### **CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT**

Dear Shareholders,

On behalf of the Group and the Board of Directors of the Group, I am pleased to present to the Shareholders the audited annual results for the year ended 31 December 2022. During 2022, the Group and its employees managed to weather the storm and rise to the occasion by uniting together dauntlessly and persistently to expand its market and control its internal costs, with a focus on efficient operation, effective production, and high-quality development. In 2022, the Group recorded a turnover of approximately RMB2,107.3 million (2021: approximately RMB1,776.0 million), representing a year-on-year increase of approximately 18.7%. Our net profit for the year amounted to approximately RMB138.8 million (2021: approximately RMB115.3 million), representing a year-on-year increase of approximately 20.4%. Earnings per share attributable to ordinary equity holders of the parent company was approximately RMB0.322 (2021: approximately RMB0.267).

In 2022, we were determined to work our fingers to the bone with perseverance. With the resilience to bounce back from obstacles, the courage to forge ahead, and the realization of our important role, we were able to implement annual strategies and deploy production lines, reach the production capacity of new product lines, launch new products to the market, and make a larger breakthrough in new areas. Our production and sales volume of the spiral welded pipes product line increased by more than 50% year-on-year at a record high, our ERW steel pipes products achieved steady growth, our prefabricated products reached the expected goal of maintaining stable price and profitability, and our assembled prefabricated products were highly appreciated among customers.

In 2022, we weathered the storm with great faith in ourselves. We were awarded multiple honours such as the National Niche Little Giant, the National Green Design Products, and the National Intellectual Property Advantage Enterprise as a result of our complete implementation of the concepts of "concentric diversification" and "focusing on principal businesses", our insistence on high-quality development and transformation into a smart company, and our perseverance for facilitating management transformation and technology enhancement. With this, we will be leading the Company into a new phase.

In 2022, we strived for self-improvement to step up our game. In response to the increasingly complex and severe external market, we had to be more dedicated to our work. We were committed to speeding up the digital transformation with a focus on developing major operating businesses, to prepare ourselves for every possibility. Following the "Go global" strategy, we sent 5 teams to visit 255 oversea customers for 693 days in total to explore opportunities for growth in results. The domestic and foreign sales departments collected sales leads amounting to 4,880 and converted them into valuable sales leads of 3,009 while inviting customers to visit 56 times, and acquiring 355 new customers. The Overseas Projects of Chinese Enterprises and the Long-distance Pipelines Project have made historical breakthroughs. Meanwhile, a continuously refined cost control model and promotion of digital applications increased efficiency by approximately RMB6.93 million, the implementation of production cost reduction amounted to approximately RMB19.88 million, and the enhancement of procurement increased efficiency by approximately RMB17 million, which promoted an extraordinary growth against the trend in the industry.



# CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

In 2022, we were working together to create a win-win situation. We continued to fully implement our corporate culture and improve our employees' sense of achievement, happiness, and security. In 2023, we will strictly comply to the standards of safety, environmental protection, and energy consumption, and make every effort to build "Digital Maike" and "Intellectual Maike" which are innovative-driven, green, low-carbon, and intelligent-manufacturing.

The greats in history have always worked hard on the road to innovation. Today, Maike Tube has confidence in its strategies, procedures, and cultures, and the courage and strength to overcome different challenges without any fear. As the past and the future connect along with the coexistence of opportunities and challenges, we, standing at the starting point for new development, must work harder and smarter together as fighters with great ambition, to continue to the new chapter of Maike Tube's development in a new era.

In November 2010, he founded Superior Alliance Group Company Limited and he has been a director since then, where he was responsible for taxation advisory and company secretarial service. He is currently the company secretary of Da Sen Holdings Group Limited (stock code: 1580), a company listed on the Stock Exchange principally engaged in the manufacturing and sales of plywood and biomass wood pellets, and has been the company secretary of Hang Yick Holdings Company Limited (stock code: 1894), a company listed on the Stock Exchange specialising in design, manufacture, supply and installation of steel and metal products for construction projects in Hong Kong from May 2018 to March 2021.

Mr. Leung graduated from the City University of Hong Kong with a bachelor's degree in business administration majoring in accounting in November 2004. He has been a Hong Kong Certified Public Accountant since February 2010.

Save as disclosed above, there was no relationship among each of the Directors and senior management at the date of this annual report.

#### **BUSINESS REVIEW**

The Group primarily engages in (i) the manufacturing and sales of standard prefabricated pipe nipple products; (ii) the manufacturing and sales of steel pipe products; and (iii) the design and supply of assembled piping systems. We also conducted sales of raw materials that were procured from its suppliers and left unused, including steel coils.

The standard prefabricated pipe nipple products of the Group are used in pipe system to connect straight pipes or pipe sections, which can be adjusted to different sizes or shapes. Standard prefabricated pipe nipple products and steel pipes products feature different specifications, such as length, outside diameter and surface treatment, which cater for various needs of the Group's customers and comply with international standards. We directly or indirectly sold most of our standard prefabricated pipe nipple products and customized steel pipe products to overseas markets. Our welded steel pipe products are roughly classified into standard ERW steel pipes and SSAW steel pipes. Our Group has received certifications in quality control including, among other things, the ISO9001 certification, ISO14001 certification and OHSAS18001 certification. Our products are widely applied in the municipal pipeline system designed for natural gas, water supply, sewage, HVAC and fire extinguish water pipes. Leveraging our industry knowledge and expertise, we also design and supply assembled piping system for our customers. Customers would seek technical advice or suggestions on the design and/or engineering solutions for their desired assembled piping systems through building information modeling and three-dimension design system to minimise wastage of material and improve efficiency, thus reducing production costs.

During the reporting period, the Company has explored potential markets through multiple means under the Board's leadership, in the face of challenges such as the COVID-19 pandemic, the appreciation in the exchange rate of USD to RMB, and the highly volatile prices of main raw materials. For the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group recorded revenue of approximately RMB2,107.3 million, representing a year-on-year increase of 18.7%, and achieved an accumulated net profit of approximately RMB138.8 million, representing a year-on-year increase of 20.4%.

#### **NEW ORDERS**

For the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group received new orders for approximately 21,700 tons of standard prefabricated pipe products, of which approximately 99.3% were from overseas customers; we also received new orders for approximately 208,000 tons of steel pipe products, of which approximately 72.8% were from domestic customers. During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group had delivered approximately 21,100 tons of standard prefabricated pipe products (including Vietnam Piping and Delta Electric (Thailand)) and approximately 199,600 tons of steel pipe products.





#### STANDARD PREFABRICATED PIPE PRODUCTS

The standard prefabricated pipe products are our key competitive products. For the year ended 31 December 2022, our revenue from standard prefabricated pipe products amounted to approximately RMB412.8 million, accounting for 19.6% of the total revenue of the Group; for the year ended 31 December 2021, our revenue from standard prefabricated pipe products amounted to approximately RMB438.6 million, accounting for 24.7% of the total revenue of the Group. The revenue of standard fabricated pipe products decreased by 5.9% as compared to the corresponding period last year, due to a decline in sales volume.

#### STEEL PIPE PRODUCTS

Our steel pipe products are made through rolling steel plate and welding the seam, and are mainly used for gas, water supply, HVAC and fire extinguishment. In order to meet the personal demand of customers, the Group produced standard steel pipes with value-added processes under customised requirements of customers, including but not limited to pipe body processing, non-standardised surface treatment, pipe end processing, thickened galvanisation, and internal smoothing. For the year ended 31 December 2022, our ERW steel pipes, SSAW steel pipes and customised steel pipes recorded revenues of approximately RMB374.0 million, RMB477.6 million and RMB263.4 million, respectively, representing a year-on-year increase of -6.8%, 31.9% and 10.7% as compared to the same period in 2021, respectively. The decrease in ERW steel pipes was mainly due to a decrease in sales volume, while the increase in SSAW steel pipes and customised steel pipes was mainly due to the increase in purchase volume from new customers. The total revenue generated from steel pipe products accounted for approximately 52.9% of the total revenue for the year ended 31 December 2022.

#### DESIGN AND SUPPLY OF ASSEMBLED PIPING SYSTEM

Leveraging our industry experience, we are able to design and supply assembled piping systems to our customers to satisfy various physical and functional characteristics of our customers' designated sites. For the year ended 31 December 2022, our design and supply of assembled piping system recorded the revenue of approximately RMB27.3 million, representing a year-on-year increase of approximately 57.3% as compared to the same period in 2021. The increase was mainly due to an increase in the delivery of orders to our customers, accounting for approximately 1.3% of the total revenue for the year ended 31 December 2022.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Group's revenue is generated from (i) sales of standard prefabricated pipe products; (ii) sales of steel pipe products; (iii) sales of the design and supply of assembled piping systems; and (iv) sales of steel coils that were left unused and procured from its suppliers.

For the year ended 31 December 2022, our total revenue was approximately RMB2,107.3 million, representing an increase of approximately RMB331.3 million or 18.7% as compared to the year ended 31 December 2021. The increase in revenue was mainly due to (i) a year-on-year increase in the sales of steel pipe products; (ii) the increase in the sales of steel coils.

The revenue generated from sales of standard prefabricated pipe products amounted to approximately RMB412.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, representing a decrease of approximately RMB25.8 million or 5.9% as compared to the year ended 31 December 2021, which was mainly due to the decrease in sales volume.

The revenue generated from ERW steel pipes decreased by approximately RMB27.4 million or 6.8% from the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB374.0 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, which was mainly due to the decrease in sales volume and lower product prices; the revenue generated from SSAW steel pipes increased by approximately RMB115.4 million or 31.9% from the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB477.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, which was mainly due to the growth in sales volume; the revenue generated from customised steel pipes increased by approximately RMB25.4 million or 10.7% from the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB263.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, which was mainly due to the growth in sales volume.

The revenue generated from design and supply of assembled piping system increased by approximately RMB9.9 million or 57.3% from approximately RMB17.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB27.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. The increase was mainly due to the increase in the delivery of orders to our customers.

The revenue generated from steel coils increased by approximately RMB233.3 million or 73.3% for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB551.7 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, mainly due to the increase in sales volume.

Others mainly consisted of warehouse service income, which amounted to approximately RMB0.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2022.

#### **GROSS PROFIT AND GROSS PROFIT MARGIN**

Gross profit increased by approximately 18.7% or RMB61.6 million from approximately RMB329.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB390.9 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. Such increase was mainly attributable to the rise in sales volume of SSAW steel pipes and the increase in the average selling price of standard prefabricated pipe products.

#### **OTHER INCOME**

For the year ended 31 December 2022, other income mainly represents government grant and interest income, which decreased from approximately RMB26.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 by approximately 83.8% or RMB22.3 million to approximately RMB4.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. The decrease in other income was mainly due to the decrease in government grant by approximately RMB22.1 million.





#### OTHER GAINS AND LOSSES

For the year ended 31 December 2022, other gains and losses mainly represent gains on sales of scrap materials, fair value gains on structured bank deposits, fair value gains or losses on foreign currency forward contracts, fair value gains or losses on derivative financial instruments and net exchange gains or losses. Other gains and losses for the year ended 31 December 2022 increased by approximately 76.7% to approximately RMB15.2 million (2021: RMB8.6 million) as compared with the corresponding period in 2021. Changes in other gains and losses were mainly attributable to gains on sales of scrap materials of approximately RMB10.3 million as compared to the gains on scrap of RMB11.4 million in the same period of last year; the decrease of approximately RMB0.6 million in the income from structured bank deposits; losses on foreign currency forward contracts were approximately RMB7.7 million in 2022, as compared to a gain of approximately RMB0.6 million in the same period in 2021; fair value gains of approximately RMB1.3 million on derivative financial instrument in 2022 as compared to the loss of approximately RMB0.7 million in 2022 as compared to the loss of approximately RMB10.7 million in 2022 as compared to the loss of approximately RMB10.7 million in 2022 as compared to the loss of approximately RMB10.7 million in 2022 as compared to the loss of approximately RMB10.7 million in 2022 as compared to the loss of approximately RMB3.5 million in the same period of 2021.

#### **DISTRIBUTION AND SELLING EXPENSES**

Distribution and selling expenses increased from approximately RMB113.5 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 by approximately 2.7% or RMB3.1 million to approximately RMB116.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, which was primarily due to the increase in business expenses.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES**

Administrative expenses increased from approximately RMB45.9 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 by approximately 17.2% or RMB7.9 million to approximately RMB53.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, which was primarily due to the increase in compensation of management staff.

#### RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT COSTS

The cost of research and development increased from approximately RMB67.1 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 by approximately 13.8% or RMB9.3 million to approximately RMB76.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. Our research and development costs accounted for approximately 3.6% of the total revenue (corresponding period in 2021: approximately 3.8%).

#### IMPAIRMENT LOSSES UNDER EXPECTED CREDIT LOSS MODEL, NET OF REVERSAL

The impairment losses under expected credit loss model, net of reversal amounted to approximately RMB5.1 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 (corresponding period in 2021: approximately RMB2.6 million), which was mainly due to the increase in the Company's trade receivables.





#### **FINANCE COSTS**

Finance costs amounted to approximately RMB5.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 (corresponding period in 2021: approximately RMB5.2 million).

#### **TAXATION CHARGE**

Taxation charge decreased from RMB14.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to RMB14.5 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, mainly due to the additional deduction policy for equipment purchased by High and New Technology Enterprises newly issued by the State Taxation Administration, the Company was entitled to this tax reduction policy.

#### PROFIT FOR THE YEAR

Profit for the year increased by approximately 20.4% or RMB23.5 million from RMB115.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to RMB138.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, which was mainly due to the increase in sales volume of SSAW steel pipes and the rise in average selling price of standard prefabricated pipe products

As at 31 December 2022, the gearing ratio of the Group, calculated based on the total interest-bearing debts divided by the total equity of the Company as at the respective period and multiplied by 100%, was approximately 8% (31 December 2021: approximately 20.1%). As at 31 December 2022, our total interest-bearing debts amounted to RMB75.9 million of bank borrowings (31 December 2021: RMB166.4 million). The decrease in gearing ratio was primarily attributable to the decline in bank loans.





#### **NET CASH GENERATED FROM OPERATING ACTIVITIES**

Our net cash generated from operating activities increased from approximately RMB22.7 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB177.8 million in for the year ended 31 December 2022. The increase in net cash generated from operating activities was mainly due to (i) an increase in cash received from sales of goods; (ii) a decrease in trade receivables backed by bills.

#### **NET CASH USED IN INVESTING ACTIVITIES**

Our net cash from investing activities changed from a net outflow of approximately RMB80.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to a net outflow of approximately RMB74.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. The change in net cash was primarily due to the change in expenses incurred for the purchase and construction of fixed assets and in structured bank deposits.

#### NET CASH (USED IN)/GENERATED FROM FINANCING ACTIVITIES

Our net cash from financing activities changed from a net inflow of approximately RMB57.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to a net outflow of approximately RMB136.1 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. The change in net cash used in financing activities was primarily due to the increase in repayment of borrowings.

#### **NET CURRENT ASSETS AND LIABILITIES**

#### Inventories

Our balance of inventories decreased by approximately RMB38.7 million or 13.4% from approximately RMB288.2 million as at 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB249.5 million as at 31 December 2022, which was mainly driven by the decrease of raw material prices.

#### TRADE RECEIVABLES AND TRADE RECEIVABLES BACKED BY BILLS

Our trade receivables increased by approximately RMB73.9 million or 27.7% from approximately RMB266.2 million as at 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB340.1 million as at 31 December 2022, mainly due to the increase in sales during the period and trade receivables being not yet due for payment.

Our trade receivables backed by bills decreased by approximately RMB50.7 million or 80.9% from approximately RMB62.7 million as at 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB12.0 million as at 31 December 2022, mainly due to maturity of bank bills previously received.





#### **CONTRACT ASSETS**

Our contract assets increased from approximately RMB25.9 million as of 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB26.9 million as of 31 December 2022, mainly due to contract assets increase in sales.

#### DEPOSITS, PREPAYMENTS AND OTHER RECEIVABLES

Our deposits, prepayments and other receivables increased from approximately RMB74.1 million as at 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB121.4 million as at 31 December 2022, mainly due to the increase in prepayment for raw materials.

#### AMOUNTS DUE FROM/TO RELATED PARTIES

Amounts due from related parties increased from approximately RMB4.6 million as at 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB7.3 million as at 31 December 2022, mainly due to the trade receivables at the end of the year.

Amounts due to related parties increased from approximately RMB0.7 million as at 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB4.8 million as at 31 December 2022, mainly due to the trade payables at the end of the year.

#### TRADE AND BILL PAYABLES

Our trade and bill payables decreased from approximately RMB93.0 million as of 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB90.7 million as of 31 December 2022, mainly due to the outstanding trade payables to our suppliers at the end of the year.

#### **CONTRACT LIABILITIES**

Our contract liabilities of approximately RMB41.8 million as of 31 December 2022 (corresponding period in 2021: approximately RMB41.8 million) was related to the timing of delivery of products to our customers.

#### **REFUND LIABILITIES**

Our refund liabilities decreased from approximately RMB13.4 million as of 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB10.6 million as of 31 December 2022, primarily due to the settlement of liabilities.

#### OTHER PAYABLES AND ACCRUED CHARGES

Our other payables and accrued charges increased from approximately RMB61.0 million as of 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB81.3 million as of 31 December 2022, which was mainly due to the increase of accrued charges and conditional government grants received.





#### **PROVISIONS**

Our provisions increased from approximately RMB1.4 million as of 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB2.2 million as of 31 December 2022. Provisions represent warranty provided for our sold products.

#### **BORROWINGS**

Our borrowings decreased from approximately RMB166.4 million as of 31 December 2021 to approximately RMB75.9 million as of 31 December 2022, mainly due to a decline in bank loans. The Group's borrowing of approximately RMB75.9 million as at 31 December 2022 was repayable within one year.

#### **LEASE LIABILITIES**

As of 31 December 2022, the Group rented three properties in the PRC, Vietnam and Thailand respectively to operate its factories and the lease liabilities were measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not yet paid. We recorded lease liabilities of approximately RMB3.5 million.

#### **FOREIGN CURRENCY RISK**

A substantial majority of our assets and liabilities are denominated in RMB, except for the following items:

- (i) certain bank balances are denominated in USD, HKD, VND and THB;
- (ii) sales of goods to overseas customers and related trade receivables are denominated in USD.

The appreciation or devaluation of RMB against USD or HKD or VND or THB may have an impact on the financial performance of the Group. The Group mainly manages potential fluctuations in foreign exchange through foreign currency forward contracts, and it has not entered into any hedging transactions.

#### **DIVIDEND**

The Board has recommended the payment of a final dividend of HK10 cents per ordinary share of the Company issued (approximately HKD43,880,000 in aggregate) for the year ended 31 December 2022 in cash (2021: HK10 cents).

The proposed dividend payment is subject to approval by the Shareholders at the forthcoming AGM to be held on 31 May 2023 and will be payable around 6 July 2023 in HKD.

Upon Shareholders' approval, the proposed final dividend will be paid to Shareholders whose names shall appear on the register of members of the Company on 16 June 2023.

The Company did not declare interim dividend for the six months ended 30 June 2022 (2021: Nil).





#### **PLEDGE OF ASSETS**

As at 31 December 2022, our Group pledged certain property, plant, equipment, right-of-use assets, trade receivables backed by bills and pledged bank deposits with the total net carrying amount of approximately RMB130.5 million (31 December 2021: approximately RMB117.7 million) to secure banking facilities granted to the Group.

#### **CONTINGENT LIABILITIES**

As at 31 December 2022, the Group did not have any material contingent liabilities.

## SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENTS HELD BY THE GROUP, MATERIAL ACQUISITIONS AND DISPOSALS OF SUBSIDIARIES, ASSOCIATES AND JOINT VENTURES

For the year ended 31 December 2022, there was no significant investments held by the Group, and the Company had no material acquisition and disposal of subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures.

#### FUTURE PLANS FOR MATERIAL INVESTMENTS OR CAPITAL ASSETS

Save as disclosed in the Prospectus, the Group did not have any other plans for material investments or capital assets during the year ended 31 December 2022 and up to the date of this annual report.

#### **EMPLOYEES**

For the year ended 31 December 2022, labour costs (including Directors' remunerations and emoluments in other forms) were approximately RMB106.1 million (for the year ended 31 December 2021: RMB107.4 million). Our Group's employees are generally remunerated by way of fixed salary, and commission will be awarded to our marketing staff if they have achieved certain sales targets. The Group utilises an appraisal system for our employees and considers the appraisal results of individual employees when conducting their salary reviews, making promotion decisions and determining the amount of bonuses. Our Group's employees are also entitled to a performance-based bonus, paid leave and various subsidies. As the Group believes that nurturing outstanding employees is particularly important for the development of enterprises, it provides employees with sufficient training to ensure that they can carry out their work safely and with due diligence. Employees in different positions are provided with various training and development programmes related to their necessary skills and knowledge.





As of 31 December 2022, we had 1,059 employees (31 December 2021: 1,073 employees), 949 of whom are in the PRC (including Hong Kong), 54 of whom work in Vietnam, and 56 of whom work in Thailand. A breakdown of our employees by functions is set forth below:

#### **EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO THE REPORTING PERIOD**

Save as disclosed, there were no significant events subsequent to 31 December 2022 which would materially affect the Group's operating and financial performance as of the date of this annual report.

#### **PROSPECTS**

The global economy in 2022 has been weakened by political conflicts such as the Russo-Ukrainian war and the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Meanwhile, the situation was worsened by the raised interest rates by FED beyond expectation with commodities collectively under pressure, and resulted in a sharp fall in steel prices in June – July 2022. Affected by the economic cycle, the construction industry, such as real estate, recorded a lower operating rate, which had a greater impact on the pipeline industry. The Ministry of Finance of the PRC funded \$60.3 billion in water resources development in 2022 and \$94.1 billion in advance for 2023 to support the construction of water resources projects. The continuous promotion of 102 major construction projects under the "14th Five-Year Plan" will increase the investment in China's infrastructure, laying the foundation for the development pipeline industry, and providing opportunities for the Company's performance growth.





Based on current situation, the Group will strengthen its own capacity building. It will adopt the following strategies to realize sustainable growth, further enhance its position in the pipe prefabrication industry, and create long-term value for the Shareholders: (1) in terms of sales activities, it will leverage its regional advantages, train its human resource reserves, driven by its major projects assisted by its differentiated services and achieve its product increment through the supply channels in the PRC, Vietnam and Thailand; (2) in terms of product design and optimization, it will focus on the sales demand, leverage external research and development resources, continuously benchmark learning, introduce research and development system and enhance its upgrade; (3) in terms of operating management, it will optimize the production lines to increase its production capacity, focus on the major issues to improve its quality, set a benchmark for remedying shortcomings to lower the costs, support the production and sales through sunshine purchase and digital applications to lower the costs; (4) in terms of customer services, it will invent a systematic model to create value for customers, and improve its product quality and service efficiency to increase customer stickiness.

#### THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC AFFECTING MARKET SALES

In 2022, the outbreak of COVID-19 in China's different places affected its transportation, resulting in a disruption of our production lines and upstream and downstream logistics and transportation, preventing us from reaching full production capacity. Due to the pandemic control policy, some domestic projects have been halted, and downstream demand has been suppressed and lagged. Since China's full opening in December 2022, the impact of COVID-19 on market sales gradually diminished and is unlikely to have a significant impact in the future.

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

Our management has designed and implemented a risk management policy to address various potential risks identified in relation to the operation of our businesses, including strategic, operational, financial and legal risks. Our risk management policy sets forth procedures to identify, analyse, categorise, mitigate and monitor various risks. Our Board is responsible for overseeing the overall risk management system and assessing and updating our risk management policy on a quarterly basis. Our risk management policy also sets forth the reporting hierarchy of risks identified in our operations.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL POLICIES AND PERFORMANCE**

The major pollutants generated by the Group in the manufacturing process include various kinds of exhaust gas and wastewater which could be harmful to human body. We comply with Chinese, Vietnamese and Thai environmental laws and regulations promulgated by national and local governments. With a commitment to bringing the idea of environmental protection into our daily operations, we have established a management system that is taken charge of by the Board, navigated by the management, and operated with interdepartmental cooperation, during the reporting period. Until today, the Company was awarded as a national-level green factory, while Jinan Ma Steel was awarded as a municipal-level green factory.





The Directors are pleased to present this directors' report together with the audited consolidated financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2022.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Company is investment holding. The principal activities of its subsidiaries are mainly engaged in the manufacturing of steel pipe products and the prefabricated pipe nipple products. Details of the subsidiaries are disclosed in note 40 of the consolidated financial statements of the Group in this annual report.

#### **BUSINESS REVIEW**

A review of the business of the Group during the year ended 31 December 2022 and the discussion on the Group's future business development are set out in the section headed "Management Discussion and Analysis" in this annual report. The description key financial performance indicators are set out in the section headed "Management Discussion and Analysis" on pages 16 to 28 of this annual report. The details of the description of principal risks and uncertainties facing the Group are disclosed in note 37 and 38 of the consolidated financial statements of the Group in this annual report.

#### Relationships with employees, customers and suppliers

The Group's success also depends on the support from key stakeholders which comprise employees, customers and suppliers.

#### Employees

Employees are regarded as important and valuable assets of the Group. The objective of the Group's human resource management is to reward and recognise performing staff by providing a competitive remuneration package and implementing performance appraisal system, and to promote career development and progression by offering training and providing opportunities within the Group for career advancement.

#### Customers

The Group's customers mainly include gas and HVAC companies, water supply companies, infrastructure and construction companies, wholesalers and distributors which on-sell our products to their own customers. The Group provides professional and quality services whilst maintaining long term profitability and business growth.

#### Suppliers

We firmly believe that our suppliers are equally important in cost control and increasing our bargaining power on procurement of materials, which further secures our competitive position. We proactively communicate with suppliers to ensure they are committed to delivering high-quality and sustainable products and services.

During the year ended 31 December 2022, there was no material dispute or disagreement between the Group and its employees, customers or suppliers.





#### Regulatory and legal compliance

The Group recognises the importance of compliance with regulatory requirements and risks of non-compliance with such requirements. So far as the Directors is aware, the Group has complied in all material respects with the relevant laws and regulations that have significant impact on the business of the Group.

#### **RESULTS AND FINAL DIVIDENDS**

The Group's results for the year ended 31 December 2022 are set out in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income on page 61 of this annual report.

The Board has recommended the payment of a final dividend of HK10 cents per ordinary share of the Company issued (approximately HKD43,380,000 in aggregate) for the year ended 31 December 2022 in cash (2021: HK10 cents).

The proposed dividend payment is subject to approval by the shareholders of the Company at the forthcoming AGM to be held on 31 May 2023 and will be payable around 6 July 2023 in HKD.

Upon shareholders' approval, the proposed final dividend will be paid to ordinary shareholders whose names shall appear on the register of members of the Company on 16 June 2023.

The Company did not declare interim dividend for the six months ended 30 June 2022 (2021: Nil).

#### **CLOSURE OF REGISTER OF MEMBERS**

The register of members of the Company will be closed during the following periods:

In order to establish entitlements to the proposed final dividend, all completed transfer documents accompanied by the relevant share certificates have to be lodged with the Company's branch share registrar, Computershare Hong Kong Investor Services Limited of Shops 1712–1716, 17th Floor, Hopewell Centre, 183 Queen's Road East, Wanchai, Hong Kong, for registration not later than 4:30 p.m. on Monday, 12 June 2023.





#### **USE OF PROCEEDS**

The Company has raised gross proceeds of approximately HKD224.4 million (RMB201.8 million) through the global offering upon the Listing. After deducting the listing expenses, the net proceeds amounted to approximately HKD183.6 million (RMB166.4 million). Such net proceeds are intended to be applied in the same manner and the same proportion as disclosed in the section headed "Future Plans and Use of Proceeds" of the Prospectus.

The total salaries and related costs granted to employees amounted to approximately RMB106.1 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. The remuneration packages of employees are determined based on their qualifications, position and experience. The Group has designed an annual review system to assess the performance of its employees, which forms the basis of its decisions with respect to salary raises, bonuses and promotion.

The remuneration of the Directors is decided by the Board upon the recommendation from the Remuneration Committee after considering the relevant Director's qualifications, experience, responsibilities, duties and performance.

Details of the emoluments of the Directors and five highest paid individuals are set out in notes 6 to the consolidated financial statements, respectively.

Save as disclosed above, there was no other long-term incentive schemes of the Group at the date of this report.

Mr. Kong wholly owns Ningbo Ming De Heng Sheng Investment Limited (寧波明德恒生投資有限公司), a company established under the laws of the PRC, which in turn owns 35.49% of Meide. Mr. Kong also holds 6.5% limited partnership interest in and is the general partner of Jinan Gong Chuang Meide Corporate Partnership (Limited Partnership)(濟南共創政德企業管理合夥企業(有限合夥)), which in turn owns 64.51% of Meide. Accordingly, Meide is an associate of Mr. Kong as defined under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules and therefore a connected person of the Company.

As the 2019 products supply framework agreement dated 22 November 2019 (the "2019 Products Supply Framework Agreement") expired on 31 December 2021, on 29 December 2021 (after trading hours), a framework products supply agreement (the "2022 Products Supply Framework Agreement") was entered into between the Company on behalf of the Group as the vendor and Meide on behalf of Meide together with its subsidiaries as the purchaser, under which the Group agreed to sell products including steel pipes, standard prefabricated pipe nipples, and other products as specified in the 2022 Products Supply Framework Agreement to Meide Group. The 2022 Products Supply Framework Agreement renewed and revised the transactions contemplated under the 2019 Products Supply Framework Agreement and is effective for three years and may be renewed by the Company, subject to compliance with the requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules and all other applicable laws and regulations. The annual cap of this continuing connected transaction for the year ended 31 December 2022 was RMB76.8 million, in aggregate (RMB48 million for distribution and RMB28.8 million for internal use within Meide Group). The aggregate amounts for the sales of products under the 2022 Products Supply Framework Agreement to Meide Group for distribution and for internal use within Meide Group for the year ended 31 December 2022 were approximately RMB35.5 million and RMB22.2 million respectively.

#### Products purchase framework agreement

As the 2019 products purchase framework agreement (the "2019 Products Purchase Framework Agreement") expired on 31 December 2021, on 29 December 2021 (after trading hours), the Company as the purchaser and Meide as the vendor entered into the 2022 products purchase Framework agreement (the "2022 Products Purchase Framework Agreement"), under which the Group agreed to purchase products including pipe fittings, repair parts, valves and crafts from Meide Group. The 2022 Products Purchase Framework Agreement renewed and revised the transactions contemplated under the 2019 Products Purchase Framework Agreement and is effective for three years and may be renewed by the Company, subject to compliance with the requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules and all other applicable laws and regulations. The annual cap of this continuing connected transaction for the year ended 31 December 2022 was RMB37.26 million. The aggregate amounts for purchases of products under the 2022 Products Purchase Framework Agreement from Meide Group for the year ended 31 December 2022 was approximately RMB15.2 million.

#### Listing Rules implications

As one or more of the applicable percentage ratios as defined under the Listing Rules in respect of the largest annual caps under the 2022 Products Supply Framework Agreement and the 2022 Products Purchase Framework Agreement exceed 5%, the transactions under the 2022 Products Supply Framework Agreement and the 2022 Products Purchase Framework Agreement constitute a non-exempt continuing connected transaction of the Company and is subject to the reporting, annual review, announcement, circular (including independent financial advice) and independent shareholders' approval requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules. Pursuant to Rule 14A.105 of the Listing Rules, the Stock Exchange has granted to the Company a waiver from strict compliance with the announcement and independent shareholders' approval requirements of the Listing Rules, subject to the aggregate values of the continuing connected transactions for each financial year not exceeding the relevant amounts set forth in the respective annual caps (as stated above).

The independent non-executive Directors have reviewed the continuing connected transaction set out above and have confirmed that these continuing connected transactions were entered into (i) in the ordinary and usual course of business of the Group; (ii) on normal commercial terms or on terms no less favourable to the Group than terms available to or from independent third parties; and (iii) in accordance with the relevant agreement governing them on terms that are fair and reasonable and in the interests of the Shareholders of the Company as a whole. Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu, the Company's auditors, were engaged to report on the Group's continuing connected transaction in accordance with Hong Kong Standard on Assurance Engagements 3000 Assurance Engagements Other Than Audits or Reviews of Historical Financial Information and with reference to Practice Note 740 Auditor's Letter on Continuing Connected Transactions under the Hong Kong Listing Rules issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu have issued their unqualified letter in accordance with rule 14A.56 of the Listing Rules concluding the followings:

- (a) nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the above continuing connected transaction has not been approved by the Board;
- (b) nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the transactions were not, in all material aspects, in accordance with the pricing policies of the Company;
- (c) nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the transactions were not entered into, in all material respects, in accordance with the relevant agreements governing such transactions; and
- (d) nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the above continuing connected transactions have exceeded the annual cap as set by the Company.

A copy of the auditor's letter has been provided by the Company to the Stock Exchange.

#### **Trademark Licensing Agreement**

On 31 March 2019, a trademark licensing agreement was entered on between Meide Group and the Company pursuant to which Meide agreed to irrevocably grant the exclusive right to our Company (and its subsidiaries) the right to use Meide's trademarks for business operation globally for nil consideration for an initial term of 10 years commencing on the date of the Trademark Licensing Agreement and will be renewed automatically every 10 years from the initial expiry date to the extent permissible under the Listing Rules, relevant laws and regulations (the "Trademark Licensing Agreement"). The provisions under this agreement provided for mutual termination by parties and does not provide for unilateral termination by our Company or Meide.

The transactions under Trademark Licensing Agreement fall within de minimis threshold as stipulated under Rule 14A.76(1)(a) of the Listing Rules, given that nil consideration is payable, and will be exempt from the reporting, announcement, annual review and independent shareholders' approval requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules.





#### A Lease Agreement in relation to a factory facility in Thailand

On 31 March 2021, Delta Electric (Thailand) (as Lessee) entered into a lease agreement with Thai Steel Pipe (as Lessor) in respect of a factory facility in Thailand for a term of 2.75 years (the "Lease Agreement"). The Lease Agreement will commence from 1 April 2021 and expiring on 31 December 2023. The aggregated value of the Rent payable shall amount to THB31.8 million (approximately HKD7.92 million). Siam Fittings Company Limited ("Thai Steel Pipe") is an indirect wholly owned subsidiary of Meide, which is in turn controlled by Mr. Kong. Therefore Thai Steel Pipe is a connected person of the Company under the Listing Rules. As such, under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules, the transactions contemplated under the Lease Agreement constitute a one-off connected transaction of the Company.

Except for the interest expenses charged by Meide, all of the Group's related party transactions as disclosed in note 34 to the Group's consolidated financial statements constitute continuing connected transactions or connected transactions as defined in Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules.

The Company conditionally adopted the Share Option Scheme pursuant to a written resolution passed by its shareholder on 19 November 2019. The Share Option Scheme took effect on 18 December 2019 upon listing of the Company's shares on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange. Summary of the principal terms of the Share Option Scheme is as follows:

#### (i) Purpose of the Share Option Scheme

The purpose of the Share Option Scheme is to enable our Group to grant options as defined in the Share Option Scheme to selected participants as incentives or rewards for their contributions to our Group. The Board has not specified any performance target that must be achieved before options can be exercised.

Given that the Board are entitled to determine any performance targets to be achieved and that the exercise price of an option cannot in any event fall below the price stipulated in the Listing Rules or such higher price as may be fixed by the Board, it is expected that grantees of an option will make an effort to contribute to the development of our Group so as to bring about an increase of market price of the Shares in order to capitalise on the benefits of the options granted.

#### (ii) Participants

The Board may, at their absolute discretion, invite any person belonging to any of the following classes of participants (the "Eligible Persons"), to take up options to subscribe for Shares.

Any individual, being an employee (whether full time or part time), director (including independent non-executive Director), officer, consultant, advisor, distributor, contractor, customer, supplier, agent, business partner, joint venture business partner or service provider of our Company, its subsidiaries or any entity (the "Invested Entity") who the Board considers, in their sole discretion, to have contributed or will contribute to our Company, is entitled to be offered and granted options.

#### (iii) Maximum number of Shares

The total number of Shares which may be issued upon exercise of all options to be granted under the Share Option Scheme and any other share option schemes of our Company must not in aggregate exceed 43,380,000 Shares, being 10.0% ("Scheme Mandate Limit") of the Shares in issue immediately after completion of the Global Offering (without taking into account of the Shares which may be issued upon exercise of any options that may be granted under the Share Option Scheme) unless our Company obtains a fresh approval from its Shareholders Options lapsed in accordance with the terms of the Share Option Scheme will not be counted for the purpose of calculating the Scheme Mandate Limit.

#### (iv) Maximum entitlement of each participant

The total number of Shares issued and which may fall to be issued upon exercise of the options granted under the Share Option Scheme (including both exercised or outstanding options) to each Eligible Person in any 12-month period must not exceed 1.0% of the issued share capital of our Company for the time being (the "Individual Limit"). Any further grant of options in excess of the Individual Limit in any 12-month period up to and including the date of such further grant must be subject to the issue of a circular to the Shareholders and the Shareholders' approval in general meeting of our Company with such Eligible Person and its associates abstaining from voting.

#### (v) Time of exercise of option

An option may be exercised in accordance with the terms of the Share Option Scheme at any time during a period as the Board may determine which shall not exceed 10 years from the offer date subject to the provisions of termination thereof.

Subject to the discretion of the Board who may impose restrictions on the exercise of the option, an option may be exercised one year after the date on which the option is granted and shall expire on the earlier of the last day of (i) a six years period from the date of such grant and (ii) the expiration of the Share Option Scheme.

#### (vi) Minimum period

The Board at its discretion may impose such terms and conditions of the offer of grant on a case-by-case basis including but not limited to the minimum period for which an option must be held.

#### (vii) Payment on acceptance of option

A consideration of HK\$1.00 (or such other nominal sum in any currency as the Board may determine) in favour of the Company is payable by the participant who accepts the grant of an option in accordance with the terms of the Share Option Scheme on acceptance of the grant of an option.





#### (viii) Basis of determining the exercise price

The subscription price ("Subscription Price") for Shares under the Share Option Scheme shall be a price determined by the Directors, but shall not be less than the highest of (i) the closing price of Shares as stated in the Stock Exchange's daily quotations on the date of grant of that option, which must be a business day; (ii) the average closing price of Shares as stated in the Stock Exchange's daily quotations for the five business days immediately preceding the date of grant of that option; provided that in the event that any option is proposed to be granted within a period of less than five business days after the trading of the Shares first commences on the Stock Exchange, the new issue price of the Shares for the Global Offering shall be used as the closing price for any business day falling within the period before listing of the Shares on the Stock Exchange; and (iii) the nominal value of the Shares.

#### (ix) The remaining life of the Share Option Scheme

The Share Option Scheme will remain in force for a period of 10 years commencing from the Adoption Date. As at the date of this report, it has a remaining life of around 6.5 years.

No share options were granted, exercised, cancelled or lapsed under the Scheme since the adoption of the Scheme and up to the date of this annual report.

#### MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the aggregate revenue from the Group's largest customer and five largest customers accounted for approximately of 8.3% and 20.8% of the total revenue, respectively. Purchases from the Group's largest supplier and five largest suppliers accounted for approximately of 21.5% and 64.9% of the total purchases for the year ended 31 December 2022, respectively.

None of the Directors or any of their associates or any Shareholders (which to the best knowledge of the Directors, own more than 5% of the number of issued Shares Company) had any beneficial interest in the Group's five largest customers or suppliers.

#### SUFFICIENCY OF PUBLIC FLOAT

Based on information that is publicly available to the Company and within the knowledge of the Directors, the Company had maintained the prescribed public float requirements under the Listing Rules from the Listing Date and up to the date of this annual report.

#### CORPORATE GOVERNANCE PRACTICES

The Company is committed to maintaining high standard of corporate governance to protect the interest of its Shareholders and to place importance on its corporate governance system. The Company has adopted the Corporate Governance Code contained in Appendix 14 to the Listing Rules issued by the Stock Exchange as its own code of corporate governance.

This report describes the Company's corporate governance practices and structures that were in place during the financial year ended 31 December 2022, with specific reference to the principles and guidelines of the Corporate Governance Code as set out in Appendix 14 of the Listing Rules issued by the Stock Exchange.

The Board considers that the balance of power and authority under the present arrangement will not be impaired and this structure will enable the Company to make and implement decisions promptly and effectively.

Save as disclosed, during the year ended 31 December 2022, in the opinion of the Directors, the Company has complied with the applicable code provisions of the Corporate Governance Code as set out in Appendix 14 to the Listing Rules.

The Company will continue to review and monitor its corporate governance practices to ensure compliance with the Corporate Governance Code.

#### **DIRECTORS' SECURITIES TRANSACTIONS**

The Company has adopted the Model Code as set in Appendix 10 to the Listing Rules as its own code of conduct regarding securities transactions by the Directors.

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Board at all times met the requirements of the Listing Rules relating to the appointment of at least three independent non-executive Directors representing at least one-third of the Board and at least one independent non-executive Director with appropriate professional qualifications, or accounting or related financial management expertise.





Following the resignation of Mr. Ma Changcheng on 1 April 2023, the Board will still have at least one INED possessing appropriate professional qualifications or accounting or related financial management expertise as required by Rule 3.10(2) of the Listing Rules. However, it will fail to meet the requirement of (i) Rule 3.10(1) and Rule 3.10A of the Listing Rules in relation to the composition of the Board; (ii) Rule 3.21 of the Listing Rules in relation to the composition of the Audit Committee; (iii) Rule 3.25 of the Listing Rules in relation to the composition of the Remuneration Committee and (iv) Rule 3.27A of the Listing Rules in relation to the composition of the Nomination Committee. The Company has already identified potential candidate(s) to fill the vacancy of the INED and the chairman and member(s) of the Remuneration Committee and member(s) of the Audit Committee and Nomination Committee (as the case may be). The Company will use its best endeavours to ensure that suitable candidate(s) is appointed as soon as practicable in order to ensure compliance with the Listing Rules. The Company expects replacements to be appointed within three months from 1 April 2023 pursuant to Rules 3.11, 3.23 and 3.27 of the Listing Rules

#### Independence of the independent non-executive Directors

The Company has received annual written confirmations from all independent non-executive Directors with regard to their independence, and therefore the Company still consider, based on the guidelines set out in Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules, that all independent non-executive Directors to be independent.

#### Continuous professional development

During the year ended 31 December 2022, all of the Directors participated in continuous professional development by either attending external seminars and conferences, or reading materials relating corporate governance practices, directors' duty and the Listing Rules.

#### Chairman and Chief Executive

Mr. Guo Lei currently serves as the chairman of the Board and the chief executive officer of the Company.

Pursuant to code provision C.2.1 of the Corporate Governance Code as set out in Appendix 14 to the Listing Rules, the responsibilities between the chairman and the chief executive officer should be segregated and should not be performed by the same individual. However, upon the appointment of chairman of the Board, we do not have a separate chairman and chief executive officer and Mr. Guo Lei is performing these two roles. Throughout the business history of the Group, Mr. Guo Lei, has held key leadership positions of the Group and has been deeply involved in the formulation of corporate strategies and management of the business and operations of the Group since its establishment. Taking into account the consistent leadership within the Group, the Board believes that it is in the best interests of the Group and the Shareholders as a whole to have Mr. Guo Lei taking up both roles for effective and efficient overall strategic planning and continuation of the implementation of such plans for the Group. The Board considers that the balance of power and authority under the present arrangement will not be impaired and this structure will enable the Company to make and implement decisions promptly and effectively.





#### Appointment & re-election of Directors

The procedures and process of appointment and re-election of the Directors are laid down in the Articles. Pursuant to the Articles, one-third of the Directors for the time being shall retire from office by rotation at every annual general meeting of the Company, provided that every Director shall retire from office by rotation and are subject to re-election at annual general meeting at least once every three years. Directors who are appointed to fill casual vacancies shall hold office only until the next following general meeting after their appointment, and are subject to re-election by the Shareholders.

Mr. Guo Lei, Mr. Yang Shufeng, Mr. Wang Ning and Mr. Ding Xiaodong will retire by rotation and, being eligible, will offer themselves for re-election at the forthcoming general meeting.

#### Indemnity of Directors

The Company has taken out directors and officers liability insurance to cover liabilities arising from legal action against the Directors.

#### **Board Committees**

The Board has established three Board committees, being the Audit Committee, the Nomination Committee and the Remuneration Committee, to oversee different areas of the Company's affairs. The terms of reference of the Board committees are published on the Company's website and the website of the Stock Exchange.

#### CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FUNCTION

The Board recognises that corporate governance should be the collective responsibility of Directors and the corporate governance duties include:

- (a) to develop and review the Company's policies and practices on corporate governance;

The primary duties of the Audit Committee include among other matters, to review and supervise the financial reporting process and internal control system of our Group, oversee the audit process, provide advice and comments to our Board, perform other duties and responsibilities as may be assigned by our Board and review and oversee the risk management of our Company, by satisfying themselves as to the effectiveness of the Company's internal controls and as to the efficiency of the audits.

The Audit Committee consists of two members, namely Mr. Ding Xiaodong and Mr. Liu Fengyuan. Mr. Ding Xiaodong has been appointed as the chairman of the Audit Committee, and is the independent non-executive Director who possesses the appropriate professional accounting and related financial management expertise. All members of the Audit Committee are independent non-executive Directors.

The work performed by the Audit Committee during the year ended 31 December 2022 comprises the following:

- reviewed the annual results announcement and the annual report of the Group for the year ended 31
   December 2021;
- reviewed the interim results announcement and the interim report of the Group for the six months ended 30 June 2022;

- reviewed and monitoring the independence of the Company's external auditor, objectivity and the

The Remuneration Committee consists of two members, namely Mr. Liu Fengyuan and Mr. Guo Lei. Mr. Liu Fengyuan, our independent non-executive Director, has been appointed as the chairman of the Remuneration Committee. The majority of the Remuneration Committee members are independent non-executive Directors. Mr. Liu Fengyuan is independent non-executive Directors and Mr. Guo Lei is an executive Director.

The primary duties of the Nomination Committee include, among other matters, to review the structure, size and composition of our Board on a regular basis and make recommendations to our Board regarding any proposed changes to the composition of our Board, identify, select or make recommendations to our Board on the selection of individuals nominated for directorship, ensure the diversity of our Board members, assess the independence of our independent non-executive Directors and make recommendations to our Board on relevant matters relating to the appointment, reappointment and removal of our Directors.

The Nomination Committee consists of two members, namely Mr. Guo Lei and Mr. Liu Fengyuan. Mr. Guo Lei, our Chairman and executive Director, has been appointed as the chairman of the Nomination Committee. The majority of the Nomination Committee members are independent non-executive Directors. Mr. Liu Fengyuan is independent non-executive Directors and Mr. Guo Lei is an executive Director.

The work performed by the Nomination Committee during the year ended 31 December 2022 comprises the following:

- reviewed the structure, size and composition (including the skills, knowledge and experience) of the Board at least annually and making recommendations on any proposed changes to the Board to complement the Company's corporate strategy;
- identifying individuals suitably qualified to become members of the Board and selecting or making recommendations to the Board on the selection of individuals nominated for directorships;
- made recommendations to the Board on the appointment or re-appointment of directors and succession planning for directors, in particular the chairman and the chief executive, taking into account the Company's corporate strategy and the mix of skills, knowledge, experience and diversity needed in the future, together with the Board, as appropriate;
- assessed the independence of independent non-executive directors in accordance with the provisions
  of the Listing Rules and other relevant laws, rules and regulations; and
- reviewed the board diversity policy, developed and reviewed measurable objectives for implementing the board diversity policy and monitoring the progress on achieving these objectives.





#### **Board Diversity Policy**

The Board recognises the importance of diversity in the Board composition and has adopted a board diversity policy which sets out the approach to achieve a sustainable and balanced development of the Company and also to enhance the quality of performance of the Company. In designing the Board's composition, selection of candidates has been considered from a number of perspectives and measurable objectives, including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, industry experience, technical and professional skills and/or qualifications, knowledge, length of services and time to be devoted as a director. The Company will also take into account factors relating to its own business model and specific needs from time to time. The ultimate decision is based on merit and contribution that the selected candidates will bring to the Board.

The Nomination Committee has considered and reviewed the composition and diversity of the Board. All the executive Directors and non-executive Director possess extensive and diversified experience in management and industrial experience. The three independent non-executive Directors possess professional knowledge in management, finance, accounting and legal aspects. The Nomination Committee will review the board diversity policy, as appropriate, to ensure its effectiveness.

The Nomination Committee recognises that the gender diversity of the Board and will continue to use its best efforts, to train, retain, attracts and select suitable female candidates that can contribute success to the Group. As at the date of this report, the Board comprises seven male directors and one female director.

As at 31 December 2022, approximately 23% of the Group's employees (including senior management) are female and 77% are male.

#### Board and Board committee meetings

Code provision A.1.1 of the Corporate Governance Code states that at least four regular Board meetings should be held each year at approximately quarterly intervals with active participation of a majority of Directors, either in person or through other electronic means of communication.

The Directors acknowledge their responsibilities for the preparation of the consolidated financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2022 that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Group in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards. The Directors were not aware of any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions which may cast significant doubt upon the Group's ability to continue as a going concern.

The reporting responsibilities of the Company's auditor with regards to the consolidated financial statements of the Group are set out in the independent auditor's report as contained in this annual report.

As Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu is relatively familiar with the Group's financials and affairs, the Board considers that the audit and other related work in respect of the Group for the year ending 31 December 2022 could be performed more efficiently by Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu, which is in the best interests of the Company and the Shareholders as a whole.

#### RISK MANAGEMENT AND INTERNAL CONTROL

The Board is responsible for evaluating and determining the nature and extent of the risks the Company is willing to take in achieving the Company's strategic objectives, and ensuring that the Company establishes and maintains appropriate and effective risk management and internal control systems. In addition to the Board's responsibilities, the senior management of the Company has risk management processes to identify, evaluate and manage significant risks, review the effectiveness of the risk management and internal control systems and to resolve material internal control defects. The Board oversees management in the design, implementation and monitoring of the risk management and internal control systems. The Board acknowledges that such risk management and internal control systems are designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Group does not have an internal audit function and is currently of the view that there is no immediate need to set up an internal audit function within the Group in light of the size, nature and complexity of the Group's business. The Board and the Audit Committee will review the need for an internal audit function from time to time. During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Board confirms that it has conducted a review of the risk management and internal control systems of the Group by the external internal control consultant. The Board concludes, based on the result of the review, that the risk management and internal control systems currently in place are adequate and effective for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The Board expects that a review of the risk management and internal control systems will be performed annually.





With respect to the procedures and internal controls for the handling and dissemination of inside information, our Group has policy and procedures which prohibit unauthorised use and dissemination of inside information. Our Board is aware of its obligations to announce any inside information in accordance with the Listing Rules and conducts the affairs with reference to the "Guidelines on Disclosure of Inside Information" issued by the Securities and Futures Commission. In addition, only Directors and delegated officers can act as the Group's spokesperson and respond to external enquiries about the Group's affairs.

The key assumptions and estimation on allowance for ECL and the Group's credit risk management are disclosed in notes 4 and 38 to the consolidated financial statements, and further information related to trade receivables is provided in note 17 to the consolidated financial statements.

As at 31 December 2022, the Group has trade In evaluating management's impairment assessment for

- Obtaining an understanding of the relevant key controls over the assessment and monitoring of credit risks, and determination of allowance for ECL;
- Evaluating the model used by management in determining the allowance for ECL;
- Testing the integrity of information used by management to develop the provision matrix, including trade receivables aging analysis as at 31 December 2022, on a sample basis, by comparing individual items in the analysis with the relevant sales invoices and other supporting documents;
  - Challenging management's basis and judgement in determining credit loss allowance on trade receivables as at 31 December 2022, including their identification of credit-impaired trade receivables, the reasonableness of management's grouping of the remaining trade debtors into different categories in the provision matrix, and the basis of estimated loss rates applied in each category in the provision matrix (with reference to historical default rates and forward-looking information); and
- Obtaining confirmations and evidences of subsequent settlements on a sample basis for trade receivable balances.

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Maike Tube Industry Holdings Limited (the "Company") was incorporated in the Cayman Islands and registered as an exempted company with limited liability under the Companies Law Chapter 22 of the Cayman Islands on 1 February 2019. Its shares have been listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange") since 18 December 2019. The immediate holding company is Ying Stone Holdings Limited ("Ying Stone"), which was incorporated in the British Virgin Islands (the "BVI") and entirely owned by Mr. Kong Linglei (孔令磊) ("Mr. Kong"). The addresses of the registered office and the principal place of business of the Company are Vistra (Cayman) Limited P.O. Box 31119 Grand Pavilion, Hibiscus Way, 802 West Bay Road, Grand Cayman, KY1-1205 Cayman Islands and No. 4 Meide Street, Meigui Zone of Industrial Park, Pingyin County, Jinan, Shandong Province, China.

The Company is an investment holding company. The principal activities of its subsidiaries are mainly engaged in the manufacturing of steel pipe products and the prefabricated pipe nipple products. Details of the subsidiaries are disclosed in note 40. The Company and its subsidiaries are collectively referred as the "Group".

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Renminbi ("RMB"), which is the functional currency of the Company.

# 2. APPLICATION OF AMENDMENTS TO HONG KONG FINANCIAL REPORTING STANDARDS ("HKFRSs")

## 3. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 3.1 Basis of preparation of consolidated financial statements

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA. For the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements, information is considered material if such information is reasonably expected to influence decisions made by primary users. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited ("Listing Rules") and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for certain financial instruments that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these consolidated financial statements is determined on such a basis, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of HKFRS 2 Share-based payment, leasing transactions that are accounted for in accordance with HKFRS 16 Leases, and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in HKAS 2 Inventories or value in use in HKAS 36 Impairment of Assets.

For financial instruments which are transacted at fair value and a valuation technique that unobservable inputs is to be used to measure fair value in subsequent periods, the valuation technique is calibrated so that at initial recognition the results of the valuation technique equals the transaction price.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs are inputs, other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

#### 3.2 Significant accounting policies

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Company:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date when the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Profit or loss and each item of other comprehensive income are attributable to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interest. Total comprehensive income of subsidiaries is attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests even if the results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of the subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies into line with the Group's accounting policies.

All intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

Non-controlling interests in subsidiaries are presented separately from the Group's equity therein, which represent present ownership interests entitling their holders to a proportionate share of net assets of the relevant subsidiaries upon liquidation.

Changes in the Group's interests in existing subsidiaries

Changes in the Group's interests in subsidiaries that do not result in the Group losing control over the subsidiaries are accounted for as equity transactions. The carrying amounts of the Group's relevant components of equity and the non-controlling interests are adjusted to reflect the changes in their relative interests in the subsidiaries, including re-attribution of relevant reserves between the Group and the non-controlling interests according to the Group's and the non-controlling interests' proportionate interests.

Any difference between the amount by which the non-controlling interests are adjusted, and the fair value of the consideration paid or received is recognised directly in equity and attributed to owners of the Company.

Merger accounting for business combination involving businesses under common control

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements items of the combining businesses in which the common control combination occurs as if they had been combined from the date when the combining businesses first came under the control of the controlling party.

The net assets of the combining businesses are consolidated using the existing book values from the controlling party's perspective. No amount is recognised in respect of goodwill or bargain purchase gain at the time of common control combination.

The consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income include the results of each of the combining businesses from the earliest date presented or since the date when the combining businesses first came under the common control, where this is a shorter period.

The comparative amounts in the consolidated financial statements are presented as if the businesses had been combined at the beginning of the previous reporting period or when they first came under common control, whichever is shorter.

#### Revenue from contracts with customers

The Group recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, i.e. when "control" of the goods underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to customers.

A performance obligation represents a good (or a bundle of goods) that is distinct or a series of distinct goods that are substantially the same.

Control is transferred over time and the revenue is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation if one of the following criteria is met:

- the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the entity's performance as the entity performs;
- the Group's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the Group performs; or
- the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

Otherwise, revenue is recognised at a point in time when the customer obtains control of the distinct good.

A contract asset represents the Group's right to consideration in exchange for goods that the Group has transferred to a customer that is not yet unconditional. It is assessed for impairment in accordance with HKFRS 9 *Financial Instruments*. In contrast, a receivable represents the Group's unconditional right to consideration, i.e. only the passage of time is required before payment of that consideration is due.

A contract liability represents the Group's obligation to transfer goods to a customer for which the Group has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer.

A contract asset and a contract liability relating to the same contract are accounted for and presented on a net basis.

Over time revenue recognition: measurement of progress towards complete satisfaction of a performance obligation

#### Output method

The progress towards complete satisfaction of a performance obligation is measured based on output method, which is to recognise revenue on the basis of direct measurements of the value of the goods or services transferred to the customer to date relative to the remaining goods or services promised under the contract, that best depict the Group's performance in transferring control of goods or services

#### Variable consideration

For contracts that contain variable consideration (i.e. refund liabilities on volume rebates), the Group estimates the amount of consideration to which it will be entitled using the expected value method, which better predicts the amount of consideration to which the Group will be entitled.

The estimated amount of variable consideration is included in the transaction price only to the extent that it is highly probable that such an inclusion will not result in a significant revenue reversal in the future when the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved.

At the end of each reporting period, the Group updates the estimated transaction price (including updating its assessment of whether an estimate of variable consideration is constrained) to represent faithfully the circumstances present at the end of the reporting period and the changes in circumstances during the reporting period.

#### Refund liabilities

The Group recognises a refund liability if the Group expects to refund some or all of the consideration received from customers. The refund liabilities are usually paid annually.

#### Sale with a right of return

For a sale of products with a right of return, the Group recognises revenue for the transferred products in the amount of consideration to which the Group expects to be entitled (therefore, revenue would not be recognised for the products expected to be returned).

Contract costs

#### Incremental costs of obtaining a contract

Incremental costs of obtaining a contract are those costs that the Group incurs to obtain a contract with a customer that it would not have incurred if the contract had not been obtained.

The Group recognises such costs (sales commissions) as an asset if it expects to recover these costs. The asset so recognised is subsequently amortised to profit or loss on a systematic basis that is consistent with the transfer to the customer of the goods or services to which the assets relate.

The Group applies the practical expedient of expensing all incremental costs to obtain a contract if these costs would otherwise have been fully amortised to profit or loss within one year.

Leases

Definition of a lease

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

For contracts entered into or modified on or after the date of initial application of HKFRS 16 or arising from business combinations, the Group assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease based on the definition under HKFRS 16 at inception, modification date or acquisition date, as appropriate. Such contract will not be reassessed unless the terms and conditions of the contract are subsequently changed.

#### Allocation of consideration to components of a contract

For a contract that contains a lease component and one or more additional lease or non-lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components.

The Group also applies practical expedient not to separate non-lease components from lease component, and instead account for the lease component and any associated non-lease components as a single lease component.

#### Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option. It also applies the recognition exemption for lease of low-value assets. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis or another systematic basis over the lease term.

#### Right-of-use assets

The cost of right-of-use assets includes:

- the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability;
- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received;
- any initial direct costs incurred by the Group; and
- an estimate of costs to be incurred by the Group in dismantling and removing the underlying
  assets, restoring the site on which it is located or restoring the underlying asset to the
  condition required by the terms and conditions of the lease.

#### Right-of-use assets — continued

Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

Right-of-use assets in which the Group is reasonably certain to obtain ownership of the underlying leased assets at the end of the lease term are depreciated from commencement date to the end of the useful life. Otherwise, right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The Group presents right-of-use assets in "property, plant and equipment", the same line item within which the corresponding underlying assets would be presented if they were owned.

#### Refundable rental deposits

Refundable rental deposits paid are accounted under HKFRS 9 and initially measured at fair value. Adjustments to fair value at initial recognition are considered as additional lease payments and included in the cost of right-of-use assets.

#### Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of a lease, the Group recognises and measures the lease liability at the present value of lease payments that are unpaid at that date. In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses the incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date if the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable.

The lease payments include fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable.

After the commencement date, lease liabilities are adjusted by interest accretion and lease payments.

The Group presents lease liabilities as a separate line item on the consolidated statement of financial position.

#### Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rates of exchange prevailing at the dates of the transactions. At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on the retranslation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

For the purposes of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. RMB) using exchange rates prevailing at the end of each reporting period. Income and expenses items are translated at the average exchange rates for the period, unless exchange rates fluctuate significantly during that period, in which case the exchange rates at the date of transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of translation reserve (attributed to non-controlling interests as appropriate).

#### Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

#### Government grants

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Group recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate. Specifically, government grants whose primary condition is that the Group should purchase, construct or otherwise acquire non-current assets are recognised as other payables in the consolidated statement of financial position and transferred to profit or loss on a systematic and rational basis over the useful lives of the related assets.

Government grants related to income that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable. Such grants are presented under "other income".

#### Employee benefits

#### Retirement benefits costs

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit are recognised as an expense when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

#### Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are recognised at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid as and when employees rendered the services. All short-term employee benefits are recognised as an expense unless another HKFRS requires or permits the inclusion of the benefit in the cost of an asset.

A liability is recognised for benefits accruing to employees (such as wages and salaries and annual leave) after deducting any amount already paid.

#### Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the income tax expense currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit before taxation as reported in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income because of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of each reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit. In addition, deferred tax liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of goodwill.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investment and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of each reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of each reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for leasing transactions in which the Group recognises the right-of-use assets and the related lease liabilities, the Group first determines whether the tax deductions are attributable to the right-of-use assets or the lease liabilities.

For leasing transactions in which the tax deductions are attributable to the lease liabilities, the Group applies HKAS 12 Income Taxes requirements to right-of-use assets and lease liabilities separately. Temporary differences on initial recognition of the relevant right-of-use assets and lease liabilities are not recognised due to application of the initial recognition exemption. Temporary differences arising from subsequent revision to the carrying amounts of right-of-use assets and lease liabilities, resulting from remeasurement of lease liabilities and lease modifications, that are not subject to initial recognition exemption are recognised on the date of remeasurement or modification.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively. Where current tax or deferred tax arises from the initial accounting for a business combination, the tax effect is included in the accounting for the business combination.

In assessing any uncertainty over income tax treatments, the Group considers whether it is probable that the relevant tax authority will accept the uncertain tax treatment used, or proposed to be use by individual group entities in their income tax filings. If it is probable, the current and deferred taxes are determined consistently with the tax treatment in the income tax filings. If it is not probable that the relevant taxation authority will accept an uncertain tax treatment, the effect of each uncertainty is reflected by using either the most likely amount or the expected value.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are tangible assets that are held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes. Property, plant and equipment are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Properties in the course of construction for production and administrative purposes are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Costs include any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management, including costs of testing whether the related assets is functioning properly and, for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalised in accordance with the Group's accounting policy. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment, other than construction in progress, less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

Research and development costs

Expenditure on research activities is recognised as an expense in the period in which it is incurred.

Where no internally-generated intangible asset can be recognised, development expenditure is recognised in profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred.

At the end of each reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, (if any).

The recoverable amount of tangible assets are estimated individually. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an asset individually, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, corporate assets are allocated to the relevant cash-generating unit when a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be established, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be established. The recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units to which the corporate asset belongs, and is compared with the carrying amount of the relevant cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset (or a cash generating unit) for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or a cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. For corporate assets or portion of corporate assets which cannot be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis to a cash-generating unit, the Group compares the carrying amount of a group of cash-generating units, including the carrying amounts of the corporate assets or portion of corporate assets allocated to that group of cash-generating units, with the recoverable amount of the group of cash-generating units. In allocating the impairment loss, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill (if applicable) and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit or the group of cash-generating units. The carrying amount of an asset is not reduced below the highest of its fair value less costs of disposal (if measurable), its value in use (if determinable) and zero. The amount of the impairment loss that would otherwise have been allocated to the asset is allocated pro rata to the other assets of the unit or the group of cash-generating units. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents presented on the consolidated statement of financial position include:

- cash, which comprises of cash on hand and demand deposits, excluding bank balances that are subject to regulatory restrictions that result in such balances no longer meeting the definition of cash; and
- (b) cash equivalents, which comprises of short-term (generally with original maturity of three months or less), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. Cash equivalents are held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments rather than for investment or other purposes.

For the purposes of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Group's cash management. Such overdrafts are presented as short-term borrowings in the consolidated statement of financial position.

#### Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventories are determined on the weighted average cost method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for inventories less all estimated costs of completion and costs necessary to make the sale. Costs necessary to make the sale include incremental costs directly attributable to the sale and non-incremental costs which the Group must incur to make the sale.

#### **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle that obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (where the effect of the time value of money is material).

#### Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value except for trade receivables arising from contracts with customers which are initially measured in accordance with HKFRS 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers and the related Amendments. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset or financial liability and of allocating interest income and interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts and payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset or financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

A financial asset is held for trading if:

- on initial recognition it is a part of a portfolio of identified financial instruments that the Group manages together and has a recent actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or
- it is a derivative that is not designated and effective as a hedging instrument.

#### (i) Amortised cost and interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for financial assets measured subsequently at amortised cost. Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired (see below). For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset from the next reporting period. If the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset from the beginning of the reporting period following the determination that the asset is no longer credit-impaired.

#### (ii) Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets that do not meet the criteria for being measured at amortised cost or FVTOCI or designated as FVTOCI are measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets at FVTPL are measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, with any fair value gains or losses recognised in profit or loss. The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss includes any interest earned on the financial asset and is included in the "other gains and losses" line item.

The Group performs impairment assessment under expected credit loss ("ECL") model on financial assets (including trade receivables, trade receivables backed by bills, deposits and other receivables, pledged bank deposits, cash and cash equivalents and amounts due from related parties) and contract assets, which are subject to impairment assessment under HKFRS 9. The amount of ECL is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL represents the ECL that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the relevant instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date. Assessment are done based on the Group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current conditions at the reporting date as well as the forecast of future conditions.

The Group always recognises lifetime ECL for trade receivables, contract assets, trade receivables backed by bills and trade related amounts due from related parties without significant financing component.

For all other financial instruments, the Group measures the loss allowance equal to 12-month ECL, unless when there has a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Group recognises lifetime ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition.

(i) Significant increase in credit risk In assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the Group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly:

- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the financial instrument's external (if available) or internal credit rating;
- significant deterioration in external market indicators of credit risk, e.g. a significant increase in the credit spread, the credit default swap prices for the debtor;
- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor;
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

(i) Significant increase in credit risk — continued Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the Group presumes that the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

The Group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

#### (ii) Definition of default

The Group considers the following as constituting an event of default for internal credit risk management purposes as historical experience indicates that receivables that meet either of the following criteria are generally not recoverable.

- when there is a breach of financial covenants by the counterparty; or
- information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the
  debtor is unlikely to pay its creditors, including the Group, in full (without taking into
  account any collaterals held by the Group).

Irrespective of the above, the Group considers that default has occurred when the instrument is more than 50 days past due unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

#### (iii) Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial assets have been occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes observable data about the following events:

- Significant financial difficulty of the issuer of the borrower;
- A breach of contract, such as a default or past due event;
- The lender(s) of the borrower, for economic or contractual reasons relating to the borrower's financial difficulty, having granted to the borrower a concession(s) that the lender(s) would not otherwise consider;
- It is becoming probably that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation.

#### (iv) Write-off policy

The Group writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the counterparty is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, for example, when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings, or in the case of trade receivables, when the amounts are over two years past due, whichever occurs sooner. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Group's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. A write-off constitutes a derecognition event. Any subsequent recoveries are recognised in profit or loss.

(v) Measurement and recognition of ECL

The measurement of ECL is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based on historical data and forward-looking information. Estimation of ECL reflects an unbiased and probability-weighted amount that is determined with the respective risks of default occurring as the weights. The Group uses a practical expedient in estimating ECL on trade receivables using a provision matrix taking into consideration historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

Generally, the ECL is estimated as the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Group in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at the effective interest rate determined at initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL for certain trade receivables, contract assets, trade receivables backed by bills and trade related amounts due from related parties without significant financing component are considered on a collective basis taking into consideration past due information and relevant credit information such as forward looking macroeconomic information.

For collective assessment, the Group takes into consideration the following characteristics when formulating the grouping:

- Past-due status;
- Nature, size and industry of debtors; and
- External credit ratings where available.

The grouping is regularly reviewed by management to ensure the constituents of each group continue to share similar credit risk characteristics.

(v) Measurement and recognition of ECL — continued Interest income is calculated based on the gross carrying amount of the financial asset unless the financial asset is credit-impaired, in which case interest income is calculated based on amortised cost of the financial asset.

The Group recognises an impairment loss in profit or loss for all financial instruments by adjusting their carrying amount, with the exception of trade receivables, contract assets and trade nature amounts due from related parties where the corresponding adjustment is recognised through a loss allowance account.

Derecognition of financial assets

The Group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. If the Group neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Group recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the Group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Group continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities and equity

#### Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

#### **Equity instruments**

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the Company is recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

#### Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### Financial liabilities at amortised cost

Financial liabilities including trade and bill payables, other payables and accrued charges, refund liabilities, borrowings and amounts due to related parties are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

#### Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Derivative financial instruments

Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value at the date when derivative contracts are entered into and are subsequently remeasured to their fair value at the end of the reporting period. The resulting gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Generally, multiple embedded derivatives in a single instrument that are separated from the host contracts are treated as a single compound embedded derivative unless those derivatives relate to different risk exposures and are readily separable and independent of each other.

#### 4. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTIES

In the application of the Group's accounting policies, which are described in note 3, management of the Group is required to make estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The followings are the key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainties at the end of each reporting period that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

#### Provision of ECL for trade receivables and contract assets under HKFRS 9

The Group calculates ECL for the trade receivables and contract assets. The provision rates are based on internal credit ratings as groupings of various debtors that have similar loss patterns. The provision matrix are based on the Group's historical default rates taking into consideration forward-looking information that is reasonable and supportable available without undue costs or effort. At every reporting date, the historical observed default rates are reassessed and changes in the forward-looking information are considered.

The provision of ECL is sensitive to changes in estimates. The information about the ECL and the Group's trade receivables and contract assets are disclosed in note 17.

The Group's revenue are under fixed price arrangement with the customers. For sales of goods, revenue is recognised when control of the goods has transferred, being when the goods have been shipped to the customer's specific location and inspected by the customers or the goods have been loaded into shipper's trucks (delivery). Transportation and other related activities that occur before customers obtains control of the related good are considered as fulfilment activities. A receivable is recognised by the Group when the goods are delivered to the customers as this represents the point in time at which the right to consideration becomes unconditional, as only the passage of time is required before payment is due. The credit term is generally 15 to 360 days upon delivery.

Retention receivables, prior to expiration of defect liability period, are classified as contract assets, which ranges from 6 to 24 months from the date of the acceptance of the pipe products. The relevant amount of contract assets is reclassified to trade receivables when the defect liability period expires.

Sales-related warranties associated with pipe products cannot be purchased separately and they serve as an assurance that the products sold comply with agreed-upon specifications. Accordingly, the Group accounts for warranties in accordance with HKAS 37 *Provisions*, *Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets* consistent with its previous accounting treatment.

During the year ended 31 December 2022 and 2021, all performance obligations for sales of goods are for periods of one year or less. As permitted under HKFRS 15, the transaction price allocated to unsatisfied performance obligations as at the end of the reporting period is not disclosed.

#### Segmental information

The Group's operation is derived from the production and sales of pipe products in the PRC, Vietnam and Thailand. For the purpose of resources allocation and performance assessment, the chief operating decision maker ("CODM") (i.e. the chief executive officer) reviews the overall results and financial position of the Group as a whole, which are prepared based on same accounting policies set out in note 3. Accordingly, no operating segment is presented.

#### Geographical information

Information about the Group's revenue from external customers is presented based on the destination of goods in the sales orders/contracts. Information about the Group's non-current assets (excluding deferred tax assets) is presented based on the geographical location of the assets.

## Sensitivity analysis

#### Credit risk

The Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which will cause a financial loss to the Group due to failure to discharge the obligations by counterparties is arising from the carrying amount of the respective recognised financial assets as stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at the end of each reporting period. The Group does not have any collateral or other credit enhancements to cover its credit risks associated with financial assets.

The Group's credit risk is primarily attributable to its trade receivables, trade receivables backed by bills, deposits and other receivables, amounts due from related parties, pledged bank deposits and cash and cash equivalents. In order to minimise the credit risk, the management of the Group has delegated a team responsible for determination of credit limits and credit approvals. Before accepting any new customer, the Group will assess the potential customer's credit quality and defines its credit limits. Credit sales are made to customers with a satisfactory trustworthy credit history. Credit limits attributed to customers are reviewed regularly. Other monitoring procedures are in place to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debts. In addition, the Group has applied the simplified approach to measure the loss allowance on trade receivables, contract assets and trade related amounts due from related parties at lifetime ECL as disclosed in notes 17 and 22 based on provision matrix. In this regard, the directors of the Company consider that the Group's credit risk is significantly reduced.

Management of the Group regularly visits these customers to understand their business operations and cash flows position and follows up the subsequent settlement from the counterparties. In this regard, management of the Group considers that this credit concentration risk has been significantly mitigated.

For deposits and other receivables, management of the Group makes periodic collective assessment on the recoverability of deposits and other receivables based on historical settlement records and past experience. The management of the Group believes that there is no material credit risk inherent in the Group's outstanding balance of deposits and other receivables. The Group recognises the 12-month ECL on deposits and other receivables, and there was no significant increase in credit risk on other receivables.

The Group have concentration of credit risk on liquid funds which are deposited with several banks. However, the credit risk on bank balance, time deposits and pledged bank deposits is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit ratings assigned by international credit-rating agencies and 12-month ECL is insignificant.

#### Liquidity risk

In the management of liquidity risk, the Group monitors and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate by the management of the Group to finance its operations and mitigates the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

The following tables detail the Group's remaining contractual maturity for its financial liabilities. The tables have been drawn up based on the undiscounted cash flows of financial liabilities based on the earliest date on which the Group can be required to pay.
