as follows: (i) The Chinese Lunar New Year (CNY) peak season was nearing the end of January 2020 instead of usual mid-February, thus most of our new-year gifts and products was dispatched on late December 2019 and early January 2020. Subsequent suspension of production and transportation and delivery restrictions impact our normal sales and (ii) In order to enjoy better exposure to various group of consumers, our distribution channel was mostly rely on key accounts (KA), super markets and mega stores which is relatively narrow and unique base, previous closedowns and restrictions orders on business hours on those stores and repeated social distancing guidelines would seriously impact our sales.

Other biscuits products

It is the Group's policy of actively seeking to expand different mix of biscuits products with different brands and flavors to meet customer's demands. Other biscuits products include mainly Jiuzhou cookie (九洲曲奇), cream crackers, Ruishiyue products series (瑞士樂系列) and others. During the year of 2020, the revenue of other biscuits products amounted to approximately RMB175.8 million, representing an increase of 3.0% or approximately RMB5.2 million as compared with the same period last year.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Others

Other products represent mainly short shelf-life bread, mooncakes and others in 2020 whereas it consists mainly pastra, sugar candies and others in 2019. The revenue of others products amounted to approximately RMB41.7 million, representing an increase of 67.5% or approximately RMB16.8 million as compared with the same period last year.

Overall gross profit margin remained the same in 2020 compared with 2019.

In 2020, gross profit amounted to approximately RMB511.0 million (2019: approximately RMB538.9 million), representing a year-on-year decrease of 5.2%. Gross profit margin mildly decreased to 33.6% in 2020, representing a drop of 0.2 percentage point from last year. The decrease in gross profit margin was due to the increase in our raw material costs (mainly sugar and palm oil). In 2020, the cost of sugar and palm oil has increased by 4.7% and 22.9% per ton respectively from last year. The Group will further imposed stringent measures and controls to keep our production and manufacturing cost remain competitive.

Other income

Other income remained the same in 2020 compared with 2019. Other income for the year of 2020 has slightly decreased by approximately 1.7% to approximately RMB47.5 million compared with 2019. The decline was primarily due to one-off lump sum government grants and tax refund received in the corresponding period last year no longer available in current year. However, the reduction of government grants income was offset by increase in interest income on loan receivables and bank deposits, rental income and other income earned.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Selling and distribution expenses

Selling and distribution expenses comprise mainly the advertising and promotion expenses, delivery and transportation expenses and selling administration expenses. Such expense remained the same in 2020 compared with 2019. The selling and distribution expenses rose by 1.8% from approximately RMB219.0 million in 2019 to approximately RMB223.0 million in 2020. In 2020 selling, advertising and promotion expenses was approximately RMB142.3 million (2019: approximately RMB132.6 million). Selling advertising and promotion expenses as a percentage of revenue was 9.4% (2019: 8.3%) such increase was in line with Group's policy to expand and broaden consumer base by increase in advertising and promotion expenditure. Delivery and transportation expenses were approximately RMB80.7 million (2019: approximately RMB86.4 million). Delivery and transportation expenses as a percentage of revenue is 5.3% in 2020 (2019: 5.4%).

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses remained the same in 2020 compared with 2019, For the year ended December 31, 2020, the administrative expenses amounted to approximately RMB76.4 million, representing an increase of approximately RMB0.6 million or 0.8%. Administrative expenses mainly consist of staff costs, legal and professional expenses, other tax expenses and rental expenses.

Other gains and losses

During the year, other losses was approximately RMB0.4 million, a decrease of losses by approximately RMB69.3 million (2019: approximately RMB69.7 million losses) as compared with the corresponding period of last year. The decrease of losses was mainly attributable to the impairment provisions on prepayments amounted to approximately RMB74.6 million no longer provided in 2020.

Inventories

The Group's inventories consist mainly of raw materials, packaging materials and, finished goods. The Group's inventories as at December 31, 2020 was approximately RMB97.5 million, increased by 34.1% from approximately RMB72.7 million as at December 31, 2019. The reason for the increase in inventories at the year end of 2020 was primarily due to the forthcoming Lunar Chinese New Year is in February 2021. Accordingly, the inventory turnover days increased from 28.09 days in 2019 to 30.83 days in 2020.

Trade, bills and other receivables

The Group's trade, bills and other receivables refer to the Group's trade receivable balance from its customers, primarily including distributors and KA together with other deposits and prepayments. The Group's trade, bills and other receivables remained the same in 2020 compared with 2019. The amounts of trade, bills and other receivables as at December 31, 2020 was approximately RMB181.0 million, decreased by 6.6% from approximately RMB193.7 million as at December 31, 2019. Accordingly, the trade, bills and other receivables turnover days was slightly increased from 36.32 days in 2019 to 45.04 days in 2020.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Working capital position

To preserve and maintain a stable cash flow is very important especially under unpredictable COVID-19 pandemic situation. Measures to mitigate the cash outflow included cutting back on discretionary spend and non-essential capital expenditure across the group. As at December 31, 2020, the Group's net current assets was approximately RMB104.8 million (2019: approximately RMB202.2 million). Current ratio of the Group as at December 31, 2020 was 1.13 (2019: 1.29). We believed our Group is in the healthy state of operating situation with adequate source of resources to meet our short-term debt.

We finance our operations and capital expenditure primarily by internally generated cash flows as well as banking facilities provided by our principal bankers. As at December 31, 2020, the Group had bank balances and cash amounted to approximately RMB490.2 million (2019: approximately RMB432.1 million; 2018: approximately RMB379.3 million). We are from time to time adopt prudent financial management policy to maintain sufficient cash to meet our cash flow needs. Total bank borrowings as at December 31, 2020 amounted to approximately RMB309.0 million, a decrease of approximately RMB69.7 million, or 18.4% from corresponding period of last year. All of our bank borrowings are unguaranteed and unsecured. As at December 31, 2020, the Group was in a net cash position (bank balances and cash less borrowings and lease liabilities) of approximately RMB174.8 million (2019: approximately RMB47.3 million; 2018: approximately RMB18.8 million). As at December 31, 2020, the gross gearing ratio (defined as total liabilities over total assets) was 48.3% (2019: 52.6%).

At this time, the COVID-19 pandemic has not materially impacted our liquidity and we anticipate current cash and operating cash flows, together with our current bank borrowing facilities will be adequate to meet our operating, investing and financing needs. The severity, magnitude and duration of the current COVID-19 pandemic is uncertain and rapidly changing. The Group is actively monitoring the pandemic and related governmental actions as they continue to develop and evolve. We will adjust our mitigation strategies as necessary to address any changing health, operational or financial risks that may arise.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Contingent liabilities and guarantees

As at December 31, 2020, the Group did not provide any guarantees for any third party and had no significant contingent liabilities.

Human resources and remuneration of employees

As at December 31, 2020 the Group had a total of 2,882 employees. (December 31, 2019: 2,956) The Group's employees are remunerated with reference to their positions, performance, experience and prevailing salary trends in the market. The remuneration package of our employees includes fixed salary, commissions and allowances (where applicable), and performance based year-end bonuses having regard to the performance of the Group and individual. For year ended December 31, 2020, the total employee benefits expenses (including Directors' and chief executive's remuneration) were approximately RMB214.9 million (2019: approximately RMB198.5 million).

OUTLOOK

Since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, Jiashili has taken all the necessary measures to protect the health of its employees, consumers, business partners and suppliers. There were no major bottlenecks or disruptions neither in the supply chain nor in operations. In order to have a better picture of the impact of the pandemic and to detect significant risks early on, internal processes have been adjusted by, for example, asking for specific information earlier or more often. For this annual performance, the Group considered all known consequences of the pandemic. However, the impact on the future income and profitability measures cannot be fully determined and is difficult to predict. Thanks to our solid foundation — built on a strong business model, stable finances and high liquidity, improved efficiency in various areas, consistently high investments on brand advertising and a high level of employee engagement — Jiashili is confident it can master the current economic downturn and once again achieve good results and emerge even stronger post-recovery.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board meets regularly during the year and is responsible for setting the Group's strategy and ensuring the necessary resources and capabilities are in place to deliver the strategic aims and objectives.

The Group's strategy, however, remains unchanged and we continue to deliver on our promises and execute our strategy of organic growth and acquisitions. As we grow it is crucial that our governance structures keep pace so that we can ensure growth is both responsible and sustainable. We need to manage our risks efficiently and ensure transparency across the business. We recognise that good governance is essential in promoting the success of the business for the benefit of its members as a whole.

BOARD COMPOSITION AND DIVERSITY

The board of directors is collectively responsible to the Company's shareholders for the direction and oversight of the Company to ensure its long-term success. The board met regularly throughout the year to approve the group's strategic objectives, to lead the group within a framework of effective controls which enable risk to be assessed and managed, and to ensure that sufficient resources are available to meet the objectives set.

Each member of our Board must be able to demonstrate the skills, experience and knowledge required to contribute to the effectiveness of the Board. It is also important that we address issues of diversity in terms of skills, gender, ethnicity and experience relevant to our business. We believe the Board is appropriately balanced in terms of diversity with a good mix of specialist skills and market expertise. However, we continue to review the composition of the Board to ensure it remains appropriate to support the ongoing development of the Group.

Since the date of its listing and up to the date of this report, the Company has complied with the code provisions under the CG Code except for deviation during the year which is summarised as below.

Code Provision A.2.1

As stipulated in the Code provision A.2.1 of the Code, the role of chairman and chief executive should be separated and should not be performed by the same individual. As the duties of chairman and chief executive of the Company are performed by Mr. Huang Xianming ("Mr. Huang"), the Company has deviated from the Code provision A.2.1 of the CG Code. As all major decisions are made in consultation with all members of the Board, and currently there are three independent non-executive Directors on the Board offering independent advises and providing fresh perspectives to the Company. In regard of this, the Board is of the view that it is appropriate this management structure is effective for the Group's operations and sufficient checks and balances are in place and in the best interests of the Company for Mr. Huang to hold both positions as it helps to maintain the continuity of the policies and the stability of the operations of the Company. The Board will also continue to review and monitor the practices of the Company for the purpose of complying with the CG Code and maintaining a high standard of corporate governance practices of the Company.

Code Provision A.6.7

As stipulated in the Code provision A.6.7 of the CG Code, independent non-executive Directors and other non-executive Directors shall attend general meetings. Appointments are made on merit, based on objective criteria, including skills and experience and recognising the benefits of diversity on the Board. Furthermore, all directors are required to inform the Company of changes in their commitments to ensure that they continue to be able to devote sufficient time to the Company.

INTERNAL CONTROLS

The Board is responsible for maintaining an adequate internal control and risk management system to safeguard shareholder investments and Company assets, and reviewing the effectiveness of such system on an annual basis through the Audit Committee. During the year, the Board has conducted a review of the effectiveness of the Company's internal control and risk management systems and considered the systems are effective and adequate in all material aspects in both design and operations.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT

Directors' Responsibility

The Directors of the Company are responsible for the preparation of consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards issued by the International Accounting Standards Board and the disclosure requirement of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance, and for such internal control as the Directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

The Directors acknowledge their responsibility for preparing the consolidated financial statements of the Group. The Board is not aware of any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions which may cast significant doubt over the Group's ability to continue as a going concern. Accordingly, the Board will continue to prepare the consolidated financial statements on a going concern basis.

Internal Audit

Internal audit function was conducted with an objective that independent feedback and reviews will be provided to the Audit Committee and subsequently the Board of Directors. The Audit Committee reviewed through the findings of the internal auditors to ensure that any major weaknesses are recognised and rectified on a timely basis and an effective and efficient risk management and internal control systems are maintained.

The internal auditors reported on their findings, recommended corrective measures to be taken by the management and the management responses thereto. During the financial year, there was no material internal control weakness that would have resulted in any significant loss to the Group.

Further review on internal control system was also done by the Audit Committee through discussion with relevant management during the Board meeting whereby other concerns were addressed.

SHAREHOLDERS' RIGHTS

To safeguard shareholder's interests and rights, a separate resolution is proposed for each substantially separate issue at general meetings, including the election of individual Directors. All resolutions put forward at general meetings will be voted on by poll pursuant to the Listing Rules and poll results will be posted on the websites of the Company and the Stock Exchange after each general meeting.

NON-COMPETITION UNDERTAKING BY CONTROLLING SHAREHOLDERS

Mr. Huang Xianming, Ms. Huang Cuihong, Ms. Huang Rujiao, Ms. Huang Rujun, Ms. Huang Xianxian, Kaiyuan Investments Limited (“Kaiyuan”), Great Logistics Global Limited (“Great Logistics”), Jade Isle Global Limited (“Jade Isle”), Grand Wing Investments Limited (“Grand Wing”), Intelligent Pro Investments Limited (“Intelligent Pro”) and Prestige Choice (Overseas) Investments Limited (“Prestige Choice Overseas”) are the controlling shareholders (within the meaning of the Listing Rules) of the Company (the “Controlling Shareholders”). Each of the Controlling Shareholders has confirmed to the Company that none of them is engaged in, or interested in any business (other than the Group) to compete directly or indirectly with the Group. To protect the Group from any potential competition, the Controlling Shareholders have given an irrevocable non-compete undertaking in the Group’s favour on August 21, 2014.

In order to properly manage any potential or actual conflict of interests between the Group and the Controlling Shareholders in relation to the compliance and enforcement of the non-competition undertaking, the Company has adopted the following corporate governance measures:

- i. the independent non-executive Directors shall review, at least on an annual basis, the compliance with and enforcement of the terms of the non-competition undertaking by the Controlling Shareholders;
- ii. the Company will disclose any decisions on matters reviewed by the independent non-executive Directors relating to compliance and enforcement of the non-competition undertaking either through the annual report or by way of announcement;
- iii. the Company will disclose in the corporate governance report on how the terms of the non-competition undertaking have been complied with and enforced; and
- iv. in the event that any of the Directors and/or their respective associates has material interest in any matter to be deliberated by the Board in relation to the compliance and enforcement of the non-competition undertaking, he may not vote on the resolutions of the Board approving the matter and shall not be counted towards the quorum for the voting pursuant to the applicable provisions in the Company’s articles of association.

The Directors consider that the above corporate governance measures are sufficient to manage any potential conflict of interests between the Controlling Shareholders and their respective associates and the Group and to protect the interests of the shareholders, in particular, the minority shareholders.

Each of the Controlling Shareholders has confirmed to the Company that he/she/it has complied with the non-competition undertaking. The independent non-executive Directors of the Company have reviewed the status of compliance and enforcement of the non-competition undertaking and confirmed that all the undertakings thereunder have been complied with.

CORPORATE INFORMATION

The Company was incorporated in the Cayman Islands on December 19, 2013 as an exempted company with limited liability. The Company's shares were listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange on September 25, 2014.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The Company is an investment holding company. The principal activities of the Group are manufacturing and sales of biscuits in the PRC and overseas.

Segment analysis of the Group (categorised by major products) for the year ended December 31, 2020 is set out in note 6 to the consolidated financial statements of the Group contained in this report. A review of the business of the Group during the year and its future development and an analysis of the Group's performance during the year using financial key performance indicators as required under Schedule 5 of the Companies Ordinance (Cap. 622 of the laws of Hong Kong), as well as particulars of important events affecting the Company that have occurred since the end of the year ended December 31, 2020, are set out in the "Chairman's Statement" on pages 6 to 9 and the "Management Discussion and Analysis" on pages 10 to 18 of this report.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

Our approach to risk management

The delivery of our strategic objectives and the sustainable growth (or long-term shareholder value) of our business, is dependent on effective risk management. Similar with any business, risks and uncertainties are inherent in our business activities and it is through a structured approach to risk management that we are able to mitigate and manage these risks and embrace opportunities when they arise. These disciplines have proved to be effective as we navigate our way through the challenges resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Board is accountable for effective risk management, for agreeing the principal, including emerging, risks facing the group and ensuring they are successfully managed. The Board undertakes a robust annual assessment of the principal risks, including emerging risks, that would threaten the business model, future performance, solvency or liquidity. The Board also monitors the group's exposure to risks as part of the performance reviews conducted at each Board meeting. Financial risks are specifically reviewed by the Audit Committee. The Board empowers the management of our businesses to identify, evaluate and manage the risks they face, on a timely basis, to ensure compliance with relevant legislation, our business principles and group policies. Our businesses perform risk assessments which consider materiality, risk controls and specific risks relevant to the markets in which they operate. The collated risks from each business are shared with the respective divisional chief executives who present their divisional risks to the group executive. The Board receives the risk assessments on an annual basis and, with the Audit Committee, reviews and challenges them with the divisional chief executives, on an individual basis. These discussions are wide ranging and consider operational, environmental and other external risks. These risks and their impact on

business performance are reported during the year and are considered as part of the monthly management review process. Group divisional heads including Legal, Treasury, Tax, Information Technology, Human Resources, Procurement and Delivery also provide input to this process, sharing with the Board and the Audit Committee their view of key risks and what activities are in place or planned to mitigate them. A combination of these perspectives with the business risk assessments creates a consolidated view of the group's risk profile. A summary of these risk assessments is then shared and discussed with the Audit Committee and Chief Executive Officer at least annually. The Chief Executive Officer holds meetings with each of the non-executive directors seeking their feedback on the reviews performed and discussing the key risks, which include emerging risks, and mitigating activities identified through the risk assessment exercise. Once all non-executive directors have been consulted, a Board report is prepared summarising the full process and providing an assessment of the status of risk management across the group. The key risks, mitigating controls and relevant policies are summarised and the Board confirms the group's principal risks.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Our business and financial results may be negatively impacted by the failure to successfully manage a disruption in consumer and trade patterns, as well as operational challenges associated with the actual or perceived effects of a disease outbreak, including epidemics, pandemics or similar widespread public health concerns, such as, the current COVID-19 pandemic

Our operations are impacted by consumer spending levels, impulse purchases, the availability of our products at retail and our ability to manufacture, store and distribute products to our distributors and consumers in an effective and efficient manner. The fear of exposure to or actual effects of a disease outbreak, epidemic, pandemic or similar widespread public health concern, such as the COVID-19 pandemic, could negatively impact our overall business and financial results. Specific factors that may impact our operations, some of which have had an unfavorable impact on our operations as a result of COVID-19, include, but are not limited to:

- Significant reductions or volatility in demand for one or more of our products, which may be caused by, among other things: the temporary inability of consumers to purchase our products due to illness, quarantine or other travel restrictions, or financial hardship, shifts in demand away from one or more of our products; if prolonged, such impacts may further increase the difficulty of planning for operations and may negatively impact our results;
- The inability to meet our customers' needs and achieve cost targets due to disruptions in our manufacturing operations or supply arrangements caused by the loss or disruption of essential manufacturing and supply elements such as raw materials or finished product components, transportation resources, workforce availability, or other manufacturing and distribution capability;
- The inability to effectively manage evolving health and welfare strategies, including but not limited to ongoing or not yet fully known costs related to operational adjustments to ensure continued employee and consumer safety and adherence to health guidelines as they are modified and supplemented;
- An inability to effectively modify our trade promotion and advertising activities to reflect changing consumer viewing and shopping habits due to the cancellation or postponement of major promoting events, reduced in-store visits, travel restrictions and a shift in customer advertising priorities, among other things; or

- The failure of third parties on which we rely, including those third parties who supply our raw materials, packaging, capital equipment and other necessary operating materials, contract manufacturers, distributors, commercial banks and external business partners, to meet their obligations to the Company, or significant disruptions in their ability to do so, which may be caused by their own financial or operational difficulties and may negatively impact our operations.

With respect to COVID-19, the situation remains dynamic and subject to rapid and possibly material change. The Company's efforts to manage and mitigate these factors may be unsuccessful, and the effectiveness of these efforts depends on factors beyond our control, including the duration and severity of any disease outbreak, as well as third-party actions taken to contain its spread and mitigate public health effects.

Market demand for new and existing products could decline

We operate in highly competitive markets and rely on continued demand for our products. To generate revenues and profits, we must sell products that appeal to our consumers. Our continued success is impacted by many factors, including the following:

- Effective retail execution;
- Appropriate advertising campaigns and marketing programs;
- Our ability to secure adequate shelf space at retail locations;
- Our ability to drive sustainable innovation and maintain a strong pipeline of new products in the confectionery and broader snacking categories; and
- Changes in product category consumption.

There continues to be competitive product and pricing pressures in the markets where we operate, as well as challenges in maintaining profit margins. We must maintain mutually beneficial relationships with our key customers, including retailers and distributors, to compete effectively.

Changes in our relationships with significant distributors could adversely affect us

There continues to be competitive product and pricing pressures in the markets where we operate, as well as challenges in maintaining profit margins. We must maintain mutually beneficial relationships with our key distributors and retailers to compete effectively. There can be no assurance that our significant distributors and retailers will continue to purchase our products in the same quantities or on the same terms as in the past, particularly as increasingly powerful distributors continue to demand lower pricing. The loss of a significant distributors or a material reduction in sales to a significant distributors could materially and adversely affect our product sales, financial condition, and results of operations. The Group has, therefore, been continually broadening and deepening its distribution and sales network and increasing the number of our distributors. The Group has also been taking proactive approaches in monitoring the performance of the distributors and supporting them with sales and marketing efforts, so as to maintain good relationships with them and uphold the sales contribution of the distributors to us.

Disruption of our supply chain could have an adverse impact on our business, financial condition, and results of operations

Our ability to make, distribute and sell our products is critical to our success. Damage or disruption to our supply chain, including third-party manufacturing or transportation and distribution capabilities, due to weather, including any effects of climate change, natural disaster, fire or explosion, terrorism, pandemics, strikes, government action, or other reasons beyond our control or of our suppliers and business partners, could impair our ability to manufacture or sell our products. Failure to take adequate steps to mitigate the likelihood or potential impact of such events, or to effectively manage such events if they occur, particularly when a product is sourced from a single supplier or location, could adversely affect our business or financial results. In addition, disputes with significant suppliers, including disputes regarding pricing or performance, could adversely affect our ability to supply products to our customers and could materially and adversely affect our product sales, financial condition, and results of operations. The Group believes that we take adequate precautions to mitigate the impact of possible disruptions. We have strategies and plans in place to manage disruptive events if they were to occur.

Any damage to our reputation could have a material adverse effect on our business, financial condition, and results of operations

Maintaining a good reputation of Jiashili is critical to selling our products. Product contamination or tampering, the failure to maintain high standards for product quality, safety, and integrity, including with respect to raw materials and ingredients obtained from suppliers, or allegations of product quality issues, mislabeling, or contamination, even if untrue, may reduce demand for our products or cause production and delivery disruptions. Our reputation could also be adversely impacted by any of the following, or by adverse publicity (whether or not valid) relating thereto: the failure to maintain high ethical, social, and environmental standards for all of our operations and activities; the failure to achieve any stated goals with respect to the nutritional profile of our products; our research and development efforts; or our environmental impact, including use of packaging, energy use, and waste management. Moreover, the growing use of social and digital media by consumers has greatly increased the speed and extent that information or misinformation and opinions can be shared. Failure to comply with local laws and regulations, to maintain an effective system of internal controls or to provide accurate and timely financial information could also hurt our reputation. Damage to our reputation or loss of consumer confidence in our products for any of these or other reasons could result in decreased demand for our products and could have a material adverse effect on our business, financial condition, and results of operations, as well as require additional resources to rebuild our reputation. In order to mitigate those impacts on the Group, we have introduced our own quality control standards to all of our suppliers and distributors; policies and practices to take account of changes in legal and environmental obligations; relevant ethical training and programs to educate staffs and workers.

OPINION

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position of the Group as at December 31, 2020, and of its consolidated financial performance and its consolidated cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRSs”) issued by International Accounting Standards Board (“IASB”) and have been properly prepared in compliance with the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

BASIS FOR OPINION

We conducted our audit in accordance with Hong Kong Standards on Auditing (“HKSAAs”) issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants (“HKICPA”). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Group in accordance with the HKICPA’s Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (“the Code”), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

KEY AUDIT MATTERS

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the consolidated financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Key audit matter

Occurrence of revenue from sales of biscuit and other products

We identified occurrence of revenue from sales of biscuit and other products as a key audit matter due to its quantitative significance to the consolidated financial statements.

The sales of biscuit and other products are recognised as revenue when the control of the goods has been transferred to the customers of the Group, the distributors and supermarkets.

The Group has recognised revenue from sales of biscuit and other products of approximately Renminbi ("RMB") 1,519 million for the year ended December 31, 2020.

The accounting policy of revenue and details of revenue are set out in notes 3 and 5, respectively, to the consolidated financial statements.

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

Our procedures in relation to occurrence of revenue from sales of biscuit and other products included:

- Understanding and testing the key controls relating to the revenue recognition for sales of biscuit and other products;
- Understanding the revenue recognition policies of the Group and evaluating its revenue recognition is in accordance with IFRS 15 *Revenue from Contracts with Customers*;
- Performing tests of details by tracing to valued added tax invoices and delivery information, on a sample basis, to ensure the transactions are valid, accurate and recorded in proper period;
- Verifying authenticity of value added tax invoices issued by the Group, on a sample basis;
- Performing background search on top ten customers of the Group; and
- Analysing the monthly revenue and assessing the reasonableness of management's explanations for any irregular fluctuations as identified by us.

KEY AUDIT MATTERS *(continued)***Key audit matter**

Valuation of financial asset at fair value through profit or loss

We identified the valuation of the financial asset at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL"), as a key audit matter as it is quantitative significant to the consolidated financial statements as a whole, combined with the significant estimates required in determining its fair value.

As at December 31, 2020, the Group's financial asset at FVTPL represents its investment in an unlisted equity investment fund, 青島嘉匯股權投資基金合夥企業(有限合夥) Tsingtao Jia Hui Equity Investment Fund (Limited Partnership) ("Jia Hui LLP"), which was stated at fair value amounted to appropriately RMB100.7 million, and the fair value loss on the financial asset at FVTPL for the year then ended amounted to approximately RMB346,000.

As set out in notes 24 and 43(c) to the consolidated financial statements, the Group's financial asset at FVTPL was measured using the fair value model based on a valuation performed by independent professional qualified valuers (the "Valuers"). In estimating the fair value of the Group's financial asset at FVTPL, the fair value of Jia Hui LLP was determined based on the asset based approach by subtracting the total liabilities of the unlisted equity investment fund from its total assets. The valuations are dependent on significant inputs that involve significant estimates, including fair value assessment of the underlying assets held by Jia Hui LLP.

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

Our procedures in relation to the valuation of financial asset at FVTPL included:

- Evaluating the competence, capabilities and objectivity of the Valuers; and
- Assessing, with the involvement of our internal valuation specialists, the methodology and the reasonableness of key assumptions adopted in the valuation model.

The directors of the Company are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, but does not include the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended December 31, 2020

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Jiashili Group Limited (the “Company”) was incorporated as an exempted company with limited liability in the Cayman Islands on December 19, 2013. Its ultimate and immediate holding company is Great Logistics Global Limited and Kaiyuan Investments Limited, respectively. Its ultimate controlling shareholder is Mr. Huang Xianming and his family. The address of the registered office of the Company is Cricket Square, Hutchins Drive, P.O. Box 2681, Grand Cayman, KY1-1111, Cayman Islands. The address of the principal place of business of the Company is Flat 10A, 14/F, Splendid Centre, 100 Larch Street, Kowloon, Hong Kong.

The Company is an investment holding company. The principal activities of the Company and its subsidiaries (the “Group”) are manufacturing and sales of biscuit and other products in Mainland China (the “PRC”).

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Renminbi (“RMB”), which is also the functional currency of the Company.

2. APPLICATION OF AMENDMENTS TO INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL REPORTING STANDARDS (“IFRSs”)

Amendments to IFRSs that are mandatorily effective for the current year

2.1 Impacts on application of Amendments to IAS 1 and IAS 8 Definition of Material

The Group has applied the Amendments to IAS 1 and IAS 8 for the first time in the current year. The amendments provide a new definition of material that states “information is material if omitting, misstating or obscuring it could reasonably be expected to influence decisions that the primary users of general purpose financial statements make on the basis of those financial statements, which provide financial information about a specific reporting entity.” The amendments also clarify that materiality depends on the nature or magnitude of information, either individually or in combination with other information, in the context of the financial statements taken as a whole.

The application of the amendments in the current year had no impact on the consolidated financial statements.

2.2 Impacts on application of Amendments to IFRS 3 Definition of a Business

The Group has applied the amendments for the first time in the current year. The amendments clarify that while businesses usually have outputs, outputs are not required for an integrated set of activities and assets to qualify as a business. To be considered a business, an acquired set of activities and assets must include, at a minimum, an input and a substantive process that together significantly contribute to the ability to create outputs.

The amendments remove the assessment of whether market participants are capable of replacing any missing inputs or processes and continuing to produce outputs. The amendments also introduce additional guidance that helps to determine whether a substantive process has been acquired.

In addition, the amendments introduce an optional concentration test that permits a simplified assessment of whether an acquired set of activities and assets is not a business. Under the optional concentration test, the acquired set of activities and assets is not a business if substantially all of the fair value of the gross assets acquired is concentrated in a single identifiable asset or group of similar assets. The gross assets under assessment exclude cash and cash equivalents, deferred tax assets, and goodwill resulting from the effects of deferred tax liabilities. The election on whether to apply the optional concentration test is available on transaction-by-transaction basis.

The amendments had no impact on the consolidated financial statements of the Group but may impact future periods should the Group make any acquisition.

The amendments provide clarification and additional guidance on the assessment of right to defer settlement for at least twelve months from reporting date for classification of liabilities as current or non-current, which:

- specify that the classification of liabilities as current or non-current should be based on rights that are in existence at the end of the reporting period. Specifically, the amendments clarify that:
 - (i) the classification should not be affected by management intentions or expectations to settle the liability within 12 months; and
 - (ii) if the right is conditional on the compliance with covenants, the right exists if the conditions are met at the end of the reporting period, even if the lender does not test compliance until a later date;
- clarify that if a liability has terms that could, at the option of the counterparty, result in its settlement by the transfer of the entity’s own equity instruments, these terms do not affect its classification as current or non-current only if the entity recognises the option separately as an equity instrument applying IAS 32 *Financial Instruments: Presentation*.

Based on the Group’s outstanding liabilities as at December 31, 2020 the application of the amendments will not result in reclassification of the Group’s liabilities.

3.1 Basis of preparation of consolidated financial statements

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with IFRSs issued by IASB. For the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements, information is considered material if such information is reasonably expected to influence decisions made by primary users. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the “Stock Exchange”) and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these consolidated financial statements is determined on such a basis, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of IFRS 2 *Share-based Payment*, leasing transactions that are accounted for in accordance with IFRS 16, and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in IAS 2 *Inventories* or value in use in IAS 36 *Impairment of Assets*.

For financial instruments which are transacted at fair value and a valuation technique that unobservable inputs is to be used to measure fair value in subsequent periods, the valuation technique is calibrated so that at initial recognition the results of the valuation technique equals the transaction price.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs are inputs, other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

3.2 Significant accounting policies

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Company:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date when the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Profit or loss and each item of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests. Total comprehensive income of subsidiaries is attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

When necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies in line with the Group's accounting policies.

All intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

Non-controlling interests in subsidiaries are presented separately from the Group's equity therein, which represent present ownership interests entitling their holders to a proportionate share of net assets of the relevant subsidiaries upon liquidation.

Business combinations

Optional concentration test

Effective from January 1, 2020, the Group can elect to apply an optional concentration test, on a transaction-by-transaction basis, that permits a simplified assessment of whether an acquired set of activities and assets is not a business. The concentration test is met if substantially all of the fair value of the gross assets acquired is concentrated in a single identifiable asset or group of similar identifiable assets. The gross assets under assessment exclude cash and cash equivalents, deferred tax assets, and goodwill resulting from the effects of deferred tax liabilities. If the concentration test is met, the set of activities and assets is determined not to be a business and no further assessment is needed.

Asset acquisitions

When the Group acquires a group of assets and liabilities that do not constitute a business, the Group identifies and recognises the individual identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed by allocating the purchase price first to financial assets/financial liabilities at the respective fair values, the remaining balance of the purchase price is then allocated to the other identifiable assets and liabilities on the basis of their relative fair values at the date of purchase. Such a transaction does not give rise to goodwill or bargain purchase gain.

Business combinations

Acquisitions of businesses other than business combination under common control are accounted for using the acquisition method. The consideration transferred in a business combination is measured at fair value, which is calculated as the sum of the acquisition-date fair values of the assets transferred by the Group, liabilities incurred by the Group to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the Group in exchange for control of the acquiree. Acquisition-related costs are generally recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Except for certain recognition exemptions, the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed must meet the definitions of an asset and a liability in the International Accounting Standards Committee's *Framework for the Preparation and Presentation of Financial Statements* (replaced by the Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting issued in September 2010).

At the acquisition date, the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed are recognised at their fair value, except that:

- deferred tax assets or liabilities and assets or liabilities related to employee benefit arrangements are recognised and measured in accordance with IAS 12 *Income Taxes* and IAS 19 *Employee Benefits* respectively;
- liabilities or equity instruments related to share-based payment arrangements of the acquiree or share-based payment arrangements of the Group entered into to replace share-based payment arrangements of the acquiree are measured in accordance with IFRS 2 at the acquisition date;
- assets (or disposal groups) that are classified as held-for-sale in accordance with IFRS 5 *Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations* are measured in accordance with that standard; and

- lease liabilities are recognised and measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments (as defined in IFRS 16) as if the acquired leases were new leases at the acquisition date, except for leases for which (a) the lease term ends within 12 months of the acquisition date; or (b) the underlying asset is of low value. Right-of-use assets are recognised and measured at the same amount as the relevant lease liabilities, adjusted to reflect favourable or unfavourable terms of the lease when compared with market terms.

Goodwill is measured as the excess of the sum of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree, and the fair value of the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquiree (if any) over the net amount of the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed as at acquisition date. If, after re-assessment, the net amount of the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed exceeds the sum of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree and the fair value of the acquirer's previously held interest in the acquiree (if any), the excess is recognised immediately in profit or loss as a bargain purchase gain.

Non-controlling interests that are present ownership interests and entitle their holders to a proportionate share of the relevant subsidiary's net assets in the event of liquidation are initially measured at the non-controlling interests' proportionate share of the recognised amounts of the acquiree's identifiable net assets or at fair value.

Goodwill

Goodwill arising on an acquisition of a business is carried at cost as established at the date of acquisition of the business (see the accounting policy above) less accumulated impairment losses, if any.

For the purposes of impairment testing, goodwill is allocated to each of the Group's cash-generating units (or group of cash-generating units) that is expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, which represent the lowest level at which the goodwill is monitored for internal management purposes and not larger than an operating segment.

A cash-generating unit (or group of cash-generating units) to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment annually or more frequently when there is indication that the unit may be impaired. For goodwill arising on an acquisition in a reporting period, the cash-generating unit (or group of cash-generating units) to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment before the end of that reporting period. If the recoverable amount is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit (or group of cash-generating units).

On disposal of the relevant cash-generating unit or any of the cash-generating unit within the group of cash-generating units, the attributable amount of goodwill is included in the determination of the amount of profit or loss on disposal. When the Group disposes of an operation within the cash-generating unit (or a cash-generating unit within a group of cash-generating units), the amount of goodwill disposed of is measured on the basis of the relative values of the operation (or the cash-generating unit) disposed of and the portion of the cash-generating unit (or the group of cash-generating units) retained.

The Group's policy for goodwill arising on the acquisition of an associate and a joint venture is described below.

Investments in associates and joint ventures

An associate is an entity over which the Group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint arrangement. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The results and assets and liabilities of associates and joint ventures are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting. The financial statements of associates and joint ventures used for equity accounting purposes are prepared using uniform accounting policies as those of the Group for like transactions and events in similar circumstances. Under the equity method, an investment in an associate or a joint venture is initially recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the associate or joint venture. Changes in net assets of the associate/joint venture other than profit or loss and other comprehensive income are not accounted for unless such changes resulted in changes in ownership interest held by the Group. When the Group's share of losses of an associate or a joint venture exceeds the Group's interest in that associate or joint venture (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the associate or joint venture), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate or joint venture.

An investment in an associate or a joint venture is accounted for using the equity method from the date on which the investee becomes an associate or a joint venture. On acquisition of the investment in an associate or a joint venture, any excess of the cost of the investment over the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities of the investee is recognised as goodwill, which is included within the carrying amount of the investment. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of the investment, after reassessment, is recognised immediately in profit or loss in the period in which the investment is acquired.

The Group assesses whether there is an objective evidence that the interest in an associate or a joint venture may be impaired. When any objective evidence exists, the entire carrying amount of the investment (including goodwill) is tested for impairment in accordance with IAS 36 as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs of disposal) with its carrying amount. Any impairment loss recognised is not allocated to any asset, including goodwill, that forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with IAS 36 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

When the Group ceases to have significant influence over an associate or joint control over a joint venture, it is accounted for as a disposal of the entire interest in the investee with a resulting gain or loss being recognised in profit or loss. When the Group retains an interest in the former associate or joint venture and the retained interest is a financial asset within the scope of IFRS 9, the Group measures the retained interest at fair value at that date and the fair value is regarded as its fair value on initial recognition. The difference between the carrying amount of the associate or joint venture and the fair value of any retained interest and any proceeds from disposing of the relevant interest in the associate or joint venture is included in the determination of the gain or loss on disposal of the associate or joint venture. In addition, the Group accounts for all amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in relation to that associate or joint venture on the same basis as would be required if that associate or joint venture had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities. Therefore, if a gain or loss previously recognised in other comprehensive income by that associate or joint venture would be reclassified to profit or loss on the disposal of the related assets or liabilities, the Group reclassifies the gain or loss from equity to profit or loss (as a reclassification adjustment) upon disposal/partial disposal of the relevant associate or joint venture.

The Group continues to use the equity method when an investment in an associate becomes an investment in a joint venture or an investment in a joint venture becomes an investment in an associate. There is no remeasurement to fair value upon such changes in ownership interests.

When the Group reduces its ownership interest in an associate or a joint venture but the Group continues to use the equity method, the Group reclassifies to profit or loss the proportion of the gain or loss that had previously been recognised in other comprehensive income relating to that reduction in ownership interest if that gain or loss would be reclassified to profit or loss on the disposal of the related assets or liabilities.

When a group entity transacts with an associate or a joint venture of the Group, profits and losses resulting from the transactions with the associate or joint venture are recognised in the Group's consolidated financial statements only to the extent of interests in the associate or joint venture that are not related to the Group.

Revenue from contracts with customers

The Group recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, i.e. when "control" of the goods or services underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to customers.

A performance obligation represents a good or service (or a bundle of goods or services) that is distinct or a series of distinct goods or services that are substantially the same.

Control is transferred over time and revenue is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation if one of the following criteria is met:

- the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the Group's performance as the Group performs;
- the Group's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the Group performs; or
- the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

Otherwise, revenue is recognised at a point in time when the customer obtains control of the distinct good or service.

A contract liability represents the Group's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Group has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer.

Consideration payable to a customer

Consideration payable to a customer includes cash amounts that the Group pays, or expects to pay, to the customer. Consideration payable to a customer also includes credit or other items (e.g. a coupon or voucher) that can be applied against amounts owed to the Group. The Group accounts for consideration payable to a customer as a reduction of the transaction price and, therefore, of revenue.

Accordingly, if consideration payable to a customer is accounted for as a reduction of the transaction price, it is recognised when (or as) the later of either of the following events occurs:

- the Group recognises revenue for the transfer of the related goods or services to the customer; and
- the Group pays or promises to pay the consideration (even if the payment is conditional on a future event). That promise might be implied by the Group's customary business practices.

Revenue from sales of biscuit and other products is recognised at a point in time when there is persuasive evidence that the control of the goods has been transferred to the customer, the customer has adequate control over the product and the Group has no unfulfilled obligations that affect customer acceptance of the products. Consideration payable to the customer includes slotting fees and promotional discounts are deducted from revenue.

Leases

Definition of a lease

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

For contracts entered into or modified or after the date of initial application or arising from business combinations, the Group assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease based on the definition under IFRS 16 at inception, modification date or acquisition date, as appropriate. Such contract will not be reassessed unless the terms and conditions of the contract are subsequently changed.

The Group as a lessee

Allocation of consideration to components of a contract

For a contract that contains a lease component and one or more additional lease or non-lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components, including contract for acquisition of ownership interests of a property which includes both leasehold land and non-lease building components, unless such allocation cannot be made reliably.

The Group applies practical expedient not to separate non-lease components from lease component, and instead account for the lease component and any associated non-lease components as a single lease component.

Short-term leases

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to leases of office premises that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option. Lease payments on short-term leases are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Amounts due from lessees under finance leases are recognised as receivables at commencement date at amounts equal to net investments in the leases, measured using the interest rate implicit in the respective leases. Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rates of exchanges prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on the retranslation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

Government grants

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants related to income that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable. Such grants are presented under “other income”.

Employee benefits

Retirement benefit costs

Payments to defined retirement benefit plans and the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme are recognised as expenses when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

Short-term and other long-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are recognised at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid as and when employees rendered the services. All short-term employee benefits are recognised as an expense unless another IFRS requires or permits the inclusion of the benefit in the cost of an asset.

A liability is recognised for benefits accruing to employees (such as wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave) after deducting any amount already paid.

Liabilities recognised in respect of other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows expected to be made by the Group in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Any changes in the liabilities' carrying amounts resulting from service cost, interest and remeasurements are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that another IFRS requires or permits their inclusion in the cost of an asset.

Shares/Share options granted to employees

Equity-settled share-based payments to employees and others providing similar services are measured at the fair value of the equity instruments at the grant date.

The fair value of the equity-settled share-based payments determined at the grant date without taking into consideration all non-market vesting conditions is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, based on the Group's estimate of equity instruments that will eventually vest, with a corresponding increase in equity (share options reserve). At the end of each reporting period, the Group revises its estimate of the number of equity instruments expected to vest based on assessment of all relevant non-market vesting conditions. The impact of the revision of the original estimates, if any, is recognised in profit or loss such that the cumulative expense reflects the revised estimate, with a corresponding adjustment to share options reserve. For share options that vest immediately at the date of grant, the fair value of the share options granted is expensed immediately to profit or loss.

When share options are exercised, the amount previously recognised in share options reserve will be transferred to share premium. When share options are forfeited after the vesting date or are still not exercised at the expiry date, the amount previously recognised in share options reserve will be transferred to accumulated profits.

Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit before tax because of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such deferred assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit. In addition, deferred tax liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of goodwill.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries and associates, and interests in joint ventures, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for leasing transactions in which the Group recognises the right-of-use assets and the related lease liabilities, the Group first determines whether the tax deductions are attributable to the right-of-use assets or the lease liabilities.

For leasing transactions in which the tax deductions are attributable to the lease liabilities, the Group applies IAS 12 *Income Taxes* requirements to right-of-use assets and lease liabilities separately. Temporary differences relating to right-of-use assets and lease liabilities are not recognised at initial recognition and over the lease terms due to application of the initial recognition exemption. Temporary differences arising from subsequent revision to the carrying amounts of right-of-use assets and lease liabilities, resulting from remeasurement of lease liabilities and lease modifications, that are not subject to initial recognition exemption are recognised on the date of remeasurement or modification.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied to the same taxable entity by the same taxation authority.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss. Where current tax or deferred tax arises from the initial accounting for a business combination, the tax effect is included in the accounting for the business combination.

Property, plant and equipment are tangible assets that are held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes (other than construction in progress as described below), are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Properties in the course of construction for production, supply or administrative purposes (construction in progress) are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Costs include any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

When the Group makes payments for ownership interests of properties which includes both leasehold land and building elements, the entire consideration is allocated between the leasehold land and the building elements in proportion to the relative fair values at initial recognition. To the extent the allocation of the relevant payments can be made reliably, interest in leasehold land is presented as “right-of-use assets” in the consolidated statement of financial position.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of assets (other than construction in progress) less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired separately

Intangible assets with finite useful lives that are acquired separately are carried at costs less accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses. Amortisation for intangible assets with finite useful lives is recognised on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful life and amortisation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate being accounted for on a prospective basis. Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives that are acquired separately are carried at cost less any subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Internally-generated intangible assets — research and development expenditure

Expenditure on research activities is recognised as an expense in the period in which it is incurred.

An internally-generated intangible asset arising from development activities (or from the development phase of an internal project) is recognised if, and only if, all of the following have been demonstrated:

- the technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale;
- the intention to complete the intangible asset and use or sell it;
- the ability to use or sell the intangible asset;
- how the intangible asset will generate probable future economic benefits;
- the availability of adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use or sell the intangible asset; and
- the ability to measure reliably the expenditure attributable to the intangible asset during its development.

The amount initially recognised for internally-generated intangible asset is the sum of the expenditure incurred from the date when the intangible asset first meets the recognition criteria listed above. Where no internally-generated intangible asset can be recognised, development expenditure is recognised in profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred.

Subsequent to initial recognition, internally-generated intangible assets are reported at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses (if any), on the same basis as intangible assets that are acquired separately.

Intangible assets acquired in a business combination

Intangible assets acquired in a business combination are recognised separately from goodwill and are initially recognised at their fair value at the acquisition date (which is regarded as their cost).

Subsequent to initial recognition, intangible assets acquired in a business combination with finite useful lives are reported at costs less accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses, on the same basis as intangible assets that are acquired separately.

At the end of each reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets, intangible assets with finite useful lives and prepayments to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the relevant asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets, intangible assets and prepayments are estimated individually. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount individually, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, corporate assets are allocated to the relevant cash-generating unit when a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be established, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be established. The recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units to which the corporate asset belongs, and is compared with the carrying amount of the relevant cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset (or a cash-generating unit) for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

For corporate assets or portion of corporate assets which cannot be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis to a cash-generating unit, the Group compares the carrying amount of a group of cash-generating units, including the carrying amounts of the corporate assets or portion of corporate assets allocated to that group of cash-generating units, with the recoverable amount of the group of cash-generating units. In allocating the impairment loss, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill (if applicable) and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit or the group of cash-generating units. The carrying amount of an asset is not reduced below the highest of its fair value less costs of disposal (if measurable), its value in use (if determinable) and zero. The amount of the impairment loss that would otherwise have been allocated to the asset is allocated pro rata to the other assets of the unit or the group of cash-generating units. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs of inventories are determined on a weighted average method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for inventories less all estimated costs of completion and costs necessary to make the sale.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset or financial liability and of allocating interest income and interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts and payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset or financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Financial assets

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

(i) Amortised cost and interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for financial assets measured subsequently at amortised cost. Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired (see below). For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset from the next reporting period. If the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset from the beginning of the reporting period following the determination that the asset is no longer credit-impaired.

All other financial assets are measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets at FVTPL are measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, with any fair value gains or losses recognised in profit or loss. The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss includes any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset and is included in the “other gains and losses” line item.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group performs impairment assessment under expected credit loss (“ECL”) model on financial assets (including trade receivables, bills and other receivables, loan receivables, amounts due from associates, a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary and a related party, loan to a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary, pledged bank deposits and bank balances) which are subject to impairment assessment under IFRS 9. The amount of ECL is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL represents the ECL that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the relevant instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL (“12m ECL”) represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date. Assessment are done based on the Group’s historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current conditions at the reporting date as well as the forecast of future conditions.

The Group always recognises lifetime ECL for trade receivables.

For all other instruments, the Group measures the loss allowance equal to 12m ECL, unless when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, in which case the Group recognises lifetime ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition.

- (i) Significant increase in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the Group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether credit risk has increased significantly:

- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the financial instrument's external (if available) or internal credit rating;
- significant deterioration in external market indicators of credit risk, e.g. a significant increase in the credit spread, the credit default swap prices for the debtor;
- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor;
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the Group presumes that the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

The Group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

(ii) Definition of default

For internal credit risk management, the Group considers an event of default occurs when information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the debtor is unlikely to pay its creditors, including the Group, in full (without taking into account any collaterals held by the Group).

Irrespective of the above, the Group considers that default has occurred when a financial asset is more than 90 days past due unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

(iii) Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that financial asset have occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes observable data about the following events:

- (a) significant financial difficulty of the issuer or the borrower;
- (b) a breach of contract, such as a default or past due event;
- (c) the lender(s) of the borrower, for economic or contractual reasons relating to the borrower's financial difficulty, having granted to the borrower a concession(s) that the lender(s) would not otherwise consider; or
- (d) it is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation.

(iv) Write-off policy

The Group writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the counterparty is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, for example, when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Group's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. A write-off constitutes a derecognition event. Any subsequent recoveries are recognised in profit or loss.

(v) Measurement and recognition of ECL

The measurement of ECL is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based on historical data and forward-looking information. Estimation of ECL reflects an unbiased and probability-weighted amount that is determined with the respective risks of default occurring as the weights. The Group uses a practical expedient in estimating ECL on trade receivables using a provision matrix taking into consideration historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

Generally, the ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at the effective interest rate determined at initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL for certain trade receivables is considered on a collective basis taking into consideration past due information and relevant credit information such as forward looking macroeconomic information.

For collective assessment, the Group takes into consideration the following characteristics when formulating the grouping:

- Past-due status; and
- Nature, size and industry of debtors;

The grouping is regularly reviewed by management to ensure the constituents of each group continue to share similar credit risk characteristics.

Interest income is calculated based on the gross carrying amount of the financial asset unless the financial asset is credit-impaired, in which case interest income is calculated based on amortised cost of the financial asset.

The Group recognises an impairment gain or loss in profit or loss for all financial instruments by adjusting their carrying amount, with the exception of trade receivables and loan receivables where the corresponding adjustment is recognised through a loss allowance account.

Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the Company are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Financial liabilities at amortised cost

Financial liabilities (including trade, bills and other payables, amount due to a non-controlling shareholder of subsidiaries, amount due to a joint venture and related party and bank borrowings) are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

Fair value measurement and valuation process of financial asset at FVTPL

The fair value assessment of financial asset at FVTPL was made by the directors of the Company by reference to the valuation performed by an independent professional qualified valuer.

For the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, as there is limited operation in the investments of the unlisted equity investment fund, so the fair value of the Group's financial asset at FVTPL was determined based on the asset based approach by subtracting the total liabilities of the unlisted equity investment fund from its total assets. The carrying amount of the unlisted equity investment fund as at December 31, 2020 was RMB100,691,000 (2019: RMB101,037,000) with fair value loss recognised in profit or loss of RMB346,000 (2019: fair value loss of RMB2,463,000) for the year then ended.

Notwithstanding that the management of the Group employs an independent professional qualified valuer to perform the fair value assessment based on their assumptions, the fair values of these unlisted equity investment fund may be higher or lower depending on the future performance of the unlisted equity investment fund.

The information about the fair value measurement of the unlisted equity investment fund is set out in note 43(c).

Pursuant to the strategic cooperative agreement signed with Kailan, the Group made a prepayment in total of RM100,000,000 in 2019 for flour. Since June 2019, Kailan suspended its operation due to its financial problem, and therefore fail to fulfil its obligations under the strategic cooperative agreement and defaulted on the supply of flour and fail to repay of the unutilized balance of the prepaid amount to the Group. On September 24, 2019, Guangdong Jiashili filed a claim with Guangdong Kaiping People's Court (廣東省開平市人民法院) (“Kaiping People's Court”) against Kailan and the management of Kailan for breach of the strategic cooperation agreement. On December 26, 2019, a judgment was made by the Kaiping People's Court in favour of Guangdong Jiashili, pursuant to which, among other things, (i) Kailan shall pay RMB80,332,000, being the unutilised balance of the prepaid amount of RMB75,421,000 as well as a compensation charge of RMB4,911,000, to Guangdong Jiashili within ten days from the effective date of the judgment; and (ii) Guangdong Jiashili can enforce its rights against the wheat and flour kept by Kailan, including the flour and wheat in the warehouse of Kailan. However, Kailan was unable to settle the amount based on the judgment.

The Group evaluated the recoverable amount from the legal case with reference to the legal opinion from an independent lawyer. In accordance with the legal opinion, the Group has a legal right to claim the amount due from Kailan, and those flour and wheat were pledged against the prepayment made by the Group. However, the insolvency administrators did not find the physical existence of those flour and wheat kept by Kailan, so the expected value of the flour and wheat as at December 31, 2019 is nil. The Group also assessed the recoverable amount with reference to the unpledged assets list of Kailan and the management of Kailan from the legal opinion and public search. As at December 31, 2019, the recoverable amount was approximately RMB780,000 and an impairment loss of RMB74,641,000 has been provided in respect of the prepayment to Kailan. As at December 31, 2020, Kailan was still under restructuring of its assets, liabilities, equities and business with the insolvency administrators appointed by the court and creditors. Thus, the Group performed the assessment of the recoverable amount by using the same approach in 2019 and no addition impairment loss has been provided in respected of the prepayment to Kailan as at December 31, 2020. Details of the impairment loss on prepayment for purchase of raw materials from Kailan are disclosed in note 8.

(ii) Performance obligations for contracts with customers

The Group sells biscuit and other products to distributors and supermarkets throughout the PRC and also export biscuit and other products to location other than the PRC.

For sales of biscuit and other products to customers, revenue is recognised at a point in time when control of the biscuit and other products is transferred, being when the goods have been shipped to the customers' specific location (delivery). Following delivery, the customers have full discretion over the manner of distribution and price to sell the goods, and have the primary responsibility on when selling the goods and bear the risks of obsolescence and loss in relation to the goods. For distributors, the Group normally receives an advance from customer before the good is delivered. For supermarkets, the normal credit term is from 30 to 180 days upon delivery.

A contract liability represents the Group's obligation to sales of biscuit and other products to customers for which the Group has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due to) from customers while revenue has yet been recognised.

Limited (廣東嘉士利食品集團有限公司) (“Guangdong Jiashili”), a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company, entered into a strategic cooperative agreement with Kailan for procurement of flour from February 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019. At December 31, 2019, with reference to the unpledged assets list of Kailan, Mr. Ye and Ms. Guan from the legal opinion and public search, the Group assessed that the expected recoverable amount of the prepayment from Kailan, Mr. Ye and Ms. Guan was amounted to approximately RMB780,000. An impairment loss of RMB74,641,000 has been provided in respect of the prepayment to Kailan during the year ended December 31, 2019.

During the year ended December 31, 2020, in view of the insolvency of Kailan, insolvency administrators (the “Administrators”) were being appointed by the Intermediate People’s Court of Jiangmen, Guangdong* 廣東省江門市中級人民法院 (“Jiangmen People’s Court”). In November 2020, the Administrators have formulated a restructuring proposal ("Original Restructuring Proposal") for the purpose of restructuring the assets, liabilities, equities and business of Kailan, subject to the approvals from the creditors of Kailan including the Group and the Jiangmen People's Court. The Original Restructuring Proposal was not approved by the creditors including the Group.

Subsequent to the year ended, in January 2021, the Administrators has formulated a new restructuring proposal in relation to the restructuring of Kailan ("New Restructuring Proposal"). The Administrators in the restructuring of Kailan shall, after it has succeeded in the judicial auction for the sale of 100% interest in Kailan ("Judicial Auction"), apply the proceeds of the bidding to settle the debts owed by Kailan to the creditors pursuant to the New Restructuring Proposal as approved by the Jiangmen People's Court. The New Restructuring Proposal was approved by the creditors and the Jiangmen People's Court on January 4, 2021 and the Judicial Auction was completed on January 20, 2021.

The Group's joint venture, Guangdong Fengjia Food Co. Limited* 廣東豐嘉食品有限公司 ("Fengjia") succeeded in the bidding for the sale of 100% interest in Kailan in the Judicial Auction with a bidding cost of RMB210,000,000. For the purpose of the Judicial Auction, the Group, as a joint venture partner of Fengjia, provided guarantee in favour of the Administrators for the due performance by Fengjia of its entire obligations in the bidding in the Judicial Auction and other obligations, if any, under the New Restructuring Proposal as adjudicated by the Jiangmen People's Court within the guarantee period, in the amount of not more than RMB210,000,000. It is further stated that the guarantee shall be valid for the period from the date of the Judicial Auction until December 31, 2021.

In addition, to fund the acquisition of Kailan by Fengjia, in January 2021, the Group has granted a loan to Fengjia amounting to RMB150,000,000 of a term of 12 months. The loan advance to Fengjia is secured by the 100% of Kailan, interest bearing at 5% per annum and repayable 12 months from the drawdown date of the loan with early repayment option by Fengjia.

The acquisition of Kailan by Fengjia was completed in January 2021. The Group shall be entitled to recover approximately RMB80,474,000, including the unutilised prepayment balance, compensation and interest, from Kailan as stipulated under the New Restructuring Proposal. Up to the date of this report, the Group has received approximately RMB50,474,000 from Kailan.

No provision for Hong Kong Profits Tax has been made for both years as the Group has no assessable profits arising in Hong Kong.

Guangdong Jiashili was accredited as a High-New Technology Enterprise by the Science and Technology Bureau of Guangdong Province (廣東省科學技術廳) and relevant authorities in the PRC with effect from January 2018 for a term of three years. Guangdong Jiashili was registered with the local tax authority to be eligible to the reduced 15% EIT rate for three years from 2018 to 2020.

For other group entities in the PRC, under the Law of the PRC on EIT (the “EIT Law”) and Implementation Regulations of the EIT Law, the EIT rate was 25% for both years.

According to Cai Shui 2008 No. 1, a joint circular of Ministry of Finance and State Administration of Taxation, dividend distributed out of the profits generated since January 1, 2008 by a PRC entity to a non-PRC tax resident shall be subject to withholding EIT pursuant to Articles 3 and 19 of the EIT Law.

The Company’s subsidiaries that are PRC tax resident are required to withhold the PRC withholding EIT of 10% on dividend payment to their non-PRC resident immediate holding company, unless such dividend payment is qualified for the 5% reduced tax rate under the Arrangement between Mainland China and Hong Kong for the Avoidance of Double Taxation and the Prevention of Fiscal Evasion with respect to Taxes on Income (the “PRC-HK DTA”).

Jiashili (Hong Kong) Limited (“Jiashili HK”) is qualified as a Hong Kong tax resident. Jiashili HK has obtained the Hong Kong resident certificate for the calendar year 2018 and was valid for three years ended December 31, 2020. Jiashili HK enjoys a reduced tax rate under Bulletin [2018] No. 9 (國家稅務總局公告2018年第9號) (e.g. beneficial ownership, shareholding percentage and holding period) of withholding EIT rate of 5% on dividend income for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, pursuant to the PRC-HK DTA.

As at December 31, 2020, the fair value of Jia Hui LLP is amounting to RMB100,691,000 (2019: RMB101,037,000) with a fair value loss recognised in profit or loss of RMB346,000 for the year ended December 31, 2020 (2019: a fair value loss of RMB2,463,000). Details of the establishment of Jia Hui LLP are set out in the Company's announcement dated June 26, 2019.

42. CAPITAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group manages its capital to ensure that entities in the Group will be able to continue as a going concern while maximising the return to equity owners through the optimisation of the debt and equity balances. The Group's overall strategy remains unchanged during the year.

The capital structure of the Group consists of net debt, which includes the bank borrowings disclosed in note 33, net of cash and cash equivalents and equity attributable to owners of the Company, comprising share capital, accumulated profits and other reserves.

The management of the Group reviews the capital structure periodically. As part of this review, the management considers the cost of capital and the risks associated with the capital. Trade receivables arising from contracts with customers

In order to minimise the credit risk, the Group generally adopts a policy to require advance payment from majority of their customers before the delivery of goods. Before granting credit to customers, the management of the Group has delegated a team responsible for determination of credit limits and credit approvals and to determine any debt recovery action on those delinquent accounts receivable arising from contracts with customers. The Group also reviews the credit quality and defines credit limits by these customers. Limits attributed to these customers are reviewed once a year and each customer has a maximum credit limit. The Group maintains a defined credit policy to assess the credit quality of these customers and seeks to maintain strict control over its outstanding receivables so as to minimise credit risk. In this regard, the directors of the Company consider that the Group's credit risk is significantly reduced.

The trade receivables balance at the end of each reporting period represented credit sales to certain customers. With respect to these credit sales, the Group has concentration of credit risk as 42% (2019: 38%) of the Group's total trade receivables as at December 31, 2020, were due from five customers. Those five customers are with good creditworthiness based on historical settlement record.

In addition, the Group performs impairment assessment under ECL model on trade receivables balance by using provision matrix. Trade receivables are grouped under a provision matrix based on shared credit risk characteristics by reference to repayment histories for recurring customers. Impairment of RMB4,980,000 (2019: RMB2,218,000) is recognised during the year ended December 31, 2020. Details of the quantitative disclosures are set out below in this note.

Before accepting any new borrowers, the Group conducted credit check to assess the borrowers' credit quality and periodically review borrowers' financial statements in order to mitigate the credit risk of loan receivables and loans to a joint venture and a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary. The Group performs impairment assessment under ECL model on loan receivables and loans to a joint venture and a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary individually. For the unsecured loan receivables, the directors of the Company estimate the estimated loss rates based on historical credit loss experience of the debtors in view of their financial position and the market data. For the loan receivables and the loan to a joint venture and a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary with collaterals, the directors of the Company will estimate the estimated loss rate based on historical credit loss experience of the debtors as well as the fair value of the collaterals pledged by the borrowers. Based on assessment by the directors of the Company, the borrowers has certain risk of default in view of the realised amount of the collaterals and estimated financial position of borrowers on their ability to repay the loan receivables upon the due date. For the loans to a joint venture and a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary, the directors of the Company believe that there is no material credit risk inherent and consider that the ECL of the loan to a non-controlling shareholder of a subsidiary is insignificant. Details of the quantitative disclosures are set out below in this note.

Pledged bank deposits, bank balances and bills receivables

Credit risk on pledged bank deposits, bank balances and bills receivables is limited because the counterparties are reputable banks with high credit ratings assigned by credit agencies. The Group assessed 12m ECL for bank balances and bills receivables by reference to information relating to probability of default and loss given default of the respective credit rating grades published by external credit rating agencies. Based on the average loss rates from reputable credit agencies, the 12m ECL on pledged bank deposits, bank balances and bills receivables is considered to be insignificant.

Other receivables

The Group assessed 12m ECL and lifetime ECL for other receivables. The management of the Group makes periodic individual assessment on the recoverability of other receivables based on historical settlement records, past experience, and also available reasonable and supportive forward-looking information under ECL model.
